MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 2151.

City of New York—Office of the Mayor, {
July 21, 1905. }

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, without my approval, a resolution passed by your Honorable Body July 11, 1905, entitled:

"Resolution granting permission to Fred. P. Snyder to erect and maintain a stand for the sale of fruit in front of premises owned by City at Manhattan street and Broadway."

I am informed that the purpose of this resolution is to permit the erection and maintenance of a stand for the sale of fruit under or adjacent to the elevated stairway situated at Manhattan street and Broadway.

Under the provisions of the existing ordinance no license can be issued for fruit stands underneath an elevated stairway, such stands being confined to the sale of newspapers and periodicals. Section 50 of the Greater New York Charter provides that the Board of Aldermen shall not pass any special ordinance relating to the erection and maintenance of stands in the public streets.

Heretofore all such stands have been regulated by general ordinance, and it seems to me desirable that such method should be continued.

Snyder, of No. 69 Manhattan street, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, to erect, keep and maintain a stand for the sale of fruit, within the stoop-line in front of premises owned by The City of New York, situated in the middle of Broadway, at the junction of Broadway and south side of Manhattan street, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, upon payment of the stated license fee to the City.

The stand to be constructed at his own expense, and said permission hereby given to continue during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 2154.

City of New York—Office of the Mayor, {
July 19, 1905. }

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, without my approval, a resolution passed by your Honorable Body on July 11, entitled:

"Resolution permitting Eugene C. Kelly to keep newspaper stand at the southeast corner of Willis avenue and One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Borough of The Bronx."

Section 50 of the Greater New York Charter provides that:

"The Board of Aldermen shall not have the power to authorize the placing or continuing of any encroachment or obstruction upon any street or sidewalk, except the temporary occupation thereof during the erection or repairing of a building on a lot opposite the same, nor shall they permit the erection of booths and stands within stoop-lines, except for the sale of newspapers, periodicals, fruits and soda water, and with the consent in such cases of the owner of the premises. The Board of Aldermen shall not pass any special ordinances in relation to any of the matters mentioned in this section. All ordinances in relation thereto shall be general ordinances, which may either apply throughout the whole City or throughout specified portions thereof, and shall provide for the enforcement thereof as specified in section 44 of this act as amended. * * * All general ordinances relating to authorized structures, encroachments or obstructions in or upon the streets or sidewalks by persons other than the authorities of The City of New York or other public authorities, shall fix a definite license fee for every such authorized structure, encroachment or obstruction according to the character, extent and duration thereof, and shall provide for the issuing of revocable licenses therefor which shall be according to an established form and shall be regularly numbered and duly registered as shall be prescribed by the Board of Aldermen."

In view of the foregoing provisions of the Charter I doubt whether the Board of Aldermen have the power to pass a special resolution permitting the erection of a booth for the sale of newspapers or periodicals on the public sidewalk adjacent to an entrance to the subway. Licenses of this character have always been regulated by general ordinances, and it seems to me desirable that this method should be continued.

Sec. 3—Any person, firm or corporation erecting, placing or keeping any such sign without a license therefor shall upon conviction be subjected to a fine of \$25 for each and every offence, or, in default thereof, shall be imprisoned for a term not exceeding ten days.

Sec. 4—All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5—This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 105 of the Building Code, relative to fireproofing buildings.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

That section 105 of the Building Code of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 105. Fireproof Buildings—Every building hereafter erected or altered, to be used as a hotel, lodging-house, school, theatre, jail, police station, hospital, asylum, institution for the care or treatment of persons, the height of which exceeds thirty-five feet, excepting all buildings for which specifications and plans have been heretofore submitted to and approved by the Department of Buildings, shall be built fireproof—that is to say, they shall be constructed with walls of brick, stone, Portland cement concrete, iron or steel, in which wood beams or lintels shall not be placed, and in which the floors and roofs shall be of materials provided for in section 106 of this Code. The stairs and staircase landings shall be built entirely of brick, stone, Portland cement concrete, iron or steel. No woodwork or other inflammable material shall be used in any of the partitions, furrings or ceilings in any such fireproof buildings, excepting, however, the inside window frames and sash, doors, trims and other interior finish when filled solid at the back with fireproof material, and the floor boards and sleepers directly thereunder may be of wood covered with metal, or of wood treated by some process approved by the Department of Buildings, or other public authorities now having jurisdiction in such matters, to render the same fireproof; but the space between the sleepers shall be solidly filled with fireproof materials and extend up to the underside

of the floor boards. The outside window frames and sash shall be of metal or wood covered with metal (and every). Every other building other than those mentioned in the first paragraph of this section, the height of which exceeds seventy-five feet (except as herein otherwise provided), shall be built fireproof—that is to say, they shall be constructed with walls of brick, stone, Portland cement concrete, iron or steel, in which wood beams or lintels shall not be placed, and in which the floors and roofs shall be of materials provided for in section 106 of this Code. The stairs and staircase landings shall be built entirely of brick, stone, Portland cement concrete, iron or steel. No woodwork or other inflammable material shall be used in any of the partitions, furrings, or ceilings in any such fireproof buildings, excepting, however, that when the height of the building does not exceed (twelve) eight stories, or more than (one hundred and fifty feet) one hundred feet, the doors and windows and their frames, the trims, the casings, the interior finish when filled solid at the back with fireproof material, and the floor boards and sleepers directly thereunder may be of wood; but the space between the sleepers shall be solidly filled with fireproof materials and extend up to the underside of the floor boards.

When the height of (a) any fireproof building, other than those to be used for purposes stated in the first paragraph of this section, exceeds (twelve) eight stories or more than (one hundred and fifty) one hundred feet, the floor surfaces shall be of stone, cement, rock, asphalt, tiling or similar incombustible material, or the sleepers and floor boards may be of wood, provided the floor boards are treated by some process approved by the Board of Buildings, or other public authorities now having jurisdiction in such matters, to render the same fireproof. All outside window frames and sash shall be of metal, or of wood covered with metal. The inside window frames and sash, doors, trim and other interior finish may be of wood covered with metal, or of wood treated by some process approved by the Board of Buildings, or other public authorities now having jurisdiction in such matters, to render the same fireproof, excepting such rough lumber known as buck frames for door and other openings, sleepers and grounds upon which to fasten or attach base and wainscot.

All hall partitions or permanent partitions between rooms in fireproof buildings shall be built of fireproof material, and shall not be started on wood sills nor on wooden floor boards, but be built upon the fireproof construction of the floor and extend to the fireproof beams filling above. The top of all door and window openings in such partitions shall be at least twelve inches below the ceiling line.

Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Health, held on the 12th day of July, 1905, a resolution was adopted requesting the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the acquisition of a tract of land situated in the Township of Mount Hope, County of Orange, State of New York, as a site for the erection of a sanitarium for tuberculosis patients.

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens has requested that fifty thousand dollars of the proceeds of said Corporate Stock be used for the purpose of paying for labor to be employed in remacadamizing or repaving certain old highways, streets, roads, boulevards and avenues or parts thereof in that borough, which are as follows:

Hon. TIMOTHY P. SULLIVAN, Acting President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—In submitting this application requesting the approval of your Honorable Board to an issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the sum of eighty-six thousand five hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$86,575), to be appropriated in conformity with the requirements of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, I wish to point out the urgent necessity for these funds.

The Department appropriation for the year 1905 is deficient in this amount and the insistent demands of property owners throughout the boroughs of Queens and Richmond for extension of water mains to streets and avenues now crowded with dwelling houses, must receive consideration.

The Engineers of this Department prepared plans and estimates showing the cost of introducing these improvements and further showed that the enlargement of the distribution of water meant increased expenses to operate the pumping stations. These facts were clearly set forth in my application to the Board of Estimate.

The development and growth of these boroughs will be retarded if there is no satisfactory response to these demands. The petitions from these boroughs bear the endorsement of the local boards of improvements, and it is only just and proper for the City to furnish an adequate supply of pure and wholesome water.

At present all water in these boroughs is pumped on an average of sixteen hours daily, but in order to maintain a steady and normal pressure, it is the plan of the Engineer to keep the pumps in operation during the entire day. This will mean the employment of additional engineers and laborers, the consumption of a large amount of coal and oil and the overhauling and repairing of the stations.

Another item in this application is the rental of fire hydrants connected with the mains controlled by the several private water companies in these boroughs. At the request of this Department, in order to afford proper protection against fire, hydrants are placed at a distance of five hundred feet apart. The contract price for the use of these hydrants averages twenty-five dollars (\$25) per annum.

The inclosed statements show the amount of money appropriated in 1904, the Department's estimate for 1905—to maintain the present system and to provide for improvements—and the sum total allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The papers also show in detail the items above referred to.

As this sum of money is absolutely necessary, I respectfully recommend that this application receive the approval of your Honorable Board.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

Sir—In the matter of the request of Borough President John F. Ahearn, in a communication under date of June 15, 1905, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to fix a grade of Stenographer in his office at \$2,100 per annum, referred to the Investigations Division for examination, I beg to report as follows:

As stated in the Borough President's communication, his reason for making the request previously noted is to allow him to increase the salary of Mr. James M. Vincent, who is now employed in said office at a salary of \$1,800.

Mr. Vincent was appointed in the office of the Borough President of Manhattan in June, 1898, by Borough President Peters, at a salary of \$1,200 per annum. He has continued in the Borough President's office from that time until the present. His salary was increased by President Coogan from \$1,200 to \$1,500, and by President Cantor from \$1,500 to \$1,800, each of these increases, it may reasonably be assumed, having been granted because of the employee's increasing value in the service.

In May, 1902, Mr. Vincent was detailed as Stenographer and Clerk to the various Boards of Local Improvements in the Borough of Manhattan, and succeeded therein to the duties of Mr. Ira E. Rider, resigned, who, at the time of his resignation, was receiving a salary of \$2,500.

Mr. Vincent, during the term of President Coogan, acted for three consecutive months as Stenographer to the Board of Aldermen, and on a number of occasions at other times has taken the place of the regular Board of Aldermen Stenographer. The compensation of the said Stenographer to the Board of Aldermen is \$2,250.

Positions with duties of a similarly exacting character to those performed by Mr. Vincent are those of Stenographer to the Board of Assessors, salary at the rate of \$2,100, and of Stenographer to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, salary \$2,550 per annum.

The duration of employment of Mr. Vincent in his present position and the character of work to which he has been detailed by the various Borough Presidents, would indicate that he is capable of high-grade stenographic work.

I do not feel inclined to recommend that a classification under the title of Stenographer alone should be made in the Borough President's office at the salary requested by Mr. Ahearn, because it should be possible to obtain for the present compensation such ordinary ability as a position of that title would demand.

The reason, however, for the present request of the Borough President is that an attaché of his office is doing work requiring unusual application and ability, inasmuch as the incumbent has charge of the stenographic work of the Local Improvement Boards.

In the event of some other person being employed in the office, some provision should be made that the compensation of \$2,100 should not be paid except to an employee doing the special work in connection with said Local Boards.

I would therefore recommend that a new designation be authorized, namely, a designation as "Stenographer to the Local Boards," salary \$2,100. I understand that if this title is approved, Mr. Ahearn will be able to designate Mr. Vincent to the position, and that in future this compensation can be paid under this title only to a person performing these special duties.

Dear Sir—Herewith I submit to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a statement of positions, with salaries attached thereto, which I desire to have fixed in

this Department, in accordance with the provisions of the Civil Service Law and the rules established thereunder, relative to the classified service.

For Assistant Engineers grades are at present established at \$3,000 and \$4,000 per annum, with no intermediate grade between these two. It is very desirable, in the interest of the service, to establish some intermediate grades—i. e., \$3,250, \$3,500 and \$3,750—so that in the case of the appointment of Engineers whose compensation should be greater than \$3,000 but not as much as \$4,000, the Department may not be compelled to allow \$4,000 when \$3,250 or \$3,500 would be sufficient. The same is true in case of promotions.

The only grade for Chemist is fixed at \$2,100, which is at present paid to the Chemist in charge of the laboratory at Mount Prospect. Since the resignation of the Biologist formerly in charge, who received a salary of \$2,500 per annum, the Chemist has been in charge of the laboratory. Under this arrangement it has not been found necessary to fill the position of Biologist, but in view of the extent of the duties of the Chemist, I recommend the establishment of that position at a salary of \$2,500 per annum. The proposed salary is amply justified by the work done.

Grades for Stenographers have been fixed up to \$1,200 per annum. It is desirable to establish grades of \$1,350, \$1,500 and \$1,650. The proposed new grades are recommended so that increases can be made in salaries as a reward for tried and efficient service, and to enable the Department to retain the services of Stenographers who have shown a marked degree of aptitude and efficiency. The maximum salaries for Stenographers in other Departments are as follows:

The proposed new grades are recommended as a reward for two Measurers who have been employed in that capacity for over fifteen years and who have supervision of the work performed by the other Measurers in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

Sir—In the matter of a communication of County Clerk Edward Kaufmann, of Kings County, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of June 14, 1905, requesting "that the following (exempt) positions, in addition to the positions already established under the jurisdiction of the County Clerk of Kings County, be established with salaries as follows:

—I beg to report as follows:

In the office of the Clerk of New York County, in the exempt class, are positions similar to those requested by the Clerk of Kings County as follows:

Cashier	\$2,600 00
Assistant Cashier	1,600 00
Law Clerk	3,500 00
Certificate Clerk	2,000 00
Mechanics' Lien Clerk.....	1,300 00

Mr. Kaufmann stated to your Examiner that the duties of the Satisfaction and Certificate Clerk proposed for his office will be the same as those of the two positions of Certificate Clerk and Mechanics' Lien Clerk in the County Clerk's office in New York County.

In regard to the creation of the position of Cashier, Mr. Kaufmann stated that, at the present time, four or five persons are taking the oath, either in part or at all times. The amount of moneys collected by the Clerk of King's County aggregates about \$50,000 per annum. As previously stated, this amount is received by several employees and is officially in the custody of no one until it reaches the Bookkeeper, who enters the receipts and prepares the money for deposit and for final transmission to the Chamberlain.

The result of the present system is that there is no concentration of responsibility for the collection of money, and the County Clerk is obliged to constantly give personal attention to a matter which, under ordinary arrangement, should be in the hands of some responsible individual. In the event of the creation of this office, the Cashier would not only collect the cash, but act as auditor for all office collections made.

The duties of the Law Clerk, as contemplated by Mr. Kaufmann, are the taxation of costs in all litigations, the entering up of judgments, the issuing of the mandates of the courts under the seal of the County Clerk, the passing upon the trust moneys deposited with the County Clerk in legal proceedings, and the receiving of cash in lieu of bail. The Law Clerk will also be in receipt of the notes of issue filed for the Supreme Court and the County Courts of this county, there being estimated to be some 8,500 cases to go on the calendar for the October term.

This work is at present performed by subordinates of the County Clerk, to the detriment of their regular duties, time being required for the same which should properly be given to other departments in the office. Duties similar to those contemplated for the Law Clerk in the Kings County Clerk's office are performed by the Law Clerk in the New York County Clerk's office, who, as previously noted, receives a salary of \$3,500, or \$2,000 more than the salary asked for the King's County office.

In explanation of the small compensation fixed for Law Clerk, namely, \$1,500, Mr. Kaufmann stated that his request in this instance is limited by the amount allowed in his budget for the present year, and that, as a matter of fact, the compensation suggested is really an inadequate return for the Law Clerk's duties. Mr. Kaufmann further stated that, in the preparation of the next budget, he will request a suitable salary for this position.

The duties of the Satisfaction and Certificate Clerk will consist of satisfying all mechanics' liens, notices of pendency of actions, judgments and other liens; he will also issue certificates of the genuineness and authority of notaries public and commissioners of deeds, certify all copies of papers required by law and affix the official seal to the satisfactions and transcripts of satisfactions required by law. As in the case of the position of Law Clerk, the proposed duties of the Satisfaction and Certificate Clerk are now being performed by other Clerks in the office to the detriment of their regular work.

It is the plan of the County Clerk to make each of these proposed positions a bonded position in a sufficient amount to protect the Clerk and the county in the event of dereliction or error in the performance of their duty.

In connection with the office of the County Clerk of Kings County generally, I beg respectfully to add that, from recent visits made thereto, it appears that the business of the office has far outgrown its present staff. The amount of business performed by the County Clerk and his subordinates appears to be a severe tax upon them, and it would seem that, in the preparation of the next annual budget, proper relief should be accorded them.

This is especially necessary because of the fact that within a very few months the County Clerk's offices will be established in splendid quarters and under conditions which will demand the highest efficiency in its administration. Under former conditions, when the office was crowded into one small room, proper access by the public

could not be accorded. The extension of the floor space to a degree sufficient to meet the public needs should naturally be followed by an increase in the staff commensurate with the increased use which will be made of the office by the public.

In conclusion I would respectfully recommend the adoption of the resolution requested by the County Clerk relative to the positions of Cashier, Law Clerk and Satisfaction and Certificate Clerk.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—At the time of the adoption by your Board of the Budget for the current fiscal year for this Department, there was added the sum of \$5,000 to the item "Salaries for the County Clerk, \$60,200," this being an increase of \$5,000 over the amount appropriated for the year 1904. This sum was provided to enable this Department to employ additional help. Accompanying the request for such additional appropriation, I attached a copy of a bill introduced in the Legislature of 1904, which passed both houses, but failed to receive executive sanction. Attention was then called to the fact that your Board possessed sufficient authority to assist this Department in obtaining the services of additional employees without the necessity of a resort to the Legislature for such power.

Since the current year an application was made by this Department to the State Civil Service Commission for authority to have the positions exempted from the operation of the State Civil Service laws, which request was granted by the State Civil Service Commission with the approval of the Governor.

A reference to the brief submitted by this Department at the time of the hearing had before your Board on the Budget for the current year, will more fully explain the necessity of having a Cashier whose duty it shall be to receive all moneys paid into this Department; a Law Clerk, whose duty it shall be to tax costs and make up judgments; and a Satisfaction and Certificate Clerk, whose duty will be to satisfy all judgments, mechanics' liens and notice of pendency of action, and to give certificates as required by law than can be set forth in this communication.

Application is therefore made to your Honorable Board for the purpose of fixing the compensation to be paid to such employees. It is suggested that the compensation to be paid to the Cashier be fixed at the sum of \$2,000 a year; and that of the other clerks at the rate of \$1,500 a year each.

Your favorable action upon these suggestions is most earnestly requested.

Dear Sir—Herewith I submit to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a statement of positions with salaries attached thereto, which I desire to have fixed in this Department, in accordance with the provisions of the Civil Service Law and the rules established thereunder relative to the classified service.

For Assistant Engineers grades are at present established at \$3,000 and \$4,000 per annum, with no intermediate grade between these two. It is very desirable, in the interest of the service, to establish some intermediate grades, i. e., \$3,250, \$3,500 and \$3,750, so that in the case of the appointment of Engineers whose compensation should be greater than \$3,000, but not as much as \$4,000, the Department may not be compelled to allow \$4,000 when \$3,250 or \$3,500 would be sufficient. The same is true in case of promotion.

The only grade for Chemist is fixed at \$2,100, which is at present paid to the Chemist in charge of the laboratory at Mount Prospect. Since the resignation of the Biologist formerly in charge, who received a salary of \$2,500 per annum, the Chemist has been in charge of the laboratory. Under this arrangement it has not been found necessary to fill the position of Biologist, but in view of the extent of the duties of the Chemist, I recommend the establishment of that position at a salary of \$2,500 per annum. The proposed salary is amply justified by the work done.

Grades for Stenographers have been fixed up to \$1,200 per annum. It is desirable to establish grades of \$1,350, \$1,500 and \$1,650. The proposed new grades are recommended so that increases can be made in salaries as a reward for tried and efficient service, and to enable the Department to retain the services of Stenographers who have shown a marked degree of aptitude and efficiency. The maximum salaries for Stenographers in other departments are as follows:

I would add that the work required of some of the Stenographers in this Department is no less exacting and requires no less ability than in any of the cases above mentioned.

For Measurers grades are established at \$1,000 and \$1,200 per annum. It is desirable to establish grades at \$1,350 and \$1,500 per annum. The proposed new grades are recommended as a reward for two Measurers who have been employed in that capacity for over fifteen years and who have supervision of the work performed by the other Measurers in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
