



BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK.
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
THURSDAY, December 28, 1882—12 o'clock M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.:

Wm. R. Grace, the Mayor; Allan Campbell, the Comptroller; Wm. Sauer, the President of the Board of Aldermen; Thos. B. Asten, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments. The minutes of the meeting held December 26, 1882, were read and approved.

On motion, the Board proceeded to the consideration of the Final Estimate for the year 1883.

Messrs. Oswald Ottendorfer, Prof. C. F. Chandler, Dr. Woolsey Johnson, Dr. Jacoby, C. C. Haight, and Dr. Thoms appeared before the Board, and made statements in favor of an appropriation for the establishment of a Hospital for the Care of Contagious Diseases, at the foot of East Sixteenth street.

Thomas S. Brennan, Jacob Hess, and H. H. Porter, Commissioners of Public Charities, and Mrs. Josephine Shaw Lowell and William R. Stewart, Commissioners of State Charities, appeared before the Board, and made statements relative to the purchase of land, etc., for insane asylums, and presented the following:

Communications and Documents from the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction, Relating to Further Provision for the Insane.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES AND CORRECTION,
December 27, 1882.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—From the accompanying reports, extracts, and suggestions your Honorable Board will readily see the necessity of taking into consideration the vital questions contained therein.

The treatment and care of the insane is a matter that has long been the subject of public thought and expression, and all minds seem to agree that healthful exercise and the absence of appearances of indoor confinement (such as are now from necessity to a great extent in use in this Department) are indispensably necessary.

We have attached to the Asylum for the Insane on Ward's Island, a small farm which employs about 120 hands, the produce of which is used to great advantage to this Department, thereby saving a considerable amount of money.

We could readily employ about one-third of the number of inmates of that institution, if we had available land, and it is the opinion of this Board that with an extensive farm, accessible by water, and the use of our steamboats, in a few years sufficient vegetables could be raised to amply supply the requirements and wants of our several institutions, which now cost the city about \$25,000 per annum, to say nothing of improvements of lands and buildings.

NEW YORK CITY ASYLUM, WARD'S ISLAND,
December 22, 1882.

Hon. THOMAS S. BRENNAN, President, etc.:

MY DEAR SIR—The new East wing of this Asylum is now nearly ready for occupation. It completes the Asylum structure as originally contemplated, and increases its capacity to one thousand beds. It falls short of providing for the proper accommodation of all the male patients at present under the care of your Department, their entire number being to-day 1,360; and it of course makes no provision for the future steady increase which is certainly to be looked for. The Pavilion Building, funds for which you are now seeking from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, will, if the funds be granted and it erected, only partially contribute to the accommodation of the present surplus, for it is intended to provide rather improved quarters for certain classes (the sick and filthy) already under care in the asylum proper, than to take in those who are temporarily lodged elsewhere.

We may assume, then, that there are 360 patients at present not adequately provided for, and, allowing for the usual increase during the period of the erection of the pavilion, that such will continue to be the case when the pavilion is ready for occupancy. A portion of this surplus is now domiciled in a very unsuitable building, borrowed from the Commissioners of Emigration (who are now strenuously demanding its return), and the remainder in an equally unsatisfactory building belonging to your Department, but situated on Randall's Island.

It is plain, then, that beyond any increase of accommodation which is now nearly available, and beyond any that has even been determined upon as necessary by your Board (and which is still subject to the veto of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment), there is urgent need for increasing the number or the capacity of the departmental buildings assigned to the reception of the male insane.

The question presents itself which form the increase shall take—of capacity or of number. In my own view, it should be of the latter. I am of opinion that an institution for the care of the insane, with a capacity of 1,000 beds, is as large as is at all proper in justice either to its patients or its officers.

The present building, as completed, is symmetrical and fully taxes the capabilities of the executive portions—the offices, boiler-house, kitchen, laundry, etc. I think that it is unquestionable, that the construction of a new and separate institution, and not the enlargement of the present one, is called for.

If this be granted, the further question of location arises: Whether the new institution should be erected upon one of the islands at present owned by the city or elsewhere? I am again in favor of the latter course. This, (Ward's) Island, is, proportionately, less crowded than any of the others, but it is, in my judgment, as fully occupied as it should be. Even were the few outstanding acres, still belonging to private owners, acquired by the city, all the land could readily be brought under cultivation by the proportion of the one thousand patients remaining, who might be capable of out-door work, if necessary facilities, implements and an increased force of out-door attendants were provided; and the presence upon the island of the institutions of another department and another institution of your own Department, exposes such patients as are so employed to contacts and dangers that are undesirable.

In my own view, the most feasible and desirable solution of the problem for providing further for the male insane, now, and to come, in care of your Department, would be the acquirement of farming land, upon which comparatively inexpensive structures should be erected and to which the chronic, comparatively harmless, and physically strong, insane should be transferred, and where they should, so far as possible, be occupied in out-door labor.

Certain requirements should, in my opinion, be possessed by the land acquired for this purpose; among others, it should be upon the water-front, and not at too great a distance from the city, in order that the departmental steamers might transport supplies, thereby saving the great expense of inland freight, and that patients and their friends, visiting them, might be saved the time and annoyance, and the latter the cost, of railway travel.

My own idea of the best course to pursue, would be, to make the new institution a home for the chronic and less curable cases, leaving to the present asylum the duty of receiving and caring for the acute, and presumably, curable cases.

The farm now attached to the latter, even with the additions that may be made to it, could, no doubt, be adequately cared for by convalescing patients, whose recovery would be expedited by the employment.

The labor list of the Asylum for the current year, kept down as it has been by want of attendants, has averaged about 400—and of these about 120 have been employed upon the farm during the period of the year when farming work was most active. I believe that, perhaps, twice the number, say 800, could be employed, and a much increased proportion in farm work, if the new institution of which I speak were provided, and if provision were made for the necessary increase in the number of out-door attendants, etc.

I presume that I do not need to insist at any length upon the advantages, both economic and curative, of out-door employment for the insane. It will certainly not be necessary for the instruction of the gentlemen of your own Board, who have practical knowledge of the matter, and it can scarcely be necessary for the information of the gentlemen of the Board to which you are appealing.

From the first, those who, from intimate association with the care of the insane, are best qualified to speak with authority, have recognized the importance to the well-being and progress of the patient of systematic and healthful occupation, and the importance to the community supporting him of realizing such offset of that burden as the profits of such occupation may afford. This proposition is of such self-evident propriety as to have been adopted, even by amateur authorities upon the care of the insane.

In the establishment of all State asylums for the care of the insane it has been regarded as a desideratum that the site chosen should embrace a sufficient acreage of arable land to afford employment for the available proportion of the number which it has been contemplated to receive.

It is true of these asylums that their population is derived largely from the rural classes, and that performance of farm work, as convalescence commences, or as the disease assumes a chronic and tractable form, is only the resumption of accustomed habits and an accustomed pursuit. A city asylum, filled with patients from a large city, unaccustomed to such labor, and, as a rule, much broken in bodily health, has peculiar difficulties to contend with; but, in the main, the difference will be apparent more in diminution of returns to the institution than of advantage to the patients. In a great number of our cases, where, either through convalescence or chronicity, the patient's labor becomes available, it will be best available in the way of mechanical labor.

I do not think that in any provision for out-door occupation or farm life, this availability should be lost sight of, but that the endeavor which has already been made in the establishment of a number of workshops to utilize skilled labor, should be continued and extended.

In conclusion, I ask to be permitted to relieve myself from any suspicion of making my present recommendations with a view of curtailing in any way the comforts of the chronic and incurable or of any class of the insane.

While economy can be served in the matter of buildings, I do not think that it should be sought in any reduction of diet or the like. The assignment of a patient to one or other institution—the old or the new—should be regulated only by his condition, the phases of his insanity, and the prospects of his cure and comfort, and whether they be regarded as entirely independent institutions, or the latter as merely a branch of the former, facility of exchange of patients from one to the other, as their best interests may indicate, should be, without question, preserved.

DR. T. S. CLOUSTON, of the Royal Asylum, Edinburgh, Scotland, 1881.

"When lately giving directions to an architect for the building of a new pavilion, we told him: 'Build to last for five-and-twenty years only.' By that time ideas will have changed, and my successor can carry out his own notions and those of his time."

DR. BUCK, Medical Superintendent, London Asylum, Ontario, 1879.

"Nothing has happened in the year just closed to make me alter what I said in my last report in praise of our group of cottages."

"The one hundred and eighty patients in this part of the Asylum, in spite of the large amount of liberty they are allowed, give no trouble. We have still no elopements from any of the cottages, and no accident of any kind as the result of too much freedom. The cost of construction of these buildings was \$278 per patient."

DR. G. M. BEARD, The Asylums of Europe, 1881.

"The best asylums of Europe are not enormous or imposing buildings, but a series or collection of small or moderate sized, unimposing cottages or houses. * * * The institution at Alt. Sherbitz has six or eight cottages, a small distance from each other, each cottage being about the size of a moderate country house—all plain brick buildings, all pleasing in appearance outside, and comfortable in reality inside."

"The Royal Edinburgh Asylum is composed of five houses, separated by a considerable distance. * * * It is believed and asserted that this splitting up of large buildings into a number of small ones, and thus scattering the insane over a wider area than has been the custom formerly, is an immense practical advantage to all classes of lunatics."

DR. C. T. FOLSOM in "Diseases of the Mind," 1877.

"In costly arrangements for 'convenience of administration,' and in the multiplicity of labor-saving machinery, where it is difficult to find enough for the patients to do, the new American State Hospitals for the insane are absolutely without rivals."

Professor WESTPHAL, Superintendent of the Department for the Insane of Charity Hospital, Berlin, 1876.

"A new insane asylum has not yet been built in Berlin. * * * My advice has not yet been asked, but I should recommend the purchase of a large piece of land, to be cultivated by the insane. A small central building should be constructed, and the greatest part of the patients should be lodged in separate, simply-constructed buildings. Such a plan is now being carried out in the province of Saxony, the land having been already bought."

DR. H. R. WILBUR, in Paper on Buildings for the Management and Treatment of the Insane, 1877.

"In Great Britain many of the asylums for the insane, of recent construction, are a fair illustration of what may be done at a moderate cost in this direction. Two-storied buildings, with house-like arrangements, as far as such are admissible. The lower stories for day occupation, with large airy, and cheerful rooms, opening directly out to the grounds for exercise, and of convenient access

to the various workshops, the chapel, and the general dining-halls. The upper story for sleeping apartments, either single or associated. The whole surrounded by a wall, sunken or concealed by foliage.

The appearance of confinement is avoided, and grated windows and spring locks are either absent or only used in what are called the refractory wards."

Report of the N. Y. State Commissioner in Lunacy, for the year 1878.

"Out-door labor, which is so beneficial to the health of the sane, has been found equally efficacious in the cure of the insane. It is therefore resorted to in all our asylums, according to the varying conditions of patients and the opportunities for giving them suitable occupation.

"In the absence of land on which to work or of shops in which to carry on mechanic arts of a simple character, it is difficult to find proper employment for any large body of insane. This is now so generally recognized that at almost every asylum in the State, however small, land is the first instrument of treatment secured, next to a building. All our State asylums, with the single exception of the one for insane criminals, being provided with large farms, the rule of employing so many patients as possible in field labor has always been enforced."

Commissioners of Lunacy of Scotland, for 1877—Twentieth Annual Report.

"The extent of land attached to Scotch asylums is yearly becoming more and more considerable. Indeed, nearly all our asylums are now acquiring such an extent of land as may properly be called a farm. The Argyle Asylum, for instance, has about 222 patients, 500 acres; and the little Banff Asylum with 90 patients, about 150 acres. This land furnishes healthful occupation and exercise to the inmates, and in the strictest sense furnishes a means of medical treatment. At the same time it benefits the whole number of the patients by the liberal supplies of beef, mutton, pork, potatoes, green vegetables and milk which it yields. * * * Fortunately, it appears that the possession of a large extent of land proves, also, an advantage financially to the asylum which cultivates it. In other words, it lightens the burden of those who pay for the maintenance of the patients; and while it does this it also procures for the patients themselves additional comforts, better health and greater happiness. It is difficult, indeed, to see how an asylum farm, which has been purchased, or which is held on lease at a reasonable price, should ever fail to be a source of profit, since so much of the labor bestowed on it costs nothing, and since the purchaser of its produce is at its door and is a sure payer. This opinion now receives general acceptance in Scotland, and as the result of it, no opportunity is lost by our asylum managers of acquiring additional land."

DR. RUTHERFORD, Superintendent of the Barony Parochial Asylum at Lenzie, Scotland, Annual Report for 1880—470 patients.

"The most important event of the year has been the purchase of the adjoining farms Muchroft and Taulthead, by which 178 acres have been added to the available resources, for the out door employment and recreation of the patients. From this I anticipate the best results both from a curative and from a financial point of view. The additional land will be cultivated by the labor of the patients, with little, if any, addition to the existing number of horses and plowmen. The farm staff has not been increased during the past five years, while the land has been more than doubled in extent. The pecuniary results, therefore, can scarcely fail to be advantageous, and I hope this will soon be apparent in the diminished cost of the maintenance of the patients.

"But it is rather as a great and beneficial means of treatment that this extension of the asylum grounds is to be regarded.

"With 382 acres of land surrounding the asylum, there can be no lack of means of employment for the patients."

Report of the Trustees of the New Hampshire Asylum for the Insane, Concord. Report June, 1881—291 patients.

"The farm proves of much importance to the asylum, both as a source of pecuniary income and as a curative agent, affording recreation and exercise to a portion of its patients during the mild season of the year. The value of out-of-door diversion in the treatment of mental disease is now more highly appreciated than formerly, and is not unfrequently a remedial means of great worth. No asylum for the insane should be without ample grounds."

Report of the Superintendent of the Willard Asylum for 1880—1,565 patients.

"The avails of the labor, \$30,314.33, have not been inconsiderable, as will be observed, and have had a decided influence upon the financial results of the asylum year. Employment and occupation have had an equally beneficial effect in contributing to the well-being and contentment of the asylum community. The wisdom of securing a large tract of land, and its capabilities for furnishing labor and occupation for the insane are more apparent every year. Farm labor has the great advantage that it is performed in the open air; does not require skilled training; that it affords variety; that all who engage in it feel that they share the results and that they become identified with the soil and their place of domicile. It has the single disadvantage, that it cannot be carried on through the entire year.

The question of the labor of the insane, its feasibility and value, has been demonstrated by this asylum, and particularly during the past year.

Report of Trustees of Willard Asylum for the year 1881—1,695 patients.

Report of Superintendent and Physician of New York State Asylum for Insane Criminals, September, 1881—135 patients.

"I have had occasion, in former reports, to deplore the fact that there is no farm connected with this asylum, and I may add in this connection that the institution must be incomplete, until the want is supplied. It is beyond question that the proper cultivation of at least two hundred acres of land could easily be done by patients here, under the supervision of an intelligent farmer. This would afford to the inmates an abundant supply of fruits, vegetables, milk, butter, eggs, pork, etc., nearly all of which articles now have to be purchased for cash. * * *

Agricultural pursuits on the part of its inmates are profitable to an institution and furnish a pleasant variety of labor, without mental strain. This, in turn, produces a wholesome fatigue and conduces to good appetite, restfulness and sound slumber. The tonic influence of fresh air and sunlight tend to strengthen and invigorate both mind and body, thus placing patients in the best possible circumstances to promote recovery in the curable, and to ameliorate the condition of the incurable.

The Middlesex County Lunatic Asylum, Hanwell, near London—1,800 patients.

A gentleman, who visited the asylum in 1877 for the purpose of examining the system of management, reports: "About seventy-five per cent. of the men who are able, worked steadily at farm or garden work or at trades, as upholsterers, shoemakers, tinsmiths, carpenters, painters, plumbers, tackers, etc., doing all (or nearly all) the work in the establishment in these lines. The hours of work are fixed by rule from 9 A. M. to 1 P. M. from 2 to 4.30 P. M., and exceptions are regulated by the physician. The work is not compulsory, but those who work are allowed a fuller dinner than is given to the others, also other extra indulgences to those who do particularly well."

DR. KIRKBRIDE, Superintendent of the Hospital for Insane, 1880. "On the Construction of Hospitals for the Insane."

"Gives a hundred acres as the minimum for every asylum, and thinks it is hardly possible, under any circumstances for such an institution to control too much land immediately around it. Dr. Kirkbride, in a private letter, says that 'with 1,200 patients, 200 acres is the smallest amount admissible.'"

DR. GRANVILLE, in the London Lancet, 1877.

"Occupation is necessary, first, for the patient's mind, and second, for his body. Mere purposeless exertion, in which the mind has no share, will not suffice to keep a human organism in good health, and it must work as well as play. * * * It is my strong conviction that the time cannot be far distant when work, with a serious purpose, not mere desultory employment, will be recognized as one of the most important elements of treatment.

"Speaking of Brookwood Asylum, Surrey, England, he says: 'The farm is well managed and of great value to the establishment, both as supplying healthful occupation to a large class of male patients, and on account of its produce.'"

Report of Board of Trustees of Willard Asylum, Ovid, N. Y., for 1879—1,539 patients.

"We invite attention to the products of the farm connected with and belonging to the asylum. There are 792 acres embraced in the farm. Of this it is safe to say that 250 acres are unproductive, being occupied as lawns about the various buildings, in roads or walks, or are covered with forests, and are broken into ravines. The products of what is left, subject to cultivation, or in meadows and pastures, from a statement made with care, based upon the market price of the locality, amounted to a valuation of twenty-nine thousand nine hundred and sixty-nine dollars and one cent (\$29,969.01). A considerable amount of the labor in the cultivation of the farm and garden has been performed by the insane. It is not attempted, except by moral influences, to enforce labor from patients, but many prefer to work. All those who do work are unquestionably benefited. * * * It will be seen that the value of the productions of the land is largely in excess of the interest on the land investment. The land does more—it gives healthful and necessary exercise to those in custody here. * * * The work generally is done cheerfully. In many instances it is a diversion; it brings profit to the institution, and reduces the expense of support. For instance, the charge this year is two dollars

and forty cents (\$2.40) per week, per patient. The earnings of the patients by their labor, which is applied to their support, amounts to an average of twenty-five cents per week. If there was no farm labor and no production * * * the charge would be \$2.65 instead of \$2 per week, as now. This is the economical view, important and practical as it is, but the lowest view of the subject. The employment of the insane adds to their health and enjoyment, their comfort and contentment, which are the higher and better results of the labor system."

"Gross products of asylum farm in 1880.—Total, \$8,827.37. * * * Viewed from an agricultural standpoint merely, the asylum farm is yielding results surpassed by few others of equal size in the State." Aside from the land occupied by the asylum building, airing inclosures, ponds, barns, etc., it has an area of about 100 acres, and this has afforded, the past year, a gross income of \$88.27 per acre.

Statement by Commissioner SMITH E. LANE, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in respect to the Appropriations for 1883.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Some of the appropriations asked for by this Department have been allowed by your Board, and others have been reduced. I wish to call your attention to the tabulated statement showing the amounts proposed by the Department, those allowed by your Board and proposed on the revision by the Board of Aldermen, and, secondly, to a comparative statement of appropriations since 1877. They show the reasons why the amounts we ask should be granted.

This shows how large is the area of Parks south of the Harlem river under the care of this Department, and their distance from each other. The variety of work is equally important in order to keep the parks in a high state of cultivation. In my previous statement it was presented as follows :

"It covers the drives, which have to be renewed once a year with the best quality of gravel for their whole length; the bridle-paths, which require the same treatment; the foot-walks, only a small proportion of which have ever been paved with asphalt, and all of which require constant attention; the bridges and other architectural work, requiring repair and cleaning; the rustic seats, arbors, and buildings, requiring constant renewal. The lawns need cutting and watering, the shrubbery, plants, flower beds, nursery, and propagating houses require watchful attention, new trees must be continually set out, and an entire revision of the landscape should be made to carry out the original design of the Central Park. The supplies of tools, horses and carts, feed and other materials must be constantly kept up."

The amount asked for is not more than sufficient for the ensuing year, particularly if the wages of the laborers are advanced to two dollars per day, as they should be, and as has been done in other city departments.

There is no doubt that this sum is a very large one, and that there is great waste and extravagance in this branch of the administration. It arises from the waste and jobbery which is constantly being carried on, and from the employment of incompetent superintendence, to which I have alluded, particularly in a preceding page. There is but one remedy, which I have also pointed out, and that is, the highest superintendence, and a rigid supervision, by which every laborer fully performs his duty. It was for this reason that in previous years the parks were maintained for a sum much less than is now needed, and that reform is imperative. But my associates have resolutely determined to sustain the system of waste and extravagance.

The appropriations for the items are sufficient to sustain them. The Zoological collection is a source of great entertainment to the visitors to the park, and so long as it is kept up the animals must be fed and housed. The Metropolitan Museum of Art and the American Museum of Natural History have by their development, since they have been established in the park, fully shown their great value, and justify the amount appropriated under the Act of the Legislature.

The music on Saturday afternoons in the Central Park, and on other evenings in the Battery Park have been greatly enjoyed by the people who have remained in the city during the hot weather.

The Skate building will be a very important improvement, as the building formerly in use is wholly worn out. It is a necessary accommodation to the tens of thousands who visit the ice.

The Ladies' Cottages, on Reservoir Square and Mount Morris Park, furnish accommodation at points where no such accommodation has been heretofore supplied, and where it is very much needed.

XV. REBUILDING MOUNT SAINT VINCENT.

We have an unexpended balance from the current year of \$6,500. Your Board appropriate nothing for 1883. The Board of Aldermen propose \$25,000. These sums would enable this Department to restore the ruins and to complete a building for a resting place. Such a building is necessary, because there is none in the central or northern part of the Central Park, and the people who resort there, particularly women and children, need a house with broad and shaded piazzas for rest and refreshment. There has been such a building there from the outset, and its destruction should be supplied.

XXV. ENCLOSING WALL ON EIGHTH AVENUE.

This wall has been left unfinished until the carriage-ways from Central Park at Seventy-seventh street and Eighty-first street were completed, because there were different designs for the work. The carriage-way at Seventy-seventh street is now finished and open to the public, and this wall along the Eighth avenue ought to be built because the line of the avenue is a high retaining wall, which is dangerous, and because the enclosing wall along the avenue is completed except at this point, Manhattan Square.

XXVI. ENTRANCE AT EIGHTH AVENUE AND EIGHTY-FIRST STREET.

This is the western exit of Transverse Road No. 2, the plan for which has now been finally adopted. The sum asked is not sufficient to finish this Transverse Road, but it will serve to grade it up to the Eighth avenue, and to open it for transverse travel, leaving the paving, curbing and gutting of the road for the future.

Your Board has pursued a wise policy in respect to the Bronx river bridges, in giving our Board money with which to rebuild them of iron. The work has been done in a solid and permanent form, and the great economy in this expenditure will be felt, because but very little will be needed for repairs. The money now appropriated will complete the approaches to these bridges on the New York City side.

It would have been well to have pursued the same policy with the Harlem river bridges. Except the one at the Third avenue, all the bridges are in a dilapidated and unsafe condition, and require large sums for repairs every year. It would be much more economical to use this money for permanent structures, and this question has been presented to your Board year after year for many years.

A new bridge at Seventh avenue should be constructed, and the Central or Macomb's Dam Bridge taken down. I have presented this to the Department repeatedly, but my associates decline to send the matter to you for your approval and action, and no new bridges have been undertaken.

The proposed bridge half a mile north of High Bridge, and a new King's Bridge, should be constructed. This would have a great effect upon the property reached by these bridges, would increase its value, and largely promote the convenience of the citizens.

The piers and abutments of the Madison Avenue Bridge have been constructed more than a year, and the iron superstructure should have been completed.

I have pressed it repeatedly at our Board meetings, but have not secured the concurrence of my associates.

XVII. SURVEYING, LAYING OUT, ETC., AND TAX AND ASSESSMENT MAPS.

XIX. MAPS FOR COMMISSIONERS OF ESTIMATE AND ASSESSMENT.

XXI. ARRANGING MAPS AND RECORDS.

The first of these items is a work the importance of which is not appreciated. It includes the surveying and laying out of streets in a large portion of the annexed district, for which the maps have not yet been completed and filed, and the placing of monuments on the ground to mark the corners of the principal streets and avenues. This is necessary to enable the property-owners to work their streets and build their houses, and the settlement of the annexed district depends directly upon it. Every improvement that is made adds to the resources by bringing more valuable property under taxation.

The preparation of maps for the Commissioner of Taxes is a duty imposed upon our Board by statute. We give them accurate copies of our maps as fast as they are made, and it enables them to tax all the property with accurate dimensions.

This work should have gone on with more rapidity, and there was money enough to have employed a larger force of engineers and draughtsmen upon it, but the Board delayed in appointing them, and the money is consequently unexpended. If the balance of this year is transferred to 1883, good progress can be made in the prosecution of this important work.

The maps for Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment are prepared by this Department under the statute, in cases of the opening and improvement of streets and avenues. It saves the property owners who are assessed from all the excessive charges for maps and surveys, which were the great abuse of the old assessment system.

The arrangement and classification of maps and records is a duty imposed upon our Board by statute. They are the old maps and records of the Annexed District before it came under the control of this Department, and require an expert to index and preserve. The result will be very valuable to the property owners.

XX. REMOVING INCUMBRANCES.

In this year your Board have appropriated but \$60,000, although we have asked for \$100,000. The area of the District is little smaller than that of Manhattan Island.

Area of Manhattan Island.....	12,576 acres.

The roads, streets, and avenues in actual use are 180 miles in length. Many of them are hilly roads, and they are all subject to great wash and wear from the weather. It is essential to the comfort of the citizens that they should be kept in good order. A plan has been heretofore pursued of using stone and macadamizing portions of the road. It results in saving an expense for future repairs and in more permanent benefit, and this plan should be pursued until the district is so thickly populated that the streets come to be paved by the property owners by assessment.

This is one of the points where rigid superintendence and faithful labor is of great importance, and upon it depends the getting of the worth of the money expended.

The property owners have advocated before your Board the appropriation of \$100,000, and the argument drawn from the amount of taxes they pay has great force.

The following tables show for the years 1881 and 1882 the valuations and the taxes levied on the property in the annexed district, and the argument of the owners is that they now pay much heavier taxes than they did before they were annexed, and that they are entitled to a sufficient appropriation to keep their roads in good order, particularly when it promotes the inflow of population, which in its turn increases the tax valuations, and in the future increases the amount of taxes receivable by the city.

The work on the sewers and drains is necessary because many of them are imperfectly constructed, and as the roads are unpaved, they become more rapidly filled up, and require attention after every storm.

The appropriation for the removal of incumbrances is necessary because there is no provision of law to compel the owner or purchaser of buildings or incumbrances on the bed of a new street which is opened to remove them, and it must be done by this Department.

III. PARKS OTHER THAN THE CENTRAL PARK,

VIII. WALKS IN CITY PARKS.

Within the past four years by your appropriations the parks in Madison Square, Union Square, Tompkins Square, Stuyvesant Square, Washington Square, City Hall Park, and some others, have been put in good order, and the appropriations will carry on this work in the smaller parks and do some needed repairs.

XI. RIVERSIDE PARK AND AVENUE.

The appropriation for 1882 was \$25,000; a portion of this has been expended in planting trees and making repairs upon the avenue. Further work was prevented until the completion of the sewer construction now going on. There will be an unexpended balance of \$12,000, which, if it is transferred, will aid in the necessary work for 1883. No work has been done on this park except the construction of the avenue, the cost of which in whole or in part will be assessed on the property adjacent, and the tree-planting above spoken of.

This land was taken for the public use as a park many years ago, and very heavy assessments charged upon the adjacent property. This gives weight to the demand of the property owners that the park work should go on, and that it should be completed in a style which its natural beauty and advantages require. When the matter was before your Board in October last you asked for the plan and estimate of the cost of the improvements it was proposed to make.

A design has been adopted for three items.

The general surface of the park is a slope from the avenue westward to the Hudson river, of varying width. The elevation of the avenue above the river is, excepting two depressions, from seventy to one hundred and forty feet in height. The avenue is three miles and forty-one feet long, extending from Seventy-second to One Hundred and Thirtieth street, and keeps on and near the eastern and higher border of the park.

The three works are as follows:
 First.—A roadway above One Hundred and Twentieth street by which a circuit is made to connect at each end with the avenue passing around Claremont Hill, which is in the park, and which commands a very extensive view over the Hudson river.
 Second.—A footwalk from this hill southward to One Hundred and Second street, where the bluff bank falls off into the depression at Ninety-sixth street.
 Third.—The construction of another footwalk from this point to the southern entrance of the park at Seventy-second street.
 The result of these improvements will be to give a very effective circuit at the northern end for carriages on the avenue and to lead foot passengers along the walks below the avenue wall over the romantic slopes of the Hudson river, in many places beautifully shaded, and in many others on bold bluffs commanding picturesque river views. There is nothing in or about the city that will be more attractive than such a walk as this.

Mr. Calvert Vaux, Superintendent Architect, under date of December 16, 1882, has supplied estimates from this work:

The first item.....	\$13,242 00
The second item.....	26,400 00
The third item.....	25,600 00

and you are respectfully requested to make this additional appropriation, as the appropriation for \$25,000 already made will be needed for repairs on the avenue, for planting trees, and other park-work.

XXII. MANHATTAN SQUARE.

The appropriation made for this will be expended in continuing the work of grading the surface of the park, laying walks through it, planting of trees, shrubs and a hedge on the border, and in preparing the turf.

XXIV. RESURFACING AND TOP DRESSING.

In the smaller city parks the grass is in poor condition because the soil is worn out, and has for long years been permeated by the gas which has escaped from the pipes laid through it, and which has poisoned both the grass and the trees. Since the introduction of the electric light in several of the city parks, the flow of the gas underground through them has been cut off. It is possible now in these parks to renovate the soil and to give new vigor to the trees and the grass, which they greatly need. It is to be done by digging up the soil, opening it to the air, replacing portions of it with new and richer soil and mould, and then regrading and seeding down the surface. This work should be commenced at once on some of the city parks, and its effect would very soon be seen, and give reason for finishing the work.

No appropriation has been made, and the \$20,000 asked for should be now allowed.

CONCLUSION.

This general survey of the work of the Department not only explains and justifies the appropriations which your Board have already made, but calls your attention also to the five items to which your consideration is respectfully requested, as stated on page 9.

The work of the Department in its whole scope is important, and every item of it should be diligently prosecuted in order to produce a satisfactory result. There is much other work which a wise forethought would even now provide for, but which is not now adverted to.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks:

GENTLEMEN—A document has again been presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by an agent of the Council of Reform, among other things reflecting seriously on the conduct of the work with which I am specially charged.

If this document were simply considered by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, who are familiar with the character of this and similar attacks, it would seem a waste of time to reply to it, but when it appears masquerading in the public press as a carefully prepared instrument of reform, the case becomes different, and constrains me to make a brief counter statement.

Most of the allegations made under the heading of “Surveying, Monumenting, Laying-out, and Mapping Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards,” are not only stupid and absurd, but positively false. Similar statements published in regard to private corporations or individuals would subject the compounder of them to prosecution for libel.

The most charitable assumption that can be made, is that the ignorance and animus of the writer has rendered him only too ready to be misled by interested parties.

The first statement is that “\$23,000 are again asked for the same work that was contracted out by the Park Commissioners, under the same specifications that the Department is now working under, and paid for ten years ago on the production of the maps of the work, which are now in use in the office of the Comptroller, and are on file in the office of the Park Department, and have been since that time.”

This eminently lucid and truthful statement needs one mere trifling correction, to wit: Not one cent is asked for the same work that was contracted out and paid ten years ago.

The second sentence says, as follows:

“Since the annexation of this district, and after the construction work of the parks had ceased, the force of engineers engaged on construction have been transferred and continued on this work of surveying and mapping out this district.”

Another slight correction is again required. One only of my force, now merely an assistant, with a salary of about \$3.33 per diem, was engaged on the original construction work of the park. It is also true that this assistant worked outside of the Department for a number of years after being engaged on the construction of the park, and that he is not, nor ever has, to my knowledge, been engaged upon the work of surveying, laying-out, and monumenting the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

The third statement is that “with every new succession of Park Commissioners the Chief Engineer has usually been changed, who, on the plea of improving on the work of his predecessor, has repeated these surveys.”

This again is unqualifiedly false as far as my record is concerned, and I sincerely believe it to be equally so of that of my predecessors.

The statement is made that “in this manner \$229,000 have been spent on this work since the annexation.”

The books of the Department show that everything, including the amount expended for surveying, laying-out, and monumenting, and the making of maps for the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments from the middle of 1874 (when the operations under chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874 commenced), to and including the year 1881, was \$160,726.13.

Farther on it is stated that no map of these surveys for the use of the city officers has yet been produced, while in the first sentence quoted above it speaks of maps of the work made ten years ago now in use in the office of the Comptroller.

I beg leave to remind you that for the 14,573 acres with the laying-out and monumenting of which the Department of Public Parks is charged, plans for the laying-out of over 13,000 acres are now on file in two of the city offices.

These plans have been accurately marked on the ground by means of permanent monuments for an area of at least 6000 acres.

Plans for the sewerage system of 1,848 acres have been filed in five different city offices.

The statement is then made that “we are assured by engineers of the highest character that \$125,000 would have been an ample allowance for this work under the specifications in force.”

If this means anything it is that \$125,000 would have been ample to accomplish the work of making exact, accurate and detailed surveys and topographical surveys and maps; the maturing plans for a complete laying-out of a system of streets, and the physical determination of those streets on the ground by means of monuments; the carefully considered establishment of grades for the same streets; the complete preparation of a system of sewerage in harmony with the plan and grades of these streets; and the preparation of a complete set of maps showing the exact dimensions, areas, and relative locations of all subdivisions of private property; the exact determination of miles of pier and bulkhead lines; the careful determination of the location of bridges and tunnels over the Harlem and Bronx rivers; the making of thorough searches and investigations, with reports on thousands of questions in connection with the real estate and its improvement for over 14,000 acres of city property.

The engineers of the highest character who made any such assertion that all this could be properly accomplished for \$125,000 were certainly not engineers of the highest intelligence.

As to an honest investigation of the work referred to, I can simply say that I should be sincerely pleased should such an investigation by disinterested experts of the conduct of the work under my charge be made, and every assistance in my power should be rendered them.

To the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks:

GENTLEMEN—A Committee of the “Council of Political Reform” has lately presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a memorial based upon so much misinformation and so calculated, doubtless in all innocence, to create such an erroneous impression concerning the parks, that I feel it my duty to lay before you a brief memorandum as to those parts of the memorial relating to the matters especially within my supervision. The public-spirited committeemen seem to me widely mistaken, in assuming that the maintenance and care of an ornate park are to be compared with ordinary farming, in which, even, they make no distinction between arable and pasture land, nor between wood land and prairie.

They may be somewhat better off in the assumed analogy between parks and cemeteries. But even here their selection seems unfortunate, for only a small portion of their chosen Woodlawn Cemetery is under the cultivation of the grave-digger. If, however, a cemetery is to be selected, why not take Greenwood in this country; or, if they are to go abroad, as they have done to the London parks, make comparisons with that of Kensal Green and Brompton Cemeteries, or with the deserted quarry converted into the remarkable St. James Cemetery at Liverpool, or with Pere la Chaise.

If a comparison is to be made with a cemetery, the expenditure of the stockholders is not a criterion for the maintenance without adding the total expenditure of private individuals with all their voluntary labor and the other tributes of decoration and private memorial days.

Furthermore, the members of the Council, forgetful of the transitory state of things, assume that costly buildings and expensive works frequented and used by the public, when once completed practically care for themselves—at least as much so as do private parks and country seats. The wear and tear to which Central Park is subjected in a week, would ruin any private pleasure ground the world over. When private premises, such as the elegant grounds of Mr. Hoey and Mr. Hilton, or as the magnificent parks and gardens at Chatsworth, in Derbyshire, England, are thrown open to the public, no visitor or group is allowed to wander through the grounds without a guide, and each person is subjected—most properly too—to a control and restrictions which would be intolerable in Central Park.

The Council of Reform appears, unwittingly, to have overlooked the difference between the cost of labor and material in works of construction and maintenance. Those who use the materials in the Department of Parks are mechanics and helpers, together with a few men who lay gravel on the drives or lay walks during the summer. As a matter of fact the amount paid in the Department, in wages, to laborers who use materials, is below the value of the materials used—a circumstance comparing favorably with any department in the city, and even with private work. It would be unjust to add all the labor expended upon the clearing away of snow, sweeping the walks, caring for the lawns, drives, bridle-roads, etc., which have to be diligently sprinkled through many months of the year, to the labor applied with materials, in a comparative valuation of both.

As no comparison is practical between the matters contrasted in the memorial in question, I have asked the accomplished bookkeeper of the Department to make up the cost of maintaining the turfed surfaces in the Central Park, the one common feature of farms, or parks, and of cemeteries, and find that it amounts to a little over \$20,000, or a little less than an average of three dollars per acre on the amount of cultivated surface allowed by the memorialists.

It is singular that the memorialists have unhappily left out of their calculation the cost and labor expended upon the great improvements which have been made in the parks, especially in Central Park, since the autumn of 1881. They assume that in the metropolis of the United States, the citizens who drive, ride and walk, are willing that their parks should be in the condition of Prospect Park, in Brooklyn, of Fairmount Common, in Philadelphia, and of others named as standards of excellence. The protests of the whole community against the state of things of the past shows a better appreciation of the efforts of the designers of the parks and of the present management. Perhaps the progress made in the last year has been so quiet and so gradual as not to be noticeable by the Council; but the change, nevertheless, has been great. The gardeners and their attendants have cleared away over 4,000 cart loads of dead wood, rubbish and prunings. The same work continues in the same manner as it was commenced; over 3,500 loads of compost and manures have been hauled upon the meadows and lawns; above 200 acres of meadows and lawns were seeded last spring, and over 150 tons of prime hay harvested in the summer; more than 12,000 plants have been planted in the circles and flower beds, and new gravel has been laid on five miles of drives; 148,852 square feet of new walk have been laid, and 56,000 square feet resurfaced.

In the Mechanical Department, besides the renovating of rolling stock and the making of new implements, the rotten floors of bridges have been relaid for the safety of pedestrians, iron bridges which had not been painted before for thirteen years and the ornamental iron of which was almost eaten away with rust, have been cleaned and painted, as have also the railings of the small parks in the city. The urinals have been cleaned and painted with two coats; the boat houses and all the park cottages (excepting the ladies' cottage at One Hundred and Tenth street), have been repaired and painted; all the park seats and stationary benches and the musicstand in the Mall have been repaired and painted; the fence around Mount Morris Park has been painted and restored; drains have been relaid and basins have been built. This work, which has been neglected for years, has been done in addition to the regular work of maintenance, and done, too, with seventy-five less men than were employed before.

The Comptroller presented the following:

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned would hereby respectfully urge the acquisition, for the New York Register's office, of the following, which are, as we understand, now submitted, from Dr. Windwart, deceased, for purchase at a reasonable price, etc.:

1. Complete index of the errors in the Official Index of Recorded Conveyances in Register's office, printed by the Commissioners of Records, under special statute, from earliest record to year 1857.

2. Index of all the maps, on record, in the Register's office, as well those on file in map-room, as those recorded at large throughout the many libers of conveyances in the office.

3. All old and new streets in New York City, properly defined, etc.

Also, many original maps, which for many years were in the Register's office, for the use of the public, and are now removed therefrom.

The printed official index, above referred to, was prepared under chapter 407 of the Laws of 1855, by a commission to print or copy, for the convenience of the public, the maps, indices, and documents in Register's office, etc., in such form and extent as deemed proper. These indices, so printed, are, as now on file in said office and as published and sold by the Comptroller to conveyancers

and the public, very incomplete, containing near two thousand errors shown in Dr. Windwart's said new Index of Corrections, and the same ought to be officially corrected and put in a reliable shape, so as to be useful to the public, as contemplated by said statute. This can be done by means of Dr. Windwart's list of errors therein.

And similarly to the acquisition, by the authorities, of Mr. Wm. Ford's new set of indices for said Register's office, from and after A. D. 1869, the aforesaid other index of all maps in Register's office, should be officially furnished, since no index is now supplied there of the many maps recorded throughout the numerous libers of deeds.

If Dr. Windwart's said two sets of indices, with the aforesaid original maps and table of streets thrown in, would be acquired, the same could be published in the CITY RECORD, in subdivisions, as exhibits to proceedings of Board of Apportionment, and those numbers being sold at twenty-five cents per copy, under direction of the City Record Commission, the public, as well as the Register's office, could obtain same for binding them, as a supplement to the said official printed index published and sold. The expense will be so refunded.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks held December 20, 1882.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meetings held December 13th and 18th inst. were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and, on motion, laid on the table to await action, as stated, to wit:

From John C. McCarthy—Requesting that permission be granted to John Donohue to erect a coal derrick mast on the bulkhead between Barrow and Morton streets, North river.

From Engineer-in-Chief—Report on Secretary's Order No. 2837 in reference to plans submitted by the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company for an awning-shed in front of their ferry premises, between Piers, new 20 and new 21, North river. Secretary directed to advise that the Board desire to have plans more definite and specific submitted therefor, and that they require that applications for permits to do work under the jurisdiction of the Department be made by the general officers or properly authorized agents of the corporation, and not by subordinates.

The following communications were received, read, and, on motion, placed on file, action being taken, where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Counsel to the Corporation—

1st. In reference to leases for piers and bulkheads on the East river, submitted to him for approval as to form.

2d. Returning thirty-four leases of wharf property on the East river, with his approval indorsed thereon.

3d. Enclosing check for \$100, received from Joseph Gallagher in settlement of claim for \$141.67 for rent of land under water at Forty-fifth street, East river. Secretary directed to advise that credit therefor was given on the books of this Department.

From Charles Guidet—In reference to the terms and conditions of his contract, and enclosing opinion from his counsel in relation thereto.

From Glen Cove Manufacturing Company—Requesting permission to make repairs to the bulkhead between Piers 49 and 50, East river. Permission granted, work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, and the previous action of the Board, on November 29th ult., directing the Engineer-in-Chief to prepare specifications for repairing the same, rescinded.

From Hoboken Land and Improvement Company—In reference to pavement in front of ferry premises at Christopher street, North river, being obstructed by the contractor. Secretary directed to advise that the contractor has agreed to remove the obstructions, and that if the same was not done, this Department would remove the same.

From Pim, Forwood & Co., lessees—In reference to the approach to Pier, new 55, North river, and requesting that the same be repaired within four days or they would do the same and charge the cost thereof to this Department. Secretary directed to advise that the Board will not object to their laying a wooden or stone pavement approach to the pier, provided that the same be

done at the cost and expense of the lessees, and that they have proper consent and authority to do the work, but that the Board considers that it has fulfilled all its agreements and has done all that it can legally do in the premises.

From Robert Ennever & Son—Requesting permission to run a 4-inch cast-iron pipe through the bulkhead north of Bank street, North river. Application denied.

From Fire Department—Requesting that five new piles be placed at the bulkhead at Pier, new 1, North river, at the berth of the steamboat "Wm. F. Havemeyer." Secretary directed to advise that the Board will grant permission to the Fire Department to do the work at their own cost and expense, under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

From James Quinn, by George S. Thompson, attorney—Requesting lease of land between Seventy-seventh and Seventy-eighth streets, East river. Application denied.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting in reference to the pavement in front of the west half of Pier 51, East river. Secretary directed to notify the owners thereof to repair the approach to the pier within ten days, under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief.

2d. Reporting amount of work done during the week ending December 16, 1882.

3d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2815, that two new mooring piles had been placed on the westerly side of Pier 19, East river.

From George W. Wannaker, Corporation Wharfinger—Reporting that the entrance to Pier, new 43, North river, required to be repaired. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to make the necessary repairs.

From William L. McConkey, Corporation Wharfinger—Reporting that the pavement in front of Pier 6, East river, was in a dangerous condition. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report thereon.

From John McKeon, Corporation Wharfinger:

1st. Reporting that the Pier at Seventy-ninth street, North river, required to be repaired. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and repair so as to keep it in safe condition.

2d. Reporting that John Rogers had incurred penalty for not removing brick from south side of Pier at One Hundred and Thirty-first street, North river, after being notified to remove the same on or before December 14th instant. Secretary directed to transmit report to the Counsel to the Corporation for collection of the penalty incurred for violation of rules on December 15th and 16th instant, \$100.

The President, to whom was referred the communication received from James Brady, in reference to charges made against him and for which he had been discharged, reported thereon that after examination of the parties in respect to the matter, he would recommend that no change be made in the action heretofore taken by the Board in the matter.

On motion, the report was received, and, with the communication, was ordered on file, and the recommendation adopted.

The communication from the Fire Department, requesting that two berths be assigned—one on the North and one on the East river—for the two floating engines of that Department, was,

On motion, taken from the table, and with the report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 2839, in relation thereto, which was received and read, was ordered on file, and the Secretary directed to advise in reply thereto that this Board have no authority to berth or place

vessels at any piers or bulkheads—the authority to do so being conferred by law on the Harbor Masters.

A communication from R. J. Cortis, agent of the White Star Line, requesting that the time to make the repairs to Pier, new 45, North river, be extended to April, 1883, was received, read, and, on motion, placed on file, and the following resolution in relation thereto was offered by Commissioner Voorhis:

Resolved, That for reasons assigned in the communication received from R. J. Cortis, agent of the White Star Line, the time for making the repairs to Pier, new 45, North river, as ordered and directed by this Board, be and hereby is extended to the first day of April next.

Which was adopted by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Vanderpoel and Voorhis. The President voting in the negative.

Judge Andrew J. White appeared before the Board in reference to the use of the Pier at Thirty-eighth street, North river, and stated that he expected that a representative from the Board of Health would be present to be heard in respect thereto, and requested that the matter be laid over for another week.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted: Resolved, That the consideration of the matter in respect to the use and occupation of the Pier at Thirty-eighth street, North river, be laid over until December 27th inst.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to examine and report as to the sunken barge "Silvan Shore," at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, Harlem river, and the best means to be employed to remove the same.

A communication from Simon Stevens, attorney, etc., offering on behalf of the respective owners thereof, to sell and convey to the Corporation of the City of New York, the bulkhead and wharf property situate in front of and opposite to Nos. 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, and 55 South street, and the northerly half of the private street known as Gouverneur Lane, together with all interest in Piers 13 and 14, East river, a total frontage of 180 feet and six inches, for the sum of \$180,500, was received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, and the following preamble and resolution, offered by Commissioner Voorhis, was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, This Board have been negotiating with Mr. Simon Stevens, the attorney for the various owners of wharf property on South street, East river, for the purchase thereof; and

Whereas, By resolution adopted December 4, 1882, the purchase of the wharf property in front of and opposite to Nos. 49, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 47 and 48 South street, and about one-half of the private street known as Gouverneur Lane, was authorized and an agreement for the purchase thereof duly executed, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and

Whereas, Mr. Simon Stevens has this day submitted in writing an offer to sell to the Corporation of the City of New York all the bulkhead and wharf property in front of, and opposite to, Nos. 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, and 55 South street, and the remaining portion of the private street known as Gouverneur Lane, together with all the interest in Piers Nos. 13 and 14, East river, being in extent about 180 feet 6 inches in length, for the sum of \$180,500, and on like terms and conditions as those expressed in the former agreement, and this Board deeming it for the best interests of the city to accept the said offer; therefore,

Resolved, That the proposition made to this Board on behalf of the alleged owners thereof to sell and convey to the Corporation of the City of New York, the bulkhead, water-front in front of, and opposite to, Nos. 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, and 55 South street, and the northerly half of the private street known as Gouverneur Lane, being in extent about 180 feet 6 inches in length of bulkhead front, together with the riparian rights, titles, easements, and privileges incident thereto, and also including their interest in Piers 13 and 14, East river, for the sum of \$180,500 be accepted, subject, however, to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as provided in subdivision 4 of section 6, chapter 574, Laws of 1871.

The President offered the following preamble and resolution, which was unanimously adopted: Whereas, John H. Rogers, one of the inspectors, was suspended, October 26, 1882, from duty for reasons assigned to this Board in a report made by the Chief Engineer under date of October 26, 1882, and

Whereas, His record for twelve years is good, no charges or complaints of record against him previously having been made, his experience and knowledge of construction, etc., in this Department commend him to the consideration of the Board; therefore,

Resolved, That John H. Rogers be and is hereby restored to duty, and that the Chief Engineer is directed to assign him as Inspector upon Twenty-third Street Pier, under contract awarded December 6, 1882.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held December 27, 1882.

Present—William R. Grace, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Allan Campbell, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Chamberlain; and John McClave, Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred back the communication from the Commissioners of Health, in relation to a site for a "Hospital for Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria and Measles, in New York City," with "instructions to confer with the Department of Docks, and ascertain from said Department what property is now actually in use by said Department at the foot of Sixteenth street, East river, and what, if any, part of said property can be appropriated for the purpose of erecting a temporary hospital thereon; and that the Comptroller be requested to report by resolution, at the next meeting of this Board,"—submitted the following communication from the Department of Docks, viz.:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS, }
NEW YORK, December 26, 1882. }

Hon. ALLAN CAMPBELL, Comptroller City of New York:

SIR—I beg leave to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of 23d instant, inclosing resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in reference to the premises at the foot of Sixteenth and Seventeenth streets, East river, used and occupied by the Department of Docks, and in response thereto I herewith transmit a diagram of the said premises, showing the portions in use by this Department, and also that used for the purposes of other Departments.

It is the opinion of this Board that the space now occupied by this Department cannot be reduced at the present time, it being fully required and absolutely necessary for the storage of granite, derricks, and other material and property belonging to and applicable for use in this Department and the removal of which would incur considerable expense, and especially in view of the fact that this Board have now in preparation plans for the improvement of the water-front on the East river, which include this section, and which, if approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund (to whom they will be submitted within a few days), will materially reduce the area now occupied and in use by this Department at this location. This Board, for the reasons stated, would respectfully request that no change be made in the use and occupation of the said premises at the present time, and would suggest that a portion of the market building could be used and made applicable for the purposes required by the Health Department. This Board will, however, do what the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may desire in the matter.

The Comptroller made a brief statement in relation to the matter under consideration, and submitted the following report, viz.:

Whereas, The Commissioners of Health have applied to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the designation and appropriation of a site for a hospital for scarlet fever, measles, diphtheria and other contagious diseases, the need of which is represented by them to be urgent and necessary; and

Whereas, The Commissioners of Health have requested that a portion of the land belonging to the city between Sixteenth and Seventeenth streets, on the East river, be designated and appropriated as the site of such hospital; and

Whereas, The Commissioners of Docks have, in a communication addressed to the Comptroller on December 26, instant, expressing their views in regard to the selection of said location as a site for said hospital, now occupied and in use by the Department of Docks, for the storage of granite, derricks and other material and property, for which the premises are required and necessary; and

Whereas, The Board of Commissioners of Docks have, however, expressed their willingness to do what the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may desire in this matter; and

Whereas, It appears that a plot of land, now occupied in part as a storage-shed by the Department of Docks, on said city property, fronting on Sixteenth street, may be appropriated as a site for a temporary hospital to be erected by the Board of Health, for the purposes mentioned in their application aforesaid; therefore

Resolved, That a plot of land, 125 feet front on Sixteenth street by 92 feet deep, belonging to the city, beginning at a point about 450 feet east from the northeast corner of Sixteenth street and Avenue C, thence 125 feet east on Sixteenth street, thence north 92 feet to the middle line of the block, thence 125 feet west on the said middle line of the block, and thence 92 feet south to the point of beginning, as indicated on a map hereunto annexed, be and the same is hereby designated and appropriated for occupation and use by the Board of Health of the City of New York, as a site for a temporary hospital to be erected for scarlet fever, measles, diphtheria and other contagious diseases, such use and occupation of the premises to be subject to a termination and abandonment by the Board of Health, whenever the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may determine, and as may be required for other disposition of the land in the interest of the city.

Report accepted and, on motion, resolution adopted; all the Commissioners voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller submitted the following resolution, viz.:

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of chapter 498, Laws of 1880, and of the Charter of 1873, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to sell at public auction to the highest bidder, a lease of the franchise to operate a ferry between Thirty-fourth street, East river, and Hunter's Point, Long Island, along with a portion of the wharf property belonging to the city, used and required for ferry purposes at the foot of Thirty-fourth street, for the term of five years, from the first day of February, 1883, upon the terms and conditions prescribed by resolutions of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, adopted March 17, 1881, and December 16, 1882, and containing the covenants and conditions as provided by law and ordinances of the Common Council now in force relative to ferries, according to a form of ferry lease prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation, on file in the Comptroller's office, at a minimum yearly rental or upset price of \$2,000 for said wharf property and of five per cent. of the gross receipts for ferriage; provided, also, that the ferriage for foot passengers shall not exceed three cents each for crossing said ferry, and that the rates of ferriage now charged for carriages, trucks, carts and other vehicles shall not be exceeded during the term of said lease, and that the returns of receipts from ferriage, sworn to by the lessee, shall be made to the Comptroller quarterly, in such form as he may prescribe, and that the books of accounts of said ferry shall be subject to his examination.

The resolution was not adopted; the Mayor, Chamberlain and Chairman Finance Committee of Board of Aldermen voting in the negative, and the Recorder and Comptroller in the affirmative.

The Mayor moved to amend the resolution so that the ferriage for foot passengers from 5 to 7 o'clock A. M. and from 6 to 7 o'clock P. M. shall be two cents; which was adopted; the Mayor, Chamberlain and Chairman of Finance Committee of Board of Aldermen voting in the affirmative, and the Recorder and Comptroller in the negative.

The resolution as amended was, on motion, adopted, to read as follows, viz.:

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of chapter 498, Laws of 1880, and of the Charter of 1873, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to sell, at public auction to the highest bidder, a lease of the franchise to operate a ferry between Thirty-fourth street, East river, and Hunter's Point, Long Island, along with a portion of the wharf property belonging to the city, used and required for ferry purposes at the foot of Thirty-fourth street, for the term of five years, from the


