

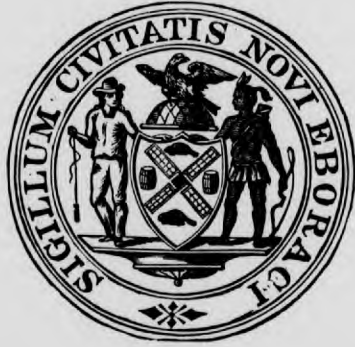

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, NEW YORK, July 29, 1885.

MOREAU MORRIS, M. D., Chief Inspector:

SIR—I have the honor to report that, in accordance with your request, I have inspected the City Prison with reference to overcrowding, and find the facts to be as follows:

The prison consists of two stone buildings, situated on the block bounded by Centre, Elm, Franklin, and Leonard streets, one of them fronting on Centre street, the other at the rear of the lot, near Elm street, and both extending the entire length of the block.

The building fronting on Centre street is used chiefly for court-rooms, kitchen, work-shop, store-house, etc., only the female and a few "drunk and disorderly" male prisoners being kept there. At present, pending the completion of the new female prison now building, the female prisoners are not confined in cells, but in rooms containing several beds each, and large enough to give to each occupant four hundred cubic feet of air. During the day, the women are allowed the freedom of the rooms and the hallways.

Two new buildings, which will contain 80 and 68 cells respectively, are now in process of erection in the prison yard and will probably be completed by November 1. When completed the

larger one of the two will be used for male prisoners in conjunction with the old male prison now in use.

The male prison standing near Elm street is a large four-story building, containing 146 cells in four tiers, varying somewhat in size, the first, second, third and fourth tier cells containing respectively 700, 600, 500 and 400 cubic feet of space, each cell being ventilated by a large aperture in the wall near the ceiling opening into the outer air.

It has been stated that the average daily number of prisoners at the Tombs is over 500 and that two, three, and sometimes four persons are confined in a cell large enough for one only.

During the year 1884 the largest number of prisoners on any one day was 502. This occurred only three or four times in the year, and was the result of police raids.

The average daily number is 333, of which about 100 are women and 30 are male "drunk and disorderlies," kept in one building, leaving about 200 men to be distributed among the 146 cells of the male prison. It is not common for more than two persons to be kept in one cell, but even this overcrowding is as likely to occur in a small cell as in a large one. No account is taken of cubic space in distributing the prisoners, they being classified according to their offenses. This overcrowding is objectionable at any season, and should be remedied until the completion of the new prison, which will add 80 cells to the 146 now in use, making 226 cells in all, or more than will generally be required to give one cell to each prisoner. Should still more room be needed in the near future, I would respectfully suggest that the space now occupied by court-rooms in the prison be converted into cells. Enough room would thus be gained to make the Tombs prison entirely adequate for the city's prisoners for years to come.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending August 8, 1885, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending August 1, 1885.

SIR—There were 648 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 8, 1885, which is a decrease of 278, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 59 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending August 1, 1885, was 824, which is 13.4 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 30.58 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,400,933.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 10 to 3 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given. Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents. All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt. Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
