

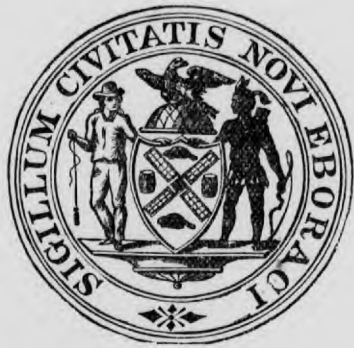

## BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

## MINUTES OF FEBRUARY 8, 1884.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met in the Mayor's office at 11 A. M., on Friday, the 8th day of February, 1884.

The following members were present:

Franklin Edson, Mayor; S. Hastings Grant, Comptroller; Hubert O. Thompson, Commissioner of Public Works; Egbert L. Viele, President of the Department of Public Parks; William P. Kirk, President of the Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting, held on September 17, 1883, were read and approved.

The Secretary reported that he had notified Messrs. James Monteith, Herbert A. Shipman, Luke F. Cozans, George W. Lyon, and Francis A. Thayer, that a meeting of this Board would be held on February 8, 1884.

The Secretary reported that he had transmitted to the Commissioner of Public Works the reports referred back to him for further examination and report at the last meeting of this Board.

The Commissioner of Public Works reported that he had a map prepared showing the proposed streets and avenues through the Deforest property, which plan he believed was satisfactory to the property-owners; but, in order to give them time for further examination, he moved that the matter be laid over until the next meeting of the Board. So ordered.

The Commissioner of Public Works reported, that action was being taken by the Common Council that would probably render unnecessary, any action by this Board in regard to laying out a new street, to afford easy means of travel between Eighth avenue at One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and Ninth avenue at One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street.

Upon motion, the report of the Commissioner of Public Works was accepted, and further action in regard to the said street indefinitely postponed.

The Commissioner of Public Works presented the following report, which was received and ordered on file.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS—COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE,  
No. 31 CHAMBERS STREET,  
NEW YORK, December 28, 1883.

Hon. FRANKLIN EDSON, Mayor and Chairman of Board of Street Opening, etc.:

SIR—In answer to the enclosed report from the Board of Health, in reference to the sanitary condition of One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, between Tenth avenue and the Boulevard, and the necessity of constructing sewers in that vicinity, I beg to say:

A portion of these sewers, viz.: in Eleventh avenue, between One Hundred and Fifty-seventh and One Hundred and Fifty-ninth streets, and in One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, are now under contract and in course of construction. The rule maps for opening One Hundred and Sixtieth and One Hundred and Sixty-first streets, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, are being prepared, but cannot be used until two-thirds of the property-owners, shall have petitioned for the opening of the streets, as required by section 673, of the New York Consolidation Act of 1882.

The Secretary presented the following report, which was accepted by the Board, and ordered to be entered in full on the minutes:

"To the Board of Street Opening and Improvement:

I respectfully report that on the twenty-fourth day of October, 1883, at the office of the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen in the City Hall, in the City of New York, I did deliver to a clerk therein and leave with him, copies of resolutions passed by this Board, and signed by the members thereof, and notices, of all of which copies are hereto annexed.

And that I have caused to be published a notice, a copy of which with due proof of the publication thereof is hereto annexed.

The Commissioner of Public Works offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the proceedings of this Board heretofore taken for the laying out, opening and extending of One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, and other streets and avenues; and for the altering of the map or plan of the City of New York by laying out, opening and extending such streets and avenues, be and the same are hereby discontinued.

The resolution was adopted by the following vote, the Comptroller being excused from voting: Ayes—The Mayor, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, and the President of the Board of Aldermen—4.

The Commissioner of Public Works offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to give the members of this Board at least ten days notice of each meeting of the Board, and that he specify in said notice what matters are to be brought before it at such meeting.

The Commissioner of Public Works offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement deem it to be for the public interest to alter the map or plan of the City of New York, by laying out, opening, and extending certain new streets and avenues as follows, viz.: That One Hundred and Twenty-seventh and One Hundred and Twenty-eighth streets be extended in an easterly direction and parallel with One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street, at a uniform width of sixty (60' 0") feet from their present termini east of Tenth avenue to the westerly line of Avenue Saint Nicholas; that a new avenue, known as Cliff avenue, to be sixty (60' 0") feet wide and parallel with Eighth avenue, the easterly line of said Cliff avenue be distant five hundred and forty (540' 0") feet westerly therefrom: Beginning on the northerly line of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, and running thence northerly to the new avenue known as Hamlin avenue for a distance of one thousand and five feet and five-eighths of an inch (1,005' 5/8") on the easterly line, and nine hundred and twenty-eight feet and two inches (928' 2") on the westerly line; that One Hundred and Thirtieth street be extended in an easterly direction and parallel with One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street, at a uniform width of sixty (60' 0") feet from its present terminus, east of Tenth avenue, to the proposed new avenue known as Cliff avenue; that a new street or place, to be known as Academy place, to be sixty (60' 0") feet wide, between the northerly line of One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, as extended, and the southerly line of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, as extended, the westerly line of said Academy place shall be distant easterly from Tenth avenue as follows, viz.: Beginning at a point in the southerly line of One Hun-

Mr. John A. Beall appeared before the Board on behalf of Mr. Harkness Boyd, and asked to have One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street closed, between Avenue St. Nicholas and Ninth avenue, and stated that he would send a petition on behalf of Mr. Boyd to the Secretary of the Board in a few days.

The President of the Department of Public Parks thereupon offered the following resolution, which was adopted by a unanimous vote.

Resolved, That the application of Harkness Boyd to alter the map or plan of the city of New York, by closing One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, between Avenue St. Nicholas and the Ninth avenue as it is laid out upon the present map be referred to the Commissioner of Public Works for examination and report upon the propriety of such action.

The President of the Department of Public Parks also offers the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and is hereby requested to cause the necessary surveys to be made to determine the practicability and advisability of laying out a new street from the point where West Seventy-first street is intersected by the Hudson River and the New York Central Railroad to the point on West Seventy-second street, where said street is intersected by said railway, with a view of securing the commercial use of a pier to be located at the foot of West Seventy-second street, the grade of the latter street prohibiting such use through that street.

The Secretary submitted the following letter and opinion, which were received and ordered on file.

NOVEMBER, 15, 1883.

Hon. GEORGE P. ANDREWS, Counsel to the Corporation:

SIR—I respectfully request your opinion as to whether it is necessary for the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, in order to fix and establish the grades of the streets and avenues laid out by them under and by virtue of chapter 360 of the Laws of 1883, to show and delineate said grades upon the maps made by them of the streets so laid out, before the filing of said maps; or whether said Board cannot fix and establish said grades subsequently to the filing of the maps laying out the streets, and then file maps showing the grades of said streets as fixed and established by them. As this Board is about to lay out and alter a large number of streets in the upper part of the city, this matter becomes one of considerable importance in view of the possibility of the vacation of assessments for regulating, grading, etc., said streets, if the Board of Street Opening do not establish the grades in a valid and legal manner.

ARTHUR BERRY, Esq., Secretary of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement:

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication under date of November 15, 1883, asking my opinion as to whether the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, in order to fix and establish the grades of the streets and avenues laid out by them under section 955 of the Consolidation Act, as amended by chapter 360 of the Laws of 1883, must delineate said grades upon the maps made by them of the streets and avenues so laid out at the time when such maps are filed, or whether the grade maps may be filed subsequently.

The section you refer to is a very long one, and it is not necessary to quote it. It provides in the first instance, for the opening, widening, straightening, extending, altering and closing the streets and avenues south of Fifty-ninth street, and for alterations of the map or plan of the city within that territory, and the certification and filing of maps showing the several streets or avenues so laid out, opened, etc.

The section (as amended) next provides for similar alterations, widenings, etc., in the territory between Fifty-ninth street and One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, south of the Harlem river, with like provisions for the certification and filing of maps showing the streets or avenues so laid out, etc. Having thus disposed of the subject of laying out the streets, the section proceeds to authorize the



fixing of grades, in these words: "And the said Board are hereby authorized and empowered to fix and establish the grades of all the streets and avenues so laid out, widened, etc., by them; and said grades shall be shown and delineated on the maps made and filed by them in accordance with the provisions of this act."

The use of the word "the" before the word "maps" in the sentence last cited, would seem to indicate that it was the intention of the Legislature to require that the grades should be shown and delineated on the maps already referred to in the earlier part of the section, and, in view of the fact that the validity of future assessments will in part depend upon a strict compliance with the act in fixing the grades, it is my opinion that the clause referred to should be thus interpreted.

## HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 26th day of February, 1884, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following amendments of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same are hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Resolved, That section 201 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 201. That for all lodging-houses in which beds are let for lodgers containing four or more beds in any apartment therein for the use of lodgers, a permit in writing from this Department shall be required, and no person in the City of New York shall have, lease, let, or keep any such lodging-house or the lodgings therein, or assist in the keeping, hire, or assist in hiring, or conduct the business of any such lodging-house, or the lodgings therein, except pursuant to the terms and condition of a permit in writing previously obtained therefor from this Department, an application for which shall be made in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Board of Health by the person or persons who propose to use the same. The beds in all lodging-houses and in every room in which beds are let for lodgers shall be separated by a passageway of not less than two feet, horizontally, and all the beds shall be so arranged that under each of them the air shall freely circulate, and there be adequate ventilation. Four hundred (400) cubic feet of air space shall be provided and allowed for each bed or lodger, and no more beds shall be permitted than those provided in this way, unless free and adequate means of ventilation exist, approved by the Board of Health, and a special permit in writing be granted therefor, specifying the number of beds or the cubic air space which shall under special circumstances be allowed.

Resolved, That section 99 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 99. That no blood, lachrymators' fluid or garbage, nor any dead animal, nor any putrid or stinking animal or vegetable matter, shall be thrown by any person or allowed to go into any street, place, sewer, or receiving-basin, or into any river or standing or running water or excavation, or upon any ground or premises in the built-up portions of said city.

TO THE PUBLIC.

AT 9.30 P. M. ON THURSDAY THE 15TH instant, the aqueduct had to be shut off to repair a large leak that could not be repaired in the usual manner from the exterior. This leak had suddenly developed in the section south of Yonkers, where smaller fissures had previously occurred.

The examination showed fissures aggregating 2,000 feet in length. The repairs were finished and water was again turned on by 4 P. M., on Saturday, the 17th instant. While the flow through the aqueduct was interrupted the supply in the Central Park reservoir was drawn down five feet.

This loss of supply in the city reservoirs, occurring now, as winter is approaching, makes it necessary to take extra precautions against waste of water. Being aware of the temptation to leave faucets open in cold weather to prevent freezing in the pipes, I specially protest against that practice, and appeal to all citizens to abstain from wasteful use of water in any manner whatever. The present condition of the supply and the possibility of a recurrence of similar leaks in the aqueduct make it my duty to give this public notice that I shall hereinafter resort to the peremptory measure of shutting off the water in all places where persistent waste is discovered.

Resolved, For the proper supervision of the waterfront of the city, the care of the wharf property located thereon placed in the charge of this Department, the rendering of necessary facilities for the prompt berthing of vessels thereat, and the collection of the wharfage accruing therefrom, that the water-front of the City of New York be and hereby is arranged and divided into nine districts, and that for each of the said districts there shall be appointed, designated, or assigned, from time to time, at the pleasure of the Board, a suitable and competent person to be known and entitled as "Dock Master," who shall perform such duties and render such services in relation to the supervision, regulation, and

occupation of the wharf property and water-front in their respective districts, as the laws of the United States and of the State of New York, the ordinances of the City of New York, and the by-laws of this Board, and its rules, or orders, shall or may require, prescribe, or direct.

The several districts so made and created, and the Dock Masters assigned thereto, are as follows, to wit: District No. 1.—Embracing all that portion of the East river, extending from Castle Garden, on the Battery, to and including Pier 21, East river.

Charles H. Thompson, Dock Master; office, 33 Coenties Slip.

District No. 2.—All that portion of the North river extending from Castle Garden, to and including Pier old 42, North river.

George W. Wanmaker, Dock Master; office, foot of Duane street, N. R.

District No. 3.—From east side Pier 21, East river, to and including Pier 55, East river.

Edward Abel, Dock Master; office, 262 South street.

District No. 4.—From north side Pier, old 42, North river, to and including pier at foot of West Twenty-third street, North river.

John M. Smith, Dock Master; office, Pier, new 43, N. R.

District No. 5.—From north side Pier 55, East river, to north side of Thirty-fourth street, East river.

Bernard Kenney, Dock Master; office, foot of East Sixteenth street, E. R.

District No. 6.—From north side Pier at Twenty-third street, North river, to and including Pier at foot Fifty-ninth street, North river.

Edward Gilon, Dock Master; office, Pier, new 57, N. R.

If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court Jurors are not exempt. Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper make any false statement, and every case will be prosecuted.
