

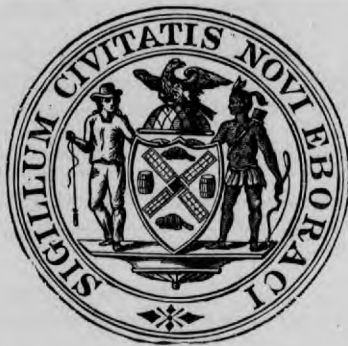

The 840 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.56, against 21.10 for the previous week, and 29.70 for the corresponding week of 1892.

The increase of 88 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 15 in the deaths from typhus fever, of 18 from diseases of the nervous system, of 13 from bronchitis, of 6 from croup, of 39 from pneumonia, of 6 from Bright's disease, and of 6 from violence, partly offset by an decrease of 10 in deaths from diphtheria, and of 7 from scarlet fever.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards, from measles in the Twelfth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Eleventh Ward. Most of the deaths from typhus fever were of persons removed to the hospital from the Tenth Ward.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, January 12, 1893, at 11 o'clock A. M.

The minutes of the meeting held the 5th instant were read and approved.

Charles L. Jones, attorney, appeared on behalf of the Liverpool and Great Western Steamship Company (Limited), respecting their application submitted December 29, 1892, for consent to the assignment of their lease of Pier, new 38, North river, to the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company (Limited).

John C. Tomlinson, attorney for the Southern Pacific Company, appeared in opposition to said application.

On motion, the communications from the Liverpool and Great Western Steamship Company (Limited) and the Southern Pacific Company were taken from the table and, together with the communication from the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company (Limited), placed on file, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That license and consent be and hereby is granted the Liverpool and Great Western Steamship Company (Limited), lessee of Pier, new 38, North river, to sublet to the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company (Limited), commonly known as the White Star Line, so much of the wharfage granted by a certain lease dated May 1, 1888, as may accrue at said pier, provided that the said lessee, the Liverpool and Great Western Steamship Company (Limited), and the sureties to said lease shall execute and file an agreement in writing with this Board that their obligations under the provisions thereof shall not in any manner be affected or impaired by reason of such license and consent to the said subletting.

A representative of Sanderson & Son, lessees, of Pier, new 54, North river, appeared and submitted an application for permission to sublet to the Panama Railroad Company the north half of Pier, new 54, North river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

W. W. Rossiter appeared on behalf of the Terminal Warehouse Company, and requested a lease of the bulkhead between Piers, new 57 and 58, North river.

On motion, application was denied.

The application of the Dunbar Box and Lumber Company, submitted December 22, 1892, for a lease of the bulkhead between Piers, new 58 and 59, North river, was,

On motion, taken from the table, placed on file, and their application denied.

The application of the New York Steam Company, for permission to dump ashes temporarily on the bulkhead south of Pier, new 14, North river, was tabled.

The communication from the New York City Civil Service Boards, respecting the resolution adopted December 29, 1892, requesting the classification of a grade of employees to be called enginemen, was tabled for one week.

The communication from his Honor the Mayor, requesting more specific information respecting the construction of crib-work around Riker's Island, was referred to the Treasurer.

The communication from the Atlas Steamship Company, complaining of coal-boats obstructing the slip on the south side of Pier, new 55, North river, and from Joseph McDonald & Co., complaining of the obstruction of the Pier foot of West Thirtieth street, North river, were,

On motion, placed on file, and the Dock Master directed to appear before the Board Thursday, January 19, 1893, at 11 o'clock A. M., and explain why said obstructions were permitted.

The following communications were received and referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report:

From the Finance Department—Requesting a description of any lots or parcels of land or buildings now or formerly used by the Department, which are not required for public purposes, in order that the same may be turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

From the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique—Requesting dredging in the slip on the south side of Pier, new 42, North river.

The following permits were granted, to continue only during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

C. H. Mallory & Co.—To construct a small room for baggage, or other purposes, on Pier 21, East river, in accordance with report on Secretary's Order No. 12504.

The building to be of brick, with stone trimmings, and provided with a roof of glass, slate, tile or other durable material, and in design should harmonize as near as possible with the Eighth Regiment Armory adjoining.
