That the word "physician" shall include dentists, and every other person who practices about the cure of the sick or injured, or who has the charge of, or professionally prescribes for, any person sick, injured, or diseased, and any person who pursues the business of or acts as midwife ; that the phrase "contagious disease" shall be held to include all persons sick, affected, or attacked by or of a disease of an infectious, contagious, or pestilential nature (more especially, however, referring to cholera, yellow fever, small-pox, chicken-pox, diphtheria (including mem-branous croup), ship or typhus, typhoid, spotted, relapsing and scarlet fevers and measles), and also including any new disease of an infectious, contagious or pestilential nature, and also any other disease publicly declared by this Board dangerous to the public health ; and every physician in said city shall at all times cause his or her name, office and residence, and also in or her kind and class of practice, to be registered within the Sanitary Bureau, and in a manner according to the regulations prescribed by this Board.

Work Performed by the Sanitary Bureau for Week ending June 2, 1894.

There were 15,447 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police. There were 457 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police. There were 297 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report. The 754 deaths represent a death-rate of 20.15 against 19.28 for the previous week, and 22.46 for the corresponding week of 1893. The increase of 33 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 12 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 14 from diarrheeal diseases, of 8 from cancer, of 25 from phthisis, of 11 from diseases of the diges-tive organs, and of 7 from congenital debility, partially offset by a decrease of 5 from croup, of 16 from pneumonia, and of 20 from Bright's disease.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth and Twenty-second Wards, from measles in the Twelfth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Seventh, Tenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-third Wards.


