

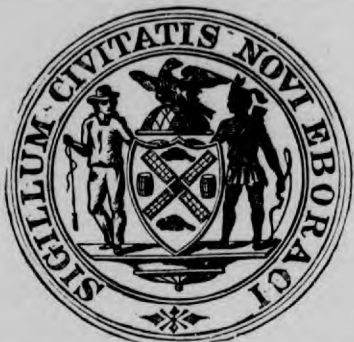

N. Y. SUPERIOR COURT.

against
The Board of Police. } Order to show cause.

Resolved, That in proceedings against the Board of Police Commissioners of the City of New York by the organization known as the Anti-Machine Republicans, the Corporation Counsel be requested to permit counsel representing the Republican Organization of the City of New York to be heard, in this and similar cases in behalf of this Board, and without expense to the City.

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 680 of the Laws of 1892, a list of all nominations of candidates for office to be filled at the ensuing election be published in the "New York Sun," the "New York Daily News," "The Press," and "The Mail and Express"—all aye.

Whereas, The Board of Commissioners of Police are desirous of procuring an honest and peaceable election in the City of New York, and a rigorous enforcement of the laws appertaining to elections; therefore

Resolved, That the Superintendent of Police be directed and requested through the Police Force to verify the registry of votes in this City, and in case of the discovery of illegal registration to bring the offenders to justice.

Resolved, That any member of the Police Force so assigned to the duty of verifying said registry, who shall wilfully connive at any false registration shall be liable to dismissal from the force; and any officer, so assigned, who shall negligently connive at or permit any such false registration shall be liable to dismissal from the force; further

Resolved, That the Superintendent of Police be especially charged with the rigorous, exact and impartial enforcement of all election laws; and particularly the provisions that no electioneering shall be permitted or allowed within the limits prescribed by law from the polling places; and particularly the provisions of law that any and all persons shall be excluded from and not permitted within said polling place except those persons legally permitted to be within the same.

Resolved, That the Superintendent of Police promulgate these resolutions to the officers and men of the department—all aye.

Whereas, It has been charged in the past that the detailment of officers at polling places in the precincts where such officers reside has been productive of evil and has tended to promote practices at the polling places condemned in the public press of this City; therefore

Resolved, That the Superintendent be empowered and authorized to detail men at polling places from other precincts than the precinct in which said polling place is situated, when in his judgment the detailment of such officers from other precincts as such polling place or polling places will tend to preserve order and quiet at the polls and aid in securing an honest and fair election.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the grantees of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
