Meeting in Room 1, Borough Hall, at 2 P.M., Thursday, July 21, 1898.

The roll was called, and the following members answered to their names: Edward M. Grout, President, in the chair, and Aldermen Kenney and Hennessy. The minutes of the meeting held on June 1, 1898, were approved. The President submitted the following:

(No. 11.)

Complaint of O. Mathews and others against the Long Island Railroad Company as lessee, the Prospect Park and Coney Island Railroad Company as lessor, and the Brooklyn Elevated Railroad Company as a road operating over the tracks of the Prospect Park and Coney Island Railroad Company along Gravesend avenue:

1st. That the Brooklyn Elevated Railroad Company operates road without authority of law.
2d. That the portion of Gravesend avenue between the railroad tracks is not kept in good order and on a level with the grade.

3d. That the railroad company obstructs said avenue with posts, pillars, culverts, sidings, ditches and banks along the line.

Also the following opinion from the Corporation Counsel:

Honorable Edward M. Grout, President of the Borough of Brooklyn:

DEAR SIR—I have received your communication, which reads as follows:
"Two of the local boards of this borough have now before them the inclosed complaint of Owen Mathews and others concerning a railroad on Gravesend avenue, upon which we have received the inclosed advices from the Department of Highways.

"The subjects of complaint are two: First, as to the grade of railroad tracks, and, second, as to the obstructions maintained by the railroad company in the highway. This matter has been much agitated and a source of much trouble in Brooklyn for several years past. The railroad company is a steam railroad constructed originally under the general railroad law, and is not a street surface road, and it maintains that it has a right to continue such obstructions in the highway as are connected with the ordinary operation of a steam railroad. The nature of these obstructions appears from the inclosed papers. Of course, if the obstructions are to be continued in the highway it is results to remedy the sails results in the meade of the streets or the tracks. from the inclosed papers. Of course, if the obstructions are to be continued useless to remedy the evils resulting from the grade of the street or the tracks.

"I desire advice, therefore, as to the right of this railroad company. Its original rights to the "I desire advice, therefore, as to the right of this railroad company. Its original rights to the street were acquired under the same law by which Gravesend avenue itself was laid out (chapter 531, Laws of 1873, section 13; having reference to the railroad company). A subsequent statute affecting the subject is found in chapter 307, Laws of 1874. The railroad company claim to have condemned the right to use the street for this purpose by proceedings which were sustained by the Court of Appeals in the suit brought by the Washington Cemetery, exact reference to which I cannot give you. In 1896 (chapter 863) the Legislature passed an act authorizing the local authorities in Brooklyn to correct the abuses in Gravesend avenue, 'having due regard, however, to the right of any such railroad company to operate a steam railroad on said avenue.'"

right of any such railroad company to operate a steam railroad on said avenue.' In reply thereto I would say that there can be no doubt as to the right of the railroad company to operate its road upon Gravesend avenue. Chapter 863 of the Laws of 1896 reads as

An Act to authorize and empower the common counsel of the city of Brooklyn to regulate the use of Gravesend avenue in said city by railroad corporations using said avenue.

Section 1. The common counsel of the city of Brooklyn, subject to the veto power of the mayor, is hereby authorized and empowered to regulate, by ordinance or resolution, the use of Gravesend avenue, in the city of Brooklyn, by any railroad corporation or corporations having the salve and resolvent to the corporation of the city of Brooklyn, by any railroad corporation or corporations. tracks along the said avenue and using the same, and using steam motor power. Such power to

regulate shall include the power to require all tracks upon said avenue to be so laid as to conform to the established grade of the said avenue, and to require the removal of any ditch, post, poles, buildings, structure, bank, bridge, culvert or channel or any obstruction of any kind or nature whatsoever in the said avenue, which shall in any manner interfere with the free and untrammeled use of said Gravesend avenue as a public highway, having due regard, however, to the right of any such railroad corporation to operate a steam railroad on said avenue.

Sec. 2. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed. Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

Under this act power is given to the Common Council over two subjects-It may require (1) Under this act power is given to the Common Council over two subjects—it may require to that all tracks upon the avenue to so laid as to conform to the established grade of said avenue, and (2) removal of any obstructions maintained by the railroad corporation which shall in any manner interfere with the free and untrammeled use of the avenue as a public highway. This power, however, is to be exercised with due regard to the right of any such railroad corporation operating a steam railroad on said avenue. The operation of such a railroad would undoubtedly include the maintenance of whatever structures or appliances may be necessary for its operation. This would maintenance of whatever structures or appliances may be necessary for its operation. This would not necessarily leave it entirely to the discretion of the railroad corporation to determine as to the number and nature of the obstructions placed and maintained upon the avenue by it. A proper regard to the use of the avenue as a public street must be had, and the interference with such use must be reduced to a minimum.

I would advise that a thorough inspection be made as to the existence of such obstructions and the nature and necessity thereof, and that the result of such inspection be certified to the Municipal Assembly with proper recommendation as to its action in the premises, so that a proper ordinance or resolution may be adopted in pursuance of the provisions of the act above cited.

As to requiring the tracks to be laid so as to conform to the established grade of said avenue, the same course of procedure may be recommended.

W. J. Kelly, counsel for the Long Island Railroad Company, appeared before the Board and stated that the company would, voluntarily, remove the wires connected with what are known as the district signals, and he stated further that the company would place the tracks of the railroad on grade, provided the street was graded and paved.

On motion of Alderman Kenney, the matter was laid over for two months, pending the preparation of a petition for grading and paving by the property-owners.
