

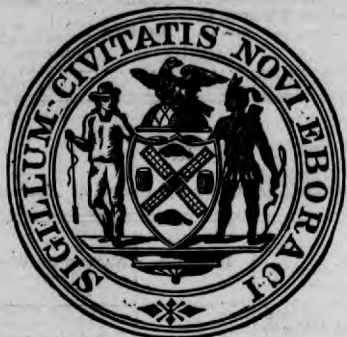

LOCAL BOARD.

TWENTY-FIRST DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board, Twenty-first District, met at 2 P. M., April 19, 1900, at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Municipal Building, Crotona Park.

Present—President Haffen, Councilman Murray, Alderman Geiger and Alderman McGrath.

HEARINGS.

East One Hundred and Eighty-first Street, Paving from Park Avenue to Boston Road (or Bronx Street).

Petition of James Shanley and others was read, and, on motion of Alderman Geiger, it was Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that East One Hundred and Eighty-first street be paved, between Park avenue and Boston road (or Bronx street), in the Borough of The Bronx, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

Laying Out on Map of The City of New York a Public Park or Place bounded by "Jerome Avenue, Anderson Avenue and Marcher Avenue."

The following petition advertised for a hearing in the CITY RECORD April 9, 1900, was read:

Whereas, An ideal spot for a public park or place would be the plot bounded by Jerome avenue, Anderson avenue and Marcher avenue, and

Whereas, Past experience has conclusively shown that such public parks and places are the direct cause of very material advancement in the increased value of properties and assist generally in the reduction of the general tax rates; therefore, we, the following property-owners and residents in the Borough of The Bronx offer the following resolution for adoption by your Board:

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Twenty-first District (Borough of The Bronx), deems it for the best interest of the public to acquire title to the above-mentioned property for a public park or place; and be it further

Resolved, That said park or place be placed upon the Final Maps of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and when so placed upon the maps, that then Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment be applied for, and that title to this property vest in The City of New York as soon as may be proper.

(Signed) EDMUND J. GEER and ten others,
One Hundred and Sixty-third street and Anderson avenue.

A large delegation of property-owners appeared in opposition to the above petition and presented a written protest, as follows:

We, the undersigned, residents and taxpayers of the Borough of The Bronx, do hereby most respectfully, earnestly and strenuously protest against the petition gotten up by certain land-owners in Highbridge and vicinity for the purpose of extending the limits of the present Macomb's Dam Park. The extension proposed is intended to include all the lands, buildings, residences and property within the following confines:

Commencing at the present central boundary of said park at East One Hundred and Sixty-first street and Jerome avenue and taking in the whole block between said One Hundred and Sixty-first street and One Hundred and Sixty-second street on Ogden avenue and Woody Crest avenue.

And also from said One Hundred and Sixty-first street and Woody Crest avenue, along the easterly side of said Woody Crest avenue north to Union (or East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh) street, thence easterly to Jerome avenue; thence southerly to said East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, and thence westerly to Woody Crest avenue.

Your petitioners respectfully submit that if any such bill as the one under consideration in this petition were allowed to pass and become a law, it would entail an additional burden of perhaps \$7,000,000 to \$10,000,000 upon the taxpayers not only of High Bridge and its vicinity, but of The City of New York at large.

Your petitioners further respectfully submit that there are parks enough in and around High Bridge, and in fact in the Borough of The Bronx, for a great many years to come, and that the additional park which is sought to be established will be of no earthly use, benefit or advantage to either the taxpayers or residents of High Bridge or vicinity or to the taxpayers or residents of The City of New York.

Your petitioners further respectfully submit that if the said proposed bill were allowed to become a law, it would, in a great many instances, result in the practical confiscation and wiping out of the holdings of a large number of property-owners in High Bridge and its immediate vicinity, whose present burdens of taxes and assessments are really more than they can carry.

Wherefore, your petitioners humbly pray that the aforesaid park bill should not be allowed to become a law.

After discussion the following resolution, moved by Alderman McGrath and seconded by Alderman Geiger, was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx, hereby denies the petition submitted this 19th day of April, 1900, for establishment of a public park or place at the location about Jerome avenue, Anderson avenue and Marcher avenue.

East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth Street, Regulating, Grading and Paving with Macadam Summit Avenue to Anderson Avenue.

Petition of Martie Dunn and others was read, and, on motion of Councilman Murray, it was Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street be regulated and graded, curbstones set, sidewalks flagged a space four feet in width, crosswalks laid where necessary, fences placed where required; that trees be planted on the sidewalks, and that the roadway be paved with macadam, from Summit avenue to Anderson avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

Woodlawn Road Sewer and Appurtenances, from Bainbridge Avenue to East Two Hundred and Tenth Street.
