The minutes of the Bellevue Hospital Medical Board for the meeting of September 1 were received and, on motion, duly seconded, ordered placed on file.

The minutes of the Gouverneur Hospital Medical Board for the meeting of September 1 were received and, on motion, duly seconded, ordered placed on file.

The reports of the attendance of the Visiting Physicians and Surgeons at Fordham and Gouverneur Hospitals during the month of August were received and ordered placed on file.

An ordinance from the Board of Aldermen, under date of August 29, providing for the issue of corporate stock in the sum of four thousand dollars for the purpose of providing additional means for the preparation of the necessary plans and specifications for completing the construction of Gouverneur Hospital, was received and ordered placed on file.

A communication was received from Messrs. Howard & Waid, under date of September 2, 1903, resigning as architects of the new Fordham Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the resignation of Messrs. Howard & Waid as architects of the new Fordham Hospital be accepted, and that their bill for preliminary plans be referred to the President.

A letter was received from George O. Sayre, under date of August 31, regarding an alleged claim for one month's salary; also a letter from the Resident Physician of the Pavilion for the Insane explaining the circumstances.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the claim of George O. Sayre be disallowed.

A communication, under date of August 29, addressed to the Supervising Nurse of Gouverneur Hospital, from the Deputy and Acting Fire Commissioner of The City of New York, requesting that the institution provide (1st) direct means of communicating alarms of fire to the department headquarters, and (2d) an electric alarm system through which alarms for fire or other danger may be instantly communicated to every portion of the building by means of bells or gongs, was received.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the Superintendent be authorized to have installed an electric fire alarm system throughout the hospital with such number of stations as may be found necessary.

A letter from the Bureau of Lamps and Gas, under date of August 24, and another letter under date of August 29, concerning the consumption of light in Bellevue Hospital, were received and ordered placed on file.

A letter from Clarence Fountain, under date of August 11, 1903, concerning the preparation of catgut, was received and ordered placed on file.

The Superintendent called to the attention of the Board the case of Doctor Jones, who had assigned another physician who was ill to a ward without authority, and who on previous occasions had permitted this physician to sleep in the ward without the consent of the Superintendent. Resolved, That the Superintendent be authorized to reprimand Doctor Jones for his unwarranted action, and that he present the matter to the Committee on Inspection.

New Business.

Resolved, That the President be authorized to have a sanitary examination made of the proposed site for the new Fordham Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by resolution adopted on the 27th of February, 1903, and Board of Aldermen by ordinance adopted on the 31st of March, 1903, approved by the Mayor on the 6th of April, 1903, have authorized the issue of Corporate Stock to an amount not exceeding eleven thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$11,250), to provide means to pay the expenses of the preparation of the necessary plans and specifications for the construction of a new hospital in the Borough of The Bronx; and

Whereas, It is deemed necessary and expedient to appoint architects to prepare plans and specifications for said hospital building and supervise and superintend the erection and completion of said hospital building;

Resolved, That this Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals proceed to erect, construct, equip and furnish a new Fordham Hospital, to be located in the Borough of The Bronx;

Resolved, That Mr. R. F. Almirall, No. 51 Chambers street, New York City, be and he hereby is employed as Architect for the hospital building designated, such employment to be in accordance with the contract to be hereafter prepared by the Corporation Counsel;

Resolved, That the said Architect be and he is hereby instructed to proceed forthwith to prepare plans, drawings, form of contract and specifications for said hospital building, pursuant to the term of the said contract, and as may be required by further action of this Board.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That Doctor Herbert C. de V. Cornwell, No. 11 West Thirty-sixth street, be appointed as Assistant Visiting Physician to Gouverneur Dispensary, and that Doctor F. W. Fielder, No. 2 West Eighty-second street, be appointed as Attending Surgeon to Gouverneur Dispensary.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

October 6, 1903.</

"Awaiting Board's action on Objections Nos. 5, 6, 7 and 8—

"No. 5—Two open courts should be provided, extending the length of the auditorium, proper.

"No. 6—Two exits on each side of each tier should be provided, leading into open courts.

"No. 7—Distinct and separate places of exit should be provided for balcony and gallery, with direct exterior outlets.

"No. 8—Two independent stairs should be provided for each gallery on opposite sides.

"There are practical difficulties caused by the situation, location and surroundings of property which prevent the designing of building to meet the requirements of Building Code in the respects as cited in the objections hereinbefore stated. We claim, however, that our plan in these respects is not only equally as good, but superior to the Code requirements.

"It is an imperative condition of designing that the stage be located adjacent to the Thirty-ninth street side of property, and working under this condition we find it difficult to place the courts at the sides of auditorium, as required by Code, and at the same time secure the best possible means of exit. We believe that our design of courts is a better one in all respects.

"Further, that the exits to courts, while not being sufficient in number, are, however, sufficient in capacity. We maintain that the width of the narrowest part of an exit determines its capacity, and in this case the stairway in court is the minimum width and determines the capacity of court as an exit. If this be true, then the door being of greater width is sufficient and has the merit over two doors of being a check on the overcrowding of the stairs.

"Further, your attention is called to the fact that in the use of exits in courts, escapes are made by descent, whereas in the case of a regularly constructed court people in exit must ascend quite a distance to doors.

"The gallery stairs and exits from same are sufficient, both as to location and capacity."

Mr. Martin J. Hackett appeared before the Board.

On motion, laid over, pending additional amendments, which are to be filed prior to next meeting.

Appeal No. 205 of 1903, Alteration No. 1396 of 1903, No. 1418 Broadway, Manhattan, Hackett-Hankinson Company, architects and appellants.

"Awaiting Board's action on Objection No. 1—State whether building is fireproof.

"Subject to Tenement House Department approval.

"Inasmuch as the first story is to be used for lobby and entrance and parts of the second and third stories for ladies' rooms, etc., all such portions are to be made absolutely fireproof, in conformity with law.

"To convert first story into lobby and entrance to theatre, as shown.

"It is essential for the success of the theatre (the lobby of which is to be placed in this building) that entrance be located on Broadway. There exists on this property a non-fireproof building. The basement, first story and parts of second and third stories are made fireproof, in conformity with Code."

Mr. Martin J. Hackett appeared before the Board.

On motion, laid over, pending additional amendments, which are to be filed prior to next meeting.

Appeal No. 205 of 1903, New Buildings No. 699 of 1903, east side of Tompkins street, 50 feet from Delancey street. Thomas H. Styles, architect and appellant.

"I respectfully ask that the law be modified to allow construction of said coal pocket, according to plans filed. The Code makes no direct provision for structures of this character, grain elevators at tide-water being nearest thereto. Similar pockets have been erected in this City during the past few years. The location and surroundings of this pocket are such that, should fire occur, it could do no damage to adjoining buildings, nor could fire at other buildings damage this structure.

"It would be impracticable to construct this pocket of other material than timber, owing to the dampness and water from coal, which affects the iron and eventually destroys it by rust and corrosion; the cost, too, becomes an important factor, owing to competition with adjacent towns where iron pockets are unknown, and as coal must be handled on small margin, the first cost of such structures is of great importance."

Mr. Thomas H. Styles appeared before the Board.

On motion, laid over, pending block plan to be filed by appellant, showing surroundings, etc.
