On reading and filing opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated April 18, 1908, relative to award of contract for furnishing and delivering 125 bicycles, and report of Inspector George R. Titus, designated by the Police Commissioner to act as Inspector for this Department in the case of bids received for bicycles, dated April 20, 1908, that the samples submitted by the Great Western Manufacturing Company, and the Miami Cycle and Manufacturing Company, were not equal to the sample bicycle for which proposals were asked and for which bids were received and opened March 30, 1908.

Ordered, That the bids of the Great Western Manufacturing Company and the Miami Cycle and Manufacturing Company for furnishing the Police Department with 125 bicycles be and are hereby rejected.

A communication from the Comptroller relative to a renewal of the lease of the premises No. 341 Pleasant avenue, Borough of Manhattan, occupied as a Trachoma Hospital, was received, and the Secretary was directed to communicate with the Comptroller and state that inasmuch as the present lease of the premises mentioned contains a privilege of renewal clause for an additional two years at the same rental, the Department of Health will exercise its right under said clause.

I therefore recommend that he be given an examination consisting of a new second sheet similar to the original second sheet."

The recommendation was adopted.

The appeal of James J. Melody, of No. 1830 Third avenue, Manhattan, candidate for Patrolman, that he be permitted to correct the date of birth appearing as August 6, 1881, in his application, to read October 6, 1881, to correspond with the birth certificate furnished by him, was granted.

The appeal of Edward J. Armstrong, Lieutenant, Two Hundred and Seventy-ninth Precinct, for a rerating of his record in the examination for promotion to Captain of Police, by giving him credit in same for an "honorable mention and medal," received on April 23, 1895, was granted.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

No person shall have at any place where milk, butter or cheese is kept for sale, nor shall at any place sell, deliver or offer or have for sale or keep for use, nor shall any person bring or send to said City any unwholesome, watered or adulterated milk, or milk known as "swill milk," or milk from cows or other animals that for the most part have been kept in stables or that have been fed in whole or in part on swill, or milk from sick or diseased cows or other animals, or any butter or cheese made from any such milk, or any unwholesome butter or cheese.

Resolved, That section 53 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 53. No milk which is watered, adulterated, reduced or changed in any respect by the addition of water or other substance, or by the removal of cream, shall be brought into the City of New York, or held, kept, sold or offered for sale at any place in said City; nor shall any one keep, have, sell or offer for sale in the said City any such milk.

The term "adulterated milk," when so used in this code, means:

First—Milk containing more than 88 per centum of water or fluids.

Second—Milk containing less than 12 per centum of milk solids.

Third—Milk containing less than 3 per centum of fats.

Fourth—Milk drawn from animals within fifteen days before or five days after parturition.

Fifth—Milk drawn from animals fed on distillery waste or any substance in a state of fermentation or putrefaction, or on any unwholesome food.

Sixth—Milk drawn from cows kept in a crowded or unhealthy condition.

Seventh—Milk from which any part of the cream has been removed.

Eighth—Milk which has been diluted with water or any other fluid, or to which has been added, or into which has been introduced, any foreign substance whatever.

Ninth—Milk the temperature of which is higher than 50 degrees Fahrenheit.

The provisions of this section shall not be applicable, however, to modified milk or skinned milk held or offered for sale under permits therefrom from the Board of Health, pursuant to the rules and regulations of said Board.

Section 56a. All milk held, kept, offered for sale or sold and delivered in The City of New York shall be so held, kept, offered for sale or sold and delivered under either of any of the following grades or designations and under no other, and in accordance with such rules and regulations as may be adopted by the Board of Health, namely:

Milk—This term shall be applied to cows' milk which conforms to the requirements of section 53 of the Sanitary Code and which does not meet the requirements of milk sold under other grades or designations herein provided for.

Selected Milk—This is milk produced by farms holding a permit therefor from the Board of Health and handled according to the rules and regulations of said Board.

Inspected Milk—Which is milk produced under the supervision of a Milk Commission appointed by the Medical Society of the County of New York or by the Medical Society of the County of Kings, or under certificates for "inspected milk" issued by said Commission.
