The Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen, to whom was referred the assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, of The City of New York, for the year 1908, together with a communication from the Comptroller of The City of New York, dated June 1, 1908, transmitting the Budget for the year 1908, accompanied by his certificate of the amounts authorized by law to be raised by tax in and for

the year 1908, and an estimate of the revenues of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation during the current year, respectfully submits the following

## REPORT:

The total Budget for the year 1908 is one hundred and forty-three million five hundred and seventy-two thousand two hundred and sixty-six dollars and seventeen cents (\$143,572,266.17), which includes county charges and expenses for the four counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, aggregating five million ninety-seven thousand eight hundred and sixty-two dollars and twenty-eight cents (\$5,097,862.28), leaving one hundred and thirty-eight million four hundred and seventy-four thousand four hundred and three dollars and eighty-nine cents (\$138,474,403.89), as the amount of the Budget which affects the general tax rates of The City of New York.

In addition to the amount of five million ninety-seven thousand eight hundred and sixty-two dollars and twenty-eight cents (\$5,097,862.28) included in the Budget for County Charges and Expenses, the following amounts disbursed during the year 1907 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds for Judgments and Claims for county charges or liabilities, are to be raised by tax in the year 1908, in the respective counties, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the revised Greater New York Charter, viz.:

Section 902 of the Charter, referred to in the Comptroller's communication, directs that the amounts required for the payment of all county charges and expenses shall be levied and collected from the taxable property within each of said counties respectively, to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred for county as distinguished from City purposes. Compliance with the provision of law will, of course, forever prevent an uniform tax rate from prevailing in The City of New York.

Your Committee recommends that in fixing the actual tax rates in the tax levy ordinance the decimal fractions of such rates be not carried beyond five figures, i. e., hundred thousandths of one per cent., as any smaller fraction would have no practical effect on individual assessments, while increasing enormously and unnecessarily the difficulties of extending the tax rolls and preparing tax bills. The total loss by omission of such remote decimals will be only \$389.87 in the whole tax levy of \$116,542,896.09.

As there is nothing to be gained by separate extensions on the tax rolls of the City and County rates, your Committee recommends that the aggregate thereof, or, in other words, the total tax rates in each Borough, as the case may be, be fixed in the ordinance levying the taxes for the year 1908. Such an ordinance has been prepared and is submitted herewith for approval and adoption by the Board of Aldermen.

## SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS IN THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN, TO BE COLLECTED WITH THE ANNUAL TAXES.

The Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments have added to the assessment rolls of the Borough of Brooklyn:

First—The amounts required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for the payment of principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for flagging, curbing, guttering and paving certain streets in the Twenty-sixth Ward of said Borough (late Town of New Lots).

Second—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for sewerage improvements in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said Borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and amendments thereto.

Third—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for street improvements, in the Thirty-first Ward of said Borough (late the Town of Gravesend), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892 as amended.

Fourth—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, in the Twenty-ninth Ward of

said borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889, as amended by chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894.

The amount to be raised for the payment of the principal and interest on the New Lots bonds is fifty-four thousand four hundred dollars and nine cents (\$54,400.09); the amount of the Flatbush sewer installment is seven thousand five hundred and eighty-four dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$7,584.39); the amount of the Thirty-first Ward improvement installment is forty-six thousand three hundred and fifty dollars and one cent (\$46,350.01); the amount of the Flatbush avenue improvement installment is thirty-five thousand and ninety dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$35,090.38).

The law requires that these assessments and installments be included in the tax levy ordinance to be levied and collected with the annual taxes.

ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York, and the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1908.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of one hundred and eleven million nineteen thousand four hundred and fifty-eight dollars and twenty-four cents (\$111,019,458.24), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1908, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City debt, and an amount provided for deficiencies in taxes pursuant to chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, amounting in the aggregate to one hundred and forty-three million five hundred and seventy-two thousand two hundred and sixty-six dollars and seventeen cents (\$143,572,266.17), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of five million ninety-seven thousand eight hundred and sixty-two dollars and twenty-eight cents (\$5,097,862.28), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, included therein, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of twenty-seven million four hundred and fifty-four thousand nine hundred and forty-five dollars and sixty-five cents (\$27,454,945.65), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York in a communication dated June 1, 1908, transmitting his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made in the Budget for the year 1908, copies of which communication and certificate and of the said Budget are as follows:

City of New York—Department of Finance,  
Comptroller's Office,  
June 1, 1908.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said City to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in each year, on account of the Corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City, as created by this Act, and purposes for which said City is liable, and on account of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the City Treasury, during the then current year from all sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the Sinking Funds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York and of any of the municipal and public corporations, or parts of municipal and public corporations, by this Act consolidated with the municipal corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, other than the surplus of revenues of any such Sinking Funds for the payment of interest on the City debt of the municipal corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, or the like debts of the municipal and public corporations by this Act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which by law they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the County officers and the other County charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of County officers and other County charges and expenses of such County; to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the County as distinguished from City purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statement as follows:

First—The Budget, in detail, for the year 1908.

Second—The amount of County charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said Budget, as well as the amount of County charges and expenses paid during the year 1907 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, which amounts together are to be raised respectively by levy upon taxable property within each of said counties, as provided by section 902 of the Charter.

Third—The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation.

Concerning the receipts of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation, the following are the items of my estimate:

GENERAL FUND.

Estimated Revenues for 1908.

## FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

## Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

The appropriations in this Budget are made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts and records of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show all receipts, disbursements and population in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller. Records must show the addresses of parents, guardians or nearest relatives of inmates and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to make provision for dependents in the institutions.
2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."
3. All institutions receiving public moneys and all their books of record and accounts shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance and at all proper times the Department of Public Charities shall have access to the record of inmates.
4. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall in his discretion suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.
5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon the per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges upon the City. Except in emergency cases in hospitals, the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals. *The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.*
6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.
7. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.
8. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.
9. Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and, when judicious, no proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the courts where no crime is proven against the child to the Commissioner of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a court commitment.
10. The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills to the Legislature, as to provide

that the children of emigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

11. In determining the acceptance of patients in private hospitals as proper charges (see Rule 5) the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the service actually rendered to the patients by the hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections.

12. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities, and has been placed in this Budget by the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City Institution at Randall's Island.

the Board of Aldermen having failed to vote in favor thereof. Thereupon a motion to adopt the Budget as received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was also, on ayes and noes, not adopted, a majority of all the members elected to the Board of Aldermen having failed to vote in favor thereof.

Eleventh Avenue Track Removal Association, July 18, 1908.

To the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen—On June 30 the Board of Aldermen unanimously requested the Public Service Commission to order increased protection along the Eleventh avenue freight tracks by stationing, day and night, two flagmen each at Forty-ninth and Fifty-first streets, and at Fifty-second, Fifty-third and Fifty-fourth streets, the crossings approaching DeWitt Clinton Park.

The reply of the railroad to the Commission is misleading, for while the three men it tried to remove have been restored they are not on duty at night. After 6:20 p. m. there are, from Sixtieth to Forty-second street, but three flagmen on duty, one each at Fifty-second, at Fifty-first and at Forty-second street.

Three flagmen to nineteen crossings at night is surely insufficient protection for the crowds who go to the Recreation pier, DeWitt Clinton Park and the docks for fresh air. Eighteen trains are run at night; eighteen trains in both directions, at an average interval of twenty minutes between 6 o'clock and 12 p. m.

During the day the crossings at Forty-sixth, Forty-seventh and Forty-eighth streets are the only ones properly protected with two flagmen each, when, as often happens, a train is going up and another coming down at the same time. But at night these flagmen are withdrawn.

All crossings between Sixtieth and Thirtieth streets should be equally well protected day and night, and we hope that the additional protection will be granted so that the average of two deaths per month will be reduced.

Owing perhaps to the absence of Commissioner Bassett, the Public Service Commission has not complied with the request of the Board of Aldermen.

In withdrawing all flagmen at night except those who throw switches the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad has violated the law, and for over a year the Public Service Commission has been derelict in its duty to the people of the West Side.



Beginning at the corner formed by the intersection of the easterly side of East Fifty-ninth street with the southwesterly side of Remsen avenue; running thence southerly and along the easterly side of East Fifty-ninth street to the southerly side of Avenue N; running thence easterly and along the southerly side of Avenue N to the easterly side of Ralph avenue; running thence northerly along the easterly side of Ralph avenue to the northerly side of Avenue N; running thence easterly along the northerly side of Avenue N to a point distant 200 feet easterly of the easterly side of Ralph avenue; running thence northerly and parallel with Ralph avenue and always distant 200 feet easterly therefrom to the southwesterly side of Remsen avenue; running thence northwesterly along the southwesterly side of Remsen avenue to the point of beginning.
