Resolved, That the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity be and is hereby authorized and empowered to purchase, without advertising for competitive bids or proposals, one passenger automobile and one automobile truck at an expense not to exceed four thousand dollars (\$4,000).

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen December 12, 1911.

Received from his Honor the Mayor December 26, 1911, without his approval or disapproval thereof; therefore, as provided in section 40 of The Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it.

No. 1812.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 363 of article 4 of chapter 7 of Part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relating to "Stands within the stoop lines."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 363 of article 4 of chapter 7 of Part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to "stands within the stoop lines," is hereby amended so that the same shall read as follows:

Sec. 363. Stands within stoop lines may be permitted and licensed, with the consent of the owner of the premises and the consent of the Aldermen of the district in which said stand is to be located, for the sale of newspapers, periodicals, fruits and soda water and the blacking of boots, and no bootblack stand shall be provided with more than three chairs. All such stands shall be classified, and the annual license fees therefor shall be fixed and collected as specified in the schedule following: Stands for the sale of newspapers, periodicals or both, \$5; stands for the sale of fruits or soda water or both, \$10; stands for the sale of newspapers, periodicals or both, and in addition also fruits or soda water or both, \$15; bootblack stands, each chair, \$5.

But no license fee shall be required for stands within stoop lines for the sale of newspapers, periodicals or both, in cases where such stands are conducted by dealers in said articles who are the owners or occupants of the premises or stores in front of which the same are situated.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolved, That the name of Bancroft st., from Westchester ave. to Whitlock ave., in the Borough of The Bronx, be and the same is hereby changed to and shall hereafter be known and designated as E. 165th st., and the President of the Borough is hereby authorized and requested to renumber the buildings thereon in such manner and to such extent as may be necessary, and to note the changes on the maps and records of The City of New York.

Resolved, That, for the purpose of defraying minor incidental expenses contingent to the office of the City Record, the Supervisor of the City Record may, by a requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150). The Supervisor may, in like manner, renew the draft as often as he may deem necessary, to the extent of the appropriation set apart for the contingencies of the City Record office, but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers certified by the Supervisor of the City Record, covering the expenditures of money paid thereon.

Whereas, The Commissioner of Public Charities, in a communication addressed to this Board, dated December 4, 1911, has requested that in order to facilitate the work of the Bureau of Dependent Adults, Department of Public Charities, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, a Contingency Fund be granted for the use of the Superintendent in charge of said Bureau; therefore be it

Resolved, That, for the purpose of defraying minor or incidental expenses connected with the Bureau of Dependent Adults, Department of Public Charities, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, the Superintendent of said Bureau may, by a requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding three hundred dollars (\$300). When said Superintendent shall have expended two hundred dollars (\$200) of said amount he shall transmit to the Department of Finance a voucher, certified to by the Commissioner of Public Charities, covering his expenditures to the extent of two hundred dollars (\$200); and at the same time shall make a draft on the Comptroller for two hundred dollars (\$200) to replenish the Contingency Fund. Additional drafts of two hundred dollars each may be made on the Comptroller in like manner from time to time, to the extent of the appropriation allowed for Contingencies, Manhattan and The Bronx, as the condition of the Contingency Fund may require.

"Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding forty thousand dollars (\$40,000), to provide means for the erection of a foundation for the Firemen's Memorial on Riverside drive, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue said corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, the proceeds thereof to the amount of the par value of the stock to be applied to the purposes aforesaid"; and

Resolved, That said resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 17, 1911, be amended so as to read as follows:

An ordinance to regulate the use of aisles and passageways in places of amusement (changing section 762 of the Greater New York Charter).

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. By virtue of the authority and power vested in the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York by chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901 of the State of New York, commonly known as the Amendatory Act of 1901, section 762 of the Greater New York Charter is hereby repealed and the following ordinance enacted in lieu thereof:

All lights used in theatres and other places of public amusement, manufactories, stores, hotels, lodging-houses, and in show windows shall be properly protected by globes or glass coverings, or in such other manner as the Fire Commissioner shall prescribe. The owners and proprietors of all manufactories, hotels, tenement-houses, apartment houses, office buildings, boarding and lodging-houses, warehouses, stores and offices, theatres and music halls, and the authorities or persons having charge of all hospitals and asylums, and of the public schools and other public buildings, churches and other places where large numbers of persons are congregated for purposes of worship, instruction or amusement, shall provide such means of communicating alarms of fire, accident or danger to the Police and Fire Departments, respectively, as the Fire Commissioner or Police Board may direct, and shall also provide such fire hose, fire extinguishers, buckets, axes, fire hooks, fire doors and other means of preventing and extinguishing fires as said Fire Commissioner may direct. In every building used or occupied as a hotel, lodging-house, or public or private hospital or asylum there shall be employed by the owner or proprietor, or other person or persons having the charge or management thereof, one or more watchmen, whose exclusive duty it shall be to visit every portion of such building, at regular and frequent intervals, under rules and regulations to be established by the Fire Commissioner, for the purpose of detecting fire or other sources of danger, and giving timely warning thereof to the inmates of the building. In every room in each of said buildings there shall be posted a card upon which shall be printed a diagram showing the exits, halls, stairways, elevators and fire-escapes, and in the halls and passageways signs shall be posted indicating the location of the stairs and fire-escapes. In each of the said buildings there shall be placed and provided electrical or other alarms and time detectors, to be approved by the Fire Commissioner, by means of which the movements of said watchman may be recorded, and through which alarms of fire or other danger may be instantly communicated, by means of bells or gongs, to every portion of the building. Said electrical apparatus, and all other appliances placed or kept within any of said buildings for the purpose of preventing or extinguishing fires, or for affording means of escape therefrom in case of fire, shall be kept at all times in good working order and proper condition for immediate use, and any member of the uniformed force of said department may enter any of the said buildings at any time for the purpose of inspecting said apparatus or appliances. The Fire Commissioner may detail, not to exceed two members of the uniformed force of said department, at each and every place of amusement where machinery and scenery are in use, while such place is open to the public, whose duty shall be to guard against fire, and who shall have charge and control of the means provided for its extinguishment, and shall have control and direction of the employees of the place to which they may be detailed for the purpose of extinguishing any fire which may occur therein. It shall also be the duty of such member or members of the uniformed force of said department to inspect every portion of the building or buildings to which they may be detailed, during public performances therein, for the

purpose of guarding and protecting the occupants from fire or panic. Whenever any member of the uniformed force of said department shall discover in any inside aisle or passageway in any such place of amusement any camp stools, chairs, sofas, or other obstructions, or any person or persons standing or sitting therein, during any public performance, it shall be the duty of such member of the uniformed force forthwith to notify the proprietor or manager of such place of amusement, or any usher, agent or other employee of such proprietor or manager then present, to cause such obstruction to be forthwith removed, or to cause the person or persons standing or sitting in such aisles or passageways to forthwith vacate the same, except as hereinafter provided. If the manager or proprietor, or such usher, agent, or employee shall cause or permit any camp stool, chairs, sofas, or other obstructions to be placed or remain in any aisle or passageway, in any such place of amusement, or shall cause, or permit any person to stand or sit therein, during any public performance, or, having been so notified, shall neglect or refuse to cause such obstruction to be forthwith removed, or to cause such person or persons to forthwith vacate said aisles or passageways, they shall each severally be deemed to have violated the provisions and requirements of this title and the regulations or orders duly made thereunder, and shall be subject to the penalties prescribed in this act, provided, however, that where there is a passageway in the rear of the seats in such place of amusement, more than six feet in depth, it shall be lawful to permit persons to stand therein, as follows: (a) if such passageway is more than six feet and less than sixteen feet deep, persons may stand therein provided an unobstructed passageway of at least six feet in depth is left open, and there are no more than four rows of persons standing; (b) if such passageway is more than sixteen feet deep, any number of persons or rows of persons may stand therein, provided that an unobstructed passageway of at least ten feet, in depth, is left open; (c) and in balconies or galleries, only one row of persons shall be permitted to stand; (d) and in places of amusement having a passageway in the rear of the seats, six feet or less, in depth, but having in addition an outer passageway in the rear thereof, to which all aisle heads have straight and direct access, it shall be lawful to permit two rows of persons to stand in such passageway in the rear of such seats, but under no circumstances, any more than two such rows; (e) and in no event, nor under any circumstances, shall any persons be allowed to stand at the head of any aisle.

The space to be occupied by said standees shall be separated from the space to be left clear for passage, by tape, ribbon, or other easily broken material, supported by light posts fixed in stationary sockets, and to be not less than three nor more than four feet from the floor; all to be so constructed and placed as to be no obstruction in case of panic or emergency. In all places of public amusement or entertainment, not included in the foregoing provisions, except in fireproof buildings, there shall be employed, by the owner or proprietor thereof, one or more watchmen whose exclusive duty it shall be to protect and guard the inmates of such buildings from fire and other sources of danger. The penalties prescribed by section 773 of the Greater New York Charter shall apply to any violation of this ordinance.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

Report for the Quarter Ending September 30, 1911.

Sir—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have the honor to submit the following report for the three months ending on September 30, 1911.

The Department as a Whole.

The most important step taken by the Trustees during the last quarter has been the establishment of a Training School for Midwives, reference to which was made in the report for the preceding quarter. The school was opened on July 18. From a long list of applicants for the position of Resident Obstetrician, Dr. E. V. Ivey was appointed at a salary of \$1,200 per annum, with maintenance. The school will be under the direct charge of the General Medical Superintendent, who is empowered to make all necessary arrangements for its management and operation. Three thousand, four hundred dollars in Special Revenue Bonds has been provided for the payment of salaries, etc. Instruction has been arranged to meet the present licensing requirements of the Board of Health, apart from the regular six months' course of training.

The new School for Men Hospital Attendants, provision for which was made at the time of the abandonment of the Mills School for Men Nurses, is now in operation. The Trustees have asked for a site upon which to erect the new building designed to accommodate this school, and it is hoped that a plot on 26th st. facing the hospital grounds and extending through to 25th st. will be available for this purpose.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, having successfully passed a non-competitive examination for the place of General Medical Superintendent, is now regularly in occupation of that position, pending the establishment of an eligible list.

In spite of efforts for economy in the expenditures under the various appropriations, there will be a deficit for the current year amounting to some \$30,000. This is distributed in small amounts through the various appropriations, the largest being \$15,000 in the appropriation for Repairs and Replacements by Contract or Open Order. The General Medical Superintendent has been authorized to issue orders for such supplies as he may consider essential, and to incur liability therefor.

Among the recommendations made by the committee of the Board in charge of the Budget provision for the coming year, were the following:

Resolved, That a uniform wage for Trained Nurses be established at \$600 with maintenance or \$800 without maintenance.

Resolved, That the Training School be directed to arrange the vacations of Nurses at intervals throughout the year, so as not to handicap the service during the limited period of the summer months, and so as to obviate the need of requesting revenue bonds for vacation relief each year.

Resolved, That all social service employees be placed on the payroll, and that in future no assistance towards payment of the salary of any employee in the Department shall be accepted without the approval of the Board of Trustees.

Resolved, That the General Medical Superintendent be instructed to arrange for the employment of an Electrician to overhaul the elevators at regular intervals, and that the request of the Supervising Engineer for the employment of a permanent Electrician for this purpose be denied.

Resolved, That the General Medical Superintendent be directed to order every possible economy in the appointment of Special Nurses, bringing this to the attention of the visiting staff if thought desirable.

Resolved, That the General Medical Superintendent, in his discretion, may grant an additional \$180 to employees who are obliged to live outside.

Resolved, That the salary of the Assistant to the Assistant Superintendent of Training Schools at each of the allied hospitals be fixed at the uniform rate of \$720.

Resolved, That all employees now paid from revenue bonds which are available until December 31, 1911, be provided for in the Budget for 1912.

Resolved, That in the Budget for 1912 fifty Hospital Attendants at \$240 be included in place of fifty Hospital Helpers at that wage.

The Budget Committee also recommended that approval be granted to the request of the General Superintendent of Training Schools that the appropriation of Revenue Bonds for additional Nurses for the alcoholic service, viz: One Trained Nurse at \$600 and ten Hospital Attendants at \$480, \$5,400, be changed to read: "Nine Trained Nurses at \$600, \$5,400," in view of the difficulty of obtaining experienced Nurses at the lower figure.

The increases asked for in the new Budget included \$8,800 in salaries and wages and the sum of \$37,866 in salaries for new and additional positions. Increases for all appropriations other than salaries over the funds provided for in 1911 amount to \$21,000.

Among the new grades established during the past quarter, together with salaries attached thereto, are: Resident Obstetrician at \$1,200 and at \$900; Chaplain at \$650, instead of \$450, as heretofore; Chief Investigator at \$1,500; Employment Agent at \$900. In addition to these it was resolved to ask for the establishment of the position of Admitting Physician and Instructor in Anaesthesia in each one of the allied hospitals.

The General Medical Superintendent has estimated that the saving in the purchase of meat through obtaining it in carcass form at the allied hospitals will amount to \$3,672.90. This will be made possible upon the establishment of a central store, which has been authorized by the Trustees. Considerable complaint has been made concerning the quality of butter supplied under the specifications prescribed by the Standardization Committee. Permission has been asked to return to the former standard, which gave general satisfaction.

BELLEVUE HOSPITAL.

Pathological Building and Men's Dormitory.

The contract for the painting of walls and ceilings of this building was completed in August, 1911. The electric fixtures were all installed on August 1, other than the setting of the glasses which were not installed until the painting was finished.

The maintenance of a temporary steam line between this building and the new boiler house has been the cause of considerable delay in carrying out the contract of the John H. Parker Company, who were allowed an extension on their contract to the first of August, and later until September 30, inasmuch as no responsibility for this condition belonged to them. The Trustees have been informed that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity will undertake the laying of two 12-inch mains in 29th street, as soon as the money is made available by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

New Boiler House and Coal Station.

The specifications for lighting fixtures in the new boiler house and coaling station have been approved by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and a bid of \$483 for the execution of the work has been accepted. The Trustees have asked the Finance Department to allow them to accept an offer made by the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries to construct a fender system in front of the boiler house, at a cost of \$435. Competitive bids from private contractors run from \$630 to \$1,128 for this work.

New Laundry Building.

The architects report that this building is now completed, and only wait the tests of the city inspectors for wiring, piping, etc., before the contract can be accepted.

Pavilions L and M.

The work of excavation for this building was begun on August 10. By September 30, the entire ground had been excavated to a level of about four feet above mean low water. The contractors asked permission to work on Sundays, holidays and at night. This request has been denied. The architects have complained of the unsatisfactory manner in which this work has been carried on, and the Trustees have warned the contractors that they must follow the instructions of the architects.

Pavilions I and K.

Corporate stock in the amount of \$1,750,000 has been issued for the erection of the new Pavilions I and K. Committees of the Medical Board to assist in planning the extensions, etc., were appointed and Dr. Goldwater, the Expert in hospital construction, employed by the Trustees, has given his assistance in the preparation of the plans and specifications. These have now been accepted by the Trustees and forwarded to the Comptroller for his approval.

Other Building Matters.

For a roof ward and thirteen additional small balconies on Pavilions A and B, the sum of \$49,500 in corporate stock has been provided. Plans and specifications for these improvements have been accepted by the Trustees and transmitted to the Board of Estimate for approval.

The work of enclosing the loggias on Pavilions A and B has been completed, thus rendering them available for the use of patients without undue exposure to the weather.

Practically all electric fixtures have been installed in Ward 31, and the contract will be formally accepted after the approval of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity has been obtained.

In the matter of the contract of Daniel J. Ryan for the extension to the Psychopathic Ward, the Trustees have been unable to modify any further the penalty for failure of the contractor to complete the work in the specified time.

The work of properly repairing the stable having been estimated to cost \$1,250, it was proposed to convert the old boiler house into a stable. This, however, was found to be impossible, without very extensive alterations. It has therefore been decided to make such repairs to the old stable as are essential to keep it in use until the new stable shall be erected.

Plans and specifications for lighting Ward 34 have been approved and the work will now be advertised.

Hospital Grounds.

Plans and specifications for the erection of tree guards and gratings have been approved. Mr. George C. Stoddard has been employed to survey the grading of that portion of the hospital grounds lying along the river front, at a cost not exceeding \$800.00.

The Commissioner of Docks and Ferries has been asked again to provide other facilities for the dumping boards now situated at the foot of East 30th street. Commissioner Tompkins has promised to endeavor to find another location for the dump.

Fire Conditions.

The Fire Commissioner, at the request of the Trustees, has undertaken an investigation of fire conditions in the old building at Bellevue Hospital. The Commissioner was asked to station firemen in the building and promised to take this into consideration in connection with his general investigation of the subject.

The Medical Service.

It has been decided to establish an orthopaedic ward for adults and children, this to be under the direction of an Assistant Visiting Surgeon to be appointed for that purpose and not under the General Surgeons. To take care of this work, an additional Assistant Visiting Surgeon will be appointed on the second and third medical divisions.

A proposal has been made to divide the present children's service in the hospital between the First and Fourth Medical Divisions. This has been referred for discussion to the Conference Committee.

The Trustees have received notice of many public endorsements of the new Bellevue Hospital Nomenclature, as revised by the Committee on Clinical Records

of the Medical Board, and have congratulated this Committee upon its work. Application has been made for the copyright of the book.

In consequence of the difficulty in controlling visitors to the Alcoholic and Prison wards, it has been ordered that visitors to these wards be required to obtain special permission from the Physician in charge, and that the hospital shall have power to search such visitors whenever it may seem necessary to the Resident Physician.

Patients cared for in the Prison and Psychopathic wards have been made exempt from the requirement for payment for their care and treatment in cases where they are able to pay. Hereafter, money will be received from such patients only where their friends volunteer the payment.

An appropriation of \$800 has been authorized to meet the cost of lectures to Nurses in the Training School, including the teaching of languages.

Medical Appointments, Resignations, etc.

The following medical appointments and changes have to be reported:

August 3, 1911—Dr. Floyd H. Jones and Dr. Leroy C. Grau, appointed Voluntary Assistants on the alcoholic service for a period of six months beginning on July 1, 1911.

August 17, 1911—Appointment of Dr. Joseph Nack as one year Interne, from July 1, 1911, on the Third Division was cancelled; Dr. Arthur M. Reich, appointed Interne on the Third Division for six months, from July 1, 1911; Dr. Francis H. Marx, appointed Interne on the Third Division for six months, from January 1, 1912.

September 7, 1911—Dr. William H. McKay, appointed Assistant Physician to Out Patients, Fourth Division; Dr. John F. McGrath, appointed Assistant Gynaecologist to Out Patients, Fourth Division; Dr. Norton E. Hall, one year Interne, First Medical Division, resigned.

August 3, 1911—Dr. Charlotte Wolf, appointed Assistant Visiting Dentist.

GOUVERNEUR HOSPITAL.

A map of the lot lying to the south of Gouverneur Hospital has been prepared and sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for action necessary to close this space and thus make it available for the uses of the hospital.

The sum of \$200,000 in corporate stock has been voted for the purpose of providing a new dispensary at Gouverneur. A contract with Messrs. McKim, Mead and White has been made for the construction of this building. Owing to the necessity of providing for Nurses on the spot, the building will have to be made considerably higher than was intended by the Trustees when application was made for the use of the plot to the south of the present hospital. It would be a pity to erect a high building upon this plot as it would shut the hospital off from a view of the river and deprive it of much air and sunlight. The Trustees are therefore inclined to seek another site for the erection of this new building, which would include, besides the Out Patient Department, quarters for the nursing staff in the hospital and a new boiler plant to take the place of the very inadequate one in the old hospital. With this in view, steps have been taken to acquire a new site and the plot to the south of the hospital will be turned over to the Park Commissioner for conversion into a small park.

The Trustees have been notified by the Commissioner of Public Charities that after the first of January, 1912, it will be impossible for him to continue to supply Nurses to take care of the wards at Gouverneur Hospital. This has made it necessary to ask for an appropriation to provide for thirty graduate Nurses, who, in the absence of quarters in the hospital, must board outside and receive \$800 salary in lieu of maintenance in the hospital.

The sum of \$10,000 in corporate stock is to be available for the construction of a new children's ward at Gouverneur. The question of how that ward shall be constructed and the selection of architects therefor have been referred to the Building Committee of the Board.

The Superintendent has been requested to obtain an estimate of the cost of planting trees on the sidewalks around the hospital.

On July 20, 1911, Dr. David C. Thompson was appointed Interne, from July 8, in place of Dr. Lee, resigned.

HARLEM HOSPITAL.

An appropriation of \$250,000 has been made in the corporate stock budget for the erection of an additional wing at Harlem Hospital, made necessary by the present overcrowding of that institution. Mr. J. H. Freedlander has been appointed architect to prepare plans and specifications and carry out all other architectural duties in connection with this extension. Mr. Freedlander requested authority to retain the consulting engineers in connection with the plans, but this was denied as the final contract to be prepared is to provide for all such services.

A contract has been made with Mr. R. F. Almirall, architect, for the construction of the new Training School for Nurses at Harlem. The wording of the appropriation of \$2,500, to provide for the replacement of the flooring of the balconies at this hospital, has been amended so as to permit of the laying of metal flooring instead of concrete, as was at first proposed.

Plans and specifications for the new fire alarm system have been approved by the Board of Estimate and this will now be installed.

Revised specifications for the lighting fixtures have now been received from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, the number of fixtures having been reduced from 333 to 181, in accordance with the arrangement made by Dr. Smith, the former General Medical Superintendent.

The Superintendent has been asked to obtain estimates of the cost of planting trees on the sidewalk around the hospital, and of enclosing the grass plots in front of the institution with a railing.

A large amount of property belonging to patients who have died or been discharged has accumulated in the hospital, and the Board has asked the opinion of the Corporation Counsel concerning its proper disposition.

The Board has been informed of the approaching resignation of Miss Julia Stimson, Assistant Superintendent of Nurses, who leaves to accept a position in the new Washington University at St. Louis. So efficient has been Miss Stimson's service that her resignation will be received with regret by the Trustees.

The following medical appointments and changes have to be reported:

July 6, 1911, Dr. Carl R. Kepler, Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, resigned.

July 20, 1911, Dr. Peter J. Fagan, appointed Assistant Physician to Out Patients.

August 3, 1911, Dr. Nathan Settel and Dr. David A. Swick, appointed Assistant Physicians to Out Patients.

FORDHAM HOSPITAL.

The medical service has been reorganized by the establishment of a continuous service on the surgical division, each of the four Visiting Surgeons to be in charge of this service for six months. Two Assistant Visiting Surgeons have been appointed in addition to the two now in the hospital, all four of whom shall serve, alternately, six months in the ward service and six months in the Out Patient Department. To render this plan effective, the appointment of four additional Internes has been authorized.

The sum of \$35,000 in corporate stock has been authorized for the construction of roof wards, and Mr. R. F. Almirall has been selected as Architect for the work. Mr. Almirall has already transmitted a preliminary specification for the construction of these wards.

The work of enclosing the balconies has gone steadily forward and this great improvement to the wards of the hospital will soon be available for use.

Medical Appointments, Resignations, etc.

July 20, 1911, Dr. Charles L. McEveety appointed Assistant Physician to Out Patients. Dr. Daniel J. Donohue, appointed Interne (additional substitute), from January 1, 1911.

August 3, 1911, Dr. Hugh A. Riley, appointed Assistant Physician to Out Patients (nose and throat); Dr. Morris Grossman appointed Assistant Pathologist.

September 7, 1911, Dr. Dominick A. DiPasca, Assistant Physician to Out Patients, resigned; Dr. John E. Breglia appointed Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients; Dr. Anthony H. Harrigan appointed Surgeon to Out Patients and Assistant Visiting Surgeon to Fordham Hospital.

August 3, 1911, Dr. Emma Westfehling appointed Assistant Visiting Dentist.

BUREAU OF SEWERS.

October 7, 1911.

Hon. E. V. FROTHINGHAM, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—I beg to transmit herewith the following report of the operations of the Bureau of Sewers for the third quarter, ending September 30, 1911. This report contains a detailed statement of all the work performed under contracts for original construction and reconstruction of sewers. The data as to work performed by the maintenance force are omitted, because that force is now under separate management and will be reported on by those in charge.

On September 30, 1911, the sewerage system of the borough consisted of 525.84 miles of sewers and 6,394 receiving basins.

During the quarter 1,575 linear feet of sewer and 8 receiving basins were built as new work and 1,400 linear feet of sewer were built as reconstruction, alteration and improvement work.

The following works were completed during the quarter:

Sewer, under pier, foot of 40th st., North river.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in 114th st., between 1st and 3d aves.

Extension to outlet sewer foot of 120th st., Harlem river.

Receiving basin, northwest corner of 167th st. and Audubon ave.

The contract prices for the above work, payable from the Street Improvement Fund, amounted to \$28,176.67.

The work completed under the head of reconstruction, and payable from corporate stock, amounted to \$4,255.

The work under construction September 30, payable out of the Street Improvement Fund, was:

Extension to barrel sewer under pier at 36th st., North river.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in 56th st., between 1st and 2d aves.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in 72d st., between Amsterdam and Columbus aves.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Central Park West, between 98th and 100th sts.

Sewer in 129th st., between Amsterdam and Convent aves.

Extension to sewer in 138th st., between 7th and 8th aves., and receiving basin at the northwest corner of 7th ave. and 138th st.

Sewer in 141st st., between Riverside Drive and Broadway.

Sewer in Buena Vista ave., between 177th st. and summit, south of 172d st.

Sewer in Northern ave., between 181st and 190th sts.

Sanitary sewer in 218th st., between Broadway and Park Terrace West and storm sewer between Broadway and summit, west of Park Terrace East.

The contract prices for the above work amounted to \$100,078.10.

Reconstruction work payable from corporate stock in progress during the quarter was:

Reconstruction of outlet sewer foot of 79th st., East river.

During the quarter the following contracts were advertised and let:

Extension to barrel sewer under pier at 36th st., North river.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in 72d st., between Amsterdam and Columbus aves.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Central Park West, between 98th and 100th sts.

Sewer in 129th st., between Amsterdam and Convent aves.

Extension of sewer in 138th st., between 7th and 8th aves., and receiving basin on the northwest corner of 7th ave. and 138th st.

Sewer in 141st st., between Riverside Drive and Broadway.

Sanitary sewer in 218th st., between Broadway and Park Terrace West, and storm sewer between Broadway and summit, west of Park Terrace East.

Sewer in Park Terrace East, between 218th st. and 100 feet south of 215th st.

Rebuilding sewer in 33d st., between 6th and 7th aves.

The following sewers have been petitioned for by property owners. The necessary steps will be taken to prepare plans and specifications for these improvements as soon as they are legally authorized:

Reconstruction of outlet sewer at West and Albany sts.

Reconstruction of outlet sewer at foot of Market st., East river.

Rebuilding sewer in 26th st., between 5th and 6th aves.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in 48th st., between 10th and 11th aves.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in 50th st., between 8th and 9th aves.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in 112th st., between 1st and 3d aves.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in 117th st., between Harlem river and Pleasant ave.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in 1st ave., between 119th and 120th sts., and in 119th st., between 1st and 2d aves.

Three receiving basins at 77th st., and a new avenue between Avenue A and Marginal st., East river.

Sewer in 131st st., between Broadway and old Broadway.

Receiving basin on northwest corner of 166th st. and St. Nicholas ave.

Sewer in Bennett ave., between Broadway and 181st st.

Receiving basins (five) on Riverside Drive, between 139th and 142d sts.

I also forward separate statements showing the amount of work on uncompleted contracts during the quarter. There is also forwarded a statement showing the status of all local improvements of which final authorization has been given by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which had not been reported to the Board of Assessors prior to the closing of the quarter ending September 30, 1911, prepared pursuant to the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment February 25, 1910.

The work of the Bureau done in the quarter has been largely of the routine order. Some of the works completed, however, are of considerable importance. I might mention the completion of the outlet sewer under pier foot of 40th st., North River, which work was undertaken to abate a nuisance of long standing. The work of alteration and improvement to the old style pipe sewers has also been carried on to a considerable extent. I might mention the sewer in 114th st., between 1st and 3d aves.; the work of alteration and improvement to sewer in 56th st., between 1st and 2d aves., now in progress, and alteration and improvement to sewer in 72d st., between Columbus and Amsterdam aves., also in progress; the alteration and improvement to sewer in Central Park West between 98th and 100th sts., which was undertaken after a long and exhaustive examination to determine why sewage found its way into the nearby lake in Central Park.

Such works as I have just mentioned will form a very large part of the business of this Bureau in the future. The old pipe line system laid some forty years ago is breaking down and we are in receipt of many complaints as to its operation, and in answer to these demands a large amount of work will have to be done. The estimated cost of the works now in progress amounts to about \$100,000.

The river front improvements which we now have under way consists of an extension of the sewer in 36th st. and North River, which is now in progress, and the extension of sewers at 129th st. and North River, which will be placed under contract very soon.

The work of constructing sanitary and storm sewers at 218th st., between Broadway and Park Terrace West, which work is known as the "Separate System," is now in progress. Contract for the same class of work has been let for a sewer in Park Terrace East, between 218th st. and a point 100 feet south of 215th st. This work is a departure from the original system on which the sewers in this Borough were constructed which was known as the "Combined System," carrying storm water and sewage in the same conduit. In the present case a separate line is constructed for storm water, the house drainage being carried in a small line of pipe. It is believed that this system can be adopted in a large portion of this Borough where the reconstruction of the old system is much needed. It is believed that the carrying of the storm flow in a system of shallow drains will result in preventing overflows into cellars and basements of houses which are at present a very frequent occurrence. There are many other advantages which will, undoubtedly, result in great benefit to the sewerage districts where the same may be installed. Very truly yours,

Grade C—For Cooking and Manufacturing Purposes Only.


Raw milk not conforming to the requirements for Grades A and B.—be it further

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be and he is hereby directed to submit to the Board of Health at its first meeting after January 1, 1912, recommendations for such modifications of the rules and regulations of the Department of Health regarding the sale and care of milk as may be necessary to effect conformity in said rules and regulations to the above classification.

Whereas, The classification of milk sold in The City of New York prescribed by this Board this day is inconsistent with provisions of Section 56d of the Sanitary Code, be it further

Resolved, That Section 56d of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby rescinded.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or other persons engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated by all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walls, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curbs in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass ping in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Depart-

ment of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession, or of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless, The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furring, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested in him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Bond New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
