To the Honorable the Board of Assistant Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—In reply to the resolution adopted by your Honorable Board on the 27th inst., requesting me to inform you of the cause of the frequent stoppages of the work of paving Broadway, from Thirty-second to Fifty-ninth streets, I have the honor to report that the work has been twice suspended on account of the delays of the Finance Department in paying the moneys due the contractor. The obligation of the city under the contract is, to pay the contractor monthly, upon the certificate and requisition of this Department, seventy per cent. of the amount of work done, and the remaining thirty per cent. within thirty days from the completion and acceptance of the work. On the failure of the city to meet this obligation with reasonable promptitude, the contractor has the right to suspend, or, if he choose, to abandon the work, and to hold the city liable for all damages accruing to him from the delays or failure of payments.

On the 8th of June last, this Department transmitted to the Finance Department its first certi-

cate and requisition for work done under this contract, the seventy per cent. payment on which amounted to \$5,558.88. On the 17th of June, the contractor had not yet received his money and suspended the work. Within two days after the suspension, payment was made by the Finance Department, and the work was resumed. The second certificate and requisition for seventy per cent. payment was transmitted to the Finance Department on the 11th inst., and has not yet been honored, wherefore the work is again suspended since the 25th inst. The complaints received by this Department from property-owners on the line of the work and by others, of the inconvenience caused by these delays, are frequent and urgent. In several places the street is in a dangerous condition, and, if any accident occurs, the city is liable for damages.

It is but justice to the contractor to say, that he has otherwise prosecuted the work with commendable vigor, and has proved his readiness to comply with the requirements of the contract and the directions of this Department.

He shall also license so many and such persons as he may think proper to be public cartmen in said city; and he may revoke or suspend any or all of such licenses at his pleasure. All persons licensed as aforesaid to keep public carts shall be deemed to be public cartmen within the meaning of this chapter; but it shall not be lawful for any person to receive or to hold a license to keep public carts, or to be a public cartman, unless he be a citizen of the United States, and a resident within the State of New York, and is the actual owner of the cart or carts, with good horses therefor, so licensed to be kept as public carts; and the Mayor may examine under oath all persons applying for or holding any such license, or the renewal thereof, touching their qualifications as aforesaid; and all licenses other than to persons so qualified shall be void.

Sec. 2. Section 3 of article 1 of the said ordinance is hereby amended and shall read as follows:

§ 3. The Mayor shall require and receive for the use of the city from every person to whom he may grant license to keep public carts as aforesaid, for every four-wheeled truck, to be drawn by two horses or other animals, five dollars; and for every four-wheeled truck, to be drawn by one horse or other animal, three dollars; and for every two-wheeled cart, to be drawn by one horse or other animal, two dollars; and half these sums respec-

tively, for the license for each truck or cart renewed, as hereinafter provided. The Mayor shall also require and receive for the use of the city from every person licensed as aforesaid to be a public cartman, one dollar, and a like amount for every such license renewed.

Sec. 3. All ordinance or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
