Resolved, That permission be and is hereby given to Murphy Brothers to erect and retain storm-door within the stoop-line on the Madison street front of their premises, southwest corner of Oliver and Madison streets, the work to be done at their own expense, and said permission to continue during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Whenever at any time any permit shall be granted to open the streets, pavements, or sidewalks.

Whenever at any time any permit shall be granted to open the streets, pavements, or sidewalks, for the purpose of laying the tubes, wires, conductors, and insulators of the company, a sum equal to one cent per lineal foot of streets occupied under such permit shall be paid to the city.

Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to authorize the laying of any mains or pipes for conveying gas nor the erection of any lamps or lamp-posts to be used for illuminating by gas.

An Ordinance to amend section 93 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances, approved December 31, 1880.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows: Section I. Section 93 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances, approved December 1880, is hereby amended by striking out the figures "74" and inserting in heu thereof the figures 9," and by striking out the word "hereinafter," so that said section when so amended shall read 31, 1880, is "89," and l as follows:

§ 93. The owner or driver of any hackney coach or cab shall not demand or be entitled to receive any pay for the conveyance of any passenger, unless the number of the carriage and rates of prices be conspicuously fixed in and on said carriage or cab, as provided by section 89 of this article, under penalty of five dollars.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of

this ordinance are hereby repealed.
Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately. Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, May 3, 1881. Approved by the Mayor, May 6, 1881.
