

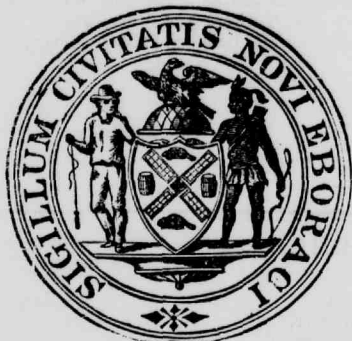

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a special meeting of the Board of Docks, held May 16, 1879.

Present—Commissioners Dimock and Vanderpoel.

On motion, Commissioner Dimock took the chair.

The Chairman stating that the Commissioners were now prepared to hear persons who were opposed to the erection of a dumping board north of the foot of Bank street, North river. A member of the firm of Cragin & Co. stated that the present wharf accommodations in that section of the water front were insufficient for the business transacted there, and vessels bringing goods to his firm were frequently delayed from three to five days before a berth could be obtained to enable them to discharge their cargoes; that a dumping board already existed at the foot of Twelfth street, and that if an additional dumping board should be erected, as proposed, it would be a great detriment to persons doing business in that locality.

Messrs. Cobanks & Theall, machinists, being present, stated that steamers were in the habit of lying at the bulkhead between Bethune and Bank streets, while repairs thereto were being made, and that if a dumping board were created at Bank street they would be unable to get proper accommodations, and that the dust arising from said dumping board would seriously damage the machinery and cabin furniture of said steamers.

The Knickerbocker Ice Company also stated that it had a serious objection to the erection of said dumping board, inasmuch as the landing of ice in the vicinity would subject them to serious loss and inconvenience in consequence of the dust from said dumping board settling upon the ice.

J. D. Tracey was heard at length as to the necessity existing for the erection of said dumping board, in order to accommodate builders and others desirous of getting rid of cellar dirt and other material, and claimed that no damage to commercial or other interests would ensue in case it were established at the point designated.

The Chairman stating that a further hearing would be granted to the parties interested on Wednesday, the 21st inst., at 12 o'clock M.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1879.

CHAPTER 261.

AN ACT to inquire into the equity and legality of certain assessments in the city of New York.

Passed May 8, 1879; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The board of revision and correction of assessments in the city of New York is empowered and directed to examine and ascertain the amount of assessments made upon the property formerly owned by George Hoffman, situate upon the corner of Fifth avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, in the city of New York, for regulating, grading, curbing, guttering and flagging One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from the Harlem river to Eighth avenue, and for regulating, grading, curbing, guttering and flagging Fifth avenue from One Hundred and Thirtieth street to One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, and if the said board determine that the said assessment or any part thereof is excessive, unjust or illegal, all or any part of the same shall thereupon, upon the certificate of said board, be vacated and canceled by the comptroller of the city of New York.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
