SANITARY BUREAU, April 27, 1875.

To the Sanitary Committee:

I beg respectfully to make the following report upon the expenses connected with the Riverside Hospital. When the Board took charge of it it was in a very dilapidated condition. Many of the beds with bedding required to be replaced, together with other furniture, and cooking apparatus on a considerable scale provided. Small-pox has been unusually prevalent since the Board took possession of the hospital; there having been 536 cases removed to it since the 21st of January. The disease has extended unusually into the spring, there having been 84 cases during the past week, and the census of the hospital to-day being 128 patients. The necessary repairs, the employment of paid officers and nurses, the improved diet, telegraph, and general comfort of the institution have been a large expense, and the sum set apart to meet it has been expended. I would respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested by resolution to set apart a sufficient sum to sustain the hospital during the rest of the year.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

HEALTH FUND.

Balance of Appropriation for 1874... \$5,422 08

Resolved, That the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) is hereby transferred from the Appropriation "Health Fund," 1874, the same being in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the Appropriation "Small-pox Hospital," 1875, for supplies, the amount of said appropriation being insufficient.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments moved to suspend the rule adopted by the Board at meeting of June 23, 1874, relating to calls of meetings, in order to act upon the resolution now to be proposed by the Comptroller for the issue of "New York City Bonds for Liquidation of Claims and Judgments."

Which was agreed to.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue bonds of the City of New York, as provided in chapter 756 of the Laws of 1873, for the purpose of providing moneys for the payment of judgments which have been or may be obtained against the said city, the amount of said bonds not to exceed the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), said bonds to be designated "New York City Bonds for Liquidation of Claims and Judgments," and bear interest not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, and payable at such time within three years from the date thereof as the Comptroller may determine.

## BOARD OF EDUCATION.

SEALED PROPOSALS WILL BE RECEIVED at the office of the Clerk of the Board of Education, corner of Grand and Elm streets (and nowhere else), until Monday, May 24, 1875, at 4 o'clock P. M., for supplying the coal and wood required for the public schools in this City (including that portion of Westchester County recently annexed thereto), for the ensuing year—say nine thousand five hundred (9,500) tons of coal, more or less, and one thousand and six hundred (1,600) cords of oak, and one thousand (1,000) cords of pine wood, more or less. The coal must be of the best quality of white ash, furnace, egg, stove, and nut sizes, clean and in good order, two thousand two hundred and forty (2,240) pounds to the ton, and must be delivered in the bins of the several school buildings at such times and in such quantities as required by the Committee on Supplies.

The proposals must state the mines from which it is proposed to supply the coal (to be furnished from the mines named, if accepted), and must state the price per ton of two thousand two hundred and forty (2,240) pounds.

The quantity of the various sizes of coal required will be about as follows, viz.: Seven thousand two hundred (7,200) tons of furnace size; one thousand two hundred (1,200) tons of stove size, five hundred (500) tons of egg size, and six hundred (600) tons of nut size. The oak wood must be of the best quality, the stick not less than three (3) feet long.

The pine wood must be of the best quality, Virginia, and not less than three (3) feet six (6) inches long. The proposal must state the price per cord of one hundred and twenty-eight cubic feet, solid measure, for both oak and pine wood, and also the price per cut for sawing and splitting per load, the quantity of oak wood to be split only as required by the Committee on Supplies. The wood will be inspected and measured under the supervision of the Inspector of Fuel of the Board of Education, and must be delivered at the schools as follows: Two-thirds of the quantity required from the 10th of June to the 15th of September, and the remainder as required by the Committee on Supplies; said wood, both oak and pine, must be delivered sawed, and, when required, split, and must be piled in the yards, cellars, vaults, or bins of the school buildings as may be designated by the proper authority. The contracts for supplying said coal and wood to be binding until the 1st day of June, 1876. Two sureties for the faithful performance of the contract will be required, and each proposal must be accompanied by the signatures and residences of the proposed sureties. No compensation will be allowed for delivering said coal and wood at any of the schools, nor putting and piling the same in the yards, cellars, vaults, or bins of said schools.

Proposals must be directed to the Committee on Supplies of the Board of Education, and should be indorsed "Proposals for Coal," or "Proposals for Wood," as the case may be.

The Committee reserve the right to reject any or all proposals received.
