

#### APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during theweek ending September 30, 1876.

Resolved, That James McGinness be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds, in place of James McGinness, whose term of office has expired.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 20, 1876.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby requested to substitute Boulevard lamps for the ordinary street-lamps now on the lamp-posts in front of the Church Rodeph Scholem, Nos. 8 and 10 Clinton street.

Resolved, That Lawrence street, from Ninth avenue to the Boulevard, be paved with Belgian or trap-block pavement, and that at the several intersecting streets and avenues crosswalks be laid where not now laid, and relaid where those now laid are, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works, not in good repair, or are not upon a grade adapted to the grade of the proposed new pavement, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby requested to lay Croton water-pipes in One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from Willis to St. Ann's avenue, as provided in section 2, chapter 477, Laws of 1875, and subsequent acts.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 20, 1876.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, September 25, 1876, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the same became adopted.

Whereas, On Thursday, the 21st instant, the historic day of the State of New York, a representation of the Police Department of this city, numbering about six hundred men, purpose visiting the Centennial Exposition at Philadelphia, by an arrangement made by the Commissioners of Police of this city, at an expense of four dollars each, which is imposed upon every member of the Police force taking part in the demonstration; and as it is intended purely as a display of the Police force of the city, it is unjust to ask each person to pay his own expenses, while acting as a representative of any part or portion of our municipal system of government; be it

Resolved, That, as there is no contingent fund to pay expenses of this character, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to transfer from any unexpended balance of appropriation of former years the sum of three thousand dollars, for the purpose of defraying the expense of the members of the Municipal Police Force of this city, on a visit to the Centennial Exposition at Philadelphia, on the 21st day of September, 1876, being the historic day of this State; and that when such transfer shall have been made, and the necessary amount thus provided, the Comptroller be and he is hereby requested to pay the same upon the presentation of vouchers satisfactory to him to the Superintendent of Police, or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay the expenses of the said members of the Municipal Police who shall visit the Centennial Exposition on the 21st day of September, 1876, and the Superintendent of Police, upon the receipt of the moneys provided in this resolution, is hereby directed to refund to the members of the Police force the amount each shall have subscribed towards paying the expenses of the visit.

### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 23, 1876: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,596, as follows, viz.: I public building, 812 tenement-houses, 64 private dwellings, 21 other dwellings, 65 manufactories and workshops, 23 stores and warehouses, 47 stables, 50 slaughter-houses, 2 markets, 18 fat-rendering establishments, 1 stock yard, 2 manure dumps, 22 sunken and vacant lots, 37 yards, courts, and areas, 83 cellars and basements, 81 waste-pipes and drains, 192 privies and water-closets, 40 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 4 dangerous stairways, 2 cisterns and cesspools, 3 dangerous chimneys, 24 other nuisances, I public sewer, together with I visit to case of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 510.

During the past week 107 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.
