APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending October 14, 1876.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to draw a warrant in favor of A. L. Ashman, for collation served to the rifle teams, on the occasion of their visit to the public institutions, on September 16, 1876, amounting to \$971.50, and to charge the same to the appropriation for "City Contingencies."

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 5, 1876.
Approved by the Mayor, October 11, 1876.

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby given to Mathew Nugent and Abraham Barnard to occupy a space in the hallway of the Sixth District Court-rooms, Nos. 389 and 391 Fourth avenue, sufficient for desks for the transaction of their business as City Marshals, assigned to said court, until otherwise ordered by the Common Council.

Resolved, That Fifty-sixth street, from Madison to east side of Fourth avenue, be paved with Belgian or granite-block pavement, and that at the several intersecting streets and avenues crosswalks be laid where not now laid, and relaid where those now laid are, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works, not in good repair, or are not upon a grade adapted to the grade of the proposed new pavement, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Whereas, The Board of Aldermen did, on the 22d July last, adopt a resolution for completing the work necessary for the improvement of Tompkins square in the words following, viz.:

"Resolved, That it be and is hereby ordered and directed that the Department of Public Parks forthwith proceed to have all the work necessary to complete Tompkins square according to the plans on file in said Department not embraced in the contract for grading and regulating said square, made with Stephen Roberts, to be completed as speedily as possible; and for that purpose authority is hereby given to said Department to prosecute said work by day's labor, and they are hereby directed to so prosecute the same. The authority hereby given shall continue only until the first day of September next."

And whereas, For divers reasons the work as authorized herein was not commenced until on or about the 15th day of August, so that sufficient time does not remain to complete the said work on the 1st day of September, 1876; therefore
