Also, beginning at a point in the northerly line of Kingsbridge road marked "A," said point being located and described as follows: Distant 1,176.62 feet easterly as measured along the northerly line of Kingsbridge road from Bolton road, and also distant from Dyckman street as measured along the southerly line of Kingsbridge road 1,180.08 feet; thence across said kingsbridge road and parallel to the line of Dyckman street extended, distance 100.01 feet, to the northerly line of said road and point marked "A"; thence northwesterly and parallel to the line of Dyckman street extended, distance 500 feet, to the southerly line of Seaman avenue; thence easterly along said line, distance 80.01 feet; thence boutheasterly, distance 500 feet, to the northerly line of Kingsbridge road; thence westerly along said line, distance 80.01 feet; to the point or place of beginning.
