DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, October 13, 1899, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—The full Board. The minutes of the meeting held October 6, 1899, were approved. Representatives of the Dock Laborers' Protective Association appeared and requested an increase in the compensation of laborers.

On motion, the matter was laid over for executive session. A representative of Mrs. Theresa A. S. Sheridan appeared in relation to the permit granted for the use of the land between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh streets, North river. He was informed that no permit for the erection of any additional dump thereat had been granted by the Board.

The communication from Herbert & Co., requesting a lease of a portion of the southerly side of the pier foot of East Twentieth street, together with the northerly half of the bulkhead between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, East river, was referred to the Treasurer. The communication from the Department of Street Cleaning, requesting the assignment of locations for the dumping of clean snow and ice during the coming winter, was referred to the Dock Superintendent to examine and report. The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:
