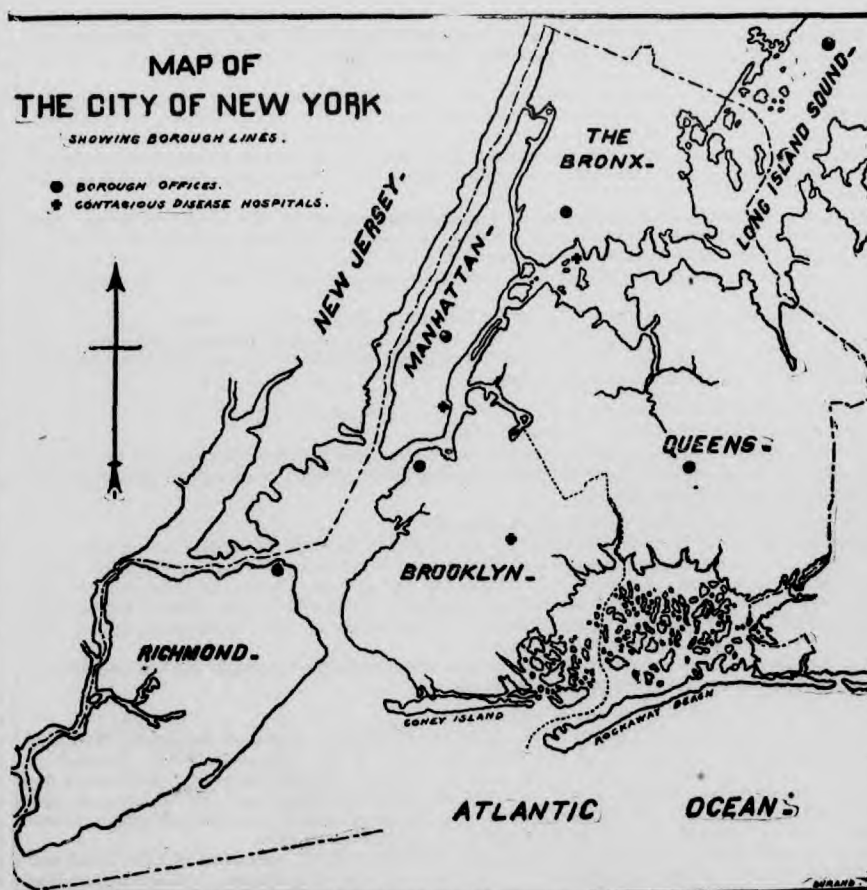

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, October 13, 1899, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held October 6, 1899, were approved.

Representatives of the Dock Laborers' Protective Association appeared and requested an increase in the compensation of laborers.

On motion, the matter was laid over for executive session.

A representative of Mrs. Theresa A. S. Sheridan appeared in relation to the permit granted for the use of the land between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh streets, North river. He was informed that no permit for the erection of any additional dump thereat had been granted by the Board.

The communication from Herbert & Co., requesting a lease of a portion of the southerly side of the pier foot of East Twentieth street, together with the northerly half of the bulkhead between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, East river, was referred to the Treasurer.

The communication from the Department of Street Cleaning, requesting the assignment of locations for the dumping of clean snow and ice during the coming winter, was referred to the Dock Superintendent to examine and report.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, to dredge at its northerly ferry slip foot of Liberty street, North river, and to clean its tracks at the foot of West Fifteenth street.

Townsend & Downey, to dredge in front of and adjacent to their piers at Shooters Island, Borough of Richmond.

Burlee Dry Dock Company, to extend the present dock at Port Richmond, Borough of Richmond, inshore to the bulkhead, for a distance of about seventy feet, in accordance with plans to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

Edward Hett, to repair the breakwater in front of New Dorp Beach Hotel, at New Dorp, Borough of Richmond, and to extend the present crib thereat southerly a distance of about ten feet, in accordance with plans to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief; the portion of the crib to be extended to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board.

Standard Oil Company, to dredge at its northerly dock foot of North Twelfth street, Borough of Brooklyn.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Mayor—Transmitting communication from the Consul of Japan, requesting information in relation to the arrangement of docks in the port of New York. The action of the President in furnishing the desired information approved.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving form of Contract No. 658, for furnishing sawed yellow pine timber.

2d. Transmitting approved blank form of general lease, to be used by this Department.

3d. Transmitting notice of application to be made by the Estate of Cyrus M. Warren for grant of land under water between Sixth and Seventh streets, Long Island City.

4th. Transmitting bills of costs in proceedings for the acquisition of wharf property at the southerly half of the bulkhead between Bank and Bethune streets, North river; at the bulkhead between Watts and Canal streets, North river, and at Pier, old 39, East river, and bulkhead adjoining. Chief Clerk directed to prepare necessary requisitions.

From the Department of Public Charities—Requesting that repairs be made to the westerly side of the dock at the City Hospital, Blackwell's Island. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary repairs thereto.

From the Panama Railroad Company—In relation to alleged damage to the northerly side of Pier, new 57, North river, by dredge owned by P. Sanford Ross. Secretary directed to state that no action can be taken by this Department in the matter.

From Philbin & Bekman, attorneys—Transmitting notices of applications to be made by Patrick Ward for grant of land under water between Halsey and Monson streets, Long Island City, and by Stephen B. Halsey for grant of land under water between Monson and Mills streets, Long Island City.

From the Trustees of the Estate of William Beard—Requesting permission to rebuild pier and wooden shed at Beard's Erie Basin, South Brooklyn.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Estate of William Beard to reconstruct pier and shed thereon, at Erie Basin, South Brooklyn, all the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, in accordance with plans to be hereafter submitted to and approved by him. It being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Estate of William Beard shall file in this Department a written agreement, the form of which shall be approved by the Corporation Counsel, that in the event the Board of Docks shall decide that the said pier and the shed thereon is needed for the improvement of the water-front, that then and in such case, no additional item of value shall be claimed or allowed by reason of the erection of said pier and the shed thereon, in any proceeding instituted for the acquisition of said wharf property either by purchase or condemnation. Said agreement to contain a mutual covenant to the effect that it shall be binding upon the heirs, executors, administrators, assigns and successors of the parties thereto.

From P. Sanford Ross—Requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 649.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of dredging on the North river, between the Battery and West Thirty-fourth street, under Contract No. 649, P. Sanford Ross, Incorporated, contractor, be and hereby is extended to November 1, 1899, the consent of the sureties on said contract having been filed in this Department.

From J. Edward Ogden—Requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 656.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the delivery of wrought-iron screw-bolts, dock spikes and washers and cast-iron cleats, under Contract No. 656, J. Edward Ogden, contractor, be and is hereby extended for thirty days, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

From the President—Recommending that the resolution adopted June 27, 1899, revoking the permit for the erection of sheds on the bulkheads adjoining Pier, new 39, North river, be rescinded.

On motion, the recommendation of the President was adopted and said resolution rescinded, and the Secretary directed to notify the Atlantic Transport Company that unless the construction of the sheds in question shall have been commenced within ninety days, the permit therefor will be revoked.

From the Treasurer—Recommending that permission be granted John Cloughen to erect and maintain, during the pleasure of the Board, a floating dump at the bulkhead between One Hundred and Seventh and One Hundred and Eighth streets, Harlem river, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$50 per month, payable at the end of each month to the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

From the Dock Superintendent—Report for the week ending October 7, 1899.

From Dock Master Matthews—Advising that Moffert & Burns have discontinued the use of the bath house at the foot of East Eighty-fourth street, and have removed the pipe leading thereto. Permit revoked, to take effect October 7, 1899.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending October 7, 1899.

2d. Recommending that repairs be made to the pavement between Harrison and Jay streets, North river, in front of the West Shore ferry premises by the placing of an asphalt pavement over the present granite pavement thereat.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH
of the Department of Health, held October 18, 1899, the following amendment to section 171 of the Sanitary Code was adopted:

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Board of Health, the following additional amendment to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 171. That no new burying-ground, cemetery, tomb or vault for dead human bodies shall be established, nor shall the remains of any dead body be placed in any existing burying ground, vault, tomb or cemetery in the City of New York, nor any of said receptacles be opened, exposed or disturbed, except according to the terms of a permit therefor given by this Department; and every body buried in any such place shall be buried to the depth of six feet below the surface of the ground and four feet below any closely adjacent street, except that in the Borough of Queens a body may be buried to the depth of three feet below the surface of the ground.

No food, beverage or other article for human consumption shall be sold, exposed or offered for sale in any cemetery or burying-ground within the City of New York.
