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### COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

*Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at Meeting Held at the Mayor's Office,  
at 12 o'clock M., on Tuesday, February 19, 1901.*

Present—Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor; Bird S. Coler, Comptroller; Patrick Keenan, Chamberlain; Randolph Guggenheimer, President of the Council, and Robert Muh, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York, adopted at the General Election held in the year 1899, the said stock is exempted for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII. of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance, relative to a renewal of the lease of premises No. 303 East One Hundred and Tenth street, Borough of Manhattan, occupied by the Department of Street Cleaning, and offered the following resolution :

FEBRUARY 9, 1901.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller :

SIR—Hon. P. E. Nagle, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, in a communication under date of February 4, 1901, requests the consent and approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for a renewal of the lease, pursuant to section 541 of the Greater New York Charter, from Herman Nestrock, of the first floor, cellar and yard of the premises known as No. 303 East One and Tenth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Department of Street Cleaning, as a section station, for a term of three years and fifteen days from April 15, 1901, at an annual rental of \$420 per annum payable monthly ; otherwise on the same terms and conditions as the existing lease.

The Commissioner also states :

"The above rent is an increase of \$5 per month over the present rent, but it is urged by Mr. Nestrock, on the ground of the increased tax rate since the date of the original lease and the premises are very convenient for the purposes for which they have been leased."

In reply I beg to report that the above premises have been leased for the use of the Department of Street Cleaning since April 15, 1895, under an original lease for three years and a renewal for the like period, at \$300 per annum, showing that the increased rent is \$10 per month, and that the Commissioner must have been misinformed in stating that it was only \$5 per month.

I have caused an examination to be made of the premises, which consist of a room about twenty-four feet by thirty feet in the rear of the ground floor of a five-story and cellar brick building, on the northeast corner of Second avenue and One Hundred and Tenth street, with the use of the yard, fourteen feet wide by twenty-five feet deep, which has been roofed over by the Department of Street Cleaning ; and also the use of a space in the cellar for the storage of coal, etc. The lease also provides that the Department shall make all inside repairs.

The reason given for the increase in rent of \$120 per annum is that the advanced tax rate since the date of the original lease is sufficient to warrant it.

In reply I beg to state that the premises were assessed for \$19,000 in 1895, 1896 and 1897 ; increased to \$20,000 in 1898, to \$21,000 in 1899, and to \$22,000 in 1901, showing a total increase of \$3,000 in assessed valuation in six years.

The proportion of such advance on the entire premises which should be borne by this rear store is extremely small, and does not, in my opinion, warrant an increased rental of \$10, or even \$5, per month.

It appears to me that the owner has received full rental value for the past six years, and that no advance for a further period of three years and fifteen days, as requested, is justified.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution of a renewal of the lease to the City by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, from Herman Nestrock, of the first floor, cellar and yard of the premises No. 303 East One Hundred and Tenth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, for a term of three years and fifteen days from April 15, 1901, at an annual rental of three hundred dollars (\$300), payable monthly ; otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease—the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance relative to a renewal of the lease of premises No. 404 East Twenty-first street, Borough



of Manhattan, occupied by the Department of Street Cleaning, and offered the following resolution:

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, *Comptroller*:

FEBRUARY 9, 1901.

SIR—Hon. P. E. Nagle, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, in a communication under date of February 7, 1901, requests the consent and approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for a renewal of the lease from George Lutz of the store or ground floor and yard of the premises No. 404 East Twenty-first street, in the Borough of Manhattan, for a term of five (5) years, from May 1, 1901, at an annual rental of six hundred dollars (\$600), payable quarterly; otherwise on the same terms and conditions as are contained in the existing lease.

The Commissioner also states:

"The above rent is in excess of what is now paid to Mr. Lutz (\$480 per annum); but, considering the size and convenience of the place for the purpose of this Department, and the fact that Mr. Lutz is willing to give a five (5) years' lease, it seems to me for the interest of the Department to enter upon said lease at said rent."

On March 16, 1900, the Department of Street Cleaning applied for a lease of these premises, for a term of five years, at an annual rental of \$636, to take the place of No. 344 East Twenty-first street, the lease of which was to expire May 1, 1900, annual rental \$300, and from my report of March 23, 1900, I quote as follows:

"Should, however, the building be put in first-class order, and in accordance with the plans submitted, I think a lease for a term of five (5) years, as proposed, might be authorized at an annual rental of \$480, which I would consider full; the owner to pay Croton water charges and keep the premises in repair."

A lease was authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on April 20, 1900, for a term of five years at \$480 per annum.

The Commissioner again addressed the Sinking Fund Commissioners on April 25, 1900, requesting that they amend their resolution previously adopted by making the annual rental \$600, which was denied.

The Department took possession of the premises on May 1, 1900, and I am informed that the lessor declined to sign the lease, whereupon another application was made by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning requesting that the term of the lease be made one year from May 1, 1900, instead of five years.

A resolution to this effect was passed on September 18, 1900, and the lease was duly executed.

As I have before stated, I believe that the rental now being paid, \$480 per annum, is full value for the premises, and in so far as the lease is to be made for five years with a responsible tenant, I do not agree with the Commissioner that that is any reason for an increased rental.

I would therefore recommend that the application for a renewal at an increased rental be denied, deeming the present terms full and sufficient.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—The Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York, at a meeting held on January 31, 1901, adopted the inclosed resolution requesting your Honorable Body to authorize the execution of a lease of the premises No. 209 East Twenty-third street, New York City, for the use of the students of the College of The City of New York, for a term of three (3) years from May 1, 1901, at an annual rental of fourteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$14,500).

This request is made because the present nine rooms occupied by about 450 of the sub-freshman class of the College in the Twenty-third street extension of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company's building expired February 1, 1901, and are wholly inadequate to house the students mentioned and the 360 more admitted on February 1, 1901.

The new building, the lease of which we ask to have executed, will amply accommodate these 800 students, when altered. It is a fireproof brick building with iron girders and cement floors, six stories in height. Thirty good class-rooms 23 feet by 30 feet, with ample light, can be arranged, three in the front and three in the rear on each floor, to take the place of the nine rooms in the Metropolitan building for which an annual rental of \$10,000 has been paid.

Of the rent of \$14,500, which is asked for the new building, only about \$8,000 goes to the landlord, inasmuch as the cost of alterations for plumbing, partitions, stairway, etc., \$10,000, has been added to the rent, to be paid in three installments, and \$3,000 per annum is also included for heating, services of a janitor, cleaning, etc., to be furnished by the landlord.

In brief, for an increase of only \$45,000 per annum over the rent now paid for the premises in the Metropolitan Building, we secure thirty good class-rooms, instead of nine, in a fireproof building, in a convenient location less than a block distant from the main college building.

The nine rooms in the Metropolitan Life Insurance building have been hired until May 1, when it is expected the alterations in the new building, No. 209 East Twenty-third street, will be fully completed. The students recently admitted, who cannot be provided for in the Metropolitan Building, will be accommodated on the first and second floors of No. 209 East Twenty-third street, the use of which has been given, pending alterations to the upper floors, until May 1, at a nominal rental of one dollar.

This building, No. 209 East Twenty-third street, is held by the owners at a fee valuation of \$18,500, and under the terms of this lease they practically get but \$8,000 per annum. It is most conveniently situated, being, as stated, less than one block away from the College building, and will be, when altered, in every way adapted for class-room for college students.

As \$10,000 for the first year's rent is to be used in paying for necessary alterations, the rent is made payable in advance for the first year. Suitable provisions have been inserted in the lease to protect the City's interest by having the \$10,000 to be paid for out of the first year's rent done under the direction and according to plans and specifications of the Superintendent of School Buildings.

It is therefore respectfully requested for the reasons above set forth that the Comptroller of The City of New York be authorized and directed to execute the lease in question in the form which has been prepared by the Corporation Counsel.

SIR—The Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York, at a meeting held January 31, 1901, passed resolutions requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the Comptroller to execute a lease of the building known as No. 209 East Twenty-third street, in the Borough of Manhattan, excepting therefrom one-half of the basement and the entire first floor, for a term of three years from May 1, 1901, at a yearly rental of \$14,500; the lessor to furnish light and heat until 5 P. M., and janitor's service; owners, the trustees of the Cass Realty Corporation (in liquidation).

This building is to be used as an annex to the College of The City of New York, and in place of the premises now leased in the Metropolitan Life Building Annex on Twenty-third street, which quarters are now insufficient.

I have caused an examination to be made of the premises, which consist of a six-story and basement brick building, about 73 feet by 94 feet, on a plot of ground 73 feet by 98 feet, situated on the northerly side of Twenty-third street, about 146 feet 5 inches east of Third avenue.

The building is of fireproof construction throughout and the two lower floors are finished for store and office purposes. The upper floors are occupied as power lofts.

The building is wired for electricity and heated by steam throughout; radiators on the first two floors and coils above.

The property is assessed on the tax-books for the year 1901 at \$85,000.

It will be necessary to make quite extensive alterations in the building to make it suitable for school purposes, and it is estimated that the sum of \$10,000 will be sufficient to cover the cost.

Under the terms of the proposed lease the sum of \$4,500 is to be paid in advance on May 1, 1901, and the balance of the rental for the first year, namely, \$10,000, is to be reserved for the payment of the alterations. After the first year the rent is payable quarterly at the end of each quarter.

The services of a janitor, light and heat are estimated to cost \$3,000 per annum, and, as the alterations which are necessary to fit the premises for school purposes will amount on a three-year lease to \$3,300 per year, the yearly rental for the building alone will thus be reduced to about \$8,200, which I consider to be full but fair rental.

It is proposed to incorporate in the lease the following provisions: The lessee to have the right to pay the interest on the mortgage on said premises in case of default on the part of the lessors and to deduct the amount so paid from the rent, and to have the privilege of the use of the first or store floor until the remaining stories shall be ready for occupancy, after which the said lessors may let said store floor, provided the written consent of the lessee is first obtained.

I am of the opinion that a lease, under the above terms, may properly receive the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Nichols and leased from her by The City of New York at an annual rental of \$400 from the 1st of May, 1900, to the 1st of May, 1901.

"Premises on the north side of One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, 100 feet east of the Southern Boulevard, owned by Eliza N. Gray and leased from her by The City of New York at a monthly rental of \$25 from the 1st of January, 1900, to the 1st of January, 1901."

I would respectfully suggest that the matter of those leases be laid before the Sinking Fund Commission with the recommendation that both of the above-described premises be leased by The City of New York, as follows:

The property on Mount Hope place for one year, from May 1, 1901, to May 1, 1902, at an annual rental of \$400 per year.

The property on the north side of One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, 100 feet east of the Southern Boulevard, for three years (instead of one year, as before), from January 1, 1901, to January 1, 1904, at a monthly rental of \$25.

DEAR SIR—I inclose herewith letter from George E. Payne, real estate agent, Long Island City, and with it send you tracing plans of floor for additional quarters which I would like to acquire for the use of the drafting office of this Department. It is imperative, considering the amount of work which this Department has before it for the ensuing year (such as plans, assessment maps, etc., in reference to the construction of the Webster avenue sewer, covering an area of 2,000 acres; also assessment maps made in connection with the Jamaica Disposal Plant; also the preparing of assessment maps and detailed drawings for the Sewer and Disposal Works at Newtown, the preparing of these assessment maps, etc., will keep between four and six draughtsmen busy for the entire year), that the working force in the Engineer's Department be increased in order to cope with this work.

The room which is at present used as the drafting room is too small and would not permit placing of any additional drawing tables, etc., for the use of any additional force. The size of the present drafting room is only 18 feet by 20 feet and is very poorly lighted. I strongly recommend the acquiring of this floor, inasmuch as it is on the same level with the main office, is well lighted, as the plans will show, and will facilitate the general working of the office considerably.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance, and offered the following resolution:

FEBRUARY 16, 1901.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. James Kane, Commissioner of Sewers, in communication under date of January 25, 1901, requests the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize a lease of the third story of the Post-office Building in Long Island City, which immediately adjoins the Hackett Building, now leased for the use of the City; terms, five years, at an annual rental of \$1,600, including steam heat. Lessor, George E. Payne, Agent, No. 75 Jackson avenue, Long Island City.

The Commissioner incloses a communication from the Deputy Commissioner for the Borough of Queens, stating that there is much increased work to be done by the Department for the ensuing year which will keep between four and six draughtsmen busy for the entire time, and that the present draughting-room, which is 18 feet by 20 feet in size, will be insufficient.

I have caused an examination to be made of the premises in question, and find that the total floor space is 2,845 square feet, exclusive of stairways and closets, which is at the rate of 56 cents per square foot per annum, including heat but exclusive of light and janitor's service.

This price appears to me extremely high for the third floor of the building in Long Island City, especially when a lease for five years with a responsible tenant is proposed.

Again, the space is entirely too large for six draughtsmen, and I have consulted with the agent in reference to what terms could be made for that part of the floor fronting on Fifth street, a connection being made with the Hackett Building on this floor in order that entrance and exit may be had from that building.

This space would amount to 1,200 square feet, for which the agent demands \$1,000 per annum, or at the rate of 83½ cents per square foot per annum, in my opinion a grossly excessive price.

I would recommend that the matter be referred back to the Commissioner of Sewers to secure smaller quarters and at a reasonable rental.

The following communication was received from the Department of Water Supply relative to the rental of premises corner Fulton street and Sheffield avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.

NEW YORK, N. Y., BROOKLYN, January 30, 1901.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller, City of New York:

DEAR SIR—Lease of premises Fulton and Sheffield avenues, Twenty-sixth Ward, for a period of three months from August 1, 1900, was authorized by resolution of the Sinking Fund Commission on August 8, 1900. Through an oversight on my part the attention of the Sinking Fund Commission was not called to the expiration of said lease on November 1, and an extension thereof requested for a further period of six months. We hoped to have secured a permanent yard in the Twenty-sixth Ward, but the Commissioner of Water Supply is opposed to the purchase of any land for that purpose. We have been endeavoring to secure propositions from land-owners to lease the City a plot of land upon which shops and stables are already erected, or upon which owners will construct shops and stables for a repair yard for this Department.

I therefore request that a resolution of the Sinking Fund Commission be adopted authorizing an extension of the lease for six months from November 1, 1900, this Department having been in continuous possession of the premises from November 1 to the present time.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

FEBRUARY 1, 1901.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—James Moffett, Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply, Borough of Brooklyn, in a communication under date of January 30, 1901, requests the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund

to authorize the further extension, for a period of six months from November 1, 1900, of the lease of the premises on the northeast corner of Fulton street and Sheffield avenue, stating that the Department is now and has been in continuous occupation of the same.

The original application for a lease of these premises was made April 16, 1900, for a term of six months, or one year from May 1, at \$40 per month. I considered this rental excessive for a yearly lease, and consulted with Deputy Commissioner Moffett, with result that he recommended a lease for three months from May 1, 1900, at \$40 per month, which received my approval.

I beg to quote from my report of April 26, 1900:

"I have conferred with Mr. Moffett in regard to the matter, and he states that it would be highly desirable for the City, as the successor to the Long Island Water Supply Company, to continue to occupy these premises for a period of three (3) months, in order that the water rents becoming due on May 1 may be paid at this office, as heretofore, thus relieving the main office in the Municipal Building, which at this time of the year is severely taxed to accommodate those paying water rents.

"Again, as the City has only just come into possession of the property of this water company and the people of these wards have been accustomed to pay their taxes at this office, it will probably save vast confusion to receive the rents up to August 1 at the same place.

"The Commissioner further states that he has no desire to establish a permanent branch office, but desires it for a term of three (3) months for the reasons as given above.

"I have consulted with Mr. James Fowler, a representative of Mr. John H. Ireland, the owner, and he agrees to rent the offices on the first floor of the corner building, about 20 feet by 60 feet in size, with the use of the yard and stable in the rear, for a term of three (3) months from May 1, 1900, at \$40 per month, with the privilege of a renewal from month to month on the same terms if required by the City.

"This is full rental for the premises, but in view of the short space of time for which they are to be used I do not consider it excessive."

On July 26, 1900, application was made by Deputy Commissioner Moffett as follows:

"Lease of the premises Fulton street and Sheffield avenue, Twenty-sixth Ward, expires on the 31st day of this month. I request that you extend the same for the further period of three months, within which time we hope to be able to vacate the premises."

—and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund (Minutes, page 372) authorized an extension of three months to expire November 1, 1900.

The present application will carry the lease to the full year originally proposed, and at the original price, \$40 per month.

My own opinion is that \$30 per month, or \$360 per annum, would be a full and fair rent, and the \$40 per month was only approved upon the assurance that the premises would not be required for a longer period than three to five months.

DEAR SIR—Hon. Stephen D. Stephens, County Judge and Surrogate of Richmond County, has handed me the copy of the resolution of the Commissioners authorizing a renewal of the lease of Rooms Nos. 5, 6 and 7 in the First National Bank Building at St. George, Staten Island.

I find that this new lease puts upon us the additional burden of supplying the services of a janitor. At the meeting with your inspector who called upon me in the matter it was understood by us that if we assumed this additional service we should be relieved of the necessity of renewing furniture and carpets. May we ask that the clause relating to furniture and carpets be omitted from the new lease?

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance and offered the following resolution:

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—C. H. Ingalls, President First National Bank of Staten Island, in a communication under date of January 25, 1901, requests that in the renewal of the lease for rooms 5, 6 and 7, First National Bank Building, St. George, Staten Island, for the use of the County Judge and Surrogate, the clause requiring the lessor to supply furniture and carpets be omitted.

In reply I beg to state that it was upon the agreement of the lessor to furnish janitor service, in addition to the covenants in the old lease, that I considered the rental asked reasonable and just, and should the covenant relating to the furniture and carpets be omitted, it is my opinion that the rental would then be excessive.

The rate per square foot for these small rear rooms in this building, under the renewal as authorized, is \$1.34 per annum against a price of \$1.20 per square foot per annum for the front rooms, now occupied by the President of the Borough, where the furniture is supplied by the City.

It will thus be seen that the lessor is now receiving fourteen cents per square foot, or about \$250 per annum, for the use and renewal of the furniture, over and above the price paid for the front rooms.

It would appear to me that this sum is adequate, and I would therefore recommend that the request of the lessor be denied.

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Buildings, to which was referred a resolution adopted by the School Board for the Borough of Brooklyn on November 7, 1900, recommending that, in view of the needs of the locality and the impossibility of finding any other suitable building, the Board of Education lease the premises known as Balzer Hall, corner of Prospect and Grant streets, Flatbush, Twenty-ninth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with the former resolution passed October 2, 1900, that a steam plant be dispensed with and the present furnace be used, with the addition of stoves, if necessary, respectfully reports as follows:

The premises proposed to be leased consist of a two-story frame structure, 47 by 85 feet, used as a hotel, for which a rental of \$1,200 per annum for a term of five years is asked. After necessary alterations, which must be made by the Board of Education, are completed, eight class-rooms, about 22 by 24 feet, will be afforded.

In view of the need for school accommodations in the vicinity, your Committee would recommend that the request of the School Board be granted, and the following resolution is offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be, and they are hereby, requested to authorize the Comptroller to execute a lease of the premises known as Balzer Hall, corner of Prospect and Grant streets, Flatbush, Borough of Brooklyn, for use as an annex to Public School 90, for a term of five years, at an annual rental of one thousand two hundred dollars; necessary repairs to be made by the Board of Education. Owner, Elizabeth F. Balzer, No. 821 Rogers avenue, Brooklyn.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance:

JANUARY 22, 1901.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Education held November 28, 1900, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be, and they are hereby, requested to authorize the Comptroller to execute a lease of the premises known as Balzer Hall, corner of Prospect and Grant streets, Flatbush, Borough of Brooklyn, for use as an annex to Public School 90, for a term of five years, at an annual rental of \$1,200; necessary repairs to be made by the Board of Education. Owner, Elizabeth F. Balzer, No. 821 Rogers avenue, Brooklyn."

I have caused an examination to be made of the premises, which consist of a two-story and cellar frame building about 25 feet by 86 feet, with an addition 16 feet by 56 feet, part of which is old and part of which was constructed some four or five years ago.

The building has been used as a saloon and assembly room on the first floor, with living apartments above.

At the time of the enactment of the Excise Law the original building was enlarged and arranged in compliance with said law, in order to secure a hotel license, and the second story was partitioned off to make 16 rooms, the majority of which are 7 feet 6 inches by 9 feet.

In order to fit this building for the occupation of the Board of Education, it will be necessary to remove the greater part of the partitions on both floors of the building, and it is their intention to make four class-rooms on each floor.

Various other alterations and improvements are necessary, as will be seen from the quoted estimate submitted by the Deputy Superintendent of School Buildings in the Borough of Brooklyn:

"The following is the approximate cost of repairs to Balzer Hall, annex to Public School No. 90, Borough of Brooklyn:

"Removing partitions and making good.....	\$250 00
"New partitions.....	150 00
"New openings and doors.....	290 00
"New wardrobes.....	500 00
"New stairs.....	150 00
"New storm houses.....	230 00
"Fitting up water-closets.....	200 00

"Total..... \$3,942 00"

Of the above \$3,942, I consider that \$2,300 is in the nature of permanent improvements to the building, and should in part be borne by the owner.

As will be seen, the building is now arranged for a hotel and saloon, and may have a rental value as such approximating the amount asked, namely \$1,200, but for other purposes, basing the rental on the intrinsic value of the property, I do not consider that a rental even approaching this sum would be warranted.

The property is assessed on the tax books for the year 1900 in the sum of \$3,600, and I do not consider that its market value, for other than hotel purposes, would exceed \$7,500, which at eight per cent. would be \$600 per annum.

If the City could secure a lease at this price, for a term of five years, making alterations estimated to cost \$3,942, I consider it might be warranted, in consequence of the necessity of immediately securing further school accommodations, but such a rental I should consider full.

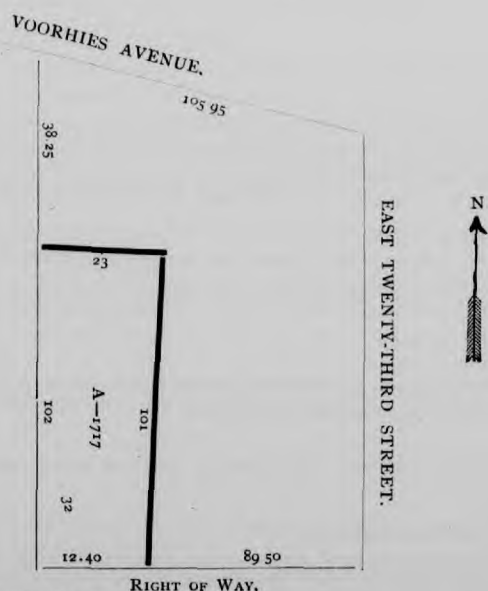

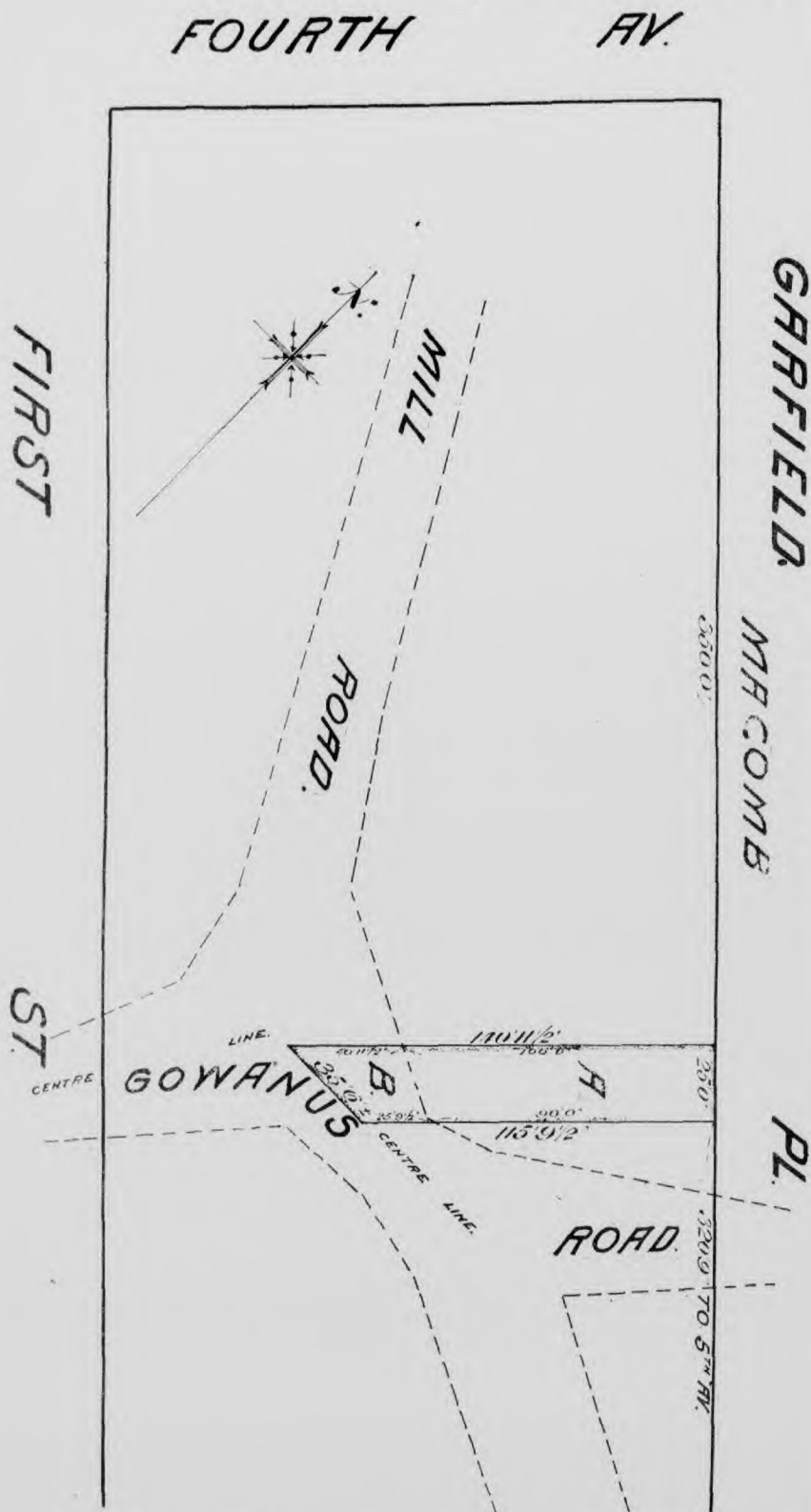

DEAR SIR—The regular monthly meeting of the Municipal Statistical Commission was called for Tuesday, February 19, 1901, at three o'clock P. M.

Present—Dr. Frederick W. Grube, Ernest Harvier and John T. Nagle.

A quorum not being present, the meeting was adjourned.

##### REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF THE BUREAU TO THE STATISTICAL COMMISSION.

The Chief of the Bureau prepared the following report for the Commission:

Since the last meeting of the Municipal Statistical Commission, a number of reports of City Departments, Commissions, etc., have been received and compiled. Many of these reports are accompanied by illustrations, which show the kind of work that has been done by them, and their methods of doing it.

The statistics that are presented will show that the City has continued to make great progress in wealth, commerce and population, and that all the departments and branches of the City Government have made a decided improvement and compare favorably with the character of work that has been done in former years.

The improvements and changes that have been made I am able to corroborate from personal observation and recollection of New York City for a period of fifty years.

The confidence that the citizens repose in the City's welfare, and the good work that is being done by its officials, is shown by the sale of its Corporate Stock, which brings a premium, although issued at the low rate of three per cent. per annum.

Some additional statistics which have been compiled since the last meeting of the Municipal Statistical Commission are given below. Among them is a table showing the population of New York City since the year 1614, obtained from the most authentic sources to the year 1890, which is the last census year.

The statistics of deaths and still-births and some of the principal causes of deaths from the most prominent diseases are given since the year 1804, and the appearance of any epidemic disease that occurred in The City in any given year since that time will be readily perceived.

The statistics of births and marriages are given from the date that the law required their registration.

A brief account of the first white male child that was born in The City of New York is also furnished as an introduction to the statistics of births.

An interesting table of the number of tenement houses, by wards, in the five boroughs of the City is submitted. This table was prepared by the Health Department and was furnished this Bureau by Dr. Tracy. The census shows the number of front and rear houses, the number of vacant apartments, the total tenement-house population and the number of persons under five and over five years of age who live in them.

I have prefaced these statistics by giving the particulars relating to the first tenement house built in this City.

The statistics showing the number of members that belong to the New York Clearing House Association, with the balances paid in money for the past forty-six years, with the average daily balance and balances to clearings for the same period, are given each year.

I am making an effort to present other annual statistical facts relating to The City's wealth and development from the earliest period to the present time.

Illustrations relating to the following subjects accompany the report of this Bureau, and photographs are promised to accompany other subjects:

##### City Hall.

Several illustrations are submitted accompanying the history and showing the City Hall during the years 1656-1700 and 1812, and also pictures of its appearance after the burning of the cupola, and also a photograph of the City Hall as it appears at the present time.

##### History of the Seal or Coat of Arms of The City of New York.

Accompanying the description of the history of the seal or coat of arms of The City of New York are several illustrations presented in their natural colors. I was greatly assisted in this work and given information relating to the City Hall by the St. Nicholas Society.

##### Department of Buildings.

The illustrations accompanying the statistics of this department will show the first brick building and the first metallic frame building erected in The City of New York; these pictures will also show the character of the buildings erected in early New York in 1673 and those erected since that time.



Other illustrations show the progress that has been made in building operations, chiefly in lower New York, Borough of Manhattan, since the passage of the Act of 1892, which recognized the practicability of steel construction.

Among the illustrations is that of a building which existed in 1680 on the northeast corner of Broad street and Exchange place, the present site of the Mills Building, and which was characteristic of the buildings that existed in this location at that time. A photograph is presented which will show this location at the present time and the changes and improvements that have taken place.

A picture giving a view of Park row in 1831 and the Park Theatre is shown, and also a photograph of the same locality in 1899. On the site of the Park Theatre a building has been erected said to be the tallest business house in the world.

Several photographs furnished by Thomas J. Brady, Commissioner of this Department, which were taken by George L. Armourenx, C. E., an employee of the department, will show some of the hazardous work performed in removing dangerous walls and debris after conflagrations.

#### Department of Education.

Accompanying the statistics of the Department of Education is an illustration showing the first public school-house erected in New York City, and also pictures of the last two that have been built. The public schools that are now erected are all fireproof and contain improvements that were not thought of in the old schools.

A brief history relating to the early public schools accompanies the statistics, and also a statement showing the oldest school now organized in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx and the oldest complete school building.

#### Dock Department.

The illustration of the Recreation Pier was furnished by William H. Burke, Secretary of the Department of Docks, and an article on recreation piers is furnished by Edward H. Kendall, who was consulting architect of the Department of Docks and who directed the construction of several of them.

In a pamphlet I issued in 1885 I called attention to the necessity of erecting piers of this character, particularly in crowded localities. In 1892 a law was passed authorizing their erection.

Several very instructive photographs and drawings have been furnished this Bureau by John A. Duntze, an engineer of the Department of Docks. These pictures and drawings illustrate the method of building docks and bulkhead-walls, giving specifications, estimates, etc., of construction.

#### Department of Parks.

The public park statistics are accompanied by photographs showing some of the fine scenery in the parks and the great work that has been accomplished by this department. There are also illustrations of different statues in the parks, and photographs of some of the small parks of the City, including Bowling Green as it appeared in 1835.

On December 26, 1884, in the "New York Tribune," under the title of "Town Talks," I suggested the creation of small parks in the tenement districts, and in a later communication stated that they were most needed where the population was densest. Since that time several small parks have been laid out in this city.

#### Department of Water Supply.

A few photographs illustrating dams, spillways, etc., of reservoirs accompany the statistics relating to this Department, their capacity in gallons and their acreage and the statistics of the water supply of the five boroughs which comprise the City of New York is given. These photographs were furnished by George W. Birdsall, Chief Engineer of the Department.

#### The Botanical Garden.

Accompanying the statistics of the Botanical Garden in the Borough of The Bronx is a picture of the Elgin Botanical Garden, which was situated between Fiftieth and Fifty-first streets and Fifth and Sixth avenues, as it appeared in 1825. This picture is about the same as it appeared in 1801, when the Garden was founded by Dr. David Hosack, who, at that time, was Professor of Botany in Columbia College. The property extended from Forty-seventh to Fifty-first street and from Fifth to Sixth avenue, contained about 20 acres, and was purchased from Dr. Hosack by the State in 1810 and given to Columbia College in 1814.

#### New York Catholic Protectors.

The statistics of this institution are accompanied by a number of illustrations, which show the important work that is being done in the different departments of it.

The photographs were taken by the class of photography of the institution, and show the commendable efforts that are being made to educate and teach the inmates the useful trades, so that they may be able to earn a livelihood when discharged.

It is of interest to ascertain from the report that more than 100 Hebrew boys were received on short terms, and that these boys were under the religious instruction of a rabbi.

It is also stated in the report that patriotism is taught, and that more than 300 former inmates joined the Army and Navy during the late war with Spain.

#### New York Post-office.

The statistics of this Post-office are made more interesting by a brief history of the Post-office in New York since 1753, and pictures of the present Post-office and the old Middle Dutch Church, which was dedicated in 1729 and made a British military prison in 1776, and occupied as the Post-office from 1845 to 1875, are submitted.

#### Fire Department.

Accompanying the statistics of the Fire Department is an illustration showing the apparatus now used by the Fire Department, and also the method of extinguishing fires in 1733. There is also a photograph of a fire which caused the highest number of deaths during the year, and a table of statistics showing the number of deaths by conflagrations in each building during the year.

#### Department of Bridges.

Several illustrations are submitted showing the improvements that have been made on many of the bridges; also photographs of some of the bridges lately built. A photograph is given of the new bridge over the Harlem river at Third avenue; a picture of the one that was there prior to it shows an interesting contrast.

#### Department of Street Cleaning.

The Street Cleaning Department's work is accompanied by illustrations that show the method of cleaning streets, removing ashes and garbage, together with a drawing of the plant for the disposal of light refuse; also photographs of the crematory, dumps and scows, and the method in which the ashes, etc., are disposed of at sea.

These interesting illustrations were made from negatives furnished by Frederick L. A. Stearns, of the Street Cleaning Department.

#### Department of Highways.

The statistics of the Department of Highways are accompanied by a number of illustrations, which show the variety and character of the work that this Department is engaged in and the cost of the same. A number of pictures of the viaducts and bridges that have been constructed and the streets that have been improved is presented.

#### Department of Correction.

The illustrations accompanying the statistics of the Department of Corrections show the old City Prison and the new one, the institutions under the charge of this Department, the sanitary improvements in the institution and the character of labor that is being performed, and other interesting information relating to the prisons under the Department of Corrections. These pictures accompany interesting statistics and a brief history of this Department, prepared by N. O. Fanning, Deputy Commissioner.

#### Aqueduct Commission.

The statistics of the Aqueduct Commission are accompanied by photographs showing the immense work that is being done by this Commission. Among these photographs is one showing the Seventh Regiment on the march to protect the Aqueduct from destruction by strikers.

The photographs of the Aqueduct were furnished by Charles S. Gowen, of the Engineering Department.

#### Department of Finance.

Accompanying the statistics of the Department of Finance is an illustration showing West Washington Market. This Department has charge of the City's markets.

#### The Reservoir.

Three illustrations are shown of the reservoir on Fifth avenue, between Fortieth and Forty-second streets, which has been removed to give place to the New York Public Library. The cost of the removal is also given.

#### Grant's Tomb.

An interesting description is given of Grant's Tomb by John T. Brady, the contractor. An illustration of it is also given.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, January 4, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M.  
 Present—The full Board.  
 The minutes of the meeting held December 28, 1900, were approved.

L. Boyer's Sons—To repair their dock at Flushing, Long Island, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Frederic W. Stevens—To construct a crib-bulkhead with return, at his property, between Temple and Elm streets, Astoria, Borough of Queens, the work to be done in accordance with plans to be hereafter approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and hereby is directed to notify the Commissioners of the Land Office that this Department has examined into the application of Daniel A. Skinnell, dated November 16, 1900, for a grant of land under water at Little Bay, Flushing, Borough of Queens, and finds that the granting of same would conflict with the rights of the City, under the provisions of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, and will be otherwise injurious to the public interests of The City of New York, and that therefore this Board protests against the granting of the application.

From Henry DuBois' Sons Company—Transmitting consent of sureties to extension of time to June 30, 1901, for the completion of the work of dredging on the North river, between the Battery and West One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, under Contract No. 694.

From Nicholas W. Ryan—Requesting a further extension of time for the completion of the work of building an inshore extension to Pier "A," North river, under Contract No. 684, and transmitting the consent of the sureties thereto.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of constructing an extension to Pier "A," North river, and of making alterations to the present building, under Contract No. 684, Nicholas W. Ryan, contractor, be and hereby is extended to and including January 4, 1901, the written consent of the sureties on said contract having been filed in this Department.

From Albon Man, Receiver—Transmitting notice of sale of the property of the Ocean Navigation and Pier Company at Coney Island.

On motion, the communication from the Corporation Counsel, requesting to be advised as to whether this Department has any interest in the property to be sold, was placed on file and the Secretary directed to state that this Department has no interest in such property.

From the Manhattan Ice Company—Declining to pay rent for the ice bridges at Corlears street, East river, and at West Thirty-fifth and Forty-seventh streets, on the North river, from January 1, 1901, and requesting that the date for the commencement of such rentals be fixed at April 1, 1901.

On motion, said application was denied and the Secretary directed to state that unless the rental is paid within ten days the permits will be revoked.

On motion, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, by section 822 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, The Board of Docks of The City of New York is authorized to acquire, in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of The City of New York, wharf property in said City, and all rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and to agree with the owners of such property, rights, terms, easements and privileges upon a price for the same, and in case of failure to agree upon a price, to institute legal proceedings to acquire the same for the improvement of the water-front of said City; and

Whereas, The said Board of Docks is desirous of acquiring, in the name and for the benefit of The City of New York, the following described premises, to wit:

All wharfage rights, terms, easements, emoluments and privileges appertaining to the bulkhead on the southerly side of South street, beginning at a point where a line parallel to and twenty-four feet easterly of Gouverneur lane would intersect said southerly line of South street, and running thence easterly along said bulkhead to the centre line of the slip between Piers, old 14 and old 15, including all right, title and interest in and to pier, old 14, East river.

Whereas, It appears that W. C. Schermerhorn, A. Iselin and others, executors, Harriett D. Potter and Elizabeth S. Jones, New York Life Insurance and Trust Company, trustee, Henry E. Jones, and George V. N. Baldwin, trustees, Henry E. Jones and R. Wharton, trustees, C. W. Astor, D. Whipple, the Estate of Edward Jones, the heirs of Jane C. Mead, are the owners in fee simple of the above described premises, together with all hereditaments, including riparian and wharfage rights.

Resolved, That this Board authorizes the purchase of above-described premises, with all hereditaments, and offers to pay for a good and sufficient title thereto, free from all incumbrances, the sum of two hundred and sixty-five thousand dollars, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Resolved, That a copy of these preamble and resolutions be served upon the aforesaid parties, or upon their authorized agents or attorneys, and that they be and hereby are requested, within ten days from receipt thereof, to notify this Board in writing whether they will sell the said riparian and wharfage rights as aforesaid to The City of New York for the price above named, and in the event that they shall fail to notify this Board of their willingness so to convey the respective rights as aforesaid it shall be deemed that no price can be agreed upon for the purchase of said property between the owners thereof and this Department.

The President stated that the Consolidated Gas Company had consented to permit this Department to enter into possession of the premises between Sixteenth and Eighteenth streets, North river, in order that the work of improvement thereat may be commenced without delay.

4th. Recommending that the application of the Central Vermont Railroad Company for a lease of Pier, new 28, East river, with adjoining half bulkheads, be denied. Recommendation adopted.

Gordon" at the Pier foot of Pike street, East river, and to cut a gangway thereat, be denied, the Board not yet having decided what disposition is to be made of said pier. Recommendation adopted.

In relation to the application of Patterson & Elder for permission to use a portion of the easterly side of the Clinton avenue extension in the Borough of Brooklyn, and recommending that in lieu of said location permission be granted the applicant to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, the bulkhead along Freeman street, about 200 feet on the westerly side of Wallabout basin, Brooklyn, with the privilege of erecting and maintaining thereon an ice bridge, tally-house and engine, the compensation for said privilege to be hereafter fixed by the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

8th. Recommending that the application of the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company for permission to change the cable crossing at Newtowna creek, between Oakland street, Greenpoint, and East avenue, Long Island City, be denied. Recommendation adopted.
