NEW YORK, March 12, 1901.

To the Honorable the Committee on Construction:

GENTLEMEN—Appurtenant to the work of constructing the New Croton Reservoir, it will be necessary to repair or reconstruct that portion of the Old Croton Aqueduct that lies between the Old and the New Croton Dams. To perform this successfully it will be necessary to discontinue the use of the Old Aqueduct between the points named while this work is in progress. For this reason I recommend the construction of a brick conduit to connect the New and the Old Croton Aqueducts at Dunwoodie. This will enable the use of both aqueducts between Dunwoodie and the city while taking the entire supply of water from the Croton Reservoir, through the New Aqueduct, and diverting it as may be necessary at the proposed connection, which would be about eighty feet in length, and its cost would be less than \$5,000.

I respectfully request that I be authorized to receive proposals to construct the proposed brick conduit connection.

The Aqueduct Commissioners, after making inquiry, can find no grounds for the complaint contained in your communication so far as it relates to this Commission. If you will specifically point out the reason for said complaint, they will, no doubt, take such action as may be necessary to at once conform to the law.

We presume, however, that the reference in your communication might be in relation to the employees of some of the contractors, and if this is the case, and you will accordingly notify us, they (the Aqueduct Commissioners) will co-operate with you in exerting any power they may have to compel the enforcement of the provisions of the statutes to which you refer.

The plot owners have protested to Mr. E. Wegmann, Division Engineer, against the removal of bodies, etc., taking place until they have received their awards, as they are in many cases too poor to buy new plots until they have been paid for those condemned by the City.

Under the above circumstances it would be useless for your Honorable Board to let now a contract for the removal of the bodies, etc., as the plot owners would not provide the new plots to which the bodies are to be moved.

It seems to me that the awards for the cemetery plots should be made with the understanding that the City is to remove the bodies, monuments, etc., before your Honorable Board lets the contract for such work.

As far as the construction of the New Croton Reservoir is concerned it would be ample time to commence the removal in the fall of this or even in the spring of next year.

GENTLEMEN—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the

City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1890, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII, of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of the City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be able to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of the City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

CHAPTER 630.
