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BOARD OF REVISION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision of Assessments was held in the Council Chamber, City Hall, on Thursday, November 17, 1904, at 11.05 o'clock A. M. Present—N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; George L. Sterling, Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel; Frank A. O'Donnel, President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meetings, not yet approved, was dispensed with.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging and laying crosswalks in Daly avenue, from East One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street to Bronx Park, and objections of John A. Steinmetz, N. W. Palmer and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors, under date of September 12, 1904.

Mr. Herbert G. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, objected to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses connected therewith.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for paving Jefferson street, from Boston road to Franklin avenue, with asphalt pavement, and objections of E. Chase, Wm. T. Lavelle and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors, under date of September 12, 1904.

Mr. Herbert G. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, objected to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses connected therewith.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing and flagging Norwood avenue (Decatur avenue), from its present southerly terminus to Woodlawn road, and objections of Matthew F. Dalton, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors, under date of September 12, 1904.

Mr. Herbert G. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, objected to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses connected therewith.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for sewer in Union Square, East, between Fourteenth and Sixteenth streets, and objections as follows:

Thomas W. Burke, attorney for Grace B. Ruggles and others; Mulqueen & Mulqueen, attorneys for Daniel Brubacher; Joseph A. Flannery, attorney for Andrew J. Dam; John C. Shaw, attorney for Mary A. Draper; Quackenbush & Pearce, attorneys for Lambert Suydam, and T. H. Baldwin, attorney for the Merchants' Clerks' Savings Bank, and J. C. Delaplain; also report of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, dated July 20, 1904, and testimony taken in said matter, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors, under date of September 12, 1904.

The Board of Assessors reported that it was claimed that there was an old sewer north of Fifteenth street, adequate for the property there, which the Board found to be true, as to the fact of the sewer being there, and further, that it had reduced the assessment 50 per cent. as to the lots in front of which there had been a sewer, and 33 1-3 per cent. as to the other property.

Mr. Shaw was heard in regard to the extraordinary cost of the work, as shown, which was caused by the Rapid Transit Subway being constructed within 2½ feet of the house line of Union Square, East, leaving but that space for the sewer, and also stated that the property represented by him had connection with the sewer in Fifteenth street.

The following attorneys also appeared in opposition to the assessment:

Mr. Mulqueen, Mr. Burke, Mr. Flannery and Mr. Baldwin.

After consideration, on motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to make a further pro rata reduction in the present assessment of 33 1-3 per cent., and that the assessment, as so reduced, be confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewer in Wadsworth avenue, between Broadway and Eleventh avenue, with objections, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of June 1, 1904, with instructions to take testimony in the matter of the allegations set forth in the objections, filed in behalf of the City Real Estate Company, was presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by the said Board, together with transcript of testimony introduced before it in said matter, under date of September 12, 1904.

Mr. James N. Butterly, attorney, representing Mr. Walter B. Hopping, attorney, was heard, and objected to the amount of the assessment charged against the property of the City Real Estate Company, for the reason that the sewer should have ended at about One Hundred and Ninetieth street; that the sewer north of One Hundred and Ninetieth street is purely a local one, and not a part of the Wadsworth avenue sewer, being disconnected from it and draining in an opposite direction; that it is of no utility to the property of his clients, and further, that the cost of same is excessive.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors with instructions to reduce the assessment charged against lots, Map Nos. 115 and 127, represented by Mr. Hopping, 20 per cent., and that the assessment as so reduced be confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in Hoe street, from East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street to Freeman street, and objections of A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, for Josef Matzke, Cornelius O'Keefe and others; and of Mulqueen & Mulqueen, attorneys for Peter Torpy and others, received from the Board of Assessors under date of September 12, 1904.

The Board reported that it had made a pro rata reduction of 10 per cent. in the assessment.

Mr. Herbert G. Andrews, attorney, as representative of Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, and Mr. Mulqueen, attorney, were heard, and objected to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses incident thereto, especially those for inspection and engineering, and claimed that, notwithstanding the reduction which had been made by the Board of Assessors, the cost of the work was still largely in excess of the benefit the property derived from it.

After consideration, on motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors with instructions to make a further pro rata reduction in the present assessment of 10 per cent., and that the assessment as so reduced be confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing and paving gutters in Fifty-third street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, together with a list of awards for damages caused by a change of grade, with objections of John W. Wilkinson, filed by Rufus O. Catlin, attorney, and application of John W. Wilkinson for an award for damages, filed by James T. O'Neill, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of September 21, 1904.

No one appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the objections filed were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for fencing vacant lots on the north side of Teasdale place, between Boston road and Cauldwell avenue; on the south side of Teasdale place, between Third avenue and Cauldwell avenue; on the south side of Wendover avenue, between Park avenue and Washington avenue, and objections of Wm. H. Jackson, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors, under date of September 21, 1904.

Mr. Herbert G. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, objected to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses connected therewith.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for constructing receiving basin at the southwest corner of Third avenue and Brook avenue, with objections of Charles Palm, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, as owners, filed by Robert L. Luce, attorney in charge, and transcript of testimony introduced before the Board of Assessors by Mr. Luce, and communication of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated July 18, 1904, transmitting copy of letter of the Chief Engineer of the said borough in regard to the objections of the said railroad company, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of October 12, 1904.

The Board of Assessors reported that after taking testimony in the matter it had reduced the assessment on the railroad property from \$223.66 to \$65.

Mr. Herbert G. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, objected to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses connected therewith.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging and laying crosswalks in Minford place, from Jennings street to Boston road, and objections of Dennis Donohue, Alfred Ericson and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of October 12, 1904.

Mr. Herbert G. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, objected to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses connected therewith, and to the apportionment of the assessment upon the property of his clients.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging and paving One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, from Prospect avenue to Dawson street, with granite block pavement, and objections of Thomas F. Meinhardt and Eugene Bauer, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors under date of October 29, 1904.

Mr. Herbert G. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, objected to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses connected therewith.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for paving East One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, from Brook avenue to the Southern Boulevard, with granite block pavement, and objections of Charles Unangst and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors under date of October 29, 1904.

Mr. Herbert G. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, objected to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses connected therewith, and to the inequality in the amount charged against Lots Nos. 25 and 26 in Block 2566 and No. 43 in Block 2549.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for Paving Jackson avenue, from Westchester avenue to East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, with asphalt block pavement, and objections of John Schwoibenberg, Bradley L. Eaton and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of October 29, 1904.

Mr. Herbert G. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, objected to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses connected therewith.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for paving One Hundred and Forty-first street, from St. Ann's avenue to Cypress avenue, with granite block pavement, and laying crosswalks, and objections of the administrators of John J. Crane, deceased, filed by Charles H. Brush, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of October 29, 1904.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for paving with asphalt pavement One Hundred and Forty-second street, from Lenox avenue to Seventh avenue, and objections of Archibald Watt and Thomas Watt, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors under date of November 12, 1904.

Mr. Shaw was heard and objected to the charge of \$868.81, included in the assessment for curbing and receding, as this work was not authorized, and in any event could not be legally assessed upon the property, the work having been previously performed and paid for, which constitutes the present assessment for it a repaving.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curbstones, flagging the sidewalks, laying crosswalks, building approaches, and placing fences in Morris avenue, from the Grand Boulevard and Concourse to East One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, and objections filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, in behalf of Francis Kaesemeyer and Viola M. Russell, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of November 12, 1904.

Mr. Herbert G. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, objected to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses connected therewith, and to the failure of the Board of Assessors to award damages to the property of his clients by reason of change of grade.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curbstones, flagging the sidewalks, laying crosswalks, building approaches and placing fences in East One Hundred and Seventieth street, from Bristow street to Charlotte street, and objections of Christina A. Sproessig and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors, under date of November 12, 1904.

Mr. Herbert G. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, objected to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses incident thereto, and also to the failure of the Board of Assessors to award damages to the property represented by him, by reason of a change of grade.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for paving Cauldwell avenue, from East One Hundred and Sixty-first street to Westchester avenue, with asphalt block pavement, and objections of Andrew Gebelein and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors, under date of November 12, 1904.

Mr. Herbert G. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, objected to the excessive cost of the work and the expenses connected therewith and to the charge of \$1,097.98 for resetting old curb, which is unauthorized and cannot be assessed.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for paving Walton avenue, from East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to the bridge over the Port Morris Branch of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, and objections of John J. Astor, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors, under date of November 12, 1904.

Mr. Shaw was heard in opposition to the excessive expense for inspection and to the charge included in the assessment for curbing and receding, which was not authorized, and therefore cannot be legally assessed upon the property, as it constitutes a repaving.

After consideration, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for grading and paving with asphalt pavement, curbing and laying cement sidewalk, in Ashford street, between Jamaica avenue and Arlington avenue, and objections of John C. Schenck and S. R. Newman, filed by Frank E. Johnson, Jr., attorney, and of the Eagle Savings & Loan Company; also communication of the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Brooklyn, transmitting copy of a report made by John Middleton, Chief Engineer, upon the objections filed in said matter, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of November 12, 1904.

After consideration, no one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the objections filed were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

Hon. JOHN F. AHEARN, President, Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir—In accordance with section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I submit the following report of the business of this Department for the quarter ended June 30, 1904:

The following contracts were entered into: Four paving contracts, estimated cost, \$58,606.20; 6 sewer contracts, estimated cost, \$135,652.22; 5 regulating and grading contracts, estimated cost, \$30,448.85; 2 miscellaneous contracts, estimated cost, \$5,899.00; 2 special contracts, estimated cost, \$768.18, making 19 contracts entered into at a total estimated cost of \$231,374.45.

The following contracts were completed: Twenty-one paving contracts, cost, \$150,969.11; 15 contracts for sewers and receiving-basins, cost, \$118,124.70; 5 regulating and grading contracts, cost, \$11,111.27; 4 miscellaneous contracts, cost, \$20,335.80, making 45 contracts completed, at a total cost of \$300,540.88.

The principal items of work done under the contracts for regulating and grading, flagging, fencing and paving with macadam, were as follows: 13,015 cubic yards earth excavated, 24,252 cubic yards rock excavated, 24,826 square yards flagging furnished and laid, 21,000 square yards macadam pavement laid, 7,171 linear feet curb furnished and set, 1,000 cubic yards retaining wall built, 2,614 square feet bridge-stone furnished and laid, 37 linear feet fence built.

The following is the mileage of new pavements laid: Sheet asphalt, 1.99; block asphalt, .65; wood, .54; total, 3.18.

The total mileage of paved streets in the borough June 30, was 416.09.

The repair force took up and relaid 84,928 square yards of stone block pavement.

The following permits were issued: To construct vaults, 63; to repair vaults, 32; to place guy posts, 10; to place tar kettles, 142; to place boilers, 162; to erect banner poles, 11; to repair pavement, 7.

During the quarter 88,968 linear feet of electric main conduits and 3,957 linear feet of gas mains were laid, while 39,015 feet of gas mains were overhauled.

3,882 permits were issued for electric, gas, steam, water and pneumatic tube services and repairs.

7,212 permits were issued to lay, overhaul and to lay and repair electric, gas, steam and water mains, sewer pipes and services, and to construct and repair railways.

Under the supervision of the Bureau of Sewers 3,343 linear feet of sewer and 15 receiving basins were constructed, making a total of 506.85 miles of sewers, with 6,222 receiving basins in the borough. In addition to this, 3 alteration and improvement works, amounting to 1,247 linear feet, were undertaken, in connection with which 1 receiving basin was constructed. Work was also completed under 7 repair contracts, amounting to 4,263 feet.

During the quarter supplies have been furnished to and necessary repairs made in the Criminal Courts Building, the County Court-house, the City Hall, the Children's Court, the First District Municipal Court, the Harlem Court-house, the Fifty-fourth Street Court-house, the Jefferson Market Court Building, the Fourth District Municipal Court, the Fifth District Municipal Court, the Twelfth District Municipal Court, the Thirteenth District Municipal Court, the building No. 72 Elm street, the Chamberlain's office, the office of the Supervisor of the City Record, the office of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, the Bureau of Buildings, offices of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Comptroller's office, public comfort stations, City Paymaster's office, the New York County Jail, the Brown-stone Building, the Bureau of Highways, public markets and public baths.

Work is still in progress in erecting interior baths at Forty-first street and Ninth avenue, One Hundred and Ninth street, near Second avenue; Allen street, Rivington street, East Seventy-sixth street and East Eleventh street. The foundation for the West Sixtieth Street Bath has not yet been excavated, and the erection of the East Twenty-third Street Bath has not been begun.

The Superintendent of Public Baths and Comfort Stations points out that many serious defects exist in the construction of these baths "from the fact that the method of their plan and construction is left absolutely in the control of the architects, who too often have accepted theory as fact and have given more thought to beauty of design and expense of finish than to real utility, capacity and durability."

The Bureau of Incumbrances received and attended to 864 complaints, made 214 seizures and removals of obstructions, removed 272 loads of dirt and 64 fallen trees and dangerous stumps and posts; also issued 1,498 permits to place building material on streets, 299 permits to cross sidewalks with horses and carts, and 212 permits to erect temporary sheds over sidewalks.

STATEMENT NO. 2—REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER LOOMIS.

July 26, 1904.

Hon. MATTHEW F. DONOHUE, Superintendent of Sewers:

Dear Sir—In compliance with your instructions I herewith hañd you a report of the work done and in course of construction, under my supervision, for the quarter ending June 30, 1904, with a statement of work done by Mechanics and Laborers.

The present total length of the sewerage system in the Borough of Manhattan is 2,676,175 feet, or 506.85 miles, with 6,222 receiving basins, making the amount done and accepted during the quarter 3,343 linear feet of sewer and 15 receiving basins. In addition, three alteration and improvement works, amounting to 1,247 feet, 1 receiving basin and 7 repair contracts, amounting to 4,263 feet, were completed. As these alteration and repair works do not increase the mileage of sewers they are not included in the same.

The following is a list of all the works completed:

Sewer in One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, between Broadway and Amsterdam avenue.

Sewer in Avenue A, west side, between Seventh and Eighth streets.

Sewer in Jumel place, between One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street and Edgecombe road.

Sewer in Wicker place, from end of present sewer to Van Corlear place, and in Van Corlear place, etc.

Alterations, etc., to sewer in Pine street, between William street and Broadway.

Alterations, etc., to sewer in Fifty-first street, between Park and Fifth avenues.

Repairs to sewer in Stanton street, between Mangin and Ridge streets.

Repairs to sewer in Pearl street, between Elm street and Broadway.

Repairs to sewer in Duane street, between Elm street and Broadway.

Repairs to sewer in Twenty-fifth street, between Fourth and Madison avenues, and to connections in Madison avenue.

Repairs to sewer in Lenox avenue, west side, between One Hundred and Forty-second and One Hundred and Forty-fifth streets.

Repairs to box sewer at foot of Forty-second street and North river.

Repairs to box sewer under Pier (new) 40, North river.

Receiving basins on the northeast corner of Washington and West Twelfth streets; on the northeast corner of Fifty-seventh street and Madison avenue; on the southwest corner of Seventy-ninth street and Lexington avenue; on the northwest

corner of Eightieth street and Columbus avenue; on the northwest corner of One Hundred and Eighteenth street and Avenue St. Nicholas; on the northwest corner of Thirty-fifth street and Park avenue.

Receiving basins on the southeast corner of Eighty-seventh street and First avenue; southwest corner of One Hundredth street and Park avenue, and southeast corner of One Hundred and Twenty-third street and Seventh avenue.

Receiving basins on the southwest corner of One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street and Lexington avenue; southwest corner of Fifty-third street and Avenue A, and alterations, etc., south side of One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, near westerly house line of Lenox avenue.

There are now in active progress 17 contracts payable out of "Street Improvement Fund," involving an expenditure of about \$350,000, some of which are of considerable importance, notably the "alteration and improvement in Broad street, between East river and Wall street," and the adjoining streets, the outlet at Twenty-first street and East river, and outlet at Ninety-sixth street, between Hudson river and West End avenue.

There are seven (7) repair works, involving an expenditure of about \$90,000, still in course of construction, most of which are nearing completion.

A detailed statement of all the above works appears in schedule annexed.

The following are contemplated, and for some of them surveys have been made, and the work will be put under contract as soon as the necessary legal authorization is obtained.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

Hon. WILLIAM DALTON, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—In accordance with your instructions I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending June 30, 1904.

Criminal Court Building.

The usual orders were issued for Janitor's and Engineer's supplies. Considerable work was performed during the quarter for the Court of General Sessions and new furniture was furnished in the several chambers of the Justices, as follows: 3 revolving chairs, 2 roll-top desks, 2 roll-top desks, 6 chairs, 6 chairs, 1 flat-top desk, 6 Stenographer's chairs, 136 chairs, 1 table, 1 leather upholstered couch, 2 revolving bookcases, 6 revolving desk chairs for use of the Judges, 6 revolving desk chairs for use of the Clerks, 1 high standing desk, 2 42-inch flat-top desks, quartered oak; 1 36-inch flat-top desk, quartered oak; 1 5-foot table, 1 typewriter desk, 1 ratchet head, tufted leather couch, 1 Turkish rocker, 4 oak leather seat and back arm chairs, 1 leather revolving chair, all upholstered in S. A. hair; 1 5-foot flat-top quartered oak desk, 1 large axminster rug, 1 Globe-Wernicke filing cabinet for documents, 3 small pieces of carpet for use under desks, 1 mahogany clothes tree, 1 umbrella jar, 3 36-inch wilton rugs, 63½ yards wilton velvet carpet made into a rug, 30½ yards wilton velvet carpet made into rug, laid with the best paper lining; 2 single door wardrobes, 4 oblong tables, 1 large witness chair, without arms; 4 metal umbrella stands, 1 rug for Clerk's room, 1 rug for Deputy Clerk's room, 1 rug for Justices' chambers, 1 desk with polished top, 1 arm chair, 1 revolving bookcase, 4 chairs and 1 revolving chair, 256 yards of A grade plain linoleum laid in Clerk's room, 4 sectional bookcases, revolving bookcases, 1 office screen, 1 costume, 1 umbrella jar, 2 Oriental rugs, 1 large rug, 2 small rugs, 1 costume and 1 umbrella jar, 1 36-inch wilton rug, 1 revolving chair, 1 small mahogany chair, 1 flat-top desk with closed back, swelled front with pedestals, brass drawer pulls, mahogany, width 5 feet 6 inches, made to order as per sketch; 1 mahogany bookcase, art nouveau design, with 8-foot Colonial glass doors set in frames, one section fitted as a wardrobe, made to order as per sketch; 1 upholstered seat and back mahogany frame revolving chair, 1 mahogany side chair, 1 mahogany clothes tree, 1 decorated umbrella jar, 68½ yards 5-frame body brussels carpet, 98½ yards wilton velvet carpet, made, laid and lined, and 1 9 by 6 Smyrna rug, and 1 36 by 72 Smyrna rug, and 1 18 by 34 Smyrna rug; 1 club chair, 1 mahogany chair, 1 leather couch, 1 revolving chair, mahogany; 2 chairs, mahogany; 1 mahogany desk, 1 revolving book stand, 1 hat tree, 1 club chair, 1 mahogany chair, 1 leather couch, 2 mahogany chairs and 1 mahogany revolving chair, 1 mahogany desk, 1 revolving book stand, 1 hat tree, 356 yards of best quality body brussels carpet, made, laid and lined, in the library; 172 yards best quality Bigelow's body brussels carpet, made, laid and lined, in Part I, 172 yards best quality Bigelow's body brussels carpet, made, laid and lined, in Part II; 92 yards wilton velvet carpet, made, laid and lined; 46 yards, made, laid and lined; 46 yards of carpet, wilton velvet, made, laid and lined; 23 yards wilton velvet carpet in Clerk's room, 28 yards in the Clerk's office, 4 sectional bookcases, 5 sections each, 11¼ inches; 1 mahogany table, 1 costume, 3 art nouveau arm chairs to match Davenport, made to order in accordance with sketch; one Davenport sofa, art nouveau design, mahogany columns, and rail upholstered in green leather, studded with metal nails, made in accordance with sketch; 12 dozen picture dusters.

All of the above furniture was purchased in accordance with resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, appropriating \$12,000 from the Revenue Bond Fund for purchasing office furniture for the General and Special Sessions Court-rooms, Chambers and Offices in the Criminal Court Building. The furniture was selected by the Justices of the various courts.

Four 15 by 25 American flags and about 30 awnings were furnished and put up. One dozen water coolers, wood jacketed and porcelain lined, of about 6 gallons' capacity; 3 dozen brass cuspidors, also one-half dozen carpet sweepers and 3 dozen fibre cuspidors, 6 step ladders of various sizes and 12 water coolers were furnished for use of the offices in the above-mentioned building. Orders were issued monthly to make

repairs to the plumbing, steam and gas systems in the above building. The furnace in one of the boilers was relined and rebuilt, where necessary. Electric lights were installed in the chambers of Justices Foster and Cowing; also repairs made to the electric bells, and one arc light placed over elevator shaft. The electric bells in the District Attorney's office were put in first-class condition, and new lights installed, as directed, in the office of the Clerk of the Court of General Sessions. Two exhaust fans were repaired and put in first-class condition; two 25-foot lengths of 1-inch, 4-ply wire wound steam hose with connections, also two 25-foot lengths of 3/4-inch, 4-ply wire wound hose with connections, and one barrel of disinfectant and one barrel of exterminator furnished. Also 200 feet of 1 1/2-inch hose for use of the Janitor. The walls, ceilings and woodwork of the private halls and the large room off the Grand Jury room, Judges' toilet-rooms, two rooms on the second mezzanine floor cleaned off, prepared, painted and varnished. Necessary lettering performed, as directed.

Elevators—The following repairs were made to the elevators: Two operating cables furnished and put in place on elevators 1, 2, 3 and 4, and blocks put in to protect operating rope on No. 2, and repairs made to the automatic cut-off on elevator No. 6. Repairs were also made to the elevator gates where necessary, and two new cast-iron posts furnished and set in the iron fence on the outside of the building.

The carpet in the Judges' library was taken up, cleaned and relaid in the four jury rooms on the third floor. The woodwork in the halls and corridors was cleaned off, bleached with acid where stained, refilled with wood filler where necessary; the window sashes painted and grained, and woodwork varnished throughout. Several new electric lights were installed in various offices of the District Attorney and Courts of General and Special Sessions. Defective steam connections were taken out and replaced with new ones. Ceiling and side walls in Magistrates' court room were cleaned and painted with cold water paint, and two coats of lead and oil.

The ceilings and walls in the Chief Clerk's private office were plastered, prepared with one coat of lead and oil paint and painted with one coat of cold water paint with decorated frieze at top. All the woodwork throughout the Chief Clerk's and Assistant Clerk's offices was cleaned off with ammonia; the base and window sills where water soaked and blackened by exposure was steel scraped to the bare wood, and filled and varnished with two coats of the best varnish. The steam-pipes and radiators were bronzed, the window glass in toilet rooms painted, also the window glass in jury room of Part I, Criminal Bench, Supreme Court. All the elevators were lettered as directed, also door of Janitor's office.

County Court-house.

The usual orders for cleaning and Engineer's supplies were issued. Order was also issued to remove cases and partition from the west side of the first mezzanine floor and set same up, and make the necessary alterations required on the east side; file cases for use of the Assignment Bureau were constructed in the northeast room on the first mezzanine floor. The usual orders for steam supply were also issued. Hot water heater was put in basement, and leaks in steam-pipe and hot-air ducts were repaired. Three hundred feet of hose with necessary couplings was furnished. Records, books, furniture, etc., from the old Court of Common Pleas were removed as directed. The necessary labor and material was also furnished to overhaul the safety gates and latches as directed, also to pack the south elevator, and adjust the hand ropes on both the north and south elevators. About thirty electric fans were repaired and put in first class condition in the Surrogates' and County Clerk's offices. Order was also issued to furnish the necessary labor, material, hoisting gear, blocks, tackles, rollers, etc., to do the necessary cartages in the building as was required and ordered during the month of April.

City Hall.

The necessary orders for the supply of steam were issued, together with the usual Engineer's and Janitor's supplies. The services of cab and driver during the auction sale of buildings and parts of buildings on May 23 and other days during the continuance of sale were furnished; also one team, truck and driver. Orders were also issued for the weekly supply of towels during the quarter. One Smith-Premier typewriter was put in first-class condition in the Borough President's office; also one revolving quartered oak chair with leather upholstered seat furnished. Two 16-inch electric fans were furnished and installed in the Mayor's and Borough President's offices, as directed; also twelve electric fans in the Marriage Bureau were repaired and put in first-class condition, and one in the motor room. One metal file case was furnished for use in the office of the Borough President. Order was issued for the necessary supply of current to operate motor pump and fans during the year; also order to rewind and put in complete working order pump in above building. Seven awnings were furnished and erected as directed.

Children's Court.

Order was issued to furnish the necessary labor and material to construct two new gates at the entrance to the stable yard of the above court as directed. Repairs were made to wainscoting and slate walls as directed.

First District Municipal Court.

Three awnings were furnished and hung up complete as directed; also one barrel of dark disinfectant furnished.

Harlem Court-house.

Order was issued to furnish the necessary labor and material to put in hot water tank complete, 3 feet by 6 feet 1/4 inch, containing about 50 feet of 1 1/4-inch brass coil with necessary connections; also to alter drip tanks and make repairs to leaks as directed. Four new awnings were furnished and hung as directed, and old frames recovered with the best Venetian awning covering. One barrel of insect exterminator and one barrel of disinfectant were furnished.

Fifty-fourth Street Court-house.

The usual Engineer's and Janitor's supplies were furnished. Twenty-two awnings, made of the best Venetian awning cloth, were furnished and hung as directed. Order was issued to cut out all defective tin on the main roof and extension, and make repairs to leaders, replacing all old tin with new of the best quality, painted bottom and top. 100 feet of hose with nozzle complete was furnished.

Jefferson Market Court Building.

One hundred feet of 3/4-inch hose, as selected, was furnished. About 37 shades made of the best shade cloth were furnished and hung; also all old shades overhauled and new parts furnished where necessary. New leaders was placed under the sidewalk, repairs made to Croton pipes and main in street, and new toilet put in on first floor; also cistern, etc., on first floor repaired where directed.

Fourth District Municipal Court.

Two 6-gallon water coolers and stands were furnished.

Fifth District Municipal Court.

One water-closet of standard type was installed, with necessary connections for use of the Justices. One barrel of insect exterminator and one barrel of disinfectant were furnished.

Twelfth District Municipal Court.

Twelve No. 36 settees, 10 feet long, were furnished. One No. 6 Remington typewriter was furnished, together with one table and cover. Thirteen awnings made of the best Venetian awning strip were furnished and hung complete. One No. 17 desk and one No. 405 table were also furnished. One metal document file case was furnished to the above court; also one to the Thirteenth District Municipal Court, of the same design and pattern as those already in use in these courts, and to match the same as nearly as possible. Order was issued to erect wire railing in front of Judge's platform, as directed.

Thirteenth District Municipal Court.

Twelve No. 20 settees, 10 feet long, were furnished; also necessary labor, teams, etc., were furnished to remove all the books, documents, furniture, etc., from No. 200 East Broadway to No. 264 Madison street, as directed. The necessary labor and material to do such plumbing in making connections as directed were furnished.

Building No. 72 Elm Street.

Order was issued to furnish the necessary labor and material to erect stairway in the above building and remove old one as directed.

Chamberlain's Office.

About ten awnings were furnished and erected on windows as directed.

Supervisor of the City Record.

Necessary labor and material were furnished to erect and place in position 120 square feet of wire railing; also six swinging gates, with six locks, and ash hand rail on top, fitted and varnished.

Municipal Civil Service Commission.

Three 16-inch electric fans were furnished and installed in the above office as directed.

Bureau of Buildings.

One dozen roller towels, No. 2, 3 yards long, were furnished; also the necessary labor and material were furnished to make repairs to awnings on the third, fourth and sixth floors, as directed.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The following articles were furnished and delivered for use of the above Board: 1 roll top desk, 1 office chair, 3 arm chairs, 1 wardrobe, 1 hat tree, 3 Smyrna rugs, 1 Spartan rug, 1 velvet rug, 1 document file unit, 1 L. D. base No. 130L, 4 G. D. units No. 130K, 1 X top No. 130L. Order was also issued to furnish the necessary labor and material and cartages to remove the office of the Chief Engineer of the above Board from the City Hall building to No. 277 Broadway, eighth floor, as directed.

Comptroller's Office.

Necessary labor and material were furnished to erect about 41 awnings, made of the best awning strip. Order was issued to take up, clean and relay 124 yards of Wilton velvet carpet in the office, as directed. One flat-top desk, No. 19, was also furnished for use in the Deputy Comptroller's office.

Public Comfort Stations.

The usual orders for steam and Janitor's supplies were issued; also current to operate motor for fans during the year 1904. Sidewalk was laid around station at Sheriff and Delancey streets, as directed.

City Paymaster's Office.

Orders were issued to install about eight nickel-plated desk telephone sets, and make provision for ten, of the intercommunicating, non-interference type, of the best manufacture, and guaranteed for one year. Orders for the usual Janitor's and Engineer's supplies and steam were also issued.

New York County Jail.

The usual cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished; also 300 yards of toweling No. 2, and articles of tinware, etc. One dozen best wood chairs No. 753 were also furnished. Necessary labor and material was furnished to make repairs to marble slabs, water-pipes, drains, gas leaks, etc., where necessary and as directed. Scrub brushes, whitewash brushes, window brushes, floor brooms, clothes baskets, etc., were also furnished.

Brown Stone Building.

The usual Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished. Order was issued to make repairs to the pump in above building. Same was repacked and two new piston rods for stuffing box furnished. Awnings were also furnished and set up throughout the building as directed, same being made of the best Venetian shade cloth.

Bureau of Highways, Room 1606.

One pigeonhole case, No. 272, for top of desk, was furnished for use in the above room; one flat-top desk, No. 31; also one chair, No. 42, leather seat; one desk, No. 31, and chair, No. 4255. Two awnings of the best Venetian awning strip were erected. Necessary labor and material were furnished to erect 13 feet 6 inches of office railing, with one swinging gate, spring hinges and wood hand rail in Room 1611. Order was issued to furnish the necessary labor and material to make connections with the new street main, and install one water-closet with necessary appurtenances, etc., for use of the employees in the corporation yard at Fifty-sixth street; also the fence around yard was repaired and braced as directed. A shed was also constructed as a continuance to the shed now being built extending into the Incumbance Yard, to be used as a storehouse for material, furniture, etc. Repairs were also made to the fencing at the corporation yard at Sixtieth street and East river; new gates were furnished, with the necessary hardware, etc. A shed was also erected in the storage yard at Eighth street on the easterly side, as directed. The necessary labor and material were furnished to erect an office for the Caretakers at the Eightieth street yard, about 7 feet wide and 7 feet high, with shelves inside, glazed windows and doors in front, and roof covered with tar paper.

The Markets.

Fulton Market—Order was issued for the necessary labor and material to construct and erect three galvanized iron skylights, with all necessary glass, etc., over the roof; also to clear and repair pipes and cesspools, put in new floor drains, pump out water and repair waste and Croton pipes under the floor. One barrel of disinfectant was furnished. About 16,000 feet of roof was painted with Prince's metallic paint and linseed oil. Labor and material were also furnished to do the necessary shoring and strengthen the foundations under partitions, etc., on the Fulton and Water street sides, as directed; new flooring of 2-inch spruce was laid where necessary, and also necessary joists and sleepers.

Washington Market—The necessary cleaning supplies were furnished. Labor and material were furnished to repair skylight, where directed, and make all the glass secure.

West Washington Market—Order was issued to cut out defective tin over stands No. 16 to 24 Bloomfield street and replace same with new tin of best quality, painted bottom and top. Repairs were also made to shed over sidewalk, and new gutter put in where required, as directed. One barrel of disinfectant was furnished; also six dozen street brooms, No. 10, with handles.

Jefferson Market—Order was issued for one barrel of disinfectant; also for necessary labor and material to remove concrete sidewalk, in order to enable plumber to make the necessary repairs to leaders, etc. The sidewalk was restored, and repairs made to the paving, as directed.

The Baths.

Order was issued for one rug to be placed in the office of the Superintendent of Baths. Storage quarters were furnished for use of the free floating baths during the quarter. Necessary labor and material were furnished to make repairs and alterations to the carpentering on the free floating baths during May, 1904, as directed; also during the month of June. Twelve galvanized iron canal pumps, spiral make, 9 feet long, were also furnished; also rods, leather plungers, tapering leads, etc. Wharfage was also furnished at Corlears and East Thirty-first streets, to be used during the bathing season. Labor and material were also furnished to make connections to the baths for the lighting system, fixtures repaired where necessary, and new parts furnished, and such repairs made to the toilets as directed. Labor and material, tugs, etc., were also furnished to tow the fourteen baths from winter quarters in South Brooklyn to their respective berths on the North and East rivers, as directed. Twenty-four awnings complete were erected on the baths, which were made of the best 10-ounce awning duck; 1,300 feet of 6-inch and 2,000 feet of 3-inch bolt rope was also furnished. Supply of brooms, wooden seat chairs, etc., were also furnished for use on the baths. Labor and material were also furnished to do the

necessary roofing work, etc., as per specifications on file in the office of the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices. Repairs were also made to the pumps on baths, as directed.

One Hundred and Ninth Street Bath-house—Order was issued to furnish the necessary labor and material to set a steel pan in the pit under sidewalk, as directed, in order to control the water pressure; 2 slop sinks and 2 basins on the first floor and 1 slop sink and 1 basin on the second floor were also completed. Necessary floor drains were set on the first and second floors, as directed.

West Forty-first Street Bath—Orders were issued for the necessary supply of cleaning and Engineer's materials, ½ dozen ash cans, No. 245; tools, 3 settees, No. 36; 18 settees, 8 feet long, No. 36; 2 wardrobes, No. 55, and ½ dozen chairs, No. 22; 2 slop sinks and 2 basins were placed on first floor, and 1 slop sink and 1 basin on second floor.

Rivington Street Bath—Orders were issued for the usual cleaning and Engineer's supplies; 4 dozen clap valves and four springs for same were furnished. Labor and material were also furnished to do the necessary painting work, etc., as directed, and as per specifications; 19 benches and 2 chairs were also cleaned off, sandpapered and varnished, as directed; return pipes from gegenstrom heaters in the wells were put in, suction pipe in boiler changed, and 2 steam gauges repaired, as directed. Labor and material were also furnished to renew and change the feed-water line from heater to boilers, and all work incidental thereto.

Allen Street Bath-house—Necessary labor and materials were furnished to excavate sheath pile, shore the wall and do all necessary underpinning of the northerly wall, the wall being carried down to the foundation of the proposed new public building adjoining; 2 slop sinks and 2 basins were placed on the first floor, and 1 slop sink and 1 basin on the second floor. Necessary labor and material were also furnished to set brass floor drains on the main and second floors, as directed.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

Supplies have been furnished from the store-room connected with the Bureau for use of the Janitors of the various public buildings, from time to time. The order for the use of horse and wagon for the Superintendent of the Bureau was renewed, and the following supplies were distributed as required: Coal and wood for heating, etc.; ice, brooms, soap, waste paper baskets, sapolio, sponges, mop handles, feather dusters, scrubbing brushes, ash cans, etc., for use of the various public buildings and offices in the care of this Bureau. Among the many items of repairs made to the different public buildings, courts and offices hereinbefore specifically mentioned, are plumbing, steam fitting, carpentering, roofing, plastering, mason work, painting, electrical work, repairs to safes, furniture, etc., and for the use of Mechanics in the employ of this Bureau, a supply of lumber, hardware, paints, varnish, etc., was furnished.

I also hand you herewith report of the Superintendent of Public Baths and Comfort Stations.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC BATHS AND COMFORT STATIONS.

City of New York—President of the Borough of Manhattan,
Offices of the Commissioner of Public Works,
Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices,

New York, July 29, 1904.

Hon. WILLIAM H. WALKER, Superintendent, Public Buildings and Offices:

Dear Sir—Herewith please find quarterly report of the Public Baths and Comfort Stations for the quarter ending June 30, 1904.

Floating Baths.

The floating baths have wintered at the foot of Twenty-third street, Brooklyn, in good condition, without accident or mishap of any kind. The usual repairs, such as painting, caulking pontoons, carpenter work, etc., are completed, and the bath buildings are all in first-class condition for the season's work. Eleven of them are in commission at this date in the following locations: Battery, East Ninth street, West Fifty-first street, West Eighty-second street, East Third street, West Thirty-fifth street, East One Hundredth street, West Ninety-seventh street, East One Hundred and Twelfth street, Corlears street, East Twenty-fourth street, and were placed in the order named above. We were very greatly hindered at the beginning of the season from lack of sufficient male attendants to properly man and care for the baths, which is at the present writing to a large extent remedied.

Up to this time but one complaint has been received, which, upon investigation, was found to be without cause. This is a good showing and speaks well for the Attendants, many of whom are new to the business.

Rivington Street Bath.

This building has been painted inside, and much other necessary work done, which when carried to completion, will place this bath in better condition than ever before. But for one or two exceptions the morals and discipline at this bath are excellent. The number of bathers for the past quarter have been 99,864 males, 55,253 females; total, 155,117.

Comfort Stations, Borough Hall Park.

This station is certainly filling a great necessity in its neighborhood, and is patronized by constantly increasing numbers. Nothing has been done toward remedying the settlement of the men's entrance, which is continually getting worse, and, in my judgment, is a menace to the safety of those using it. The ventilation leaves much to be desired in that respect; though the fresh-air inlet fan has been repeatedly repaired at considerable expense it fails to accomplish the purpose.

The new comfort station nearing completion at One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Park avenue is practically completed; the one at Battery place is two-thirds completed; Delancey street and Sheriff, three-quarters completed, and all should soon be open for use. Those at Greeley Square, Chatham Square, Long Acre Square and Hanover Square are progressing slowly, being underground and difficult of construction. If it were possible, these buildings should be over, instead of under ground.

New Interior Baths.

Are in course of construction at locations previously reported. The one at Forty-first street, near Ninth avenue, has been very near completion for the past six months, but still remains unfinished. This bath should have been in use by the City for the past year. One Hundred and Ninth street, near Second avenue, is dragging along. Allen street, near Rivington street, is making fair progress. West Eightieth street is not yet excavated for. East Seventy-eighth street and East Eleventh street are progressing rapidly. East Twenty-third street bath not yet commenced. I wish most emphatically to express the opinion that many serious defects exist in the construction of these baths, from the fact that the method of their plan and construction is left absolutely in the control of the Architects, who too often have accepted theory as fact, and have given more thought to beauty of design and expense of finish than to real utility, capacity and durability. This condition should not prevail in the baths contemplated. While no mean or miserly economy should be advocated or allowed, the City should get more and better for the money expended. These interior baths which are being built are practically experimental. They are meant to encourage and facilitate cleanliness and healthfulness among our poor classes, and should be built with that view, and not in a style which makes them elaborate and expensive luxuries.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
