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PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD HELD IN NO. 320 BROADWAY, ON THURSDAY, THE 31ST OF JANUARY, 1907.

There were present—Alexander E. Orr, President, presiding; John H. Starin, Vice-President; Mayor George B. McClellan, Comptroller Herman A. Metz, and Commissioners Woodbury Langdon and Charles Stewart Smith.

Commissioner Jesup sent word, asking to be excused on account of illness.

George L. Rives and Albert B. Boardman, Counsel; George S. Rice, Chief Engineer, and Alfred Craven, Deputy Chief Engineer, also were present.

The minutes of the meeting of January 17, were read, and it was moved that they be approved.

Ayes—The President, Vice-President, Mayor, Comptroller and Commissioners Langdon and Smith.

Nays—None.

Carried.

Joseph H. Choate addressed the Board in advocacy of an express station on the proposed Lexington avenue subway at Fourteenth street, giving ten reasons why the station should be located there instead of at Twenty-third street.

Communication of the Blackwell's Island Bridge Protective Association, advocating an express station at Fifty-ninth street on the proposed Lexington avenue route, was presented.

Eugene A. Philbin presented the following petitions of the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company:

The application of the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company for the right to make excavations from the surface of Thirty-second street and Thirty-third street westerly to Sixth avenue, and in the vicinity thereof on the routes of said railway, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

To the Honorable the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York:

The petition of the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company respectfully shows:

First—That a certificate was duly granted by your Honorable Board on or about the 9th day of October, 1902, to your petitioner, wherein and whereby, under the terms and conditions therein specified, authority was duly granted to your petitioner, among other things, to lay down, construct and operate a railway on the routes therein specified, including the routes under the streets hereinafter referred to.

Second—That said certificate, and more particularly clause VI. thereof, provided as follows:

"The method of construction shall be generally as follows: The tunnels under rivers, streets and avenues shall be constructed in whole or part of masonry or of steel or of iron or any two or more thereof combined. Excavations necessary in the course of construction by the tunnel company shall be made without disturbing the surface of the streets or avenues, except the portions of Thirty-first street, Seventh avenue, Thirty-third street, Eighth avenue and Ninth avenue immediately in front of the terminal station aforesaid, and except in Queens Borough, provided, however, that the Board may, wherever elsewhere local conditions make excavations from the street necessary for efficient construction, grant the right to make such excavations from the surface, subject to such conditions as the Board may prescribe."

Third—That under and pursuant to said certificate your petitioner duly entered into a contract in writing on or about the 29th day of May, 1905, with the United Engineering and Contracting Company, a corporation, for the construction of sections designated "D" and "F" of your petitioner's said railway, including the routes under Thirty-second and Thirty-third streets, from about First avenue and the East river, in the Borough of Manhattan, extending thence westward under private property and streets to points in Thirty-third and Thirty-second streets, between Sixth and Seventh avenues, in said Borough, including the points in said streets hereinafter referred to.

Fourth—That as your petitioner is informed and verily believes, under said contract, the United Engineering and Contracting Company has made the excavations for said routes under said streets, from about First avenue and the East river aforesaid, westward to Fifth avenue, in said Borough, excepting the short distance under Thirty-second street.

Fifth—That as your petitioner is informed and verily believes, local conditions at the following places on the routes of said railway make excavations from the surface of the streets necessary for efficient construction, and for the safety and security of the said streets and the buildings and structures abutting thereon, viz:

1. On Thirty-third street, from a point three hundred (300) feet, more or less, west of the west line of Sixth avenue eastward, a distance of thirty (30) feet, more or less, depending upon the conditions as developed in the advancement of the work, but not to exceed in any event three hundred (300) feet.

2. On Thirty-second street, from a point five hundred and fifty (550) feet, more or less, west from the west line of Sixth avenue eastward, a distance of thirty (30) feet, more or less, depending upon the conditions as developed in the advancement of the work, but not to exceed in any event seven hundred and fifty (750) feet.

Sixth—That your petitioner respectfully begs leave to submit such affidavits or other proof as your Honorable Board may deem proper in support of said application. Wherefore, your petitioner prays that the right be granted to your petitioner, its agents and contractors, to make excavations from the surface of said streets as aforesaid, and for such other and further relief as may be just and proper.

To the Honorable the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York:

The petition of the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company respectfully shows:

First—That a certificate was duly granted by your Honorable Board on or about the ninth day of October, 1902, to your petitioner, wherein and whereby, under the terms and conditions therein specified, authority was duly granted to your petitioner, among other things, to lay down, construct and operate a railway on the routes therein specified, including the routes under the streets hereinafter referred to.

Second—That said certificate, and more particularly Clause VI. thereof, provided as follows:

"The method of construction shall be generally as follows: The tunnels under rivers, streets and avenues shall be constructed in whole or part of masonry or of steel or of iron, or any two or more thereof combined. Excavations necessary in the course of construction by the Tunnel Company shall be made without disturbing the surface of the streets or avenues, except the portions of Thirty-first street, Seventh avenue, Thirty-third street, Eighth avenue and Ninth avenue immediately in front of the terminal station aforesaid, and except in Queens Borough; provided, however, that the Board may, wherever elsewhere local conditions make excavations from the surface necessary for efficient construction, grant the right to make such excavations from the surface, subject to such conditions as the Board may prescribe."

Third—That under and pursuant to said certificate your petitioner duly entered into a contract in writing, on or about the 29th day of May, 1905, with the United Engineering and Contracting Company, a corporation, for the construction of sections designated "D" and "F" of your petitioner's said railway, including the routes under Thirty-second and Thirty-third streets, from about First avenue and the East river in the Borough of Manhattan, extending thence westward under private property and streets to points in Thirty-third and Thirty-second streets, between Sixth and Seventh avenues, in said Borough, including the points in said streets hereinafter referred to.

Fourth—That as your petitioner is informed and verily believes, under said contract the United Engineering and Contracting Company has made the excavations for said routes under said streets, from about First avenue and the East river aforesaid westward to Fifth avenue in said Borough, excepting the short distance under Thirty-second street.

Fifth—That, as your petitioner is informed and verily believes, local conditions at the following places on the routes of said railway make excavations from the surface of the streets necessary for efficient construction, and for the safety and security of the said streets and the buildings and structures abutting thereon, viz:

1. On Thirty-third street, from the west line of Fifth avenue westward a distance of four hundred and fifty (450) feet, more or less, depending upon the conditions as developed in the advancement of the work, but not to exceed, in any event, six hundred (600) feet.

2. On Thirty-second street, from a point two hundred (200) feet, more or less, west of the west line of Madison avenue westward a distance of five hundred (500) feet, more or less, depending upon the conditions as developed in the advancement of the work, but not to exceed in any event six hundred and fifty (650) feet.

Sixth—That your petitioner respectfully begs leave to submit such affidavits or other proof as your Honorable Board may deem proper in support of said application. Wherefore your petitioner prays that the right be granted to your petitioner, its agents and contractors, to make excavations from the surface of said streets as aforesaid, and for such other and further relief as may be just and proper.

Mr. Philbin explained to the Board the conditions which necessitated the excavations from the surface.

Charles DeHart Brower, in behalf of Thomas Diamond, a property owner in Thirty-third street, and Mr. Samuels, representing Coudert Brothers, attorneys for the owner of property at Nos. 158 and 160 West Thirty-second street, opposed the petition for the right to make excavations from the surface of Thirty-second and Thirty-third streets west of Sixth avenue.

A. N. Hand, representing property owners in Thirty-third street, also appeared in opposition.

On motion, the matter was referred to the Chief Engineer for investigation and report, and also to counsel as to the power of the Board in the premises.

Communication and resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment were read as follows:

GENTLEMEN—I transmit herewith certified copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment January 25, 1907, relative to the communication dated January 8, 1907, from your Board, pertaining to the construction of a system of subways in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, and connecting the Brooklyn, Williamsburg and Manhattan Bridges.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York:

Whereas, The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners has, under date of January 8, 1907, submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a plan for a system of subways in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn connecting the Brooklyn, Williamsburg and Manhattan Bridges, and has, in said communication, proposed, with the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to contract only for the construction of this system of subways so that it shall be strictly under the control of the City, the question of a lease to a future date; be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the plan outlined in said communication of contracting for construction only, with the recommendation that such a contract be entered into at the earliest possible date; and be it further

Resolved, That, in view of the discontinuing and closing of the extension of Bedford avenue, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment suggest to the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners that the proposed loop in the Borough of Brooklyn be extended up Broadway and Lafayette avenue to their intersection, and, in view of the disapproval of the William street spur by the Commission appointed by the Court to report upon Route No. 9, as laid out by the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that the said spur down William street be omitted from the plan submitted with the communication of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners of January 8, 1907, the entire line to be of four tracks throughout, with the necessary spurs for connections and future extensions.

A true copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment January 25, 1907.

The Comptroller moved the following resolution:

Resolved, That the portions of Subway Route No. 9 connecting the Manhattan terminals of the Williamsburg and Brooklyn bridges should be a four-track subway, and should be separately contracted for and be built with all possible speed, and that the same be done by the City and to remain under the full control of the City.

Resolved, That said subway route, when completed, should not be restricted to any one company or system, but that any passenger transportation line, under proper terms of compensation, be entitled to the use of same. And, also, that, in view of the urgent need of relief, the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, under proper terms and proper restrictions, be allowed to operate its elevated rolling stock such as it now has, through the subway connection between the bridges on completion.

The President moved the following substitute, which was seconded by the Mayor:

Resolved, That the portions of Subway Route No. 9, connecting the Manhattan terminals of the Williamsburg and Brooklyn bridges, should be a four-track subway and should be separately contracted for and be built with all possible speed, and that the same be done by the City and to remain under the full control of the City.

Resolved, That said subway route, when completed, should not be restricted to any one company or system, but that any passenger transportation line, under proper terms of compensation, be entitled to the use of same.

Ayes—The President, Vice-President, Mayor, Comptroller and Commissioners Langdon and Smith.

Nays—None.

Carried.

The Mayor moved the following resolution, which was seconded by Commissioner Smith:

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed, consisting of the President and Comptroller, to confer with the President of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company as to the form of cars to be employed in the proposed Brooklyn-Manhattan subway loop, when completed, in case that company becomes a successful bidder for the contract to operate the same.

Ayes—The President, Vice-President, Mayor, Comptroller and Commissioners Langdon and Smith.

Nays—None.

Carried.

On motion, the Mayor was added to the above Committee.

Mr. Rives reported that the first draft of the contract for a portion of the proposed Brooklyn-Manhattan subway loop in Manhattan Borough would be ready for the consideration of the Committee on Contracts almost immediately, and that detailed plans were also nearly ready. It was decided to have a meeting of the Committee on the 5th of February.

The following resolution was moved:

Resolved, That the officers of this Board be and they hereby are authorized to execute agreement in form substantially as follows:

BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK TO
HUDSON AND MANHATTAN RAILROAD COMPANY.

Certificate Modifying Terms of Certificate to New York and Jersey Railroad Company,
Dated February 2, 1905.

The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York does hereby certify as follows:

Whereas, The New York and Jersey Railroad Company (which is hereinafter called the Tunnel Company) was a railroad corporation duly incorporated under the laws of the State of New York for the purpose (among other things) of constructing and operating a tunnel railroad in The City of New York (which city is hereinafter called The City) to be connected with a railroad or railroads within the State of New Jersey and thereby forming a continuous line for the carriage of passengers and property between a point or points within, and a point or points without the City; and

Whereas, The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York (which is hereinafter called the Board), by a certificate dated the 2d day of February, 1905, did grant to the Tunnel Company the right and franchise to extend its road (which said road had been theretofore duly authorized) from the intersection of Greenwich and West Tenth and Christopher streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, under Christopher street to Sixth avenue; thence with one branch under Sixth avenue to a terminal station at or near the intersection of Sixth avenue and Thirty-third street, in said borough, and with another branch crossing diagonally under Sixth avenue to Ninth street, and thence easterly under Ninth street to a terminal station at or near the intersection of Fourth avenue and Ninth street, in

said borough; which certificate was thereafter duly accepted by the said Tunnel Company; and

Whereas, The said certificate was duly modified by a supplemental certificate dated the 12th day of April, 1906, and accepted by the Tunnel Company on the 26th day of April, 1906; and

Whereas, The said certificate, dated February 2, 1905, provided that no exit from the tunnel at the surface should be constructed except through private property unless the Board, by resolution, should specially approve of an exit or exits situated within one or more of the streets or avenues therein mentioned; and

Whereas, Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company is a corporation formed by agreement of consolidation between the said New York and Jersey Railroad Company, Hoboken and Manhattan Railroad Company, a corporation of the State of New Jersey, and Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company, a corporation of the State of New York; which agreement of consolidation is dated December 1, 1906, and was filed in the office of the Secretary of State of New York December 5, 1906, and in the office of the Clerk of the County of New York on December 6, 1906; and

Whereas, By the said agreement of consolidation all and singular the rights, powers, privileges, exemptions, immunities, franchises, roads, rights of way and property, real and personal, of every kind and nature of the Tunnel Company were conveyed and transferred to the said Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company, which thereupon expressly assumed and agreed to discharge all liabilities, duties and obligations of the Tunnel Company and especially the obligations and duties assumed by the Tunnel Company by acceptance of the franchises granted by the Board by said certificate dated February 2, 1905, modified as hereinbefore stated; and

Whereas, The Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company has requested the Board to approve of exits from the tunnel in Sixth avenue situated in Fourteenth street near the westerly side of Sixth avenue, in Twenty-third street near the westerly side of Sixth avenue, in Twenty-eighth street near the easterly side of Sixth avenue, and in Twenty-eighth street near the westerly side of Sixth avenue; all of the said streets being mentioned in the said certificate dated February 2, 1905; and

Whereas, The said certificate also provided that in case any part of the stations and station approaches should be within the streets or avenues and above a horizontal plane 10 feet below the street surface, such space should be deemed to be vault space within the meaning of the said certificate; and that the Tunnel Company should pay to the City annually during the term of years mentioned in the said certificate, as rental for vault space occupied by it, such a sum as should be equal to four per cent, upon the valuation of the horizontal area occupied by such vault space, said valuation to be at the same rate per square foot as the valuation of the land, exclusive of buildings, contained in the abutting property, fixed for purposes of taxation for the year 1904; and

Whereas, Doubts have arisen as to the mode of computation of the payments for vault space in station approaches not immediately abutting upon private property, and also as to what space is to be considered as vault space, and also as to the mode of fixing the compensation to be paid for exits from the tunnel situated in the streets, and the Board is satisfied that in respect to the provisions last above recited fixing the mode of computing rental for vault space the said certificate varies from the intent of the parties and that the same should be modified so as to make it conformable to the true intent of the parties; and

Whereas, It is to the interest of both the City and the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company to modify the said certificate so as to remove all such doubts and to avoid causes of difference and the uncertainty, expense and delay of possible litigation, and it is therefore proposed to modify the terms of the contract constituted by the delivery of said certificate of February 2, 1905, and its acceptance by the Tunnel Company, by adding thereto provisions which shall fix the compensation or annual rental to be paid to the City for exits from the tunnel situated within streets and shall also define more clearly what space is to be considered as vault space and shall fix clearly and precisely the mode of calculating the payments to be made for vault space generally so as to conform to the true intent of the parties in respect thereto; and

Whereas, To the end and for the purpose hereinbefore recited, the Board has, by a concurrent vote of at least six of its members, determined upon certain modifications of the said contract as hereinafter set forth, and has prescribed such terms, conditions and requirements in relation thereto as to it appear just and proper, including all the terms, conditions and requirements provided for by the Rapid Transit Act in case of such modification:

Now therefore, the Board, with the consent of the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company, does hereby modify said certificate dated February 2, 1905, by adding thereto the following provisions:

First.

The Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company shall have the right to construct and maintain exits from the tunnel at the surface of the following streets, viz.: Fourteenth street, near the westerly side of Sixth avenue; Twenty-third street, near the westerly side of Sixth avenue; Twenty-eighth street, near the easterly side of Sixth avenue; Twenty-eighth street, near the westerly side of Sixth avenue; provided that the same shall be constructed in substantial accordance with the drawings or plans submitted to the Board by the said Company, and entitled:

The Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company shall not be required to construct all of the said exits, but it shall on or before the 1st day of January, 1908, by written notice to the Board, state which of the said exits (if any) it determines to construct; and thereupon the right of said Company under this certificate to construct any of the above-mentioned exits which are not included in such notice shall wholly cease.

Second.

The Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company shall pay to the City annually for the right, franchise and license to construct and maintain such of the said exits as the said Company determines to construct (including the station approaches connected therewith) the following sums, to wit:

For the exits in Fourteenth street near the westerly side of Sixth avenue, and the station approaches connected therewith, including so much of the said station approaches as may be within Sixth avenue, the sum of one thousand dollars.

For the exits in Twenty-third street near the westerly side of Sixth avenue, and the station approaches connected therewith, including so much of the said station approaches as may be within Sixth avenue, the sum of one thousand dollars.

For the exits in Twenty-eighth street near the easterly side of Sixth avenue, and the station approaches connected therewith, including so much of the said station approaches as may be within Sixth avenue, the sum of one thousand dollars.

For the exits in Twenty-eighth street near the westerly side of Sixth avenue, and the station approaches connected therewith, including so much of the said station approaches as may be within Sixth avenue, the sum of one thousand dollars.

The foregoing sums shall be paid during the whole period beginning on the day when the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company shall first commence actual operation of the extensions authorized by the said certificate dated February 2, 1905 (but not later than the last day on which the said Company shall be bound to begin such operation) and ending on the day when the rentals payable under the franchise granted to the Tunnel Company, and dated July 10, 1902, shall become subject to readjustment under the terms of the said last-mentioned franchise.

Third.

The said certificate, dated February 2, 1905, is hereby amended by striking from Article IV, thereof the paragraph which reads as follows:

"2. The Tunnel Company shall pay to the City annually, as rental for any vault space occupied by it (as the phrase vault space is hereinafter defined), such a sum as shall be equal to 4 per cent, upon the valuation of the horizontal area occupied by such vault space, said valuation to be at the same rate per square foot as the valuation of the land, exclusive of buildings, contained in the abutting property, fixed for purposes of taxation for the year 1904."

Instead of the payments provided for in the paragraph so struck out as aforesaid, the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company shall pay an annual rental to the City, at the rates hereinafter provided, for any vault space occupied by it (as the phrase vault space is defined in the said certificate dated February 2, 1905), provided that such vault space is not to be paid for under any other clauses of the contract with the City. Inasmuch as payments are to be made by the said Company for station platforms under Article IV, of the said certificate dated February 2, 1905, and for the exits and station approaches mentioned and described in Article Second of this

present certificate, the same shall not be charged or paid for as vault space under this article.

The rental payable for any vault space occupied by the said Company and not paid for under any other clauses of the contract with the City shall be 4 per cent. per annum upon the valuation of the horizontal area so occupied by the said Company. Such valuation shall be ascertained as follows: The valuation per square foot of the neighboring or adjacent land, exclusive of buildings, as fixed for purposes of taxation for the year 1904, shall first be determined. One fourth of the aforesaid valuation shall be the valuation per square foot, for the purposes of this agreement, of any such vault space area for the period beginning on the day when the said Company shall first commence actual operation of the extensions authorized by the aforesaid certificate dated February 2, 1905 (but not later than the last day on which the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company shall be bound to begin such operation), and ending on the day ten years after the day when any part of the said extensions is in actual operation. One-half of the aforesaid valuation of neighboring or adjacent land shall be the valuation per square foot, for the purposes of this agreement, of the same vault space area for the period beginning on the last day of such period of ten years, and ending on the day when the rentals payable under the franchise to the Tunnel Company dated July 10, 1902, shall next thereafter become subject to readjustment under the terms of the said last mentioned franchise.

Fourth.

All payments to be made under this present certificate, as well as all annual payments by way of rental under the terms of the said certificate dated February 2, 1905, are to be subject to readjustment at one and the same time.

Fifth.

This certificate is only to take effect if and when approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, and consented to by the sureties on the bond given by the Tunnel Company, in so far as it alters or modifies the aforesaid certificate dated February 2, 1905, in respect, (1) to the definition of vault space within the meaning of the said certificate, and (2) the mode of calculating the payments for vault space.

In witness whereof, this certificate has been prepared by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, by and upon the concurrent vote of at least six of the members of the said Board, and is now attested by its seal and by the signature of its President, who is its presiding officer, and by the signature of its Secretary, this day of _____, 1907.

Burrows, that he resides in the Borough of Brooklyn, in the said City of New York, that he is the secretary of the said Board and that he subscribed his name thereto by like authority; and both the said Alexander E. Opinion of Counsel was read as follows:

January 23, 1907.

ALEXANDER E. ORR, Esq., President of the Rapid Transit Commission:

DEAR SIR—At the meeting of the Board held on the 17th inst., the Mayor presented a memorandum entitled "Memorandum for Insertion in Franchise," which was referred by the Board to counsel for examination and report. The Mayor stated that this memorandum had been furnished to him by the Central Federated Union of The City of New York.

We will take up the various clauses as stated in this memorandum:

"First—All bidders for construction and operation under this franchise, shall agree as a condition precedent before the contract is awarded to pay the prevailing rate of wages to all men employed upon construction, during the entire period of the work."

This suggestion is covered by chapter 506, Laws of 1906, amending the Labor Law, and the provision suggested in the memorandum is in substance inserted in the draft contract.

"Second—That eight hours shall constitute a day's labor during the period of construction."

The same remarks apply to this. The subject is covered by chapter 506 of the Laws of 1906, and is expressly included in the contract.

"Third—That during the course of construction, the contractor shall employ only those who are affiliated with labor unions recognized by the Central Federated Union of The City of New York."

We are unable to see how any public authorities can make such an agreement as is here suggested. It would not be pretended that the City could provide that a contractor should employ only persons of a particular race or color or religion. And if the City could not provide by contract that the only persons to be employed should be members of a given religious society, we are unable to see how it could provide that the only laborers to be employed should be members of a given labor union.

"Fourth—That in the event of any dispute or misunderstanding of any kind arising during the course of construction between the contractor and any of the employees, such dispute or misunderstanding shall be referred forthwith to a Board of Arbitration, to consist of five members, two of whom shall be nominated and appointed by the unions or a majority thereof, represented by the men employed upon the work; two of said Board to be named by the contractors, and the fifth to be the Mayor of The City of New York."

We know of no legal objection to the insertion of a clause in the contract which should provide that certain disputes or misunderstandings between the contractor and any of his employees should be referred to a Board of Arbitration. Such a clause would be most unusual, and we believe that the City has never yet inserted anything like it in any of its contracts. Whether it would be expedient to insert such a clause in a contract, and whether if inserted responsible contractors could be found to agree to it, are matters for the judgment of the Board.

An examination of the above mentioned premises shows that Mrs. Jones has done all the work that is possible to be done at this time, as specified and called for in Article No. 4 of the agreement between Jane T. Jones, Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company and The City of New York, recorded on page 4261 of the Minutes of the meeting of the Rapid Transit Board of October 4, 1906, and for which a sum not exceeding \$6,000, together with \$1,166.66 (an allowance made for loss of rental), making in all \$7,166.66, a sum agreed to be paid upon completion of the work. Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Commission, New York City:

DEAR SIR—I have noticed several claims made by the Washington Heights Taxpayers' Association that the management of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company was purposely and intentionally making the express service through the centre track on the Broadway Division, between One Hundred and Thirty-seventh and One Hundredth streets, as bad as possible, in order to have the service withdrawn. I deem it advisable to give you a plain statement of facts as they have developed from the operation of this piece of road with express trains.

During the rush hour period, morning and night, we operate express trains on a four-minute interval, and local trains on a four-minute interval, on both the Broadway and Lenox Avenue Divisions, making a two-minute interval express service, and a two-minute interval local service, south of Ninety-sixth street.

With the enormous amount of business we are handling during these rush hours we cannot possibly put trains through the junction at Ninety-sixth street on this short interval, with our present facilities at Ninety-sixth street, without resulting in congestion north of that point on both divisions.

The Kingsbridge express trains are run on an eight-minute interval, and the One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street express trains also, making a Broadway four-minute express interval south of One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, and the run through the centre, from One Hundred and Thirty-seventh to One Hundredth street, is not of sufficient length to enable a Kingsbridge train to overtake its leader, and if it did it would be impossible to put the two trains through immediately following each other without causing undue congestion to the Lenox avenue service, on which division we carry nearly 100 per cent. more people than on the Broadway Division.

You will readily see, therefore, that in order to give the Kingsbridge people the very best possible benefit from this centre-track service, taking into consideration the rights of passengers using the Lenox Avenue Division, we schedule a Kingsbridge train to leave One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street six minutes behind its One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street leader, or two minutes ahead of its One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street follower, thus enabling the first train to make up two minutes through the centre track and fit into its proper place at Ninety-sixth street.

The Kingsbridge trains are not detained any longer north of Ninety-sixth street than are the One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street trains, and I think you will agree with me that it is ridiculous to think we would lay out our entire service for the purpose of discommoding our patrons who use the Kingsbridge expresses.

The Honorable the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—A communication from the Commissioner of Bridges is now before the Board of Estimate asking for an issue of Corporate Stock for the construction of approaches to the Manhattan Bridge on both sides of the East river. The plans for these approaches, especially the grades, are of great importance with the extension of the rapid transit subways, and I beg to call your attention to the necessity for an official communication from your Commission to the Mayor, for reference to the Department of Bridges, stating which of the eight tracks over the Manhattan Bridge have been taken by your Commission in laying out routes, and also giving engineering information as to what would be the steepest feasible operative grade from the bridge approach structure into the subways at either end of the Manhattan Bridge.

The understanding is that two pairs of the tracks over this bridge are to be utilized in connection with the Tri-borough Route and the Lafayette avenue route, but no official request has been addressed to the Bridge Department to this effect.

With regard to the grades on the Brooklyn approach, the Bridge Department now has a grade of less than 3 per cent., terminating at Sands street, from which point your Chief Engineer has designed a grade in the neighborhood of 6 per cent. with a very short radius running into the subway through Flatbush Avenue Extension. Mr. Creuzbaur, the Consulting Engineer of this office, has conferred on several occasions with your Engineers and again with the Engineers of the Bridge Department, and has found that up to yesterday no arrangement whatever had been made to equalize these grades, although one of the consulting engineers of the Bridge Department agrees that a reduction of the gradient on the approach can readily be arranged if agreed upon at once.

At the last meeting of the Board of Estimate the grade of Sands street, which was lowered nearly 9 feet to accommodate the present grade of the bridge approach, was laid over for a public hearing on February 8, and before this time a definite plan through which this street must be further depressed should be agreed upon.

Aside from this, I have now for immediate determination the question of grades in the Flatbush Avenue Extension, and the Bridge Department has proposed to raise Nassau street about two and one-half (2½) feet so as to ease the gradient of the subway tracks.

This would involve an undesirable increase in the gradient of Flatbush Avenue Extension, which is now 3 per cent., and should be avoided.

I would therefore suggest that the use of the Manhattan Bridge tracks of the rapid transit subways be officially determined at the earliest possible moment, and that your Commission advise your Chief Engineer to confer with the Engineers of the Bridge Department and of my office so that these important matters of street, subway and bridge grades may be determined upon without delay.

DEAR SIR—I beg to report that yesterday workmen for Cunningham & Kearns, contractors for the widening of Third avenue at One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, were removing some of the granite blocks alongside of the rapid transit vault lights at the southeast entrance to the Third avenue station. As has already been called to the Board's attention, Third avenue has been widened on the east side, except for that portion of the station, including the vault lights, which is connected with the subway entrance, the vault lights projecting into the widened avenue for a distance of about sixteen feet. Upon inquiry, the foreman of the gang showed a letter addressed to Mr. Kearns bearing the signature of the Chief Clerk of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, which letter directed Mr. Kearns to proceed to carry out their contract for removing the vault lights, cutting down the subway walls at the staircase entrance, placing steel beams across the passageway, putting on the waterproofing, etc., and proceeding with the work of laying the street pavement over the staircase passage.

This is a matter which has been before the Board for some months. I would now wish to point out that the reconstruction involved in the changes that the President of the Borough of The Bronx has directed to be made, will require careful supervision, and should be executed in accordance with plans approved by this Department. No such plans have been presented to us by The Bronx officials, and I therefore am not cognizant of just what they propose to do.

Letter of Mr. Rives was read as follows, and it was understood that the Secretary would communicate with the Comptroller on the subject:

DEAR SIR—The Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company bought a piece of land on Hillside avenue, a part of which the City agreed to purchase (see Minutes, pages 3883 to 3890).

The price was not agreed upon at that time, but on March 1, 1906, the representatives of the Construction Company stated that they considered the plot which the City was to buy worth \$3,500. This estimate was then referred to the Comptroller for report (Minutes, page 3948).

I do not find that the Comptroller has ever reported on this valuation, and if not, I think that the matter ought to be brought up at the next meeting of the Rapid Transit Board, so that the question may be disposed of and the title of the City to the station at that point made complete.

Resolved, by the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, Borough of The Bronx, That in order to avoid the congested and dangerous condition existing in and around the Manhattan Elevated platform, station and stairways at Third ave-

nue and One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, additional stairways should be constructed by the Manhattan Elevated Railroad Company for exit only on the southeast and southwest corners of Third avenue and One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, and that an additional covered passageway should be provided from the station on the southwest corner of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Third avenue to connect with the downtown entrance to the subway at the northwest corner of Melrose avenue and One Hundred and Forty-ninth street.

Resolved, That copies of these resolutions be forwarded to the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, the Manhattan Railroad Company and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company.

The Secretary reported that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment had adopted a resolution on January 25, 1907, appropriating \$742,500, on the requisition of the Rapid Transit Board dated December 27, 1906.

Reports of the Chief Engineer were presented as follows, and referred to Counsel for a report as to the incidence of the cost of the work referred to:

New York, January 30, 1907.

Hon. A. E. Orr, President, Rapid Transit Board:

DEAR SIR—In my report upon improving the conditions in the subway during the summer, submitted to the Board on March 22, 1906, and approved by it on April 5, 1906, I recommended that experiments be entered into with a view to determining upon a proper method of cooling the subway air.

To carry out this recommendation, a plant was installed at the Brooklyn Bridge station, in accordance with plans prepared and submitted by Mr. John E. Starr, our consulting expert. This plant consisted of:

1. Four 8-inch wells driven down through the floor of the subway at the north end of the station to supply from a ground-water source 400 gallons per minute, to be used in cooling the air, together with the necessary suction pipes and pumps to lift the water from the wells and carry it to the proper places on the station platforms.
2. Four fans, with a combined capacity of 150,000 cubic feet of air per minute.
3. Two pipe coolers, with sufficient cooling surface to cool 150,000 cubic feet of air per minute 15 degrees F.
4. Air ducts leading from the coolers over the station platforms for the purpose of distributing the cool air to all points.

This plant was divided into two separate units—one located on the east side of the station to provide cooling for the east island platform, and the other located on the west side of the station to provide cooling for the west island platform.

The cooling was wholly obtained from the ground water pumped from the wells. In accordance with my statement to the Board of June 28, 1906, the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company ordered the plant installed upon the assumption that the cost of that portion of the work which was interpreted as "construction" would be paid for as an extra under the contract with John B. McDonald, and the cost of that portion which was interpreted as "equipment" would be borne by the Subway Construction Company.

The plant was completed and put in operation on August 29, and the results were entirely satisfactory, as indicated in my reports to the Board of September 7 and November 14, 1906.

I transmit herewith in duplicate bill of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, dated January 23, 1907, covering the "construction" portion of this plant, amounting to \$14,505.

I respectfully recommend that payment of this bill as an extra under the contract with John B. McDonald be authorized by the Board.

DEAR SIR—During the early summer of 1905 the conditions in the subway became objectionable on account of the relatively high temperature which prevailed therein. As a result of these conditions, on June 22, 1905, the Board passed the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Chief Engineer be and he hereby is authorized to take immediate steps to install in those stations where the ventilation seems to be the most imperfect such devices, either for ventilation or increased circulation of air or refrigeration, as seems to him best."

Pursuant to this resolution, the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company undertook to carry out the following work, as ordered by me, with a view to improving the conditions as quickly as possible:

1. Vault lights were cut out and temporary and permanent gratings installed to produce a better circulation of air in the stations at Brooklyn Bridge, Fourteenth, Grand Central, Seventy-second and Ninety-sixth streets on Contract No. 1, and at Wall street station on Contract No. 2.
2. Small motor driven fans were furnished and installed on the columns in the Brooklyn Bridge, Fourteenth street and Grand Central stations.
3. Large motor driven fans were furnished and installed at the following points:
In the subway at City Hall Park.
In the Brooklyn Bridge station, at the north and south ends of the west local platform.

On the street surface, exhausting air from the subway at Duane street.
In Bleeker street station, at the north end of the west platform and the south end of the east platform.

In Lafayette street, on the east and west side of the subway, about midway between Bleeker street and Astor place stations.

In Fourteenth street station, over the northbound local track.

In the subway, at Sixteenth street.

4. An opening was cut through the roof of the subway at One Hundred and Forty-first street and Broadway, and a large fan installed in a temporary house on the street surface, for the purpose of ventilating the car yard between One Hundred and Thirty-seventh and One Hundred and Forty-fifth street stations.

5. Experimental louvers were constructed and installed in the opening in the roof of the subway at Sixty-third street and Broadway.

6. Experimental sprinkling pipes were provided and installed in the subway south of the Sixty-sixth street station.

7. Thermophones were buried under the street surface over and adjacent to and at some distance from the subway at Leonard and Lafayette streets, for the purpose of determining the ground temperatures.

In payment for the above work, I transmit herewith, with my approval, the bill of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, dated June 15, 1906, amounting to, Contract No. 1, \$28,738.49; Contract No. 2, \$403.24; with detailed vouchers attached thereto.

This is only a portion of the total amount which has been expended upon this work. When all the statements have been rendered, an additional bill covering the balance due will be submitted for approval and payment.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR—The statement of allowances to be made to the contractor under contract between The City of New York and John B. McDonald, dated February 21, 1900, as amended, for additional work performed and services rendered, and of deductions to be made for work omitted from that embraced in the original contract plans and specifications, has never been taken up between the contractor and your Board. At an early stage in the work, the policy was adopted of reserving all of these matters until the substantial completion of the contract, and with the exception of one or two specific instances, all of these matters have been left open. As the work is now practically completed, we have caused a full statement of the amounts claimed on behalf of the contractor for such additional work and material (excluding sub-section 15, not yet completed, and the cost of ventilation, recently ordered by your Board) to be prepared, and we hand you the same herewith.

The principal items of such additions are:

1. Those resulting from the change in the plan of construction, by placing the ducts to carry the electrical conduits in the tunnel walls. This item was the subject of litigation, as a result of which the courts decided that it constituted construction, and was to be allowed and paid to the contractor as an extra; and payments have been made accordingly.

2. The construction of about six miles of additional tracks to those embraced within the original contract plans, which as the work progressed was determined upon and authorized by your Board for the greater efficiency of the system.

3. The lengthening of all stations north of Ninety-sixth street and of all express stations south of and including the Ninety-sixth street station so as to admit of the operation of eight-car trains; those originally planned having been adapted to five-car trains only. Also a very considerable increase in the cost of construction of stations, resulting from changes in the plans of ornamentation.

4. There were also retaining walls required to be built under the Astor property at Forty-second street and Broadway, and under the new "Times" building, a wall for the new Tombs building, certain collision walls, and a very large number of minor changes in plans, no one of them in itself amounting to a large sum, but together aggregating a considerable amount.

All of these items are shown in detail upon the accompanying statements. There will, of course, have to be deducted from the amount shown on these statements the saving in the cost of work involved in the change of the City Hall loop, and a number of other items which we assume will be prepared by your own engineers, and which our engineers will be happy to take up at your early convenience.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
