The quarterly meeting of the officers to designate city depositories, in accordance with section 196, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, was held in the Mayor's office on Monday, February 2, 1914.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Chamberlain offered the following:

Resolved, That the minimum rate of interest on deposits be fixed at two (2) per cent., that the Chamberlain be empowered, wherever he may do so in his best judgment, to enter into contract for such higher rate of interest as may be obtained, provided that in such case the specific approval of the Mayor and Comptroller be obtained. The Chamberlain is empowered in his discretion to require from any or all such depositories bonds to secure the deposits made therein, such bonds to be approved by the Comptroller.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The following report of the action taken by the Commission was approved and signed by the Mayor, Comptroller and the Chamberlain:

The Mayor, Comptroller and Chamberlain, comprising the Banking Commission, met to-day, as required by law, to select City depositories and to fix the rate of interest that will be paid during the next quarter on the approximately \$30,000,000 in cash which the City carries in the Treasury.

As far back as any one remembers, the City has received 2 per cent. on practically all of its balances. Of the one hundred banks and trust companies acting as City depositories during the past quarter, all paid 2 per cent., both for active and inactive accounts, except five. Of these two paid 3 per cent. and three paid 2½ per cent.

Of the 109 banks and trust companies designated as City depositories to-day, 22 agreed to pay 3 per cent. during the next quarter, one 2½ per cent. and 31 2½ per cent. Under the plan of distributing funds, it will be possible, on a very conservative basis of making deposits, to place \$27,000,000 in banks and trust companies paying the City 2½ per cent. or better. This means that for the remainder of the year the City will earn in interest \$130,000 more than it would have earned if the rate of 2 per cent. paid heretofore had been continued. It now seems highly probable that the present rate will be maintained throughout the year, although the rate of interest must be fixed every quarter under the law. This assumption is based on the fact that

\$20,000,000 at 2½ per cent. This practically includes the total amount of cash now carried in active and inactive accounts. It will later be determined what rate will be required on active accounts. In these cases it is necessary to take into consideration the volume of check transactions, now exceeding 800 per day. There will also be taken into consideration the loan accommodation which the bank or banks carrying the active accounts will extend to the City when emergency borrowing is necessary. A final plan with respect to the active accounts will be worked out by the Comptroller and Chamberlain, since the Comptroller is responsible for the borrowing of City funds.

*Safety will not be neglected for the sake of interest earnings.* The first consideration in each case will be the condition of the bank. The amount deposited with any one bank is limited by law to 50 per cent. of that bank's capital and surplus. The amount deposited within this legal limit is, however, solely within the discretion of the Chamberlain. At the Chamberlain's request the Banking Commission to-day authorized him to require, in his discretion, any or every bank receiving City funds to deposit bonds to secure such deposits, these bonds to be approved in each case by the Comptroller as well as by the Chamberlain.

To avoid the possibility of discrimination the Chamberlain has tentatively adopted the following plan for making deposits in banks and trust companies.

A definite maximum will be placed on the amount that may be deposited in any bank. In determining this maximum a basis of 10 per cent. of the combined capital and surplus of the bank will be taken. For every additional ¼ per cent. of interest paid on daily balances over 2 per cent. an additional 2½ per cent. of the capital and surplus of the bank will be added, up to 20 per cent., set as the maximum. From the total amount which may be placed in any bank on this basis deductions will be made at the rate of ½ per cent. of capital and surplus for every unit of variation above the ratio of 5 to 1, between deposits in that particular bank and its total capital and surplus. Correspondingly, an addition will be made of like amount for every unit of variation between deposits and the total of capital and surplus below the ratio of 5 to 1.

The ratio of five to one was determined by taking the average ratio of deposits to capital and surplus of all banks now serving the City as depositories. It so happens that this ratio is also regarded as a normal ratio by bankers.

In transferring funds from inactive to active accounts, removals will be made, first, from the accounts paying the lower rates of interest. This will tend to give stability to the City's reserve balances. The City under the law may not make time deposits, which ordinarily earn higher rates of interest. Such arrangements are made in a number of American cities, notably in Cleveland, Ohio.

In adopting this plan the Chamberlain assumes no obligation to place in any bank the full amount that it is entitled to under the rule, even if funds are available. Moreover in no case will a maximum deposit of 20 per cent. of capital and surplus be exceeded. A continual watch will be kept on the condition of the banks and adjustments will be made of deposits according to evidence of the stability of the depositories.

The plan adopted places the distribution of funds for the first time upon an equitable basis and one which will work fairly alike to large and small institutions. It will also, it is believed, wholly eliminate the possibility of favoritism which tends to creep in where the distribution is based entirely upon the judgment of the Chamberlain as heretofore.

*It is desired to make clear that balances will not be kept high for the sake of interest earnings. They will be made to conform solely to the requirements of the City.*

The Banking Commission expressed its gratification at the very satisfactory response received from the banks. Their action, as well as the tenor of their replies to the letters sent out by the Chamberlain, gives substantial evidence of their desire to co-operate with the administration in placing the banking relations of the City on a business basis.

The attempt to improve interest rates was made by the Chamberlain not only as a matter of business, but because the Charter specifically requires that the Banking Commission shall fix the rates of interest "according to the current rates of interest upon like balances deposited in banks and trust companies in The City of New York by private persons and corporations."

"Attached is a list of depositories designated and rates offered."

On motion, the Comptroller and Chamberlain were appointed a committee to take up the question of the rate of interest allowed by the banks in which the active accounts are carried.

I also submit herewith report showing the work done by the Department during the quarter.

#### New Construction Work by Department Force.

The work of extending the North River piers out to the recently modified pier-head line has been in progress at: Pier No. 25, North River, foot of N. Moore st.; Pier No. 28, North River, foot of Laight st.; Pier No. 36, North River, foot of Charlton st.; Pier No. 38, North River, foot of King st.

The extension to Pier No. 26, foot of Beach st., was completed during the quarter.

The construction of New W. 46th st. Pier was begun by the removal of piers at W. 45th and W. 46th sts., preliminary to dredging and construction.

A portion of the inshore end of the W. 47th st. Pier has been removed, and a temporary ramp approach built on a temporary pile platform for the Street Cleaning Department leading from 12th ave.

A permanent foundation for one of the shed columns in the New W. 46th st. Pier has been built and loaded for experimental purposes.

On the East River work has been in progress on the construction of the E. 123d st. section of bulkhead wall. The bulkhead wall built for the use of the Borough President of Manhattan in order to furnish available wharfage room in connection with the Municipal Asphalt Repair Plant between E. 90th and E. 91st sts., has been completed. Work on the bulkhead wall for providing a permanent retaining structure along the easterly side of the Marginal st. has been in progress at the Corlears section, in the vicinity of Jackson st., and on the Yorkville section between E. 65th and E. 72d st.

In the Borough of Brooklyn a platform has been completed leading from the foot of Washington st. around to and in front of the Brooklyn Tower of the Manhattan Bridge.

Temporary pavement has been laid by Department force to provide approaches from 2d ave. to the 31st and 33rd st. piers at South Brooklyn; and the approach from 2d ave. to the Municipal Ferry at the foot of 39th st. has been widened and temporarily paved.

#### New Construction Work by Contracts.

On the North River the dredging preliminary to the construction of the new W. 46th st. pier was begun on November 1, 1913, under Contract 1383, and is still in progress; 224,820 cubic yards having been removed prior to January 1, 1914.

On the East River a new impervious granite pavement has been laid under Contract 1374 from the entrance to Pier No. 17 to the entrance to Pier No. 19.

In the Borough of Brooklyn the installation of tracks on the 33d st. pier and track connection with 2d ave., together with an overhead trolley, was begun under Contract 1380 and is still in progress.

The construction of the new Municipal Ferry House at the foot of 39th st. in the Borough of Brooklyn has been in progress under Contract 1294.

In the Borough of Richmond a steel frame and glass awning shelter in the rear of the ferry house at St. George has been in progress under Contract 1393.

#### General Repairs by Department Labor.

General repairs by Department labor have been made to 42 piers, 4 platforms and 9 bulkheads.

Minor repairs have been made during the quarter to all of the recreation buildings located at: Barrow st., North River; W. 50th st., North River; W. 129th st., North River; Market st., East River; E. 3d st., East River; E. 24th st., East River; E. 112th st., Hudson River; Metropolitan ave., Brooklyn.

The amount of work involved in repairs to pavement all of which has been confined to the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, is 13,322 square yards.

#### General Repairs Under Contract.

The work of repairing the asphalt pavement on the Marginal street along the North River was completed under Contract 1359, Class 1, on October 7th, 1913, and similar repairs were made along the North, East and Harlem Rivers, under Contract 1397.

On the East River, Pier No. 51 was extensively repaired under Contract 1391.

#### Supervision of Permit Work.

Work done by private parties, lessees and others during the quarter under permit from the Commissioner of Docks has been supervised under: 117 permit orders in the Borough of Manhattan; 43 permit orders in the Borough of The Bronx; 83 permit orders in the Borough of Brooklyn; 23 permit orders in the Borough of Queens; 31 permit orders in the Borough of Richmond.

Various and sundry repairs to piers, bulkheads, sheds and platforms have been made for owners, lessees and others by Department labor authorized by the issuance of 58 Bureau orders for this class of work, the most extensive of which has been the removal of the Weber-McLoughlin Coal plant from the bulkhead south of W. 131st st. to the bulkhead between W. 132d st., North River, thereby removing the congestive features which operated toward making the pier at the foot of W. 131st st. inaccessible from the south.



Seventh—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Eighth—All construction which shall be made under this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereinafter to be imposed by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas, and Electricity, or their respective successors in authority. The said Company shall submit a working plan of construction to the said President and to the said Commissioner, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said pipes or conduits, connections, manholes and other appurtenances, and the mode of protection of all subsurface construction under the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Ninth—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the pipes or conduits of the Company, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Tenth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said pipes or conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the pipes, conduits and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Eleventh—The Company shall bear the expense of keeping in repair for one year after it has been replaced, all pavement which may at any time be removed by said Company, either for the purpose of construction or for the repairing of the pipes or conduits and the appurtenances thereto.

Twelfth—The Company shall bear the expense of inspection which may be required by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and of all work of construction.

Thirteenth—The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes hereby authorized whether laid within conduits or separately whenever required by and under the supervision of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The conditions of such test shall be as follows:

(a) If the test be made in the foundry where the pipes are manufactured, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of three hundred (300) pounds per square inch.

(b) If the test be made in the field, of pipes in use or ready for use, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of two hundred (200) pounds per square inch.

A certificate showing that such a test has been made without injury to the pipes shall be executed by an officer of the Company, and endorsed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and filed with the Board.
