



### PROCLAMATION.

MAYOR'S OFFICE,  
NEW YORK, Feb. 6, 1874.

Whereas, Nicholas Ryan and his sister Mary Ryan were found dead at their residence, No. 204 Broome street, on the 20th December last, and whereas the coroner's jury, from the facts elicited during the inquest, were unable to determine the manner of their death; and

Whereas, from such an examination of the case as I have been enabled to make, I am of the opinion that the said Nicholas and Mary Ryan were brutally murdered, at the time and place above stated, now,

I, WILLIAM F. HAVEMEYER, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby offer a reward of one thousand dollars for the discovery and conviction of the party or parties who may have committed the deed, the said reward to be paid on the conviction of the said party or parties, and the certificate of the District Attorney that such conviction was had upon the testimony of the person or persons claiming the reward. But all claims not presented to the Mayor within twenty days after such conviction shall be disregarded.

The lease to contain a further condition, that immediate possession of the premises will be given to enable the courts to be held, but that no rent shall be charged for such occupancy, until the building shall have been put in thorough order and condition to hold court therein.

### BOARD OF EDUCATION.

STATED SESSION,  
Wednesday, February 18, 1874.

The President laid before the Board the report of his action in relation to the death of James W. Gerard, Esq., Inspector of Common Schools for the Fifth District, as follows:

To the Board of Education:

GENTLEMEN—On the 10th instant I caused to be published in all the leading newspapers of this city the following notice:

To the Commissioners, Trustees and Inspectors of Education, and Principals and Teachers of the Public Schools:

By the death of Inspector James W. Gerard the schools of this city have lost an old and faithful friend, whose interest and labors for more than a quarter of a century have been actively alive and freely given in their behalf.

Not confined by the boundaries of the ward or district for which he was specially elected or appointed, with an enlarged benevolence he visited all the schools of the city, instructing and encouraging by lectures and kind words of address the teachers and scholars.

It seems proper that his attachment and services should be recognized by a more than usual mark of respect for his memory. I therefore advise that the hour appointed for the funeral, ten to eleven o'clock A. M., on Wednesday next, be observed in the several schools of this city by such appropriate memorial exercises as the trustees and principals may provide.

That such teachers as can be spared from the schools at the morning session of that day be permitted to attend the funeral.

That the flags upon the hall of the Board of Education, and on the school houses, be placed at half staff, so to remain until after the day of the funeral.

And, by virtue of the power vested in me by the by-laws of the Board of Education I direct as a further mark of respect to the memory of Mr. Gerard, that the schools in his district—the Fifteenth and Eighteenth wards—be closed for the day on Wednesday next.

The members of the Board of Education, the Trustees and Inspectors of Common Schools, the City Superintendent and Assistants, are invited to meet at half-past nine o'clock A. M., at Grammar School No. 50, in East Twentieth street, near Third avenue, on Wednesday, 11th instant, to proceed thence to attend the funeral in a body.

In accordance with this notice on the morning of the funeral a large number of the Commissioners, Trustees and Inspectors of Common Schools convened at Grammar School No. 50, and after appropriate remarks delivered by Commissioner Man, the following resolutions were proposed by him and unanimously adopted:

Whereas, James W. Gerard, Esq., whose decease is now announced, has been for many years an earnest and efficient co-worker with us in the cause of public education; therefore,

Resolved, That in the decease of Mr. Gerard the cause of education, and particularly the public school system of the city of New York, sustains the loss of a most useful friend and able advocate; and we desire especially to recognize the fact that, both by wise counsels and by devoted personal example, he bore a distinguished part in raising our present school system to its high standard, and establishing it in public favor and confidence; and

Resolved, also, That in common with his friends and the entire community, we deplore as a public loss, the decease of the eminent citizen who is thus called away in the fulness of years and honors, and yet still in the midst of his usefulness.

The gentlemen present then proceeded in a body to Calvary Church, there to assist in the funeral ceremonies of the late James W. Gerard, Inspector of Common Schools for the Fifth District.

### REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

#### SALARIES AND ECONOMY.

Commissioner West presented a report from the Committee on Salaries and Economy, as follows:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Salaries and Economy have had under consideration the several propositions referred to them upon the subject of the salaries paid to the teachers in the ward schools, and the inequality that exists in consequence of the principals and the vice-principals of the male schools being paid fixed amounts, while those of the other departments are dependent upon the system of averages in attendance, in the preceding year, for their compensation.

This inequality is in contravention of the statute law, which requires that the salaries paid to teachers shall be as uniform as practicable, and is unjust, inasmuch as it subjects the largest number to the chances of an average attendance, and favors the smallest number with a known and permanent sum.

Your Committee submitted to the Board, in June last, a scheme for the regulation of these salaries in the future, which they trusted would have been well considered, and that such consideration and a fair criticism would have resulted in the adoption of some plans acceptable to the majority of teachers and school officers, by which this difficult problem of equalizing equitably the salaries of all teachers would have been solved and made permanent in its application, and with favorable pecuniary results to the treasury of the city.

As the proposed changes in the system of salaries are still under discussion before the Board, and the prospect of final settlement of the question would seem to be remote, your Committee feel compelled to bring to the attention of the Board the necessity of making our present system consistent and fair in its application to all classes of teachers, and they accordingly herein present a uniform system of the salaries of principals and vice-principals, based as they are now, in part, upon the average attendance of the schools for the preceding year, but at reduced sums, to take effect immediately, but only upon future appointments.

This scale was adopted by the Board in 1867, and for several years was applied, apparently, without the infliction of any injustice, or eliciting much complaint.

The Committee hope that for the reasons stated, the Board will without delay adopt the recommendation herein submitted as a matter of immediate necessity, whatever conclusions may hereafter be reached in relation to the general plan previously presented.

The proposed plan is as follows:

Amend section 35 of the Manual by adding thereto: "Principals and vice-principals of schools and departments hereafter employed by this Board may be paid as follows:

MALE.—Principals of schools with an average attendance for the preceding year of 150 or less \$2,250

"—Principals of schools with an average attendance for the preceding year of 151 to 300, 2,500

"—Principals of schools with an average attendance for the preceding year of 301 to 500, 2,750

"—Principals of schools with an average attendance for the preceding year of 501 and upward..... 3,000

"—Vice-Principals of schools with an average attendance for the preceding year of a grammar grade, 250 or more..... 2,000

FEMALE.—Principals of Grammar Schools with an average attendance for the preceding year of 100 or less..... 1,200

"—Principals of Grammar Schools with an average attendance for the preceding year of 101 to 150..... 1,300

"—Principals of Grammar Schools with an average attendance for the preceding year of 151 to 300..... 1,500

"—Principals of Grammar Schools with an average attendance for the preceding year of 301 to 500..... 1,60

—Vice-Principals of schools with an average attendance for the preceding year of 500 to 1,000.....	1,000
—Vice-Principals of schools with an average attendance for the preceding year of 1,000 and upward.....	1,200

It is with reluctance that your Committee propose to make even a prospective reduction of any of the salaries paid to teachers, but the people of this city whose interests in part we represent, may justly demand an assurance from this, as well as from every other department, that whatever action is taken in respect to salaries shall be in the direction of retrenchment.

The unavoidably large demand made upon the taxpayers for the purpose of public education is startling to property owners who are at present compelled to surrender one-half of their legitimate income in order to defray the expenses of the several departments of the city government, as well as to the tenant who finds his rent proportionately advanced.

The condition of dis-repair in which the school buildings were left by the preceding Board, as well as the great need of new schools in the upper wards of the city, renders it useless to entertain any hope of reduction in the items applicable to buildings. Hence it is obvious that the expenses of public instruction are only to be reduced by a reduction of salaries; and, indeed, it will be quite impossible to apply our present scale of salaries for principals of the small schools of the new wards.

The need, therefore, must be apparent, that some action should at once be taken, which, while it will not interfere with the proper rewarding of meritorious services, will reduce, as far as possible, the aggregate expenses of the Board.

The President laid before the Board the report of the Committee on Salaries and Economy, as follows:

To the Board of Education:

GENTLEMEN.—The Committee on Salaries and Economy have had under consideration several applications for increase of salary on the part of certain Principals now in the employ of this Board, under the provisions of sub-division 4, sec. 35 of the By-laws, which says "that all persons who have been employed as Principals of Grammar or Primary Departments and Schools for a period of ten years, and who have filled their positions with acceptability to the Board of Education, shall receive the maximum salary in their respective departments."

It will be perceived that, while this By-law contemplates a proper reward for service long and faithfully rendered, it makes no distinction as to the amount of labor performed. Or in other words, under its operation the Principal of a department having an average attendance of 150 pupils would receive as much compensation as the Principal of a department having 1,500 pupils, provided each had been in the employment of this Board for the term of ten years, and had given satisfaction in their respective positions.

It does not appear to your Committee that this is a proper basis upon which to reward meritorious service.

And if this plan should be pursued for a number of years longer, it must be evident that it will finally result in raising all our Principals to the maximum salary without regard to the attendance at their schools, thereby increasing very materially the expenses of supporting our Public Schools.

It cannot be denied that in judging of the merit and value of a Principal's work, length of service should form an important element in the consideration. But your Committee do not believe that it should be the only element.

It must be apparent to every one that the expenditures for teachers' salaries bear a disproportionate ratio to the other school expenses, and the Board should so regulate its future action that this disproportion may not be made greater.

While we believe that every faithful teacher ought to receive a fair and liberal compensation, we also think that a just and proper discrimination should be made as to the amount of labor performed.

The Committee having this object in view, would respectfully recommend to this Board that some plan should be adopted or some by-law passed, by means of which deserving Principals and teachers may be transferred from one position to another at an advanced salary, without increasing the aggregate annual expense.

Nor do we believe that in this matter of transfer and promotion ward limits should be recognized.

Our schools are and ought to be a unit in management and discipline, and the very best talent employed under this Board should be placed in the most important positions and should receive the most liberal compensations.

The Committee respectfully recommend the repeal of sub-div. 4, sec. 35 of the By-Laws, provided that those principals now receiving the maximum salary under this by-law shall continue to be paid such maximum.

Resolved, That sub-div. 4, section 35 of the By-Laws of this Board be, and the same is hereby repealed, provided that those principals now re-

ceiving the maximum salary under this by-law shall continue to be paid such maximum.

Also, from the same Committee, assigning the number to the new Primary School in Third street. Said school to be known as Primary School No. 6. Adopted.

#### TEACHERS.

Commissioner Halstead presented a report from the Committee on Teachers, appointing Miss Mary C. Hepburn as Principal of Primary School No. 6. Adopted.

Also from the same Committee, appointing Miss Sarah E. Stone, Principal of Primary Department of Grammar School No. 66; Miss Louise Studwell, Principal of Primary Department of Grammar School No. 67; and Miss Margaret Shea, Principal of Primary School No. 48, in the Twenty-fourth ward.

Also, from the same Committee, appointing Evander Childs as Principal of Grammar School No. 9. Adopted.

Also, from same Committee, several reports relative to teachers referred to the Committee. Which were adopted.

#### BUILDINGS.

Commissioner Dowd presented reports from the Committee on Buildings—

Relative to hiring premises in East 75th street for Primary Schools. Adopted.

To pay several bills for repairs in Ninth and Eleventh wards. Adopted.

To authorize Trustees to advertise for altering galleries in Primary Departments of Grammar Schools Nos. 27 and 53. Adopted.

#### WARMING AND VENTILATION.

Commissioner Baker presented reports from the Committee on Warming and Ventilation, asking an appropriation of \$496.47, to pay bills for work done on heating apparatus in various wards, by Gillis & Geoghegan. Referred to Finance Committee.

Asking for an appropriation of \$2,000 for tests in new methods of ventilation. Referred to the Finance Committee.

To pay bills, \$106, Twelfth ward. Referred to Finance Committee.

#### FURNITURE.

Commissioner Wetmore presented reports from the Committee on School Furniture—

Relative to donating furniture to Children's Aid Society, stating that there is none now at the disposal of the Board. Adopted.

Relation to furniture for the use of Trustees of the Twenty-fourth Ward. Referred to Finance Committee.

#### EVENING SCHOOLS.

Commissioner Mathewson presented reports from the Committee on Evening Schools, relative to the pay of several teachers. Adopted.

#### NORMAL SCHOOLS.

Commissioner Brown presented a report from the Committee on Normal Schools relative to the transfer of the Model Primary School in St. Mark's place to the Trustees of the Seventeenth Ward.

Referred to the Committee on Buildings. Also, to pay bill of \$144 18 for plumbing. Referred to the Finance Committee.

#### FINANCE.

Commissioner Vermilye presented reports from the Finance Committee as follows:

To transfer balances of appropriations. Adopted.

Financial statement of expenditures in detail for 1873. Adopted.

To authorize sliding doors in Grammar School No. 12, Seventh Ward. Adopted.

To appropriate \$2,000 for tests in ventilation. Adopted.

To appropriate \$1,545 for heating apparatus in Grammar School No. 40, Eighteenth Ward. Adopted.

To appropriate \$1,400 for pianos. Adopted.

Commissioner Brown called up the report of the Committee on Course of Study and School Books, recommending the appointment of an Assistant Superintendent of French and German.

The President put the question on the adoption of the report, and it was decided in the affirmative.

A motion of Commissioner Brown to authorize the Committee on Course of Study and School Books, to select a person competent to supervise the instruction of French and German was adopted.

Monday the 23d being observed as a holiday, the President announced that the schools would be closed on that day.

The Board adjourned.

#### THE GAS COMMISSION.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Mayor, the Comptroller and the Commissioner of Public Works, under section 73, chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873.

February 13, 1874.

In accordance with a notice issued by the Chairman, the Mayor, the Comptroller and the Commissioner of Public Works met in the office of the Mayor on Friday, February 13, 1874, at 3:30 P. M.

The minutes of the meeting held February 7, 1874, were read and adopted.

On motion of the Comptroller Richard J. Morrison was elected secretary.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the contract for supplying the gas for each lamp, and for the lighting, cleaning and reglazing the same, and replacing the cocks, tubes and burners, crossheads, lamp irons and lanterns thereto, at the rate of \$39 per annum; for straightening each lamp post at the rate of \$3; for re-leading each column at the rate of \$3; for refitting each stand pipe at the rate of \$4; for removing each lamp post at the rate of \$4; for resetting each lamp post at the rate of \$10; for fitting up each new lamp at the rate of \$10, in accordance with the specifications, be made for the year 1874, with the Harlem Gaslight Company, for the district of said company, being the lowest bidder for the above mentioned supply and work.

Whereupon the Chairman put the question upon the resolution; which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller and the Commissioner of Public Works—3.

The Comptroller also offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the contract for supplying the gas for each lamp and for the lighting and cleaning and reglazing the same, and replacing the cocks, tubes, and burners, crossheads, lamp irons and lanterns thereto, at the rate of \$33 per annum; for each lamp post straightened at the rate of \$3.50; for each column re-ledged at the rate of \$5; for each stand pipe refitted at the rate of \$5; for each lamp post removed at the rate of \$5; for each lamp post reset at the rate of \$12; for each new lamp post fitted up at the rate of \$12, in accordance with the specifications, be made for the year 1874 with the Metropolitan Gaslight Company, for that portion of the district of said company set forth in its proposal, which is not already awarded to the New York Mutual Gaslight Company, said Metropolitan Company being the lowest bidder for the above-mentioned supply and work.

#### HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending Feb. 14, 1874:

The total number of inspections made by the inspectors was 2,064, as follows, viz.: 5 public buildings, 1,008 tenement houses, 342 private dwellings, 59 other dwellings, 23 manufactorys and workshops, 13 stores and warehouses, 72 stables, 1 market, 54 slaughter houses, 1 bone factory, 5 breweries, 6 dumping grounds, 8 fat melting establishments, 3 head and gut cleaning establishments, 1 lime kiln, 3 manure dumps, 21 sunken and vacant lots, 27 yards, courts and areas, 83 cellars and basements, 80 waste pipes and drains, 146 privies and water closets, 70 street gutters and sidewalks, 4 dangerous stairways, 4 cisterns and cesspools, 10 other nuisances, together with 5 visits of the sanitary inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of report's thereon received by the inspectors was 519.

During the past week 46 complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the inspectors for investigation and report.

The disinfecting corps have visited 58 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 58 houses, 58 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, &c.

Two cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital by the ambulance corps.
