#### MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By unanimous consent, Assistant Alderman Brucks offered the following resolution.

Resolved, That Peter B. Masterson be and he is hereby elected to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Henry A. Linden, late a member of the Board of Assistant Aldermen, from the Nineteenth District of this City.

Assistant Alderman Wade moved to lay the resolution on the table.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the negative by the following vote :
