REGULAR MEETING, 9.30 A. M.

Present—Commissioner Wenman, President, Commissioners Conover, Lane, and Green.
The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.
The following communications were received:
From the Director of the Menagerie, reporting on the communication of Mr. Henry offering to sell twelve deer.

From H. W. Hayden, complaining of the condition of the road leading to the depot in the Spuyten Duyvil district.
Referred to the Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.
From H. W. Denicke—In relation to the condition of the northeast corner of Third avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-third street.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said motion, and it was determined in the negative, a majority of all the members of the Board not voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Noes—Commissioners Wenman and Lane—2.
Commissioner Lane moved that it be referred to the Superintendent Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards to report upon the removal of the said signs.
The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said motion, and it was determined in the negative, a majority of all the members of the Board not voting in favor thereof, as follows:
Ayes—Commissioners Wenman and Lane—2.
Noes—Commissioners Conover and Green—2.
From the Engineer of Construction in relation to the repairs to the southwest wall of Sedgwick avenue.

Resolved, That a 12-inch sewer pipe and basins be constructed in One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, at a cost not exceeding three hundred and fifty dollars, that the Engineer of Construction furnish specifications for the same, and that the Treasurer be directed to issue an order for building said sewer and basins.
The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

The President decided the said resolution out of order, not being in writing.
Commissioner Green appealed from the decision of the Chair.
The President put the question whether the Board would agree to sustain the decision of the

Chair, and it was determined in the negative, a majority of all the members of the Board not voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 2, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,757, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 820 tenement-houses, 62 private dwellings, 82 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 22 stores and warehouses, 53 stables, 38 slaughter-houses, 1 lime kiln, 1 garbage dump, 2 manure dumps, 1 public sewer, 1 fat-melting establishment, 1 soap factory, 1 gas works, 52 sunken and vacant lots, 1 lard-rendering establishment, 1 smoke house, 1 foundry, 1 lodging house, 1 tannery, 60 yards, courts and areas, 91 cellars and basements, 147 waste-pipes and drains, 190 privies and water-closets, 26 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 6 cesspools, 16 other nuisances, and 59 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 556.

During the past week 172 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 105 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

102 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 71 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 70 houses, 70 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of contagious disease was removed to Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 597 births, 42 still-births, 178 marriages, and 529 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 2, 1880; this shows an increase of 57 births, and a decrease of 1 still-births, 26 marriages, and 42 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was a decrease of 27 births, and an increase of 3 still-births, 3 marriages, and 31 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small pox decreased 2; measles, 4; erysipelas, 1; malarial fevers, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 23; inanition, 7; alcoholism, 3; bronchitis, 1; heart diseases, 3; aneurism, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 10; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and pretermatural births, 4; drowning, 1; while the deaths from scarlatina, increased 3; diphtheria, 1; croup, 2; whooping cough, 2; typhoid fever, 4; puerperal diseases, 1; cancer, 6; phthisis pulmonalis, 5; pneumonia, 6; convulsions, 5; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 11; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 4, and suicide, 2. The number of deaths from cerebro-spinal fever was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 83 were in institutions, 299 in tenement houses, 134 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 3 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 121 on the first, 145 on the second, 99 on the third, 42 on the fourth, 21 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 525 were stated to be residents of New York City and 4 non-residents; 61 were stated to be single, 135 married, 62 widowed, and the condition of 271 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 2, 1880, was 61.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.942, the mean humidity was 72, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1043, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.14 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

At Morgue, Bellevue Hospital, from Seventh Precinct Station-house—Unknown man; aged about 27 years; 5 feet 8 inches high; brown hair, and moustache; dark eyes. Had on black diagonal coat and vest, brown and white pants, white shirt, white knit undershirt, white socks, black felt hat.

Unknown woman, from foot of Seventeenth street, East river; aged about 50 years; 5 feet high; brown hair; blue eyes. Had on dark calico wrapper, dark striped woolen skirt, white chemise, light calico apron, brown cotton stockings, laced gaiters.

Unknown man, from Pier 23, North river; aged about 40 years; 5 feet 7 inches high; black hair; moustache and goatee. Had on black coat and vest, dark striped pants, white shirt, white cotton flannel drawers, brown woolen socks, Oxford tie shoes.

Unknown man, from Fifth Precinct Station-house; aged about 40 years; 5 feet 6 inches high; brown hair and chin whiskers; gray eyes. Had on black frock coat, gray vest, blue flannel pants, white cotton flannel drawers, gray flannel undershirt, blue striped calico shirt, blue socks, gaiters, black felt hat.

CHAPTER 195.

AN ACT in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assessment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Sec. 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Sec. 4. No provision of this act hereinbefore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of Real Estate in said city, that, as provided by chapter 123 of the Laws of 1880, they may now pay any arrears of taxes and Croton water rents levied prior to the year 1877, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum. If, however, such taxes and Croton water rents are not paid before the first day of October next, the property on which they are due will be sold for taxes immediately thereafter, with the addition of accrued interest thereon at the rate of 12 per cent. per annum from the respective dates on which they were levied.

Lists for such tax sale are now being prepared by the Clerk of Arrears.

The time of payment of taxes for the years 1877, 1878, and 1879, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, is extended to the first day of April, 1881, and if not paid before that date, interest will be payable at the rate of twelve per cent. per annum.

The Act, chapter 123, Laws of 1880, containing these provisions of law, is published below.

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed, and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over even per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
