

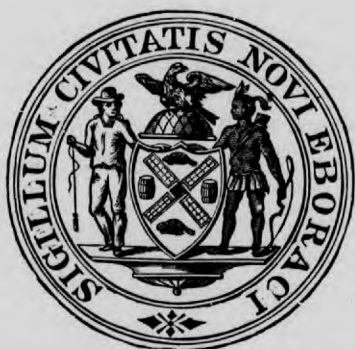

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS—OFFICE OF THE ENGINEER-IN-CHIEF,
PIER "A," FOOT OF BATTERY PLACE, N. R.,
NEW YORK, August 1, 1887.

To the Board of Docks:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of the work under my supervision for the quarter ending 31st July, 1887:

Pier "A," North River.

Various small repairs were made to the building on Pier "A," as required.

Chambers Street Section—Resolutions of the Board, 24th November, 1877, and 21st November, 1878.

The new-made land was cleaned of rubbish, and water was drained from its surface into the sewer. The section office doors were repaired.

North Moore Street Section—Resolution of the Board, 28th April, 1880.

BULKHEAD WALL.

Work was resumed on this section of the bulkhead wall on the 7th July.
Dredging—The Union Dredging Company excavated and removed 8,920 cubic yards of mud under Treasurer's Order No. 12421.
Stone Filling—Messrs. Brown & Fleming delivered and put in place 390 cubic yards of small cobble stone.

Beach Street Section—Resolution of the Board, 16th July, 1879.

BULKHEAD WALL.

Work was resumed on this section of the bulkhead wall on 30th May.
Dredging—The Union Dredging Company excavated and removed 1,180 cubic yards of mud under Treasurer's Order No. 12267.
Stone Filling—The Department force washed the accumulated mud from the surface of the stone filling with a water jet.
Piling and Woodwork—Broken piles were sawed off by the diver, and the foundation was cleared of bark and other rubbish. 64 vertical piles were driven and one pile was broken in driving.

Laight Street Section—Resolutions of the Board, 30th July and 3d November, 1880.

BULKHEAD WALL.

Work was resumed on this section of the bulkhead wall on the 28th May.
Dredging—The Union Dredging Company excavated and removed 2,884 cubic yards of mud, under Treasurer's Order No. 12267.
Stone Filling—The Department force washed the accumulated mud from the surface of the stone filling in place.
Piling and Woodwork—151 vertical and 24 bracing piles were driven, regulated and stay-lathed. 4 vertical piles were broken in driving, 2 binding frames were made and put in place. 45 low cut and 75 high cut vertical piles were cut off by machine.
Masonry—Measurements were taken for lengths and number of concrete foundation blocks required.

APPROACH TO PIER, NEW 27.

The plank approach was shored up.

WATCHMAN'S SHANTY.

The Watchman's house, also used for small stores, was cleaned, repaired and moved from the new bulkhead wall to the old bulkhead between Beach and Hubert streets.

Spring Street Section.

BULKHEAD WALL.

96 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were deposited at the toe of the wall, after the removal of the pier. This could not be put in at the time the wall was built.

PIER, NEW 37, NORTH RIVER.

The work of removing the existing Pier, new 37, North river, and the building of a new pier on the site thereof, by the lessees was begun.

PIER, NEW 41, NORTH RIVER.

The force of the Department removed pavement and excavated for a new silt basin near Pier, new 41, in the new paved land; a new silt basin was put therein with a 6-inch drain pipe, connecting with the brick sewer, by the Jordan L. Mott Iron Works, under Treasurer's Order No. 12347, and the earth filling was replaced. The pavement was relaid by Mr. George Doak, under Treasurer's Order No. 12365, and the joints were filled with coarse gravel and coal tar by Department labor.

West Twenty-third Street Section, South End—Resolution of the Board, 5th November, 1880.

PIER, NEW 54, NORTH RIVER.

The temporary roadway to the pier was repaired.

West Thirty-first Street Section—Resolutions of the Board, 8th August and 19th September, 1883.
EARTH FILLING.

9,494 loads of earth filling were received on tickets, and 943 loads of filling were received free from the Department of Street Cleaning, and were deposited in the rear of the bulkhead wall. Total to date, 10,225 loads on tickets, 1,364 loads free, and 943 loads from the Department of Street Cleaning.

WEST THIRTIETH STREET OFFICE.

The office was removed from the leased Pier, new 60, to the earth filling immediately north of it.

West Thirty-second Street Section—Resolution of the Board, 22d October, 1885.
BULKHEAD WALL.

Dredging—The Union Dredging Company excavated and removed 7,215 cubic yards of mud under Treasurer's Order No. 12194; 1,893 cubic yards of mud under Treasurer's Order No. 12320, and a sunken wreck under Treasurer's Order No. 12335. Total number of cubic yards of mud excavated and removed to date, 49,079.

Stone Filling—Messrs. Brown and Fleming delivered and put in place 1,480 cubic yards of small cobble stone under Treasurer's Order No. 12298, and 452 cubic yards under Treasurer's Order No. 12358; also 1,538 cubic yards of rip-rap under Treasurer's Order No. 12092, and 1,904 cubic yards under Treasurer's Order No. 12299. Total to date in the wall, 9,872 cubic yards of small cobble stone and 13,567 cubic yards of rip-rap stone.

Piling and Woodwork—330 vertical and 59 bracing piles were driven, regulated and stay-lathed, and 2 vertical and 1 bracing piles were broken in driving. Total to date, 992 vertical and 158 bracing piles, exclusive of the broken piles. 5 binding frames were made and placed, making a total of 12, and the thirteenth frame was begun. 104 low-cut piles were sawed off by machine and the remaining high-cut piles were cut off by hand. 216 linear feet of longitudinal capping, and 23 transverse caps were put in place and the ends of the transverse caps were chocked, and trimmed to receive the granite. 476 square feet of the 4-inch decking were placed on the capping. The usual location was made and recorded of the low-cut foundation piles, the pile butts were rafted and put in the West Thirtieth street basin and the piles delivered for the work under Treasurer's Order No. 12230 were inspected.

Masonry—5 concrete foundation blocks were brought down from West Fifty-seventh Street Yard and were set in place, and the chain grooves were filled with concrete in bags. 74 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 210½ batches of concrete, and the joints in the granite were pointed.

PIER, NEW 61, NORTH RIVER.

The Union Dredging Company removed 52,711 cubic yards of mud from the site of the pier and from the slips on each side of it, under Treasurer's Orders Nos. 12231 and 12308.

Yellow pine timber delivered by the Hilton Timber and Lumber Company for this pier, under Treasurer's Order No. 12309, was received, rafted, inspected, and cared for.

Contractor Joseph Walsh began the work of building the pier on the 1st July, 1887, under Contract No. 248.

EARTH FILLING.

2,996 loads of earth filling were received on tickets and 1,038 loads free were received from the Department of Street Cleaning, and were deposited in rear of the wall.

MOORING PILES.

3 new mooring piles and 3 old piles were driven as moorings for floating property during the work on this section.

New Pier and Approach at West Fortieth Street, North River.

Richard Cronin, contractor, finished and completed the work of building the new pier and approach at the foot of West Fortieth street on the 30th June, 1887, under his contract therefor, No. 231. The premises were occupied by the lessees on the 1st May, 1887.

New Pier and Approach at the foot of West Thirty-seventh Street, North River—Resolution of the Board 25th June, 1887.

The work of removing the old structures was begun 30th July. The dredging in the northerly half slip was begun 27th July, 1887, and 3,454 cubic yards of mud were removed therefrom by the Union Dredging Company under Treasurer's Order No. 12396.

New Pier and Approach at the foot of West Thirty-eighth Street, North River—Resolution of the Board 25th June, 1887.

The Union Dredging Company removed 20,140 cubic yards of mud from the northerly half slips under Treasurer's Order No. 12381.

Crib Bulkhead, West Seventy-seventh to West Seventy-eighth Street, North River—Contract No. 243.

A new crib bulkhead extending from the northerly line of West Seventy-seventh street to the existing crib work near the southerly line of West Seventy-eighth street, was finished and completed ready for the earth filling in its rear, on the 20th July, by Mr. William P. Kelly, contractor, under his contract therefor.

New Pier and Crib Bulkhead at the foot and southerly of West One Hundred and Thirty-second Street, North River—Contract No. 246.

Messrs. O'Connell & Coffey, contractors, began work on the 18th July in dredging for and building a new crib bulkhead at and southerly of West One Hundred and Thirty-second street, and in preparing for and building a new wooden pier at the foot of the street.

Pier, new 32, East River—Resolution of the Board 1st December, 1886.

The Union Dredging Company excavated and removed 4,334 cubic yards of mud and 4,743 cubic yards of crib, from the site of the new pier, and in the half slips adjoining.

Contract No. 241.

John Gillies, contractor, continued the work of building Pier, new 32, East river, and of repairing the bulkhead at the foot of Pike Slip, under his contract therefor.

Crib Bulkhead at the foot of East Seventy-sixth Street, East River—Contract No. 247.

John Gillies, contractor, began the work on the 25th July of building a new crib bulkhead on piles, under his contract therefor.

Dumping-board at East Eightieth Street, East River—Contract No. 245.

W. Danforth, contractor, began and finished a dumping-board, with approach thereto, under his contract therefor.

West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

Blacksmiths made and repaired iron work for different sections and for floating property. Carpenters prepared moulds for concrete foundation blocks. Laborers made 23 concrete foundation blocks, containing a total of about 735 cubic yards of concrete. 2,999 barrels of Portland cement were received, tested and stored for Department use. One sample of cement was tested for private parties by order of the Board.

East Seventeenth Street Yard.

The Yard has been maintained and the property there has been taken care of. Granite has been issued for construction. Messrs. Nolan & Sons have made two deliveries of granite under their contract therefor, No. 230.

Floating Property.

The list of the floating property of the Department is as follows:

100-ton derrick, "City of New York."
10-ton derrick.

Boring machine, "Woodcock."
Divers' scow, "G."
Small divers' scow.
9 yawls, 2 bateaux, 3 skiffs, and 3 sounding boats.
100-ton derrick, "City of New York"—The crew and force of floating property calked deck and circle, oiled fall, head ropes, chains, shackles, etc., repaired boiler, machinery, life lines on boom and tower steps in engine room and gantline block, packed valves, piston rods, water glasses, etc., blacked boiler, scraped circle and put in circle rope, and cleaned engines, machinery, etc.
The derrick loaded five concrete blocks at the yard, was towed to West Thirty-second Street Section and after setting them was towed back to the yard. Lifted Pile Driver No. 6 from the water and placed it on the deck of Scow "D" for repairs at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard. After repairs were made it put the pile-driver back in the water.
The 10-ton Derrick—The force of the Department worked at engines, boiler and machinery, repaired door, scraped and oiled boom and mast, cleaned water-tank and pumped out bilges.

From May 13 to June 3 and from July 13 to date the derrick has been engaged setting granite at West Thirty-second Street Section. The Police Department inspected its boiler on the 16th June.

Tug "Manhattan"—The tug was laid up at the Atlantic Dock basin until 7th May, when it returned to the West Fifty-seventh Street Yard, and it has done all the towing of the Department since that date. While laid up as above the Pioneer Iron Works repaired engines, etc., under Treasurer's Order No. 12282, finishing on the 6th of May; Thomas C. Townsend, under Treasurer's Order No. 12276, repaired pipes, etc., of water-closet, and on the 6th May the United States Inspectors inspected hull and boiler. It was laid up on May 16 and June 24, 1887, to clean the boiler. The force of the Department repaired machinery, pilot house, boat chocks, window sashes, etc., painted house, smoke stack, small boats, canvas boat covers, life preservers and lettered same, sewed canvas on boiler, lettered zinc sign with name "Manhattan" on stern. Messrs. Devoe & Co., under Treasurer's Order No. 12302, furnished cask sal soda; John F. Rogers & Co., under Treasurer's Order No. 12383, furnished 4 x 4 I. L. oil cups, and under Treasurer's Order No. 12433, furnished 50 pounds Albany grease.

On June 20, 1887, at about 2.40 P.M. the Hunter's Point Ferry boat "Flushing" ran into the "Manhattan" when off East Thirty-fourth Street Ferry, East River, and did considerable damage, as follows: broke guard fender rail, knees, etc., under deck, loosened house from deck and plank.

The hired tugs of Victor Vierow did all the towing required by the Department while the "Manhattan" was laid up from the 1st to the 7th May, 1887.

Dredges Nos. 3 and 4 remain in the possession of the Union Dredging Company.

Pile Driver No. 1—No work required.

Pile Driver No. 2—Is now at work on general repairs. The force of the Department fitted up new upright boiler with steam pipes, fittings, engines, machinery, etc., put on new smoke stack, repaired house, ways, deck, water tank, hatches, engine frame, etc., calked deck and water tank. July 11, 1887, the barge "Chicago," in tow of tug "Bluestone," broke a side shore on ways of No. 2, which the Department force repaired, under Secretary's Order No. 6781, at a cost of \$15. June 16, 1887, Police Department inspected boiler.

Pile Driver No. 3—Is now at work on Lighthouse Street Section. The force of the Department put new lagging on drum, repaired ways, windlass bits, water tank, deck, machinery and house, calked water tank and deck, cleaned boiler and machinery, and are building a set of new ways at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard. The following material has been received for the new ways: Bell Bros., under Treasurer's Order No. 12332, furnished 21 pieces 1½ x 10"-13" spruce; Patterson Bros., under Treasurer's Order No. 12342, furnished 202 pounds of square and round washers and 1,715 pounds angle iron 6 bars; Charles L. Bucki & Co., under Treasurer's Order No. 12331, furnished 4,877 feet B.M. yellow pine. June 16, 1887, Police Department inspected boiler.

Pile Driver No. 5 (fitted up as a pile cutter)—Has been at Lighthouse Street Section and at West Thirty-second Street Section, and is now at the last-named place. The force of the Department repaired house, machinery, hatch cover, etc., painted house and ways. May 22, 1887, Police Department inspected boiler.

Pile Driver No. 6—Is now at work on Lighthouse Street Section. The force of the Department removed ways from deck on May 11, placed it on the deck of Scow "D" at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard, stripped sides, deck, etc., scraped bottom, cut out old end logs and replaced with new, put in new bit, plugged spike-holes, laid new deck plank, put in and fastened eleven six-inch hackmatack knees, calked bottom, sides and deck, put on side and end plank, wearing-pieces, chocks, iron-work, etc., repaired steam-pipes, engines and machinery, house, ways, hatches, etc., and on June 3, placed it in the water at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard and placed ways on its deck, painted house, ways, etc.

Pile Driver No. 7—Is now at work on general repairs. The force of the Department worked at engines, boiler, steam-pipes and machinery. July 23, Police Department inspected boiler.

Pile Driver No. 8—Is laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard. The force of the Department edged new yellow pine for deck and worked at boiler and machinery.

Pile Driver No. 9—Is laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard in good order. The force of the Department repaired house, roof, ways, pipes, machinery, etc., made new window-sash, put in glass, put on chocks, screwed up bolts in ways and cleaned boiler and machinery.

Pile Driver No. 10—Is laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard. The force of the Department repaired ways and machinery, cut pump-holes in deck and made plugs for same. May 22, Police Department inspected boiler.

Pile Driver No. 11—Is now at West Thirty-second Street Section. The force of the Department repaired ways and machinery.

Boring-machine "Woodcock"—Is laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard. The force of the Department repaired canvas on roof, house, engines and machinery, painted roof. June 2, Police Department inspected boiler.

Divers' Scow "G"—Has been at work on general repairs, Lighthouse Street Section, and is now at West Thirty-second Street Section.

Small Divers' Scow—Is laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard in good order.

Deck Scow "B"—Has been in use from time to time, and is now at West Thirty-second Street Section. The force of the Department calked deck and cleaned out hold.

Deck Scow "C"—Has been in use from time to time, and is now laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard in good order.

Deck Scow "D"—Has been in use from time to time, and is now laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard loaded with new creosoted timber, and is in good order.

Deck Scow "E"—Has been in use from time to time, and is now at West Thirty-second Street Section.

Deck Scow "F"—(Used and fitted up with coal-pockets for carrying coal to different parts of the work) Is in good order.

Scow "Jim"—Is laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

Scow "May"—Is laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard, and is not worth repairing.

Scow "Willie"—Is now at West Thirty-second Street Section. The force of the Department calked its top and sides.

New deck scow—Is now under construction at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard by the force of the Department. The bottom side logs and fore and aft beams are on, all the cross-trusses are in and fastened, part of the side plank is on and one end is framed. A. J. Murray furnished the yellow pine and white oak under Treasurer's Orders No. 12150 and No. 12151.

New land ways—The force of the Department are building a set of land ways for general use, also fitting hammer for ways. The yellow pine used was furnished by A. J. Murray, under a Treasurer's order therefor.

Small boats—Repaired and painted Skiff No. 1 and Surveyor's Boat No. 1. Painted Yawl Boat No. 14 and new Yawl Boat No. 19.

Drill—Put up one No. 3 upright hand and power drill in blacksmith shop at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard. Messrs. Manning, Maxwell & Moore furnished drill and drills, under Treasurer's Order No. 12361.

Pier "A," North River.

Made and varnished cabinet in Room 9, painted and lettered gate, repaired furniture, doors, windows, etc., placed and bolted in deck two cast-iron fenders at gate entrance, cemented brick work and tops of boilers and repaired water-pipe.

East Seventeenth Street Yard.

Repaired machinery and cleaned engines, boiler, etc., put cover on mast-head.

June 17, 1887—Police Department inspected boiler.

Various other small pieces of work have been done on account of floating property, office fittings, automatic tide-gauges, etc.

Material Furnished for General Use of Floating Property.

George L. Van Emburg, under Treasurer's Order No. 12379, furnished 2,036 feet B. M. of white pine, ½-inch, 1-inch, 1½-inch, and 1¾-inch.

William B. Ferguson & Son, under Treasurer's Order No. 12405, furnished two horsing beetles and handles and 200 hickory ship wedges.

The Eureka Manufacturing Co., under Treasurer's Order No. 12429, furnished 111 pounds Queen Lubricant.

Alfred J. Murray, under Treasurer's Order No. 12304, furnished 7,630 feet B. M. of yellow pine.

Surveying Party.

The surveying party has given all the lines and levels required for the various work of the Department and the various levels over the wall and pavement have been taken as usual.

Six surveys have been made on the North river water-front, seven on that of the East river and one on the Harlem river, four of which on the North river, two on the East river and one on the Harlem river were in connection with the supervision of work done by private parties under permit from the Board, and plots of the same have been made for the records of the Department. The necessary lines have been determined upon and given for work under permit.

21,660 disc soundings have been taken by the surveying and sounding parties in 87 slips and 743 rod soundings in 6 slips, of which 9,570 disc soundings, in 42 slips, and 438 rod soundings, in 3 slips, were on the North river, and 12,090 disc soundings, in 45 slips, and 305 rod soundings, in 3 slips, were on the East and Harlem rivers. The greater part of these soundings have been recorded, including those that stood unrecorded at the end of the previous quarter, and the remainder, taken this quarter, are nearly ready for record.

The automatic tide-gauges have been attended to.

Statement of Dredging done by Department of Docks.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

No ice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents. All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment.
