

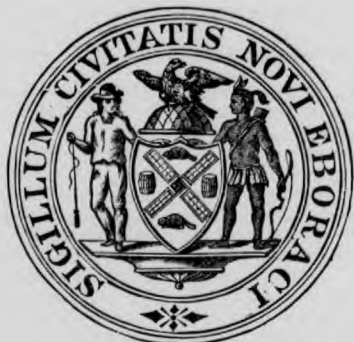

Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 2; croup, 3; whooping cough, 8; alcoholism, 3; cancer, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 13; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 9; convulsion, 2; apoplexy, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 9; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; surgical operations, 2; suicide, 2; drowning, 2; while the deaths from small-pox increased 3; scarlatina, 3; diphtheria, 6; typhoid fever, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; malarial fevers, 5; puerperal diseases, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 1; inanition, 5; rheumatism and gout, 4; bronchitis, 6; pneumonia, 12; heart diseases, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 8; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; premature and preterm births, 1. The number of deaths from erysipelas and cirrhosis and hepatitis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 134 were in institutions, 389 in tenement-houses, 161 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 136 on the first, 181 on the second, 135 on the third, 64 on the fourth, 31 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 693 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 8 non-residents; 69 were stated to be single, 166 married, 72 widowed, and the condition of 394 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 701; still-births, 55; bodies in transit, 16; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 71 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 553 births; 221 marriages; 16 still-births; 701 deaths; 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 150 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 16 transcripts of the birth record, 10 of marriage, and 90 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending April 10, 1886, was 44.0 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.919, the mean humidity was 68, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,504, and the total amount of rain-fall was 3.07 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
