APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending Oct. 2, 1886.

Resolved, That the fifteenth day of October, 1886, at eleven o'clock A. M., and the Committee Room, Board of Aldermen, No. 13 City Hall, be and are hereby designated as the time and place when and where the application of "The North and East River Railway Company," to the Common Council of the City of New York for its consent for the construction, maintenance and operation of the street surface railroad proposed to be constructed and maintained by said company as mentioned in their petition for such consent, will first be considered, and that public notice of such application and of the time and place when such application will first be considered, be given by the Clerk of this Board, by publishing the same for fourteen days, excluding Sundays, in two daily newspapers of this city, to be designated therefor by his Honor the Mayor, according to the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, such advertising to be at the expense of the petitioner.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 22, 1886.

Approved by the Mayor, September 27, 1886, and the "New York Times" and "New York Sun" were designated as such papers.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to N. Murray to place and keep a watering-trough on the sidewalk, near the curb, in front of No. 86 Watts street, the work to be done and water supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 8, 1886.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, September 25, 1886, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That the Department of Public Parks be and is hereby directed to cause the obstructions at the intersections of Vanderbilt and Webster avenues and One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, caused by the fences of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, to be removed, so as to open said One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street for the free uses of the public.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 8, 1886.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, September 25, 1886, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That a crosswalk of two courses of blue stone be laid across Fourteenth street, about one hundred and twenty feet west of Sixth avenue, opposite the main entrance of the Fourteenth Street Theatre, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 8, 1886.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, September 25, 1886, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That the carriageway of One Hundred and Fortieth street, from the crosswalk on the east side of Third avenue to the crosswalk on the west side of Willis avenue, be paved with trap-block pavement, except where crosswalks at any intersecting avenues are now laid, and that such crosswalks be relaid where not on grade, under the direction of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 8, 1886.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, September 25, 1886, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected and street-lamps placed thereon and lighted in One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, from Eighth avenue to St. Nicholas avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 8, 1886.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, September 25, 1886, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That One Hundred and Seventy-second street, from Bathgate avenue to Washington avenue, be regulated, graded and curb-stones set, under the direction of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 8, 1886.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, September 25, 1886, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That Rider avenue, from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth to One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 8, 1886.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, September 25, 1886, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That a free improved iron drinking-hydrant (for man and beast) be placed on the northeast corner of Third and Westchester avenues, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 8, 1886.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, September 25, 1886, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That the carriageway of One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, from the crosswalk on the east side of Third avenue to the crosswalk on the west side of Willis avenue, be paved with trap-block pavement, except where crosswalks at any intersecting avenue are now laid, and that such crosswalks be relaid where not on grade, under the direction of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 8, 1886.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, September 25, 1886, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Hon. William C. Whitney and Cornelius Vanderbilt to substitute granite-block pavement for the pavement in the carriageway of the street in front of their respective residences, Nos. 1 and 2 West Fifty-seventh street, and extending westwardly about one hundred and fifty feet, the work done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, August 20, 1886.

Approved by the Mayor, September 25, 1886.

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to John A. Morris to repave, with Trinidad asphalt pavement, at his own expense, the roadways or carriageways of Madison avenue and East Thirtieth street, within the following limits, viz.: On Madison avenue, from the southerly crosswalk at Thirtieth street to a distance fifty feet north of Thirtieth street, and on Thirtieth street, from the easterly crosswalk at Madison avenue to a distance of one hundred feet west of the westerly line of Madison avenue, the present stone blocks and crosswalks stones to be delivered for the use of the Department of Public Works where required, "and Mr. John A. Morris to stipulate that such new pavement be kept in good order and repair for the period of five years, at his own expense," the work to be done under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 29, 1886.

POLICE DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, No. 300 MULBERRY STREET, {
BUREAU OF ELECTIONS, NEW YORK, October 4, 1886. }

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, and by virtue of the authority therein conferred upon the Board of Police, the division of the several Assembly Districts in the City and County of New York into Election Districts, and the boundaries of said Election Districts are hereby fixed by said Board as follows:

First Assembly District.

The First Assembly District shall be divided into twenty-five election districts, the extent and limits of which shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Beaver street, Old slip, East river, Whitehall street, and Broadway.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Broadway, Battery place, and Greenwich street.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Morris street, Greenwich street, Battery place, and Washington street.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Washington street, Battery place, and Hudson or North river.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Greenwich street, Morris street, and Washington street.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Albany street, Greenwich street, Rector street, and Hudson or North river.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Greenwich street, Albany street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Broadway, Rector street, and Greenwich street.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Maiden lane, East river, Old slip, Hanover square, William street, Beaver street, and Broadway, including Franklin Market.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Ferry street, Peck slip, East river, Maiden lane, and Gold street.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spruce street, Gold street, Liberty street, Broadway, and Park row.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Dey street, Broadway, Liberty street, and Hudson or North river.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Barclay street, Broadway, Dey street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Reade street, Broadway, Barclay street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fifteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Franklin street, Broadway, Reade street, and Hudson street.

The Sixteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Harrison street, Hudson street, Reade street, and Hudson or North river.

The Seventeenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within North Moore street, Hudson street, Harrison street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Hubert street, Hudson street, North Moore street, and Hudson or North river.

The Nineteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Beach street, Varick street, North Moore street, West Broadway, Franklin street, and Hudson street.

The Twentieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Broadway, Franklin street, West Broadway, North Moore street, Varick street, Beach street, St. John's lane, and Laight street.

The Twenty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Laight street, St. John's lane, Beach street, and Hudson street.

The Twenty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Desbrosses street, Greenwich street, Laight street, Hudson street, Hubert street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twenty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Hudson street, Laight street, and Greenwich street.

The Twenty-fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Greenwich street, Desbrosses street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twenty-fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Battery place, Bowling Green, Whitehall street, East river, Hudson or North river, Governor's Island, Bedloe's Island, and Ellis' Island.

Second Assembly District.

The Second Assembly District shall be divided into twenty-eight election districts, the extent and limits of which shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Oak street, Catharine street, Catharine slip, East river, and Oliver street.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Chatham square, Catharine street, Oak street, and Oliver street.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within New Bowery, Oliver street, Oak street, and James street.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Park row, New Bowery, James street, Madison street, and Roosevelt street.

The Twenty-sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Thirteenth street, Eighth avenue, Horatio street, Greenwich street, and Ninth avenue.

The Twenty-ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Twenty-seventh street, Seventh avenue, West Twenty-sixth street, and Eighth avenue.

The Twenty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-first street, Ninth avenue, West Fortieth street, and Tenth avenue.

East Forty-sixth street, Second avenue, East Forty-fifth street, and Third avenue.

The Twenty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Pelham avenue, Cambrelling avenue, Crescent avenue, Jefferson avenue, Locust avenue, Morris street and Railroad avenue.

The Twenty-fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within road to Berrian's landing, Kingsbridge road, Railroad avenue, Morris street, Waverley street, McComb's Dam road, Morris lane, and Harlem river.

The Twenty-fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within northern boundary of Twenty-fourth Ward, Bronx river, Pelham avenue, Kingsbridge road, road to Berrian's landing, and Central avenue.

The Twenty-sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Tibbit's brook, Williamsbridge avenue, Central avenue, road to Berrian's landing, Harlem river, and Spuyten Duyvil creek.

The Twenty-seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within northern boundary of Twenty-fourth Ward, Central avenue, Williamsbridge avenue, Tibbit's brook, monumental line dividing William C. Wetmore's and the late James R. Whiting's land, and Hudson or North river.

The Twenty-eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, Willis avenue, East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Third avenue.

The Twenty-ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Forty-second street, Brook avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-first street, and Third avenue.

The Thirtieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, Brook avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-second street and Willis avenue.

The Thirty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Railroad avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, College avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-second street, Rider avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, and Harlem river.

The Thirty-eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Twenty-third Ward line, Old Boston road, East One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, and Fulton avenue.

The Thirty-ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within line of monuments dividing Wm. C. Wetmore and J. R. Whiting's land, Tibbit's brook, Spuyten Duyvil creek, and Hudson or North river.
