DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks held August 29, 1878.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held August 21, were read and approved.

A communication was received from the Old Dominion Steamship Co., accepting terms of resolution adopted August 14; and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Old Dominion Steamship Co. be and is hereby informed that the new pier to be built by this Department upon the site of Pier, old 37, North river, leased to said company by resolution adopted 14th inst., is to extend out to the new pier line, and that from and after May 1, 1879, and until this Department shall take possession of said Pier 37 for the purpose of building a new pier in place thereof this Department will keep the premises in proper condition, and do such dredging as may be required, and that said company be informed that their acceptance of the terms of said resolution of August 14, as contained in their communication of August 28, is satisfactory to this Board.

A petition was received from Carl Smith & Son to insert a drain-pipe in the bulkhead between Piers 57 and 58, East river; and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to Carl Smith & Son to insert in the bulkhead between Piers 57 and 58 East river, a drain-pipe to connect with their storehouse on East street, the consent of the owner of said bulkhead having been filed in this office, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and this permit to remain only during the pleasure of the Board.

A report was received from the Engineer-in-Chief, stating that there appeared to be no objection to the erection of a pile pier on the Harlem river in the vicinity of One Hundred and Fiftieth street, as petitioned for by Henry Lewis Morris; and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to Henry Lewis Morris to construct, at his own cost and expense, upon lands under water, owned by him, a pile pier about 150 feet in length and 15 x 30 feet in width, on the easterly side of the Harlem river, about 60 feet south of the southerly side of One Hundred and Fiftieth street. The outer end of said pier, when constructed, to be within the bulkhead line as established in 1868. The work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief and in accordance with plans on file in this Department.

A communication was presented by John J. Chase, Superintendent of Hoboken ferry, foot of Christopher street, requesting that three booths standing in front of the ferry premises be removed, as they prevent free access to said ferry, and that the carriages now in the habit of using the roadway, recently paved, be compelled to stand on the northerly side of the flagging of the southerly paved approach to said ferry premises, and Mr. Chase being heard as to the necessity of the changes referred to,

On motion, the Dock Superintendent of the District was directed to cause said booths to be removed without delay, and to cause the carriages to stand in the location as above designated.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Regulation 1, adopted by this Department for piers, bulkheads, and slips, be amended by striking out the words "for a longer time than twenty-four hours," as they appear on the last two lines of page 34 of the Manual, and inserting in place thereof the following, "after the Superintendent of Docks in the District shall have notified the owner or consignee of the goods to remove the same; but such notification shall not be made until such goods, etc., have been on the pier or bulkhead for forty-eight hours."

On motion, the following preamble and resolution was adopted:

Whereas, It appears that sundry articles of stationery have been purchased by the Department of John S. Hulin, as enumerated in his bills of July 30, 1877, for \$147.38, and June 6, 1878, for \$318.05, and that ice has been furnished by the Knickerbocker Ice Company to the Commissioners' office, and to the Christopher street office, as stated by the company's bills of June 30, 1878, for \$22.62, and July 6, 1878, for \$5.80, without in either case a certificate of necessity having been first issued therefor, as required by sec. 92 of chap. 335, Laws of 1873; and

Whereas, The said purchases were made in good faith, and the several articles have all been used for the uses and purposes of the Department; and

Whereas, The Counsel to the Corporation has advised the Commissioners orally that it is, under the circumstances, the duty of this Board to cause the required certificate of necessity to be indorsed upon all the said bills; therefore,

Resolved, That the President be and is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to enter upon the said bills the customary certificate of necessity, and that the bills be passed for payment with the next audit.

From Commissioners of Pilots, in reference to the dumping of three scow loads of dredged material in the harbor below Fort Wadsworth, on the 27th instant, in violation of the law, while in tow of steam tug "E. H. Webster."
