

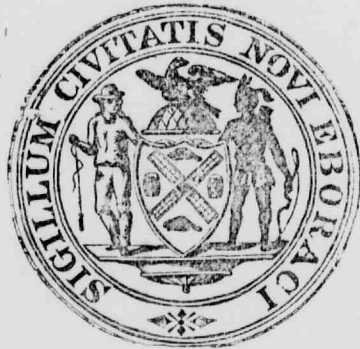

COMMUNICATIONS FROM DEPARTMENTS AND CORPORATION OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Public Administrator:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

The Public Administrator, pursuant to chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, chapter 7, section 242 of said act, herewith exhibits to the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York a statement on oath of the moneys received by him for commissions and expenses, and of the total amount of his receipts and expenditures in each case in which he took charge and collected any effects, or on which he administered on any estate during the year 1891, with the name of the deceased, his occupation, the place of his residence at the time of his death, when known, and the country or place from which he came, if he was not a resident of this State at the time of his death.

In the absence of the President, Commissioner Cram acted as President pro tem.

The minutes of the meeting held the 17th instant were read and approved.

Stephen A. Walker, attorney for the owners of certain land under water and bulkhead rights between the southerly line of West Twenty-sixth and the centre line of the block between West Twenty-fifth and West Twenty-sixth streets, lying westerly of Thirteenth avenue, appeared and declined the offer of the 10th instant for the purchase of the above premises, stating that his clients were willing to dispose of the said property for the sum of eighty-five thousand nine hundred and sixty-two dollars and fifty cents (\$85,962.50).

On motion, the matter was tabled until Thursday, December 31, 1891.

Abraham B. 1st. Report for the week ending December 19, 1891.

2d. Reporting the completion of the work of building the new Pier and approach foot of Forty-eighth street, North river, under Contract No. 386. The Dock Master directed to collect wharfage.

3d. Reporting damage to the new Pier foot of Forty-eighth street, North river, by the tug "Pier," and recommending that the repairs be made by the force of the Department. Recommendation adopted.

Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 10580, 10899, 11391, 11470, 11476, 11479, 11494, 11497, 11507, 11522, 11538 and 11567, that he had superintended driving piles and depositing rip-rap in front of the bulkhead, from Eightieth to Eighty-first street, North river; repairing Pier, old 33, North river; in reference to locating the "Crystal Boat Club" at One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street, North river; superintended extending sewer-pipe through the bulkhead, from premises at Nos. 14, 15 and 16, Thirteenth avenue; reference to the extension of Pier, new 34, North river; repaired sheathing on deck of Pier foot of Thirty-eighth street, East river, and on Pier foot of Seventy-ninth street, North river; superintended placing a steam-boiler and engine on the outer end of Pier, old 20, North river; repairing pavement in front of Pier 33, East river; repairing ferry racks, etc., foot of Liberty street, North river; cleaned the bulkhead between Piers, new 24 and 25, North river; repaired the bulkhead at approach to Pier foot of One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, North river; and stating that the pavement at Pier 4, East river, was repaved by the lessees.

On motion of Commissioner Cram, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to commence the work of removal of Pier, old 33, North river, January 11, 1892.

On motion of Commissioner Cram, the officer of the Central Rail Road Company of New Jersey, dated October 22, 1891, respecting Piers, old 12, 13 and 14, North river, was referred back to the Treasurer with a request that he report to the Board as soon as convenient what in his opinion would be a proper agreement and settlement to make with said company.

At the hour of eleven o'clock, Mr. E. G. Marsh, representing the Comptroller, being present, and the meeting open to the public, the President, in the presence of the representative of the Comptroller and such of the parties making proposals as were present, opened the estimate-box and publicly opened and read all the estimates or proposals which had been received in accordance with advertisements duly published in the CITY RECORD for the following works:

Messrs. Sherman T. Pell and George W. Carpenter, Supervisors of the Town of Westchester, appeared before the Board upon invitation, concerning the maintenance of the City Island Bridge. The Board made a proposition to the effect that it would contribute \$500 for repairs and \$300, the salary of a bridge man, making \$800 in all, provided the County of Westchester undertook to bear the expense of maintaining said bridge during the year 1892. Messrs. Pell and Carpenter stated that they would report said proposition to their Board and communicate their action to this Department.

Mr. Matthew J. Elgas, President of the Teachers' Association, appeared before the Board and asked permission to occupy one of the floors of the Arsenal Building in Central Park for an exhibition of geographical appliances, on behalf of the Teachers' Association.

Commissioner Gallup offered the following:

Resolved, That permission be and the same hereby is granted to the Teachers' Association to use the second floor of the Arsenal Building for a period of thirty days for an exhibition of geographical appliances, provided no entrance fee is charged.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Gallup, Straus, Dana, Tappen—4.

Mr. Herbert L. Satterlee appeared and was heard in relation to an application made by the Naval Reserve Association for permission to use Castle Garden as a drill-room and quarters for the Naval Reserve.

On motion, the application and the accompanying recommendations were referred to Commissioner Dana for consideration and report.

Mr. A. J. Hanrahan, chairman of a committee of citizens from Highbridge, was heard in the matter of providing approaches to the footways of the bridge over Harlem river, at Eighth avenue, to connect with the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street side.

The President presented the following report:

The President reports as follows:

The work for the coming year should be prepared as soon as possible. Last year contracts were not prepared and let until late. I have therefore directed that contracts be drawn at once to be advertised immediately after the 1st of January for the following works:

1. To continue the work on Fourth avenue parks.
2. For relaying asphalt in the city parks to the extent authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.
3. For gravel.
4. To complete the work on the Circle at One Hundred and Tenth street and Fifth avenue.
5. To continue the work on the One Hundred and Sixth street entrance to the park on the west side.

The funds available for these works can only be determined when the final estimates are passed on December 31. As much progress is being made as possible with the plans for the improvement and laying out of the new portion of the East River Park, to the end that this Department may early in the year present them to the Board of Estimate, in order that an issue of bonds may be authorized under the Laws of 1887, chapter 320.

In addition, the subject of laying out the triangle at Seventieth street and the Boulevard must be taken up. For the information of the Board a report of the Engineer of Construction and a plan by Mr. Vaux are herewith submitted.

In addition to this work and the work mentioned in my last report, viz.: setting out trees on the west side of the park, it will be necessary for the Department to make an intelligent beginning in the direction of repairing the structures in the various parks. This work in some cases will require large expenditures, but instead of patching here and there, as has been done heretofore, a better result will undoubtedly be reached by a liberal expenditure on a few buildings, putting them in complete order, leaving the others to be repaired in the same way next year.

I omitted to mention in my last report that on the third day of December the force was put on half time. This is not unusual at this time of the year. It is expected by the men, and it is preferable to discharging a portion of them. By this means the appropriations at hand will last until the 31st of December. Last year before the system of checks on the Superintendent's figures, which has been in use all this year, was devised, it was found necessary to lay off the whole force the day before Christmas upon his representation that sufficient funds were not in hand. Although this turned out to be erroneous, yet the possibility of such an occurrence has been since obviated.

Commissioner Straus, who for some time past has been looking into the system of accounts in use at the Arsenal, is about to recommend some changes, among which will be the adoption of a general stock or property ledger in which shall be entered under proper heads every item of property received or issued by the Property Clerk, so that at a glance the precise quantities of property on hand can be ascertained. Such a book of account is not kept in the Department, but its usefulness was long since demonstrated by Mr. Barker, now President of the Tax Department, when he was a Commissioner of Accounts.

Mr. Boller was directed to prepare the maps for the use of the Counsel to the Corporation of the lands to be condemned for the approaches to the new Seventh Avenue Bridge without any further delay, and his reply to the communication of this Department is herewith submitted, in which he states that he is using every possible effort, with the assistance of the Department of Public Works, to comply with the directions of the Department.

A communication was written since the last meeting to the Commissioner of Public Works, requesting him to widen and make safe the temporary approach to the Seventh Avenue Bridge constructed by him. Mr. Gilroy's reply, stating that he has no appropriation on hand for that work, is submitted to the Board herewith.

Litigation between the City and the Suburban Railroad Company has resulted in a judgment of the Court of Appeals maintaining the claim of the Suburban Railroad Company, that it has the right to construct its road through St. Mary's and Bronx Parks. A copy of the opinion will be obtained at once, and also a copy of the route that was laid out for the railroad company prior to the acquisition of the park property. This result is to be deplored, as the beauty of Bronx Park and St. Mary's Park will be in a great measure destroyed; but, on the other hand, access to these parks will be greatly facilitated.

Second—That the abstract of our said estimate and assessment, together with our damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates and other documents used by us in making our report, have been deposited with the Commissioner of Public Works of the City of New York, at his office, No. 31 Chambers street, in the said city, there to remain until the fourth day of February, 1892.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lots, pieces or parcels of land, situate, lying and being in the City of New York, which taken together are bounded and described as follows, viz: Northerly by the southerly line of a certain unnamed street and the northerly line of Devoe street; easterly by the centre line of the block between Summit avenue, Lind avenue and Sedgwick avenue, and Devoe street and Anderson avenue; southerly by a line drawn perpendicular to the southern extremity of the land to be acquired for the opening of Lind avenue; westerly by Sedgwick avenue and the centre line of the block between Lind avenue, Sedgwick avenue and a certain unnamed street; excepting from said area all the streets, avenues and roads, or portions thereof, heretofore legally opened, and all the unimproved land included within the lines of streets, avenues, roads, public squares and places shown and laid out upon any map or maps filed by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874, and the laws amendatory thereof, or of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, as such area is shown upon our benefit map deposited as aforesaid.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York at a Special Term thereof, to be held at the Chambers thereof, in the County Court-house, in the City of New York, on the 19th day of February, 1892, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
