Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor:

SIR—In compliance with the requirements of section 110 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 516 of the Laws of 1884, we herewith transmit the results of our examination of the Chamberlain's and Comptroller's offices for the third quarter of 1895, and submit statements as follows:

The balance in the City Treasury, Sinking Funds and Miscellaneous Accounts on September 30, 1895, was \$5,242,035.45, which agrees with the balances as stated in the Chamberlain's books, and also with the certificates of the officers of the several depository banks of concurrent date.
