Report for the Quarter ending December 31, 1898.

DEPARTMENT OF HIGHWAYS—COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, No. 150 NASSAU STREET, New York, March 21, 1899.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor:

DEAR SIR —In accordance with the provisions of section 1544 of the Charter of The City of New York, I make the following report of the operations of the Department of Highways for the quarter ending December 31, 1898:

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

For paving and repaving streets 18 contracts were entered into at an estimated cost of \$162,707.11; 28 contracts for paving and repaving streets were completed at a total cost of \$562,031.17, and 11 contracts for regulating and grading streets were completed at an aggregate expense of \$110,001.16.

Under these contracts the following items of work were done: 84,666 cubic yards of earth excavated, 8,535 cubic yards of rock excavated, 42,025 cubic yards of filling furnished, 14,257 lineal feet of curbstones set, 142,292 square feet of flagging laid, 47,018 square feet of flagging relaid, 930 cubic yards of retaining wall built, 79 lineal feet of culvert laid, 170 cubic yards of concrete laid, 2,669 cubic feet of cut granite laid and 43 granite caps placed.

For constructing vaults 31 permits were issued and \$34,088.72 was paid for this privilege.

A pavement repair force consisting of 235 mechanics, 252 laborers, 81 horses and carts, and four teams took up and relaid about 57,719 square yards of defective pavement.

Contracts were completed and accepted for laying granite pavement in four streets, asphalt blocks in six streets and sheet asphalt in eight streets; making in all 3.07 miles of new pavement.

At the close of the quarter there were in the Borough of Manhattan 403.22 lineal miles of

paved streets.

During the quarter 4,603 openings were made in the public streets to repair gas, water, sewer and electric-light connections. Of the pavements over these openings 9,602 inspections were

and electric-light connections. Of the pavements over these openings 9,602 inspections were made.

The following work was performed under permits from this Department: Fire-alarm subsidiary laid, 5.11 miles; subway and other appliances laid, 10.79 miles; gas-mains laid, 3.72 miles; gas-mains overhauled, 4.293 lineal feet, and steam mains laid, 4,226 lineal feet.

In the connection with the construction of underground electrical conduits for electric surface railways, I quote the following items of work: 3,130 lineal feet of double rail-tracks laid; 7,920 lineal feet of single rail-tracks laid; 43,700 square yards of stone and 8,027 square yards of asphalt pavement taken up; 36,340 square yards of stone pavement relaid, and 11,263 square yards of asphalt pavement relaid.

The macadam roads and unpaved streets in charge of the Bureau of Streets and Roads have been maintained in good condition. These items of work were accomplished: 3,530 square yards of macadam roadway repaired; 2,716 square yards of dirt roadway repaired: 26,107 square yards of macadam roadway regulated; 290 square yards of gutters regulated and graded; 874!/4 miles of roadway cleaned; 1,4863/4 miles of gutters cleaned; 461 miles of crosswalks cleaned; 845 loads of broken stone hauled and used; 1,723 loads of earth hauled and used; 46 loads of gravel hauled and used; 227 loads of gravel screenings hauled and used; 399 loads of stone screenings hauled and used; 277 washouts filled; 4,776 leads of refuse removed; 3,309 loads of stone screenings hauled and used; 277 washouts filled; 4,776 leads of refuse removed; 3,309 loads of sonow removed; 550 loads of Gneiss stone hauled and used; 97 loads of ashes hauled and used; 9 miles of gutters cleared of snow and 16 miles of sidewalks cleared of snow.

The number of complaints of obstructions on streets and sidewalks, received and attended to during the quarter, was 1,051. In all cases where it was found, upon examination, that the incumbrances were mote promptly complied with the obstructions were remov

Permits were issued by the Bureau of Incumbrances as follows: 964 to place building material on streets; 236 to cross sidewalks for the purpose of excavating lots for building purposes; 5 to cut down dead and dangerous shade-trees, and 84 to place temporary sheds over sidewalks in front

of new buildings in course of erection.

The sum of \$4,203.60 was expended in making seizures and removals of obstructions in the 131 cases referred to, including the removal of 746 loads of dirt, stone and rubbish; the throwing in of dirt, stone and rubbish on premises, at various locations, and the removal of 305 dead and dangerous trees, stumps and posts.

For the redemption of articles seized and removed to the Corporation Yard \$91.50 was paid by the owners, and \$420 was collected in fees for permits to place temporary sheds over side-

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

During the quarter work was in progress under 58 contracts for regulating and grading streets.

Eleven of these improvements have been completed. Of 13 contracts for regulating and paving nine have been finished; also two contracts for viaducts or bridges.

The mileage of new pavements laid is: Specification granite, .88 miles; sheet asphalt, 1.46 miles, and macadam, .88 miles.

Fair progress has been made with the work on the four bridges over the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad at Walton, Gerard, and River avenues, and over the New York and Putnam Railroad at Fort Independence street.

Railroad at Fort Independence street.

Work on the beam tunnel over the Port Morris Branch Railroad at Brook avenue has been almost at a standstill pending a decision as to whether or not asphalt shall be substituted for granite blocks in paving the structure.

The macadamizing of Jerome avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-second street to the city line, has been practically finished, with the exception of a small section near Kingsbridge road, where a sewer is being laid.

The area of macadam roads remacadamized, resurfaced and repaired is 123,025 square yards; 281,199 square yards of macadam pavement were scraped and cleaned, and 2,324 square yards of the lord foundation were laid.

The main thoroughfares, to the extent of 90 miles, were sprinkled daily when necessary as late

During the quarter 1,387 permits were issued to make openings in the streets for sewer connections, water connections, vaults, laying and repairing gas and water-pipes, and for other miscellaneous purposes; 222 permits were issued to place building material, hoisting engines, and tar kettles on streets, also to excavate for foundations of buildings, and to place sand on streets; and 196 permits were issued to drive across sidewalks, to move frame houses on public highways, to lay sidewalks, to erect new fences, and for other purposes.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Additions to the mileage of paved streets have been made as follows: Asphalt, 1.46 miles; belgian block, 0.4 miles; macadam, 5.09 miles; and brick, 0.05 miles, making at the close of the quarter, 538.45 miles of paved streets in the Borough of Brooklyn, and leaving about 150 miles of streets still unpaved.

Work was in progress during the quarter under contracts for paving with asphalt 10 streets, with macadam 11 streets, with belgian blocks 2 streets, with oblong trap 1 street, with cobblestone 1 street, and for regulating and grading 1 street.

Under the supervision and inspection of this Department 22,008 square feet of flagging on sidewalks, and 460,380 square feet of concrete sidewalks were laid.

Examinations and reports have been made on the tollowing petitions referred to the Department by the President of the Borough: 18 for flagging sidewalks, 15 for fencing vacant lots, 2 for digging down lots, and 49 for grading and paving or repaving streets.

In making repairs to pavements 40,453 square yards of pavement were taken up and relaid by an average working force of 56 mechanics, 147 laborers, 30 horses and carts and 16 horses and warons.

During the quarter 1,772 water and sewer connections, 1,494 gas connections, 128 electric connections and 333 miscellaneous connections were made, while 1,448 water and sewer connections were repaired.

Regular inspections of macadamized roads and unpaved streets were made, as well as special inspections in response to complaints by property-owners and citizens. The area of macadam roads repaired was 8,636 square yards, while that of dirt or unpaved roads similarly treated was 3.6 miles; 17,763 square yards of macadam roads were cleaned and snow removed therefrom, 6,800 lineal feet of gutters were cleaned, 80 lineal feet of wooden culverts were repaired, and in repairing dangerous washouts 1,000 cubic yards of filling were used.

The following openings were made to repair all pipes, except water-mains and sewers, and to make service connections: In asphalt pavement, III; in granite pavement, 391; in cobblestone pavement, 935; in macadam pavement, I4; in Belgian block pavement, I4; in unpaved streets, 280, and in sidewalks, 172.

The number of complaints of obstructions received and attended to was 359, two seizures and removals of obstructions were made, 338 permits to place building material were issued, 183 permits were issued to cross sidewalks, 209 permits were issued to cut down trees, and 1,450 permits

were issued for miscellaneous purposes.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

In the quarter ended December 31, the following work was accomplished: 18,324 square yards of granite block pavement laid; 13,925 square yards of macadam pavement laid; 7,476 square yards of brick pavement laid; 6,852 square yards of trap-block pavement laid in paving gutters; 4,224 square yards of brick pavement laid in paving gutters; 940 lineal feet of new curb set; 1,840 square yards of trap-rock pavement repaired; 1,986 square yards of granite block pavement repaired; 22,240 square yards of macadamized streets resurfaced; 21,329 square yards of old macadam pavement repaired; 274,318 square yards of macadam pavement scraped and cleaned, and 121,426 square yards of Peekskill gravel pavement repaired and cleaned; 976,480 square yards of dirt roadway were scraped, crowned and surfaced; 318 square yards of cobblestone gutters repaired on unpaved streets; 374 square yards of cobblestone gutters repaired on macadam streets; 5 wooden culverts built; 7 stone culverts constructed, and weeds cut and removed from about 7 miles of gutters and sides of streets.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

By the completion of the improvement of Fresh Kills road, between Green Ridge and the bridge, the Borough of Richmond has obtained one of the finest driveways in the country, generally parallel with the shores of the island, and for the most part in sight of the surrounding water. This admirable belt of highway is about 35 miles in length, forming connection with the various villages, hamlets and neighborhoods of the borough.

The roads, streets and avenues of the borough are in good condition, and washouts and other damages caused by the left and the street.

damage caused by the late autumn and early winter storms having been promptly and properly

damage caused by the late autumn and early winter storing having occur promptly and prepaired.

The early advent of winter suddenly and unexpectedly interrupted and seriously delayed the work of constructing highways, but the public suffered little or no inconvenience on this account, because the opening of the streets preparatory to the prosecution of construction work had been confined to the shortest practicable distance of headway.

The mileage of paved streets was increased by .02 miles of specification granite, and 9.35 miles of macadam, making a total of 143.54 miles of paved streets in the borough.

During the quarter, 16,274 square yards of macadam pavement were repaired.

Permits to make openings in the public streets were issued as follows: 84 to tap water-pipes 95 to repair water connections, 77 to make water connections, 28 to repair sewer connections, 34 to place building material on streets and 195 special permits to repair sidewalks, lay gas-pipes, etc.

Seven bridges were scraped and painted; 448 square feet of new crosswalks were laid; 4.141 square feet of old crosswalks relaid; 30.20 miles of crosswalks, sidewalks and county roads were cleared of snow; 235.50 square yards of cobble gutters were laid and relaid during the quarter; 5,375.8 lineal feet of sidewalks were repaired; 6,072.4 lineal feet of curb were reset, and 5,302.9 lineal feet of gutter were relaid by property owners at their own expense; 337.64 miles of roads were cleaned in sections at a cost of \$22.18 per mile, and on 19½ miles of roads grass and weeds were mowed at a cost of 4.06 per mile.

From October I to November I, 12 sprinklers were employed in sprinkling 35 miles of roadway, at a cost of \$1.27 per mile per day, and from November I to December I, 3 sprinklers were used in sprinkling Io miles of roadway, at a cost of \$1.11 per mile per day.

In the above table the following rules are observed:

The number of miles is the actual total length of streets covered with the kind of pavement designated without regard to their various widths and without regard to whether the pavement covers the full width of the street or not.

Where the pavement between the outer rails of street railways is different from that between the outer rails and the curbs, the former pavement is disregarded and the street classified as paved with the kind of pavement which is between the outer rails and the curbs.

Oblong granite includes all specification granite whether laid with sand only or on concrete with tar and gravel joints.

Oblong tran includes all specification transcript whether laid with each order of the contraction.

with tar and gravel joints.

Oblong trap includes all specification trap or syenite whether laid with sand only or on concrete with tar and gravel joints.

Square granite and trap includes all trap, syenite or granite blocks which are not oblong.

Asphalt includes all rock or other sheet asphalt and asphalt blocks.

Other paved streets—this heading includes every other kind of pavement than those mentioned and included above and specifies in foot notes what kind they are.

Unpaved streets include streets and roads legally opened and laid out and all streets regulated and graded but not appeared. and graded but not paved.

The work of this Bureau, as will be seen by reference to the foregoing detailed statements, has progressed fairly well during the quarter; and much better results in completed work would have been obtained if the winter had not set in so much earlier than usual; the laying of bluestone was

practically suspended after November 20, a very early date.

At the end of the quarter there were 47 regulating and grading, and 4 regulating and paving contracts in progress, while during the quarter, 11 regulating and grading, and 9 regulating and

contracts in progress, while during the quarter, 11 regulating and grading, and 9 regulating and paving contracts were completed.

At the end of the quarter there were also 4 viaduct or bridge contracts in force.

Thirteen assessment lists were prepared and a number of old lists were corrected or amended to agree with new block numbers. The assessment lists for the works now completed are in various stages of progress and I trust will be all complete before another quarter passes.

The work on the four bridges, Walton, Gerard and River avenues, over New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, and Fort Independence street, over the New York and Putnam Railroad, has progressed very well indeed, and that contract will, no doubt, be completed in the early spring.

The Beam Tunnel at Brook avenue over Port Morris Branch railroad has been almost at a standstill on account of the proposed substitution of asphalt for granite-block in the paving over the structure on account of the high school fronting on this work. This matter is still unsettled.

The contract for Melrose Viaduct, between One Hundred and Sixty-third and One Hundred and Sixty-fifth streets, has not yet been ordered ahead, nor has the viaduct at One Hundred and Fifty-third street, between Park avenue and Sheridan avenue. Both of these works are delayed by the fact that the necessary easements over or title to lands affected has not been acquired.

The macadamizing of Jerome avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-second street to the city

The macadamizing of Jerome avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-second street to the city line, has been practically completed, with the exception of a small portion near the Kingsbridge road, where a sewer is being laid. It is hoped that the Sewer Department will hasten their work so that the avenue may be turned over to the public use free from obstruction throughout its entire

The work on mostly all contracts for regulating, grading, etc., of streets shows good progress during the quarter.

The cobblestone pavement referred to was laid under a contract executed in 1896, under the Eighth Ward Improvement Act, and is the last of contracts made under this law, and will probably be the last of this kind of pavement to be laid in this borough. A number of contracts, to

ably be the last of this kind of pavement to be laid in this borough. A number of contracts, to proceed with which authority was given in October, could not be commenced so late in the year, and we will, therefore, have something to commence upon as soon as the season opens.

Work was commenced on the majority of those authorized, but owing to the exceptional severity of the early winter it was difficult to complete any of them, while on several of them the curb has been set, but the concrete foundation has not been laid. In eight (8) cases the snowstorm of November, came after the concrete had been laid and before the asphalt surface had been put down. This resulted in annoying delays, and in order to give the property-owners the use of the streets, it was necessary to lay the asphalt upon the concrete while the latter was frozen. In view of our previous experience under similar circumstances and recent careful observations of the effects of freezing on cement mortars (notably those of Mr. Hobart of the University of Illinois, which have been recently published), I am confident that this was the wisest course under the circumstances.

The flagging laid under the inspection of the Bureau during the quarter amounts to 22,008 square feet, and 460,380 square feet of concrete sidewalks have been laid under similar inspection.

Inspections and reports have been made in the case of 18 petitions for flagging of sidewalks, 15 for the fencing of vacant lots, 2 for the digging down of lots and 49 for the grading and paving, or repaving of streets, which have been referred to the Department by the President of the Borongh.

Many dangerous washouts have occurred during the quarter which have required more than 1,000 cubic yards of filling.

I wish to say in reference to my letter of January 5, submitting a list of streets which are under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Streets and Roads, and which, in my judgment, should be repaired immediately, as their present condition is such as to impede public travel, that it is necessary, in order to properly maintain the streets—principally comprised of dirt and macadam roads—to retain a certain number of gangs permanently to look after the same, as they require almost constant attention, owing to washouts, etc. This is true particularly as to the macadam

almost constant attention, owing to washouts, etc. This is true particularly as to the macadam pavements, which, if allowed to get out of repair, usually require to be entirely repaved at a much greater expense than if properly looked after during both seasons of the working year. Dear Sir—I have received from M. J. Kennedy, General Superintendent of Sewers, a complaint made by Parsons Brothers, foot of Nineteenth street, about the sewer which empties near their works. A copy of their complaint is herewith attached.

I respectfully report that a storm sewer 36 inches in diameter discharges during excessive rainstorms at a point about 250 feet east of Second avenue into a basin used by the Hilton Lodge Lumber Company for the storing of logs, etc. This basin has been greatly reduced by having been filled in, until a narrow channel exists, about 30 feet wide, extending to the pier-line about 920 feet westerly. An old crib, but in comparatively good condition, about 10 feet wide, extends from Second avenue to near the established pier-line, and upon the north side of the street. Upon the north side of this crib there is a large lumber-storing basin, about 700 by 600 feet, or from Second avenue to the pier-line and from Nineteenth street to near Hamilton avenue, the property of the South Brooklyn Saw Mill Company, who also own stone crib work.

Nineteenth street was declared open from Third avenue to high-water mark by authority of the Common Council, resolution being passed to this effect on October 13, 1890. It will be necessary to have Nineteenth street, from high-water mark to the adopted bulkhead-line declared open before this Department can take any action in the matter. The high-water mark is at the discharging point of this sewer.

Recommendation is hereby made that the Commissioner of Sewers be requested to apply to the Board of Public Improvements for the opening of this street, in order that this sewer may be built, which there is no doubt should be constructed.
