The minutes of the last meeting were read and, on motion of Councilman Doyle, were approved as read.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

No. 1340.

By Councilman Doyle—

Resolved, That the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies be and it is hereby requested to drape with appropriate material the Borough Hall, Brooklyn, as an additional mark of respect to the memory of the late President of the United States, William McKinley. Which was adopted.

No. 1341.

By the President—

Whereas, The death of the late President of the United States, after a week of alternate hope and fear, has stunned the people of this nation with poignant grief for his loss, and stirred them with fierce indignation against the spirit of anarchy that caused his assassination; and

Whereas, His lamented death has not only shocked the people of the United States, all of whom recognize the nobility of his character as a soldier and patriotic American and a statesman who sought the welfare of his country, but has evoked expressions of profound sympathy from the nations of the world; and

Whereas, His private life has been marked by the constant exhibition of those generous qualities of head and heart which endeared him to all who came within the circle of his friendship, which won the devoted love of his life companion, and challenged the admiration and reverence of his fellow-citizens; and

Whereas, The historian of the United States will emphasize the fact that it was in the presidency of William McKinley that a great war was waged, with absolute unselfishness, in the sacred name of liberty; and

Whereas, His singleness of aim and patriotic wisdom were always directed to the adoption of such a policy, both at home and abroad, as would redound to the glory and welfare of the United States; and

Whereas, The monstrous crime of Friday, September 6, 1901, struck down a President admired and beloved by all classes in the community without any distinction of political opinion; and

Whereas, The assassination in our own land of a man distinguished for his public and private virtues has filled the hearts of his fellow-citizens with an indignation which will not be appeased until the wicked principles of anarchy are banished from this home of equal rights and privileges; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, representing all the people of the metropolis, hereby deplores the death of President McKinley and conveys to his stricken wife the assurance of New York's sympathy with her in this dark hour of affliction; and be it further

Resolved, That the people of The City of New York, welded by sorrow into one body, abhor and execrate the dastardly crime of the assassin which slew President McKinley and deprived a nation of its Chief Magistrate; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions, suitably engrossed and duly authenticated by the City Clerk, be transmitted to the widow of the deceased President; and be it further

Resolved, That, as an additional mark of respect to his memory, this body do now adjourn. Which was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

And the President declared that the Council stood adjourned until Tuesday, September 24, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M.
