The Secretary was directed to note the corrected name on the records.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries, dated February 25, requesting that the Commissioner be advised as to whether it would be proper to assign Licensed Firemen to duty on the ferryboats, also whether he might assign Marine Stokers at the terminals, to the end that the Department would be able to utilize the services of the men holding either title to the best advantage. The matter was referred to the Labor Clerk for a report.

A communication was presented from the Superintendent of the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys, dated February 23, requesting that the positions of Stableman and Investigator be placed in the non-competitive class. The Secretary was directed to advertise a public hearing in accordance with Rule III.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of the Department of Correction, dated March 1, transmitting appeal of Charles Noonan, a Keeper in the Department, for a special examination for promotion to Head Keeper, together with a certificate from his physician to the effect that he was ill at the time of the general examination and unable to appear. The matter was ordered continued on the calendar.

A communication was presented from Deputy Commissioner E. W. Bemis, of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated February 26, requesting authority to change the titles of Edward L. Martin, Edward Millmore, John Reed and Michael Wood, Linemen employed in the County of Westchester, to Laborer, and stating that the application was made at the request of the men. The matter was laid over, pending the receipt of additional information.

A communication was presented from Deputy Commissioner E. W. Bemis, of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated February 24, with further reference to his request for authority to continue the services of Miss Sadie A. Bryan, Temporary Clerk in the Borough of Brooklyn, for a further period of three months, beginning February 18, and certifying that the duties that Miss Bryan was performing were not those of a permanent position. The request was granted.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated February 14, transmitting resolutions adopted at a meeting held February 4, to the effect that in the opinion of the Board the working day of all employees of The City of New York and the counties therein, except the Justices of the Supreme Court, should be from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. from Monday to Friday, inclusive, and from 9 a. m. to 12 m. on Saturday; also that in all Departments of the City and County governments within The City of New York, time records should be kept for each employee, except the Justices of the Supreme Court, indicating the hours of service and the character work performed for each working day. The



Secretary was directed to acknowledge receipt of the communication, and state that the suggestions had been put into operation in the office of the Commission.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of The Bronx, dated February 28, stating that the notice of the suspension of James Brady, Inspector of Sewer Connections, to take effect immediately, had been an error on the part of the Chief Clerk; that Brady had worked until the 19th instant before the error had been detected, and that, in order to prevent any difficulty in relation to the payroll, the Borough President had thought it advisable to notify the Commission of the facts and request that Brady be paid until the 28th instant. The Secretary was directed to amend the records as to the date of suspension and to certify the said employee's payroll with time up to February 28.

A communication was presented from the Fire Commissioner, dated February 28, submitting a voucher in favor of W. J. Coates, Veterinarian, for professional services rendered, amounting to \$5. On motion, the Secretary was directed to certify the voucher in accordance with paragraph 4 of Rule XII.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Accounts, dated February 24, submitting a voucher in favor of Charles Pickler, amounting to \$124.60, for services rendered as Court Stenographer, and setting forth the necessity for such services. On motion, the Secretary was directed to certify the voucher as exempt from the provisions of the Civil Service Rules.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Normal College, dated February 28, with further reference to the request for authority to appoint Miss Aline Meyer as first grade Clerk, with salary at the rate of \$400 per annum, and stating that at the meeting of the Executive Committee to be held on March 18, President Davis would recommend that Miss Meyer be made a Clerical Assistant, which would avoid the necessity of holding an examination for Female Clerk, first grade. The Secretary was authorized to certify Miss Meyer's payroll as a first grade Clerk until March 18, pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 3 of Rule XII.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, dated February 28, stating it had been necessary to employ two Horse-shoers under the emergency clause of the Civil Service rules, owing to a change in the method of shoeing park horses, to take effect March 1, and that after that date it would be necessary to appoint two Horse-shoers permanently. The request was granted.

A report was presented from the Labor Clerk, dated March 5, relative to the request of the Commissioner of the Department of Docks and Ferries, for permission to construe the positions of Licensed Firemen (at the terminals) and Marine Stoker (on the ferryboats) as interchangeable. The matter was referred to the Secretary for a reply.

A report was presented from the Record Clerk, dated March 8, stating that Russell Vickers, of No. 140 Temple street, Astoria, Long Island, who had filed an application for the position of Clerk, second grade, in the Board of Water Supply, on October 15, 1908, giving as the date of his birth August 21, 1890, which made him eighteen years of age (the minimum for that position), had stated in a declaration sheet filled out at the time of his appointment as Temporary Clerk in the Board of Elections that he had been born on August 22, 1891, from which it appeared that he had been under the minimum age at the time of filing his application. The Secretary was directed to summon the candidate to appear and show cause why his name should not be removed from the list, in accordance with paragraph 14 of Rule VII.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated March 8, relative to the request of the Board of Water Supply that an examination be held for promotion from the position of Assistant Engineer, Grade C, to Assistant Engineer, Grade D, and recommending that the examination be held in accordance with Rule XV., paragraph 9, to be open to all Assistant Engineers who had served not less than six months in Grade C. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated March 8, relative to a communication from the Secretary to the Mayor, asking that the Commission look into the case of Assistant Foreman Reehill, whose name appeared upon the eligible list for promotion to Foreman, which had expired by limitation on February 26, 1910. On motion, the Secretary was directed to forward a copy of the report to the Mayor for his information.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated March 8, relative to the request of the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning that promotion examinations be held for the following positions: Stable Foreman, Assistant Stable Foreman, Section Foreman, Assistant Dump Inspector; and recommending as follows:

1. That an examination for promotion to Stable Foreman be held, in accordance with Rule XV, paragraph 13, the examination to be open to all Assistant Stable Foremen who had served for at least six months.

2. That an examination for Assistant Stable Foreman be held, in accordance with Rule XV, paragraph 17, the examination to be open to all Drivers, Hostlers, Stablemen and Acting Assistants to Stable Foremen who had served at least three years.

3. That an examination be held for promotion to Assistant Dump Inspector, in accordance with Rule XV, paragraph 17, the examination to be open to all Dump Boardmen and Scowmen who had served at least three years.

The recommendation was adopted, and the Secretary was directed to state that the examination for promotion to Section Foreman could not be held, owing to the fact that the examination for promotion to Assistant Foreman (second grade), ordered on March 10, 1909, had not been held because of the temporary injunction obtained by certain persons holding the title of Acting Assistant to Section Foreman, for which reason there was no one in the Department under the title "Assistant Foreman."

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated March 8, relative to the request of the President of the Borough of Queens that an examination be held for promotion from the positions of Laborer and Sounder to that of Messenger in the Topographical Bureau of his Department, and recommending that the examination be held in accordance with Rule XV., paragraph 17, to be open to all persons in the labor class in the Topographical Bureau who had served at least three years. The recommendation was adopted.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, dated March 7, stating that at a meeting of that Board held on March 3 the following resolutions of the Commission had been approved:

2. Striking from the exempt class, under the heading "Board of Water Supply of The City of New York," "2 Inspectors, Board of Water Supply Police."

3. Excepting from competitive examination, pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII, Mr. Marvyn Scudder (the Investors' Agency) to render expert service in the Department of Finance at a total compensation of four thousand dollars (\$4,000).

The communication was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated March 5, relative to the certification made from the preferred list of Transimtan, to take precedence over the promotion list for that position, stating that, in the opinion of the Board, the principle of having a preferred list of persons suspended from other City Departments take precedence over the promotion lists prepared exclusively for the Board of Water Supply was extremely detrimental to good organization, and requesting to be advised whether the Board would be obliged to consider the preferred list for the position of Assistant Engineer when making promotions to that position. The change of title was approved.

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, Mr. R. H. Gillespie, Civil Engineer, be and he hereby is excepted from examination, pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII., to assist the President of the Borough of The Bronx in a reorganization and amalgamation of the Bureau of Sewers and Highways, for a period of six months, at a compensation to average \$416.66 per month.

The Secretary presented a voucher in favor of Arthur W. Shepard, for services as Photographer in the Police Department, from January 1 to 31, 1910, amounting to \$77.50, and stated that Mr. Shepard's services had been continued until February 19, 1910, when a letter had been sent to the Police Department to the effect that an appointment should be made from the eligible list of Photographer. No water closet or privy vault shall be constructed without adequate provision for the effectual and proper ventilation and cleansing thereof.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath in writing of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids, or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
