Report of the operations of the Bureau of Sewers for the quarter. On June 30, 1912, the sewerage system of the Borough consisted of 516.56 miles sewers and 6,412 receiving basins.

During the quarter 671 linear feet of sewer and 4 manholes were built as new work, 616 linear feet of sewer and 15 manholes were built as reconstruction, alteration and improvement work.

The following works were completed during the quarter: Alteration and improvement to sewer in Central Park West, between 98th and 100th st.

Sewer in Buena Vista ave., between 177th st, and the summit south of 172d st. Sanitary sewer in 218th st., between Broadway and Park Terrace West, and storm sewer between Broadway and the summit west of Park Terrace East, The contract prices for the above work, payable out of the Street Improvement

Fund, amounted to \$28,015.74. The work under construction June 30, 1912, payable out of the Street Improvement Fund, follows:

Extension to barrel sewer under pier at the foot of 36th st., North River. Alteration and improvement to sewer in 72d st., between Amsterdam ave. and Columbus ave. (Abandoned April 4, 1912, by Thomas A. Reilly.) Alteration and improvement to sewer in 117th st., between Harlem River and

Pleasant ave. Sewer in Park Terrace East, between 218th st. and 100 feet south of 215th st. Receiving basin on the northwest corner of 166th st, and St. Nicholas ave.


