SIR—I have examined the premises Nos. 24 and 26 Macdougall street, which the Police Department contemplate purchasing for the sum of \$41,000, for which purpose it desires the transfer of \$6,250 from the appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1890, entitled "Police Station-houses—Alterations, Fitting up, Additions to and Repairs of Station-houses," etc., which is in excess of the amount required, to the appropriation made to the same Department for the year 1891, entitled "For the Purchase of a Site for the location of a new Station-House for the Eighth Precinct," which is insufficient.

The two lots are known on the Tax Maps as Nos. 1352 and 1353, and are taxed on a valuation of \$7,000 each.

There is a two-story basement and attic brick house on each lot, well built and in good condition.

I estimate the value of the lots, if purchased separately, at \$15,500 each.

If in the hands of one owner, they might be worth, together, \$33,000.

If these particular lots are specially required by the City, it might be justified in paying as high as \$35,000.

But I consider the price given in the resolution of the Board of Police, \$41,000, as entirely unreasonable.

DEAR SIR—In the final estimate for 1891 a proviso was made in the appropriation for "Boulevards, Roads and Avenues, Maintenance of" that it shall include the expense of building a ramp or temporary bridge as an approach to McComb's Dam Bridge, pending the construction and completion of the permanent approach in connection with the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street viaduct. In fixing the amount of the appropriation it was also understood that, if found necessary and practicable, the appropriation be supplemented by transfer of unexpended balances of other appropriations. Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor and Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to present herewith for the consideration and action of your Board the following list of streets, which I recommend for repavement this year, under the appropriation made by chapter 346, Laws of 1889. The selection of the streets has been made after careful and laborious surveys and examinations of the extent and conditions of the streets which require repavement; the relative degrees of necessity and urgency for the repavements, and the character of the new pavements to be laid, in order to meet in the best possible manner the requirements of public travel, and other conditions appertaining to the different localities.

In the streets which are traversed or intersected by car-tracks, excepting West street, the space in and about the car-tracks is excluded from the estimate of the cost to be incurred by the City for the repavements for the reason that I hold that the various street railroad companies, under their franchises and their obligations to the City, are and should be required to make the repavements within such space at their own expense, simultaneous with, and of the same character and quality, as the repavements to be made by the City at the expense of the taxpayers at large. The exception in the case of West street is made for several reasons. The carriageway is traversed and intersected by the rail-tracks of different companies for the whole length of the street and the space outside of the rail-tracks is narrow. If, therefore, the City should proceed with repaving the narrow space on each side of the tracks and delay should ensue in inducing or compelling the different railroad companies to make the repavement in and about the rail-tracks simultaneously, of the same quality and description and according to the same specifications, the repavement made by the City would be of little or no benefit to public travel; and the entire repavement, when finally accomplished, would not come up to the standard required for good pavement, for lack of uniformity. It is, therefore, desirable that in this case provision be made and authority given, to have the entire width of the carriageway repaved by the City under one contract and direction, at the same time looking to the different railroad companies to reimburse the City for the repavement made in and about the rail-tracks.

LIST OF STREETS, DESCRIPTION OF PAVEMENT RECOMMENDED, AREA AND ESTIMATE OF COST.

Granite blocks on Concrete Foundation, with Crosswalks of North River Blue Stone at intersecting and abutting Streets where necessary.

West street, from Battery place to Gansevoort street—The present pavement is square trap blocks in bad condition. A large portion of West street is to be repaved under the provisions of chapter 449, Laws of 1889, relating to the obligations of grantees in respect to pavements under land grants, and the cost of such repavement will be assessed on the abutting property. The repavement to be made under the appropriation, as now recommended, covers the area not included in the grants or the obligations under the grants, and will, therefore, supplement the other so as to provide for an entire new pavement on West street; area to be repaved under the appropriation, 15,000 square yards; estimated cost, \$60,000 00

Park Row, from Broadway to Frankfort street—The present pavement is granite and trap blocks in poor condition. This includes a section of the proposed Third Avenue Cable Railway, and the new pavement is to be laid simultaneously with the construction of that railway, which will be begun by the Third Avenue Railway Company in the early spring. That company has agreed to repave the space in and about the rail-tracks, at its own expense, simultaneous with and of the same quality, and according to the same specifications as the pavement to be laid by the City; area to be repaved by the City, 2,000 square yards; estimated cost, 8,000 00

Third avenue, from Twenty-third to Fifty-ninth street—The present pavement is square trap blocks in bad condition. This covers another and large section of the proposed Third Avenue Cable Railway, where the railroad company has agreed to make repavement at its own expense in and about the rail-tracks, simultaneous with and of the same character and quality as the repavement to be made by the City. Three other sections along the line of this cable railway will be repaved this year in the same manner, the City's portion of the work to be done under the annual repavement appropriation made in pursuance of section 321 of the Consolidation Act, viz.: Park Row, from Frankfort street to and including Chatham Square, already contracted for; the Bowery, from Chatham Square to Sixth street; and Third avenue, from Sixth street to Twenty-third street, for which contracts are about to be made. These several sections will form a continuous new pavement to be laid this year on the line of the Third Avenue Cable Railway, from Broadway to Fifty-ninth street, and will, with the construction of the cable railway, be an improvement of great magnitude and benefit. The area to be repaved by the City, from Twenty-third to Fifty-ninth street, is 42,700 square yards; estimated cost.....	\$170,800 00

The matter, having been referred to me by this Board at its meeting of December 24, 1890, I respectfully report as follows:

The sum of \$4,500, the first item, has been reduced to \$2,300, as made up of certain emergency repairs to Primary Schools No. 20 in the Thirteenth Ward and No. 14 in the Fourth Ward, amounting to \$1,050; and a still further amount of \$1,250, consisting of various small expenditures incurred by trustees of the different wards, without any inquiry as to the balance available for such purposes. The same indiscreet action of the trustees is the cause of the deficiency of \$1,050. The Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Education has made an explanation, which, however, does not alter the fact of these expenditures being entirely illegal, and some action should be taken by this Board to correct such abuses of power in the future. And if a few of the parties to whom these amounts are due were compelled to sue for the payment of their bills, it would tend to show the trustees of the different wards that an application to this Board for a transfer will not always meet with a response to cover their delinquencies. The same remarks will apply to the transfer of \$1,600 asked for, for the salaries of Janitors.

For 1890 there was an increase of nearly fifty per cent. of expenditure over 1889, which was occasioned by the increased attendance in the schools, necessitating two stages to each route instead of one as formerly; so that double the accommodation was secured at an increased expenditure of fifty per cent., and as the contract provides that payment is not to be made until the completion of the term, this expenditure could not be anticipated. Therefore the request of the Board of Education in this matter is right and equitable and should be allowed, and I submit the following resolution.

PUBLIC NOTICE CALLING FOR BIDS OR proposals for the privileges or licenses to sprinkle the public streets in the City of New York with water drawn from the public fire-hydrants, the bids to be received and opened at the office of the Commissioner of Public Works on Thursday, February 26, 1891, at 12 o'clock noon.

A SEPARATE BID must be made for each of the sprinkling routes hereinafter described.

The bidder must state the amount which he proposes and agrees to pay for the license, over and above the amount which will be charged for the water consumed in sprinkling. The amount of each bid must be paid in advance at the time when the license is issued, and the charges for water, as established by the Commissioner of Public Works, must be paid monthly in advance.

The season for sprinkling the streets shall begin not earlier than March 15, 1891, and terminate not later than November 15, 1891, and the Commissioner of Public Works reserves the right to diminish the length of the season and to suspend sprinkling during the season whenever he deems it in the interest of the City so to do.

The Commissioner of Public Works also reserves the right to reject any or all of the bids or proposals.

In the sprinkling of the streets the following rules and regulations must be observed:

1st. The tin sprinkler attached to each cart shall conform in every respect to a pattern approved by the Department of Public Works, the holes to be in parallel rows, at least one-half inch apart, and of a size not to exceed No. 14 wire.

2d. The name and residence of each person licensed to sprinkle the streets shall be painted on both sides of the cart in black letters of not less than two inches in length on a white ground.

3d. Permits for sprinkling carts, if driven by boys, will be immediately revoked.

4th. No license will be granted to any person not a resident of the City and County of New York.

5th. Each sprinkling cart shall be provided with a sound and proper piece of hose to conduct the water from the fire-hydrant to the cart, and such hose shall always be kept in order and free from leaks.

6th. Each person obtaining a permit for sprinkling shall keep the hydrants allotted to his use closed, except when obtaining water for use, and shall be responsible for any damage that may result from the use or abuse of them while in their charge; provided such damage shall not have been occasioned by others than those in the employ of said persons.

7th. Any person who shall thus obtain a permit shall pay to the Department of Public Works such sum or price as may be fixed by the Department for the water used during the season for sprinkling; the payments to be made monthly in advance and within the first week of each month.

8th. Each person obtaining a permit will be required to sprinkle the streets with sufficient water only to lay the dust; drenching the streets with an excessive quantity of water will be sufficient cause to revoke any permit or license.

9th. Every person who shall obtain a sprinkling permit will be required to confine himself strictly to his route; encroaching on other routes will not be permitted.

10th. No double-nozzle hydrants shall be used.

11th. Any licensee violating any of the above rules and regulations will, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works, have his license revoked, and will forfeit all moneys paid by him on account of the same.

No bid will be considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Commissioner of Public Works, or money to the amount of one hundred dollars (\$100) as security for compliance with the conditions of the license. Such check or money must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the bid, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Department who has charge of the estimate-box, and no bid can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said officer or clerk and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same within three days after the license is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after the license has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited and retained by the City of New York, as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the license within the time aforesaid, the amount of the deposit will be returned him.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed, as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.
