The Board met pursuant to the following call:

In pursuance of the authority contained in the 112th section of chapter 335, being an act entitled "An act to reorganize the local government of the City of New York," passed April 30, 1873; and section 1 of chapter 779, being an act entitled "An act in relation to raising money by taxation in the County of New York, for county purposes," passed June 14, 1873; and chapter 304, being an act entitled "An act to consolidate the government of the City and County of New York, and further to regulate the same," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 303, being an act entitled "An act in relation to the estimates and apportionment for the support of the government of the County of New York," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 308, being an act entitled "An act in relation to the estimates and apportionment for the support of the government of the City of New York," passed May 1, 1874—a meeting is hereby called of the Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, constituting a Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to be held at the office of the Mayor, on Saturday, June 19, 1875, for the purposes specified in requisition of the Comptroller of June 16, 1875.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the authority conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by provision of section 112, chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue from time to time, as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, Third District Court-house Bonds, as authorized by chapter 55, Laws of 1871, and section 2, chapter 292, Laws of 1871, and in pursuance of the requisition of the Commissioners for the erection of the Court-house in the Third Judicial District, dated June 5, 1875, one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000).
