

Whereas, In my opinion, the want of suitable accommodation for the Court of General Sessions of the Peace in and for the City and County of New York in the building where the same is regularly to be held renders it necessary that some other place within said city should be selected for the sessions of said court ; therefore, I do hereby direct that the next ensuing term appointed to be held, to wit, the term for the month of September, 1894, of the said Court of General Sessions of the Peace in and for the City and County of New York, shall be held in the building erected for Criminal Courts and other purposes, under the provisions of chapter 371 of the Laws of 1887, and commonly known as the New Criminal Court-house, and which is situated on Centre street, in the said City of New York, and bounded by the following streets, to wit, Centre, White, Elm and Franklin streets, in said city.

And I do further direct that this proclamation be published twice in the CITY RECORD and in the "New York Sun" and "The New York Times," daily newspapers published in the City of New York.

Resolved, That article VI., section 15 of the Rules and Regulations governing the uniformed force be amended to read as follows: Section 15. No officer or member of the uniformed force shall sell or assign his salary before the same is due, nor commit any assault or breach of the peace, nor any other act for which he may be arrested, confined or imprisoned and prevented from performing his duty as a member of this Department. In case of arrest and confinement such person shall be considered as absent with-out leave during the time of such confinement or detention. Whenever any officer or member of the uniformed force shall have contracted a debt for Department uniform clothing, or the making thereof, and neglected or refused to make due payment therefor, or shall be accused, in a complaint duly written out and sworn to by the complainant, of contracting a debt under false or fraudulent pretences, or shall have neglected or refused to pay a debt for which judgment shall have been rendered against him in an action at law, such person shall be deemed to have committed an act constituting a breach of discipline and conduct unbecoming an officer. It shall be the duty of the indebtedness to the person to whom it is due, at such time or times as the Secretary shall, under the circumstances, deem reasonable and proper, and to present to the Secretary evidence of such pay-ment. If such notice is not complied with the Secretary shall prefer charges against the accused to the Board of Commissioners. Any conviction thereunder may be punished by reprimand, forfeiting and withholding pay of dismissal from the force. 'Adjourned.


