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The Comptroller being now present the Supervisor read the following communication relating to the proposed form of contract and amended schedules for stationery supplies:

The Honorable, the Board of City Record:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to submit herewith for your action the form of contract and schedules for stationery supplies as modified and approved by the Corporation Counsel.

Before you act upon it I consider it my duty to call your attention especially to the changes made in the schedules.

The Board will recall that the Commissioners of Accounts were directed to carefully investigate the needs of the several departments and to compile a suitable schedule of supplies to be appended to the stationery contract.

The Commissioners of Accounts reported such schedule and under date of April 23, 1906, it was approved by the Board of City Record and the Supervisor was directed to use said schedule until further notice. Accordingly it was appended to the present form of contract when sent to the Corporation Counsel for approval on April 12, 1907. On May 1, 1907, the contract and schedule now presented for your consideration were returned to the office of the Supervisor in their present form. The schedule has been changed in very material particulars, and in view of the positive instruction of the Board that the schedule prepared by the Commissioners of Accounts should hereafter be used, I deem it my duty to call your attention to the fact that the schedules now presented are not those which I was directed to use.

The Corporation Counsel states that it is impossible for him in a limited time to make up a schedule in place of the one submitted nor is it his duty so to do, and that the few changes made by him are for the purpose of inviting more general competition.

Since the schedule as compiled by the Commissioners of Accounts is so satisfactory to the departments I have the honor to suggest that before the Board commits itself to the amended schedule the matter be again referred to the Commissioners of Accounts for examination and report.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
