No. 229. Regulating and grading and paving with granite blocks on a sand foundation the roadway of Canal place (street), west from East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth to East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, and all work incidental thereto.

Referred from Board of Aldermen:

Hunts Point avenue, sheet concrete paving, from south curb of Lafayette avenue to Longfellow street.

Intersection of Hunts Point avenue and Lafayette avenue.

Kelly street sheet concrete paving, between Intervale avenue and East One Hundred and Sixty-third street.

Manida street sheet concrete paving, between Lafayette avenue and Garrison avenue.

### MINUTES OF THE LOCAL BOARD OF VAN CORTLANDT, TWENTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board of Van Cortlandt, Twenty-fifth District, met in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx on Thursday, May 27, 1909, at 2 p. m., in the Municipal Building, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue.

Present—Alderman Hochdorffer, Alderman Crowley and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Absent—Alderman Handy.

Minutes of the previous meeting were adopted as typewritten.

Petitions advertised for hearings on this date:

No. 33. Acquiring title to the lands necessary for the widening of Mosholu avenue, between Broadway and a point about 175 feet westerly therefrom; also fixing a probable area of assessment.

This matter was ordered readvertised for a hearing on this date, in view of the fact that the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of April 6, 1908, recommended to the Board of Estimate a reduced area of assessment.

No one appeared either for or against the petition at this hearing, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same hereby are initiated for acquiring title to the lands necessary for the widening of Mosholu avenue, between Broadway and a point about 175 feet westerly therefrom; and be it further

Resolved, That this Board hereby recommends to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the area of assessment in this proceeding be fixed as recommended in the report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx, dated May 12, 1909, and which, as shown on map marked in red and blue, is to be included. Unanimously adopted.

No. 230. Constructing a sewer and appurtenances in Townsend avenue, between East One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street and East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street.

No one appeared in opposition. Petition signed by John C. Gartselman. Laid over awaiting report as to the cost, etc.

No. 234. Laying out on the map of The City of New York a change of lines of Reservoir place and of Reservoir oval, as shown on the final map, by making the southeasterly line thereof conform to the southeastern boundary of the land acquired by the City for the reservoir, between Gun Hill road and Woodlawn road, so that no land will have to be acquired for these streets within said lines.

No one appeared in opposition.

On motion, seconded, it was

Resolved, That this Board hereby recommends to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the laying out on the map of The City of New York a change of lines of Reservoir place and Reservoir oval, as shown on the final map, by making the southeasterly line thereof conform to the southeastern boundary of the land acquired by the City for the reservoir, between Gun Hill road and Woodlawn road, so that no land will have to be acquired for these streets within said lines, as shown on "Map or plan showing the change of lines of Reservoir oval to the intersection of Perry avenue and Gun Hill road, to conform to existing lines of same, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York dated May 25, 1909, and signed by E. Greiffenberg, Principal Assistant Topographical Engineer, and by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx, Josiah A. Briggs." Unanimously adopted.

### Laid Over Matters.

No. 226. Cannon place, regulating, grading, etc., from Giles place to West Two Hundred and Thirty-eighth street.

Estimated cost, \$13,500; assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is \$84,190.

On motion, seconded, it was

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same hereby are initiated for regulating and grading, setting curbstones and flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches, walls, drains, etc., and erecting fences where necessary in Cannon place, from Giles place to West Two Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, and all work incidental thereto.

Unanimously adopted.

No. 227. Sewer and appurtenances, Van Cortlandt avenue, between Jerome avenue and the Grand Boulevard and Concourse.

Hearing held on May 13, 1909. Laid over awaiting report as to the estimated cost, etc.

Petition signed by Bartly Cannon and others.

No. 217. Paving with asphalt blocks on a concrete foundation Fordham road, from Sedgwick avenue to Webster avenue; the portion between Kingsbridge road and Webster avenue to have granite blocks on concrete in the centre thereof; and setting curb where necessary, and all work incidental thereto; also that the surface railroad company be required to repave the portion for which it is responsible.

No opposition at this meeting. Laid over awaiting report.

No. 204. Laying out on the map a change of lines of Reservoir oval and Reservoir place. Placed on file. See resolution adopted on petition No. 234, at this meeting.

No. 162. Constructing a sewer and appurtenances in Percy avenue, between Gun Hill road and East Two Hundred and Eleventh street, with branches in East Two Hundred and Eleventh street, etc.

Laid over awaiting report of Chief Engineer.

No. 176. Regulating and grading, etc., extension of Grand Boulevard and Concourse, between East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street and Franz Sigel Park. Hearing held December 23, 1908. Laid over awaiting report as to estimated cost, etc.

Communication from the Finance Department dated May 18, 1909, relative to defective sidewalks along Washington avenue, where trees have been planted.

Report of the Engineers of the Finance Department, dated May 14, 1909, was read, and papers placed on file.

Communication from Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity relative to laying of water mains in Bronx Borough, dated May 24, 1909, was read and placed on file. The said Department has applied for an issue of Corporate Stock to provide for the laying of water mains in the sum of \$2,026,000, and as soon as favorable action has been taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the work will be attended to.

## MINUTES OF THE LOCAL BOARD OF CHESTER, TWENTY-THIRD DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the members of the Local Board of Chester, Twenty-third District, met in the office of the said President on Thursday, May 27, 1909, at 3 p. m.

Present—Alderman Mulligan, Alderman Corbett and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Minutes of the previous meeting were adopted as typewritten.

No. 231. Acquiring title to the lands necessary for East Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, from Bronx boulevard to Laconia avenue.

Petition signed by Angela Justo, Edward C. Brennan, Joseph F. Loughery and others.

This petition is a substitute for the one advertised under No. 173, which was ordered filed, and on motion, seconded, it was

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same hereby are initiated for acquiring title to the lands necessary for East Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, from Bronx boulevard to Laconia avenue. Unanimously adopted.

No. 232. Regulating and grading, setting curbstones, flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches, drains, walls, etc., and erecting fences where necessary in East Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, from Bronx boulevard to Laconia avenue, and all work incidental thereto.

Petition signed by Angela Justo and others. No one appeared in opposition. Laid over awaiting report as to the estimated cost, etc.

No. 233. Regulating and grading, building approaches, drains, walls, etc., and erecting fences where necessary in Zerega avenue, from Randall avenue to Ludlow avenue (One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street), and all work incidental thereto.

Wm. J. Hyland and Michael Leahy appeared in favor. Petition signed by one owner. Mr. Brommly in opposition.

Laid over awaiting report as to estimated cost, and to be presented to Local Board on June 5, 1909, at 11 a. m.

No. 235. Acquiring title to lands necessary for Barnes avenue, from Tilden street to Baychester avenue.

Petition signed by Frank McGarry, was read as were also a number of protests; one of which contained the names of John A. De Lezer, John P. Ginnam, Eliza V. Colby and twenty-eight others, dated May 10, 1909, and addressed to Alderman Mulligan.

Other protests were signed by S. Donadowski, Peter N. Siro, Frederick Miller, Frank Newbauer, Theo. Klotz, Oscar F. Hopler, Eugene T. Slattery, John Lynch, G. H. Perkins, and others; Jos. M. Vanderpool, and others.

A large number of owners who signed the protests also appeared at this meeting in opposition to having the improvement carried out just at the present time, owing to the fact that they claimed that they had quite a few assessments to meet, and asked the Board to postpone action on this petition.

Laid over until June 5, 1909, at 11 a. m.

## Laid Over Matters.

No. 173. Acquiring title to the lands necessary for East Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, from Bronx River to Boston road.

Petition signed by Angela Justo and sixteen others.

Placed on file in view of the fact that petition No. 231 was favorably acted upon at today's meeting.

No. 174. Regulating and grading, viz., East Two Hundred and Thirtieth street (Flower street, Randall street, Arthur street), between Bronx River and Boston road, and all work incidental thereto.

Laid over awaiting action on petition No. 232 presented at to-day's meeting, which petition was also laid over awaiting report as to estimated cost, etc.

No. 197. Regulating and grading, viz., Zerega avenue (Avenue A), from Lafayette avenue to Westchester avenue, and all work incidental thereto.

Laid over until June 5, 1909, 11 a. m., when estimated cost will be presented on petition No. 233, which is a substitute for this petition numbered 197.

Mr. Brommly appeared in opposition. The Board inquired from Mr. Brommly as to the names of the Committee of Ten of the Unimproved Lascayers' Association who opposed the grading of Zerega avenue, from Lafayette avenue to Westchester avenue, in unsigned letter of March 30, 1909. Mr. Brommly said that he was one of them, but refused to name the others.

Laid over until June 5, 1909, 11 a. m.

No. 223. Acquiring title to Barnes avenue, from Tilden avenue to the northerly City line.

Hearing held on May 13, 1909. Opposition. Written protests received signed by John Lynch and Charles E. Stoker, G. H. Perkins, and others; Joseph M. Vanderpool and others; Jos. A. De Lezer and others.

Laid over until June 5, 1909, 11 a. m.

No. 221. Regulating and grading, Freley avenue, from Westchester avenue to Clasons Point road, Cross avenue, etc.

Estimated cost, \$225,000; assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is \$158,585.

Laid over until Chief Engineer can prepare a report covering only part of the streets mentioned for which Mr. Briggs expects to have ready for the special meeting on June 5, 1909.

No. 291 of 1906. Acquiring title to White Plains road, from West Farms road to the bulkhead line of the East River.

Whereas, Under date of January 23, 1909, the Local Board of Chester adopted a resolution initiating proceedings for "acquiring title to the lands necessary for White Plains road, from West Farms road to the bulkhead line of the East River; and

Whereas, Under date of March 4, 1908, Chief Engineer Lewis of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment reported favorably upon this proceeding; and

Whereas, At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on April 10, 1908, this proceeding was referred back by said Board to the Borough President; and

Whereas, Under date of April 16, 1909, the Principal Assistant Topographical Engineer reported favorably upon this proceeding; now therefore be it

Resolved, That this Local Board hereby again recommends that proceedings be and the same hereby are initiated for acquiring title to the lands necessary for White Plains road, from West Farms road to the bulkhead line of the East River, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York.

Unanimously adopted.

Two Hundred and Forty-first Street Bridge over Bronx River. Petition signed by George Wadley and others, was read, as was also protest from Tax and Rent-payers' Alliance and report of Chief Engineer Briggs, dated April 21, 1909.

On motion, seconded, this petition was denied.

Bridge over Bronx River, the New York and Harlem Railroad tracks and the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad tracks, connecting Two Hundred and Fortieth street and Webster avenue with Nereid avenue.

Petition of J. C. Vreeland, L. K. Peersink and others was read.

On motion, seconded, it was

Resolved, That this Board hereby recommends to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that it authorize the issuance of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$5,000 for the purpose of preparing preliminary surveys, plans and specifications, etc., for a bridge over the Bronx River, the New York and Harlem and the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad tracks, connecting Two Hundred and Fortieth street and Webster avenue with Nereid avenue.

Unanimously adopted.

Lot 26, map of Bowne estate for constructing a dock thereon.

Petition signed by Wm. A. Mallon and others, was read.

On motion, seconded, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board of Chester, Twenty-third District, hereby recommends to the Department of Docks and Ferries the advisability of said Department

applying to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to purchase the following plot of land for the purpose of constructing a public dock thereon, viz.:

Plot No. 26 on map of Bowne estate, being bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the easterly side of the roadway leading from Main street to the Town Dock, which point is 69 feet southerly from the corner formed by the intersection of the easterly side of said roadway with the southerly side of Main street; running thence southerly along the easterly side of said road, 80 feet; running thence easterly and at an angle of about 100 degrees, 90 feet; running thence northerly and parallel with the easterly side of said roadway 80 feet; and thence westerly and parallel with said easterly course, 90 feet to the point or place of beginning.

Unanimously adopted.

Regulating and grading, etc., East Two Hundred and Twenty-second street, from Bronxwood avenue to Carpenter avenue.

Ordered advertised for meeting of June 17, 1909.

Communication from Hudson P. Rose Estate, addressed to Alderman Mulligan, relative to owners ceding land for street purposes to The City of New York in the Thompson-Rose Estate, Willis Estate and Ruser Estate.

Referred to the Topographical Bureau for further investigation and report.

Regulating and grading, etc., Ludlow avenue, from Clasons Point road to Tremont avenue.

A communication from the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment dated May 25, 1909, was read, in which the Local Board was informed that at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on May 21, 1909, the Chief Engineer of the said Board reported that the estimated cost of regulating and grading Ludlow avenue, between the Southern boulevard and Tremont avenue is about \$246,000, which is greatly beyond the limits fixed for improvements of this character, other than for exceptional cases, and recommending that the Local Board resolution be disapproved, and that a new resolution be presented affecting those portions of the street where the property valuations are sufficient to permit of collecting the assessment.

The following was then unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That Ludlow avenue, from Clasons Point road to Tremont avenue, be regulated and graded 100 feet wide in excavation and 60 feet wide in embankment, and all work done incidental thereto within said limits at a total estimated cost of \$121,000, the assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment being \$274,665.

The following was also unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That Ludlow avenue, from Bronx River to Clasons Point road, be regulated and graded 100 feet wide in excavation and 60 feet wide in embankment, and all work done incidental thereto within said limits at a total estimated cost of \$102,000, the assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment being \$178,551.

On motion, the Board adjourned until June 5, 1909, at 11 a. m.

One day we counted twelve passing under our window in one hour. When the matter was agitated some months since, the number of such men decreased for a time, and they only called a few times on a block, but now they are beyond endurance again. Two more have been screaming past since I have been writing these lines.

Dear Sir—The following resolution was adopted May 29, by the above association:

Whereas, The proposed new Building Code prescribes that no frame buildings shall be erected in the Borough of The Bronx south of Fordham road and Pelham avenue, from the Harlem to the Bronx Rivers, which would include such detached residence sections as High Bridge, Morris Heights, University Heights, Sedgwick Park, Mount Hope and Fordham; and

Whereas, Such proposed fire limits bear no relation to the present state of development of the section of the Borough included so that if the proposed extension is in the public interest, logically the entire Borough and the entire city and every portion thereof should be brought within the fire limits; and

Whereas, The physical facts render itself evident that no public necessity exists for the proposed extension of the fire limits to a purely arbitrary line drawn across the Borough, which would retard its development and depreciate property values; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be respectfully requested not to extend the fire limits in The Bronx Borough beyond their present limits; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Mayor, President of the Board of Aldermen, the public press and other civic associations of The Bronx.

Chamber of Commerce, State of New York, }

Hon. PATRICK F. MCGOWAN, President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—I am instructed by the Chamber of Commerce to transmit to you for the Board of Aldermen of New York City the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Chamber of Commerce of the State of New York believing that the complete installation of a uniform system of accounting is essential if we are to have a prompt and economical administration of the City's finances, urges the Board of Aldermen to appropriate \$50,000 at its next meeting to enable the Comptroller to employ the temporary Expert Assistants imperatively needed to make the new system entirely effective in the Finance Department, and it appeals to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to unite with the Board of Aldermen in making this appropriation.

This resolution was adopted at the meeting of June 5 as a part of the report of the Committee on Finance and Currency of the Chamber, signed by James G. Cannon, Maurice L. Muhleman, Gates W. McGarrath, John Claflin and R. Fulton Cutting, which included a report from a Sub-Committee of three Experts, two of them public accountants of high reputation in regard to the installation of the new system of accounting in the City Departments and the pressing necessity of an immediate appropriation to defray the cost of such installation. I beg to send to you as a part of this letter the text of the reports of the Committee and the Sub-Committee of Experts as they were printed in the monthly bulletin of the Chamber for June.

When the matter comes before the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen I should be glad to be notified in order that a member of the Committee may be able to be present in behalf of this proposed action.

Sir—This office is in receipt of a communication from the Deputy Fire Commissioner, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, dated the 26th inst., stating that the lease of premises on Rockaway near Flatlands avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, occupied by Engine Company 157, Leonard Ruoff, executor of the estate of his father, Leonard Ruoff, lessor, expired October 1, 1908, and that recommendation for its extension could not be made for the reason that the date of completion of a new building, in process of erection for said company, could not then be definitely determined, the same having been subsequently finished and occupied by it since March 21, 1909.

Dear Sir—Herewith respectfully submit to you a detail report of the general conditions of the Heating System at the Workhouse, B. L. New York, explaining why it is of the utmost importance to have a new plant installed at once.

1. The present main steam lines running through the cellars and subways of the several buildings comprising the Workhouse, Blackwell's Island, New York, together with all their branches, risers, etc., supplying steam to the several radiators and coils, are in a great many instances so badly corroded that they are beyond repairs; this also applies to the main returns and their branches and which, as a result, is costing the City several hundred tons of coal annually for this waste of escaping steam.

2. The radiators, coils, etc., together with the valves connected thereto throughout this entire institution, are in very bad shape and nothing more than junk; in a great many instances drip pans have been placed under them to keep the water from dripping and spreading over the floors.

3. The covering insulation throughout this system is rotten and practically useless, the bare piping being exposed, which is wasting a great quantity of radiation where it does no good; this also causes a large waste of fuel.

4. In fact this entire heating system which has been in active service over thirty years is completely worn out and it would be a waste of money to attempt any further repairs thereto.

5. During the year 1905 a new boiler was installed at this institution, consisting of three (3) 150 horsepower boilers including new heating mains. At that time the old heating system was repaired to make it possible to continue its use until an appropriation could be made to renew the heating plant.

6. During the years 1906 and 1907 there was added an electric lighting plant, for the lighting of the institution, but with no additional boiler capacity, which with the excessive waste of escaping steam from the heating plant, has made it necessary to tax the entire boiler capacity to its utmost limit, with no reserve whatever in case of accident or repairs. As a result it is very necessary now to give these boilers a general overhauling as soon as the weather permits shutting off the heating plant.

7. Therefore, I am constrained to report that it is of the utmost importance that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to allow an appropriation of at least \$50,000 for the installation of a complete new heating system throughout the buildings comprising the Workhouse, Blackwell's Island, together with one (1) additional boiler of 150 horsepower capacity similar to the present boiler now in place, as a reserve, in case repairs are necessary.

8. I would further call your attention to the fact that this new heating system should be installed during the summer months so that same will be ready for operation next winter. It will take at least six months to install a new plant, and the work cannot be started too soon to have it completed in time.

9. It was only due to the very mild weather we had last winter that it was possible to keep this institution at any habitable temperature. It will not last another winter.

10. The Workhouse has a daily average census during the winter months of at least 2,000 inmates, and proper heating facilities are absolutely necessary.

Dear Sir—I have made a careful inspection of the heating and plumbing systems at the Second District Prison, and respectfully report as follows:

1. The heating system throughout this institution is in a very bad condition, the heating coils and risers are merely shells and the inside of pipes very badly corroded. Repairing is useless, because, as soon as the tongs are put on pipes to make repairs, pipes are crushed.

2. This heating system has been in use for over thirty years, and further repairs would be a waste of money. I would strongly recommend that the entire heating system be renewed from the cellar up.

3. The present heating system is absolutely useless; for enough pressure cannot be put on to carry the steam through the building. Consequently, if new piping is not installed by next fall, stoves will have to be purchased and put up throughout the building, in order to make it habitable during the winter months.

4. The plumbing system throughout the institution is in a very unsanitary condition.

This system has been in constant use for the past thirty years, and the soil-lines, vent-pipes and the water supply to the fixtures are in many instances choked up with corrosion. In many instances they are eaten through, and, as a result, foul air and sewer gas remain in the building. This may, sooner or later, cause an epidemic among the inmates.

I would therefore urge that a new and sanitary plumbing system be installed throughout the building, and that this be done as soon as possible.

To make the changes as above set forth will cost about \$40,000.

Dear Sir—I beg to report on condition of laundry plant at Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island, as follows:

1. The boiler in boiler house adjacent to the laundry building, supplying steam for the laundry is unsafe, and therefore the use of this plant has been discontinued pending reconstruction.

2. A temporary steam line has been connected to the heating main in the factory building, which system is supplied with steam from main power plant, but this will necessitate the keeping of the main plant in operation during the summer, which is both expensive and inadvisable.

3. The laundry equipment at this institution is antiquated and is inadequate for the purposes intended. A new plant is very much needed.

4. Therefore, I would suggest that plans and specifications be prepared as soon as possible, as follows:

Remove present boiler and equipment; build new brick subway from cellar of north wing of Penitentiary building to laundry building; run new high-pressure main to laundry building and connect same to high-pressure main in cellar of north wing of prison, which will give a direct steam supply from the main power plant, thus doing away with the boiler plant in the laundry building entirely.

This change will save considerable cost in fuel.

Install two (2) large extractors in the laundry; repair present equipment where necessary; install an electric motor of proper size for the power transmission, including the installation of feeders from the panel in south workshop, etc., to render the work a complete job.

To make these changes will cost about \$5,000.

The changes as above set forth are urgent necessities, and the matter should be taken up at an early date.

Gentlemen—The undersigned Commissioner of Public Charities very respectfully requests the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$35,000.51, to provide the means to employ the following additional help from June 1, 1909, who are necessary to care for the increased number of patients, due to the opening of new buildings, thus increasing the capacity for patients and employees. The total daily average census for the first quarter of this year was 737 more than the daily average census for the fourth quarter of 1908, when the total daily census was 11,763.

Two Stationary Engineers are needed to take the place of permanent Engineers during vacations.

The Plumbers, Steamfitters and Tinmiths are needed to keep the buildings in repair, and, if allowed, much of the work which is now given out by contract can be done by Department help.

The Blacksmith is needed because we have none at present in the Department, the horseshoeing being done by outside blacksmiths. There are no Wheelwrights employed in this Department, and one is necessary.

An additional Telephone Operator is desired for night service, at \$7.20 per annum. The Department finds it most desirable to employ an additional Telephone Operator to have charge of the switchboard at the principal office from 4 p. m. to 12 p. m. The telephones of the Island institutions are used to a large extent during these hours, and the failure to keep the switchboard open at the principal office of the Department is creating a source of annoyance to those having business to transact with the institutions. During three nights in March, which was selected for observation, the lines of the Island institutions were reported "busy" 165 times, at an average of 55 times per night. One night it was necessary to ring "busy" for the line of seven numbers eight times between 4 and 5 p. m., and twice between 5 and 6 p. m. The improved service that two details which we desire, in place of the one as formerly, will, however, cost \$60 a year less at the rate of \$7.20 per annum each than was paid to the former incumbent.

Two additional Stenographers are desired, one to be detailed to the Purchasing Agent and the other to the office of the Secretary, for the general use of employees. This additional help is necessary in order to keep the greatly increased clerical work of the Department more closely up to date.

Office of the Auditor.

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These are needed owing to the increased work incident to the new system of records and accounts. The present force have been working overtime and have been unable to keep up with the work in hand.

One Deckhand in the Budget for only three months is to be retained throughout the entire year. Two Deckhands are needed on the steamer "Muley" to properly man the boat as required by the United States steamboat regulations.

Six Hospital Helpers, at \$300 per annum each are needed on the One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street dock, One Hundred and Twentieth street dock and Seventieth street dock; one on each dock for day service and one on each dock for night service.

A Ship Carpenter and a Ship Joiner are needed to keep the boats in repair, thereby doing emergency work which would otherwise have to be done in the open market.

The City Hospital census at present is greatly increased and will continue to increase owing to more room being made available for the reception and care of patients, as the house staff has been removed from their quarters in the main building to the new Janeway hall and several of the kitchen services have been transferred from the main building to the new kitchen service building. This extra help is to be distributed as follows:

1 Supervising Nurse to assist the Deputy Superintendent who at present is greatly overworked.

1 Trained Nurse (male) for the Neurological Ward. This has been recommended by the Medical Board.

6 Post Graduate Nurses at \$300 are required for the positions of Assistant Supervisor, night duty; in the operating rooms; Surgical Wards; and Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat Divisions.

5 Hospital Helpers (ward maids) at \$180 per annum, for night duty at City Hospital.

A Dietitian is required for teaching.

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The boiler plant at this hospital is nominally 1,000 horsepower, but with sufficient firemen to properly handle it can be made to develop about 1,500 horsepower, and this is necessary as the New Nurses' Home, a large four-story building, and extra emergency pavilions have been added to this group of buildings which it will be necessary to heat from this plant during the coming winter. Specifications are now being made largely to increase this boiler plant, hence this request for more money.

An additional Trained Nurse at \$600 per annum is desired for the work of this hospital. This Nurse is desired for service in connection with the Tuberculosis Infirmary when the Nurses from that institution take the present Nurses' Home under their charge. This will be done as soon as the Training School can remove to the new home.

Twelve additional Pupil Nurses at \$10 per month have been obtained as a result of much advertising, whose services are greatly needed. These additional Pupil Nurses have long been needed and the applicants procured only after much difficulty and expense. Heretofore the school has been unable to give sufficient time to them after duty to study or for recreation, and is frequently obliged to ask Nurses who have worked all day to continue their work at night, which is not fair to either patients or Nurses.

Three additional Hospital Helpers acting as Nurses are required at \$300 per annum to take charge of additional pavilions for tuberculosis patients.

Three additional Hospital Helpers are required at \$180 per annum to take charge of the ordinary work of caring for these pavilions and five for general work in the new Nurses' Home.

Two Hospital Helpers at \$240 are required in the Nurses' Home to run the elevator, answer the telephone and general work.

Instead of three Trained Nurses, it is desired to employ seven, in order that the orthopaedic service of the hospital may have better attention and more efficient results. Out of the eighty or more crippled children in this hospital the Medical Board has selected forty-five cases which promise improvement or cure with the better attention of a more competent service, and has placed them in separate wards, but we have no Trained Nurses for their care, particularly in the post-operative cases, and such care is urgently necessary. One Trained Nurse is desired for day service and another for night service, while a third is needed to visit these and other children upon their return to their homes, in order to show such attention to the directions of the Physician as will prevent, if possible, any recurrence of the trouble and the consequent necessity of a return to the institution. An experienced operating room Nurse is also required.

A Teacher at \$600 per annum is required to instruct the children who are unable to leave their beds.

An Orthopaedic Mechanic is required to have charge of the workshop where all orthopaedic braces and crutches for crippled children can be made, repaired and altered promptly at a minimum cost.

A medical man is required to act as Deputy in this institution, and there are no medical men on the eligible list for Deputy Superintendent, lay, from which the former incumbent was taken; hence the request for a Deputy Medical Superintendent.

It is desired to add another Supervising Nurse, male, to the force at \$750 per annum, to supervise the growing work of the hospital, particularly through the opening of outside wards. This will release a Trained Nurse at \$600 per annum to be placed in charge of the alcoholic ward, where there is no Trained Nurse at the present time.

An additional Trained Nurse at \$600 per annum is needed to take charge of additional patients in the tuberculosis pavilion recently opened at the hospital.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Hon. Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx, in communication dated April 26, 1909, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize him to cut a path through the parkway space on Prospect avenue, near the front of the main entrance of Public School 40, and to charge the same against the appropriation for improving the plots on Prospect avenue.

President Haffen forwards with his request a communication signed by Mr. William O'Flaherty, Principal of the said school, explanatory of the said request. Mr. O'Flaherty explains that at fire drills, a number of classes using the main entrance have to cross and recross the said plot; that the children's shoes become covered with mud and that they carry dirt over the pavements into the school.

President Haffen further explains in his said communication that, upon investigation by Chief Engineer Briggs, of his office, it is found that there is a balance sufficient to cover the cost of the work in the appropriation that was made for sodding and soiling these said plots, and says that the whole cost will not exceed \$1,000.

The appropriation out of the balance of which it is proposed to pay for this work, was authorized on July 6, 1906, it being provided in the resolution passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on that date, that Corporate Stock in the sum of \$8,000 be issued for the purpose of top soiling or sodding the centre plots on Prospect avenue, between East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Crotona Park. Of this amount, there now remains to the credit of the account on the books of this, the Department of Finance, the sum of \$2,698.06.

Public School 40 is on the westerly side of Prospect avenue, between Jennings street and Ritter place. The length of the block is about 286 feet and the centre plot is placed curb and the plots are all supposed to have been sodded, but the sod on this one, in consequence of children crossing and recrossing, has disappeared.

The proposed improvement, it is reported to me, will be a desirable one. It is proposed to place a wide crossing at the centre of the plot, opposite the main entrance of the building and to erect a railing around the two plots thus formed and to again sod these enclosures.

The appropriation was originally made for the purpose of improving these centre plots, and I see no reason why a portion of the balance which is now available should not be used in the manner requested.

I therefore advise that the resolution of July 6, 1906, authorizing an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$8,000 for the purpose of top soiling and sodding the centre plots on Prospect avenue, between East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Crotona Park be amended in compliance with the request of the President of The Bronx, as will be necessary to place a crossing opposite School 40, located on the westerly side of Prospect avenue, between Jennings street and Ritter place and to erect railings around the centre plots on the said block, at an estimated cost of \$1,000, and when said amendment is concurred in by the Board of Aldermen that the Borough President be authorized to proceed with the work.

Sir—An issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$750,000 has been authorized to provide for the extension of the high pressure fire system in the Borough of Brooklyn. The same conditions confront the Department in the selection of a proper hydrant as was recently explained in your Board in the application for authority to purchase a hydrant especially constructed to withstand the extraordinarily severe service for which it is intended. It was fully explained in my previous application in relation to the Manhattan hydrants that the hydrant now in use had been selected after free and open competition. It was the only hydrant submitted to withstand the test prescribed by the Department's specifications.

The efficiency of the hydrant manufactured by the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company, of Newark, N. J., has been thoroughly demonstrated in the successful operation of the system now in use for a period of about one year.

Several injunction suits were brought by the unsuccessful bidders on the Department's first invitation for bids for high pressure hydrants, and the question of selection of the Smith hydrants was litigated adversely to the plaintiffs. There elapsed a period of about seven months before the award of the contract was made.

Taking these facts into consideration, as well as the obvious advantages of the uniformity of the system, I would request the privilege of the Honorable Board of Aldermen to purchase, for use in the Borough of Brooklyn, five hundred (500) of the high pressure hydrants of the A. P. Smith manufacture. It is agreed that these hydrants shall be furnished at the cost of \$108.50 each, this being the same price as the hydrants just authorized for the Borough of Manhattan and somewhat lower than the original bid price of this company for the hydrants furnished on the first installment.

I attach hereto a form of resolution which I would request that you submit at the next meeting of the Board of Aldermen.

Dear Sir—The Budget allowance for the operation and maintenance of the high pressure stations in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn does not permit of the payment of salaries for the force now assigned to these stations. It has been necessary since January 1 to transfer men, whose salaries were paid from other appropriation accounts, to duty at these stations, and no provision has been made for the payment of salaries where extra men have to be employed to take the place of those who are absent on account of sickness, or injuries received in the discharge of their duties.

Under the present arrangement the men have been obliged to work seven days in the week; this is not required of the other department employees generally.

At all times there should be on duty a full and adequate force, capable of meeting all emergencies, and to permit of the rearrangement of the hours of employment so that each man at the station will be obliged to work but six days a week, it will be necessary to increase the force. The Corporation Counsel has rendered an opinion that the Department cannot demand the employees at these stations to work beyond eight hours in one day. The present number of employees would, perhaps, be sufficient if the Department was guaranteed of their attendance at all times, but sickness and other causes compel the men to be absent and the remaining force are obliged to work extra hours.

In the following schedule I mention the number and classes of employees that will be required to meet these emergencies, and the arrangement of the hours of employment which will assure a full force at the stations at all times, making allowance for absentees:

The Bureau of High Pressure Fire Service Stations has been recently created, independent of the Bureau of the Chief Engineers of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn. I was unable to transfer a Clerk to this Bureau, and in the proposed schedule I have made provision for the employment of a Clerk whose duty it shall be to keep the necessary records. Requisitions for supplies and material, the preparation of payrolls, and the keeping of time records and other correspondence in connection with this Bureau will be done independent of the Chief Engineers of these Boroughs, who, prior to May 1, had control of these stations.

The appropriations for the Brooklyn stations for supplies, fuel, etc., are entirely inadequate for the proper maintenance of the stations and additional money is necessary for the repair of the machinery, fuel, etc. The apportionment of these supplies and the amount of money necessary are set forth in the following table:

"It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said City to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purposes of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the Corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City as created by this act, and purposes for which said City is liable, and on account of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the City Treasury during the then current year from all sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the Sinking Funds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Community of The City of New York, and of any of the Municipal and Public Corporations, or parts of Municipal and Public Corporations by this act consolidated with the Municipal Corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Community of The City of New York, other than the surplus revenues of any such Sinking Funds for the payment of interest on the City Debt of the Municipal Corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Community of The City of New York, or the like debts of the Municipal and Public Corporations by this act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which by law they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the County officers and the other County charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said Counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of County officers and other County charges and expenses of such County; to the end that each of said Counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the County for County as distinguished from City purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statement as follows:

First—The Budget in detail for the year 1909.

Second—Copy of resolutions authorizing additional appropriation to the Department of Health for the year 1909, pursuant to the provisions of section 236 of the Greater New York Charter.

Third—The amount of County charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said Budget, as well as the amount of County charges and expenses paid during the year 1908 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, which amounts together are to be raised, respectively, by levy upon taxable property within each of said Counties, as provided by section 902 of the Charter.

Fourth—The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation.

## BUDGET FOR 1909.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and nine, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, viz.: One hundred and forty-eight million four hundred and forty-six thousand nine hundred and four dollars and eighty-three cents (\$148,446,904.83); second, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year, viz.: Five million one hundred and seventy-five thousand seven hundred and ninety-six dollars and twenty-three cents (\$5,175,796.23), and, third, the amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1908, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, viz.: Two million nine hundred and twenty-two thousand four hundred and forty-seven dollars and eight cents (\$2,922,447.08).

Be it further Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and nine, with the exception that the items contained in the schedules under the titles "Salaries" or "Salaries and Wages," in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County governments, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

First—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County governments in the schedules of "Salaries" and "Salaries and Wages" herein contained, except when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and when such change will not increase the monthly rate of the total amount herein appropriated for the said schedules of "Salaries" and "Salaries and Wages" for monthly payrolls in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County governments.

Second—(a) That the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules, entitled "Salaries" and "Salaries and Wages," and (b) set forth on said payrolls the monthly, weekly or daily pro rata expenditures of said appropriations and the total amounts expended up to the time of and including said monthly and weekly payrolls, and (c) the unexpended balance of each appropriation against which said payrolls are chargeable.

## FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

The appropriations in this Budget are made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts and records of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show all receipts, disbursements and population in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller. Records must show the addresses of parents, guardians or nearest relatives of inmates and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to make provision for dependents in the institutions.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys and all their books of record and accounts shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance and at all proper times the Department of Public Charities shall have access to the record of inmates.

4. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall in his discretion suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payments for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon the per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges upon the City. Except in emergency cases in hospitals, the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals. The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amounts so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.

8. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the public schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child of four years of age and over receiving such instruction during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

9. Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and when judicious, no-proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the courts where no crime is proven against the child, to the Commissioners of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a court commitment.

10. The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills to the Legislature, as to provide that the children of emigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

11. In determining the acceptance of patients in private hospitals as proper charges (see Rule 5) the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the service actually rendered to the patients by the



hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections.

12. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities, and has been placed in this Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City Institution at Randall's Island.

#### MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

Nos. 1572 and 1573.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor,  
June 8, 1909.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, disapproved, proposed ordinances Nos. 1572 and 1573, entitled "Ordinances to amend sections 315 and 316 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relative to the establishment of fare registers on public vehicles."

My reasons for disapproving this proposed resolution are:

First—That the rates of fare charged by all public cabs and coaches are fixed by section 319 of the General Ordinances. It is feared that in establishing a new class of public vehicles called taxicabs and taxicoaches, that the present provisions of section 319 of the Ordinances would not be applicable thereto.

Second—In the proposed ordinance no rates of fare are provided to take the place of the rates in present section 319.

Third—Section C of the proposed ordinance is to take effect immediately on being approved by me. It appears that this section would require the appointment forthwith of a Chief Inspector and Deputy Inspectors of Taxicabs. Prior to making any such appointments it will be necessary to have the salary grades fixed in pursuance of the provisions of section 56 of the Charter, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, and further, to have the new positions graded in the Civil Service by the Local Board, the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, in accordance with the Civil Service Act.

Fourth—I am of the opinion that this entire subject should be contained in one ordinance, and the rates of fare to be exacted by taxicabs and taxicoaches set forth in whatever legislation your Honorable Board deem advisable to pass.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which were referred on January 12, 1909 (Minutes, page 308), and recommended on January 26, 1909 (Minutes, page 472), the annexed proposed ordinances affecting taximeters and registers in public vehicles, and also referred on January 19, 1909 (Minutes, page 340), a complaint in this matter, respectfully

#### REPORTS:

That, having held several largely attended public hearings on the subject, every phase of which was presented at large and in detail by representatives of all interested, and believing that a comprehensive regulation of the entire system is necessary, it therefore recommends that the accompanying substitute ordinance be adopted.



## (SUBSTITUTE.)

AN ORDINANCE to amend Sections 315 and 316 of Chapter 7, Title 2, Article 3 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York.

Be it Enacted by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. That section 315 of chapter 7, title 2, article 3 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York be and it hereby is rescinded and repealed, that the following new section 315 be substituted therefor, and further that section 316 of the same chapter, title and article be amended by adding thereto section 316a to section 316b, as follows:

315. Every person driving a licensed hack or express (other than the person named in the license therefor) shall be licensed as such driver, and every application for such license shall be endorsed, in writing, by two reputable residents of The City of New York certifying to the competence of the applicant. No owner of a licensed hack or express shall employ an unlicensed driver under a penalty of \$10 for each and every offense.

316. Any meter instrument or device by which the charge for hire of a licensed hack is mechanically calculated either for distance travelled or for waiting time or both and upon which such charge shall be indicated by means of figures shall be deemed a taximeter. Every vehicle intended to seat two persons inside upon which such taximeter is affixed shall be deemed a taxicab; every vehicle intended to seat four persons inside upon which such taximeter is affixed shall be deemed a taxicoach.

316a. Each vehicle upon which a taximeter is affixed shall be licensed, and the owner thereof shall pay annually such license fees as are hereinafter provided:

Each special taxicab, \$10.

Each public taxicab, \$8.

Each special taxicoach, \$15.

Each public taxicoach, \$12.

Each driver of a licensed taxicab or taxicoach shall pay an annual license fee of \$3. The owner or driver of any hack upon which a taximeter is affixed, and who has duly procured a license to use or to drive such vehicle according to the provisions of any ordinance heretofore enacted, shall continue to use or drive said vehicle under said license until its expiration.

316c. There shall be under the direction of the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses an Inspector of Taximeters and such Deputy Inspectors as may be found necessary to carry on the work hereinafter described, who shall be appointed and removed at pleasure by the Mayor, and who shall be paid such compensation as shall be fixed by law.

316d. It shall be the duty of such Inspector and Deputy Inspectors to test, inspect, examine, prove and ascertain the accuracy of each and every taximeter affixed to any vehicle offered for hire, and to measure, test and examine every wheel, tire, gear, shaft or every part of the mechanism of such vehicle which may affect or control the operation of such taximeter, and to make any and all necessary examinations, tests and inspections of such taximeter and vehicle. A Deputy Inspector shall mark and number such taximeter and vehicle approved at least once every six months, and as much oftener as the Inspector shall deem necessary, with some suitable device, which device shall be recorded in the office of the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses. Any person may provide and keep on his premises a suitable and proper apparatus to be approved and marked by the Inspector of Taximeters, for testing and proving the accuracy of taximeters and vehicles furnished for use by him and by which apparatus all taximeters and vehicles may be tested and proved. It shall be the duty of any person using or permitting to be used any taxicab or taxicoach immediately after any inspection or test to effectually seal up the case containing the working parts of the taximeter and the case or cover of the gear which operates the distance if it is not enclosed in the main part of the taximeter.

316e. Any person who shall use or permit to be used, or who shall drive for hire any taxicab or taxicoach, the seal of the case or cover of the taximeter or gear of which is not intact, shall, upon conviction thereof by any City Magistrate, be fined for such offense a sum not exceeding \$10, and in default of paying any fine which is imposed, may be committed to the City Prison not exceeding ten days, each day of imprisonment to be taken as a liquidation of one dollar of the fine.

316f. No license shall be issued to a taxicab or taxicoach until the Inspector or a Deputy Inspector of Taximeters shall certify to the Chief or Deputy Chief of the Bureau of Licenses that the taximeter of and such vehicle have been duly inspected and approved.

316g. The Inspector of Taximeters shall keep a register of the name of each person owning and using a vehicle upon which a taximeter is affixed, together with the serial number, size and make of such taximeter, the description, make and necessary dimensions of such vehicle, with the date and complete record of such inspection, and such record shall be open to the inspection of the public at all reasonable times.

Each Deputy Inspector shall issue a certificate of inspection of taxicabs and taxicoaches and shall keep a record of such certificates given on corresponding stubs. The certificates and corresponding stubs shall be numbered consecutively. All registers and books shall be public records and extracts may be certified by the Inspector of Taximeters for use as evidence.

316h. Five thousand two hundred and eighty feet shall be deemed to be one mile.

316i. Any taxicab or taxicoach which seeks patrons on the streets, avenues or highways of The City of New York, or occupies space thereon by reason of a permit or license from The City of New York, shall conform to this ordinance.

316j. After such taximeter and vehicle have been duly marked, numbered and approved, any person who shall substitute and affix any other taximeter on such vehicle than that marked, numbered and approved for said vehicle, and any person who shall use or permit to be used or drive any vehicle upon which such taximeter has been substituted and affixed, unless such vehicle is immediately withdrawn from service and not offered for hire until such substituted taximeter and such vehicle shall be duly marked, numbered and approved, and any person who shall tamper with, manipulate or operate any taximeter which has been duly marked, numbered and approved, or any part of the mechanism of such vehicle which controls or affects such taximeter, so that the taximeter is defective or incorrect to the prejudice of any passenger, or who shall use or permit to be used or drive any vehicle the taximeter of or such parts of the mechanism of which have been as tampered with, manipulated or operated, or any person who shall use or permit to be used or drive any taxicab or taxicoach for hire, not inspected, examined, tested, proved, marked and numbered as heretofore provided, shall upon conviction thereof by any magistrate, either upon confession of the party or competent testimony, be fined not more than \$50 for each and every offense, and in default of payment of such fine may be committed to prison by such magistrate until the same shall be paid, but such imprisonment shall not exceed ten days.

316k. No person shall use, or permit to be used, or drive any taxicab or taxicoach for hire, the taximeter of which shall be adjusted or installed in such manner or which shall be in such condition as to be defective and incorrect to the prejudice of a passenger under a penalty of \$50 for each and every offense.

316l. No taximeter affixed to a taxicab or a taxicoach propelled by steam, electricity, gasoline, compressed air or other motive power shall be operated from any wheel to which power is applied under a penalty of \$25 for each and every offense.

316m. Each figure used to indicate the fare on a taximeter shall be of such size as to be legible from the rear seat of such vehicle, and each taximeter shall be placed in a position approved by the Inspector or Deputy Inspector of Taximeters, so that its face can be easily seen by a passenger from the inside of said vehicle, and after sundown such face shall be illuminated by a suitable light.

316n. All persons shall exhibit on demand at all reasonable times any taximeter or vehicle to any of said Inspectors for the purpose of inspection. Any person offending against this section, on conviction thereof by any city magistrate, may be fined for each such offense a sum not to exceed \$10, and in default of paying any fine which is imposed, may be committed to the city prison, not exceeding ten days, each day of imprisonment to be taken as a liquidation of one dollar of the fine.

316o. If any passenger shall request an inspection of any taxicab or taxicoach, giving in writing a full statement of any trip made by him, upon investigation of said request the Chief or a Deputy Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, or the Inspector of Taximeters, may order the owner of the vehicle complained against to withdraw the same from service until inspected and tested, and the same shall be forthwith inspected and tested; if the same on being so tested shall be found to be 5 per cent. defective and incorrect to the prejudice of any passenger, the Inspector shall order the owner to forthwith remove the taximeter or change or alter any part of said vehicle. Any person who refuses to comply with or who disobeys said order or orders shall upon con-

viction thereof by any city magistrate be fined for each such offense a sum not to exceed \$10, and in default of paying any fine which is imposed, may be committed to the city prison not exceeding ten days, each day of imprisonment to be taken as a liquidation of one dollar of the fine.

316p. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. Article C. of this ordinance shall take effect immediately, and all other articles and sections shall take effect thirty days after the approval of this ordinance by his Honor the Mayor.

Every vehicle intended to seat two persons inside upon which such taximeter is affixed shall be deemed a taxicab; every vehicle intended to seat four persons inside upon which such taximeter is affixed shall be deemed a taxicoach.

316b. Each vehicle upon which a taximeter is affixed shall be licensed, and the owner thereof shall pay annually such license fees as are hereinafter provided:

Each special taxicab, \$10.

Each public taxicab, \$8.

Each special taxicoach, \$15.

Each public taxicoach, \$12.

Each driver of a licensed taxicab or taxicoach shall pay an annual license fee of

\$3. The owner or driver of any hack upon which a taximeter is affixed and who has duly procured a license to use or to drive such vehicle according to the provisions of any ordinance heretofore enacted shall continue to use or drive said vehicle under said license until its expiration.

316c. There shall be under the direction of the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses an Inspector of Taximeters and such Deputy Inspectors as may be found necessary to carry on the work hereinafter described, who shall be appointed and removed at pleasure by the Mayor, and who shall be paid such compensation as shall be fixed by law.

316d. It shall be the duty of such Inspector and Deputy Inspectors to test, inspect, examine, prove and ascertain the accuracy of any taximeter affixed to any vehicle offered for hire, and to measure, test and examine every wheel, tire, gear, shaft or any part of the mechanism of such vehicle which may affect or control the operation of such taximeter, and to make any and all necessary examinations, tests and inspections of such taximeter and vehicle. Any person may provide and keep on his premises a suitable and proper apparatus to be approved and marked by the Inspector of Taximeters for testing and proving the accuracy of taximeters and vehicles furnished for use by him and by which apparatus all taximeters and vehicles may be tested and proved. It shall be the duty of any person using or permitting to be used any taxicab or taxicoach immediately after any inspection or test, to effectually seal up the case containing the working parts of the taximeter and the case or cover of the gear which operates the distance, if it is not enclosed in the main part of the taximeter.

316e. Any person who shall use or permit to be used or who shall drive for hire any taxicab or taxicoach, the seal of the case or cover of the taximeter or gear of which is not intact, shall, upon conviction thereof by any City Magistrate, be fined for such offense a sum not exceeding \$10, and in default of paying any fine which is imposed, may be committed to the city prison not exceeding ten days, each day of imprisonment to be taken as a liquidation of one dollar of the fine.

316f. No license shall be issued to a taxicab or taxicoach until the Inspector or a Deputy Inspector of Taximeters shall certify to the Chief, or Deputy Chief, of the Bureau of Licenses that the taximeter of and such vehicle have been duly inspected and approved.

316g. The Inspector of Taximeters shall keep a register of the name of each person owning and using a vehicle upon which a taximeter is affixed, together with the serial number, size and make of such taximeter, the description, make and necessary dimensions of such vehicle, with the date and complete record of such inspection, and such record shall be open to the inspection of the public at all reasonable times.

Each Deputy Inspector shall issue a certificate of inspection of taxicabs and taxicoaches and shall keep a record of such certificates given on corresponding stubs. The certificates and corresponding stubs shall be numbered consecutively. All registers and books shall be public records and extracts may be certified by the Inspector of Taximeters for use as evidence.

316h. 5,280 feet shall be deemed to be one mile.

316i. Any taxicab or taxicoach which seeks patrons on the streets, avenues or highways of The City of New York, or occupies space thereon by reason of a permit or license from The City of New York, shall conform to this ordinance and not exact any fare from a passenger greater than the official schedule of rates hereinafter provided.

316j. The legal maximum rate provided in this ordinance and any schedule of rates promulgated by the owner of any such vehicle charging less than the legal maximum rate, shall be displayed in a conspicuous place on the inside of such vehicle.

## LEGAL MAXIMUM RATES-

## Taxicabs.

For one-half mile or any part thereof, 30 cents.  
For each additional quarter mile or part thereof, 10 cents.  
For waiting time, at the rate of \$1 per hour.

## Taxicoaches.

For one-half mile or any part thereof, 40 cents.  
For each additional quarter mile or part thereof, 10 cents.  
For waiting time, at the rate of \$1 per hour.  
One piece of baggage, 20 cents.  
No charge shall be made for hand bag, dress suit case or child under five years of age.

316k. All rates of fare shall depend on the number of persons which each vehicle is intended to seat inside and not on the number of passengers actually carried, and no owner or driver of any taxicab or taxicoach shall use or permit to be used on such vehicle any taximeter which shall calculate and indicate a rate of fare which shall depend on the number of persons actually carried under a penalty of \$25 for each offense.

316l. After such taximeter and vehicle have been duly marked, numbered and approved, any person who shall substitute and affix any other taximeter on such vehicle than that marked, numbered and approved for said vehicle, and any person who shall use or permit to be used or drive any vehicle upon which such taximeter has been substituted and affixed, unless such vehicle is immediately withdrawn from service and not offered for hire until such substituted taximeter and such vehicle shall



be duly marked, numbered and approved, and any person who shall tamper with, manipulate or operate any taximeter which has been duly marked, numbered and approved, or any part of the mechanism of such vehicle which controls or affects such taximeter, so that the taximeter is defective or incorrect to the prejudice of any passenger, or who shall use or permit to be used or drive any vehicle the taximeter of or such parts of the mechanism of which have been so tampered with, manipulated or operated, or any person who shall use or permit to be used or drive any taxicab or taxicab for hire, not inspected, examined, tested, proved, marked and numbered as hereinbefore provided, shall upon conviction thereof by any magistrate, either upon confession of the party or competent testimony, be fined not more than \$50 for each and every offense, and in default of payment of such fine may be committed to prison by such magistrate until the same shall be paid, but such imprisonment shall not exceed ten days.

316m. No person shall use, or permit to be used or drive, any taxicab or taxicab coach for hire, the taximeter of which shall be adjusted or installed in such manner or which shall be in such condition as to be defective and incorrect to the prejudice of a passenger, under a penalty of \$50 for each and every offense.

316n. No taximeter affixed to a taxicab or a taxicab propelled by steam, electricity, gasoline, compressed air or other motive power shall be operated from any wheel to which power is applied, under a penalty of \$25 for each and every offense.

316o. Each figure used to indicate the fare on a taximeter shall be of such size as to be legible from the rear seat of such vehicle, and each taximeter shall be placed in a position approved by the Inspector or Deputy Inspector of Taximeters, so that its face can be easily seen by a passenger from the inside of said vehicle, and after sundown such face shall be illuminated by a suitable light.

316p. All persons shall exhibit on demand at all reasonable times any taximeter or vehicle to any of said Inspectors for the purpose of inspection. 316r. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect ninety days after the passage of this ordinance.

No. 1572

(ORIGINAL.)

AN ORDINANCE amending chapter 8 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to weights and measures and incorporating therein taximeter or mileage registers.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

#### Chapter 8—Weights and Measures.

Sec. 380. There shall be a Mayor's Bureau of Weights and Measures in The City of New York, in charge of an Inspector of Weights and Measures, to be appointed by the Mayor and removable by him at his pleasure, who shall be paid a salary of \$2,500 per annum. The Sealers and Inspectors of Weights and Measures shall hereafter be known as Deputy Inspectors of Weights and Measures, and they and their successors shall each receive a salary of \$1,500 per annum, and be removable by the Mayor at pleasure.

Sec. 381. The present Sealers and Inspectors of Weights and Measures shall continue to hold office as Deputy Inspectors of Weights and Measures. Any vacancies which shall hereafter occur shall be filled by appointment by the Mayor.

Sec. 382. Said Inspector and each of said Deputy Inspectors of Weights and Measures shall, before entering upon the duties of his office, execute to The City of New York a bond, with one or more sufficient sureties to be approved by the Mayor, in the penal sum of \$2,000 conditional for the faithful performance of the duties of his office.

Sec. 383. All persons using weights and measures, scale beams, patent balances, steelyards, taximeters or mileage registers, or any other instrument in weighing or measuring any article intended to be purchased or sold in The City of New York, shall cause the same to be sealed and marked by a Deputy Inspector of Weights and Measures of said City.

Sec. 384. Any person who shall, in weighing or measuring mileage on the streets and highways or any article for purchase or sale within The City of New York, use any weight, measure, scale beam, patent balance, steelyard, taximeter or mileage register or other instrument not sealed and marked as herein required, shall forfeit and pay the sum of \$50 for each and every offense.

Sec. 385. All weights, measures, scale beams, patent balances, steelyards and other instruments for weighing, as well as taximeters or mileage registers, to be sealed and adjusted by a Deputy Inspector of Weights and Measures in The City of New York, shall be made to conform to the standard of the State, and shall be marked by him with the initials of his name and the date on which the same shall be sealed and marked.

"Upon the written request of any resident of The City of New York, the Inspectors of Weights and Measures shall test or cause to be tested, within a reasonable time after the receipt of such request, the weights, measures, scale beams, patent balances, steelyards, taximeters or mileage registers or other instruments used in measuring, buying or selling by the person, firm or corporation designated in such request."

Sec. 386. If any person shall use, in The City of New York, in weighing or measuring, as aforesaid, any weight, measure, scale beam, patent balance, steelyard, taximeter or mileage register or other instrument which shall not conform to such standard, or shall use in weighing aforesaid, any scale beam, patent balance, steelyard or other instrument which shall be out of order or incorrect, or which shall not balance, he, she or they shall forfeit and pay for every such offense the sum of \$25.

Sec. 387. The Inspector shall keep a register of the name of each person, firm or corporation whose weights, measures, scale beams, patent balances, steelyards, taximeters or mileage registers, or other instruments have been inspected, together with the number and size of same, and what of each was approved and what condemned, with the date of inspection, and such record shall be open to the Inspector or the public at reasonable times.

Sec. 388. No person shall sell or offer for sale in any market or in the public streets or in any other place in The City of New York any fruits, vegetables, or berries in crates, baskets, or other measures or any butter in prints, or any ice or coal or other fuel or for a greater weight or measure than the true measure thereof, and all ice, coal, coke, meat, poultry and provisions (except vegetables sold by the head or bunch) of every kind, sold in the streets or elsewhere in The City of New York, shall be weighed or measured by scales, measures or balances, or in measures

duly tested and stamped by the Inspector or Deputy Inspectors of Weights and Measures; provided, that poultry may be offered for sale and sold in other manner than by weight, but in all cases where the persons intending to purchase shall so desire and request poultry shall be weighed as hereinbefore provided.

Sec. 389. Any weights or scales found by the Deputy Inspector in use in any market or in the public streets, which, upon being tested, are found to be short in weight by one-quarter of a pound or upwards, may be summarily confiscated and destroyed.

Sec. 390. No person shall sell or supply any coal or coke within the limits of The City of New York, unless there shall be delivered to a person in charge of the wagon or conveyance used in such delivery a certificate duly signed by the person selling such fuel, showing the weight of the fuel proposed to be delivered, the weight of the wagon or conveyance used in such delivery, the total weight of fuel and conveyance and the name of the purchaser.

Sec. 391. No person in charge of a wagon or conveyance used in delivering coal, coke or other fuel, to whom the certificate mentioned in the previous section has been given, shall neglect or refuse to supply such certificate to the Inspector or Deputy Inspector of Weights and Measures, or to any person designated by either of them, or to the purchaser or intending purchaser of the fuel being delivered; and when the said officer or person as designated, or the intending purchaser, shall demand that the weight shown by such certificate be verified, it shall be the duty of the person delivering such fuel to convey the same forthwith to some public scale in the district, or to any private scale the owner whereof shall consent to such use and permit the verifying of the weight shown, and shall, after the delivery of such fuel return forthwith with the wagon or conveyance used in the same scale and verify the weight of said wagon or conveyance.

Sec. 392. It shall be the duty of the Deputy Inspector of Weights and Measures, and each of them is hereby authorized to inspect, examine, test and seal at least once in each year, and as much oftener as the Inspector of Weights and Measures may deem proper, the weights, measures, scale beams, patent balances, steelyards, taximeters or mileage registers and other instruments used in The City of New York in weighing and measuring aforesaid.

Sec. 393. No person shall refuse to exhibit any weights, measures, scale beams, patent balances, steelyards, taximeters or mileage registers or other instruments to any of said Inspectors for the purpose of being so inspected and examined, under the penalty of \$25 for every such offense.

Sec. 394. No person shall in any way or manner obstruct, hinder or molest any Inspector of Weights and Measures in the performance of his duties as hereby imposed upon him, under a penalty upon every such person of \$25 for every such offense.

Sec. 395. All weights, scale beams, patent balances, steelyards, taximeters or mileage registers and other instruments used for weighing or measuring shall be inspected and sealed at the stores and places where the same may be used; but in case they or any of them shall be found not to conform to the standard of this State, the owner thereof shall, within five days, at his expense, have the same so altered and repaired as to conform it to the said standard of the State, under the penalty of \$10 for each neglect.

Sec. 396. It shall be the duty of each of the said Inspectors to make a record and certificate as hereinafter provided of all the weights, measures, scale beams, patent balances, steelyards, taximeters or mileage registers and other instruments used for weighing and measuring inspected by him, in which he shall state the names of the owners of the same, and whether they are conforming to the standard of the State.

Sec. 397. It shall be the duty of the Deputy Inspector of Weights and Measures to report promptly to the Inspector of Weights and Measures the names of all persons whose weights, measures and other instruments for weighing and measuring shall be found to be incorrect.

Sec. 398. It shall also be the duty of said Deputy Inspectors to file monthly reports with the Inspector of Weights and Measures, and to make such other and further reports and keep such further records as may be required from time to time by said Inspector.

Sec. 399. It shall be the duty of the Inspector of Weights and Measures to report forthwith to the Corporation Counsel the names and places of business of all persons violating any of the provisions of this Chapter, and of all persons making use of any fraudulent or unsealed weights, measures, scales, taximeters or mileage registers or other instruments for weighing or measuring.

Sec. 400. It shall not be lawful for the said Inspector or Deputy Inspector to vend any weights, measures, scale beams, patent balances, steelyards, taximeters or mileage registers or other instruments to be used for weighing or measuring or to offer or expose the same for sale in The City of New York, under the penalty of \$50 for every such offense.

Sec. 401. Each Deputy Inspector shall give a certificate to the owner of the weights or measures accepted, and shall keep a record of such certificate given on a corresponding stub. The certificates and corresponding stubs shall be numbered consecutively. The books containing the stubs, after the corresponding certificates have been given out, shall become a public record. The Inspector shall be authorized, when required, to certify extracts from these records.

Sec. 402. All complaints against Deputy Inspectors of Weights and Measures shall be lodged with the Inspector of Weights and Measures, and by him reported, with his recommendation thereon, to the Mayor for his final action.

Sec. 403. The Deputy Inspectors shall be assigned for service by the Inspector in such district as he may deem proper. Whenever any Deputy Inspector shall resign or be removed from office, it shall be his duty to deliver at the office of the Inspector of Weights and Measures all the standard weights and measures and other official property in his possession.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

No. 1573

AN ORDINANCE providing for the accuracy and efficiency in cabs, cabs, hacks, automobiles and other public conveyances, of a machine or device for the regulation of the fare of passengers in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York approves and recommends the installation of some machine or device in the cab service of the City looking to the betterment of said cab service and for the protection and safety of the public.

Sec. 2. The Chief of the Bureau of Licenses is hereby authorized and directed to investigate and test the accuracy and efficiency of any machine, device or register to be used in cabs, cabs, hacks, automobiles or vehicles used for public hire purporting to show the fare of the passenger or passengers during and at the termination of the distance ridden by said passenger or passengers in numerical figures, the number of miles covered by said vehicle, the number of trips (counting from the end or destination of each route) for which the vehicle or cab may have been employed or engaged by any passenger, the amount of money collected by the owner, lessee or driver of a vehicle or conveyance herein mentioned, the amount recorded and charged for the transportation of extra baggage or luggage.

Sec. 3. The Chief of the Bureau of Licenses shall make a report in writing to the Board of Aldermen of the result of such test with all convenient speed, and at such times hereafter as may be demanded.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

To the Members of the Committee on Laws and Legislation of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—Relative to the report of your Committee made to the Board of Aldermen, under date of May 4, 1909, bearing on proposed ordinances Nos. 1572, 1573 and 1603, which said report became General Order No. 175, and was, under date of May 18, 1909, referred back to your Committee by the Board of Aldermen for further consideration and amendment, I beg to respectfully suggest and recommend the following amendments to the "Substitute" ordinance contained in said report.



First—In section 316a, third line, insert after the word "figures," the words "or otherwise."

Second—In section 316a, fifth line, first word, and sixth line, sixth word, in place of the word "such" insert the word "a."

Third—In place of section 316c insert the following:

"316c. The Mayor shall appoint and may remove at pleasure, one Inspector of Taximeters and such Deputy Inspectors of Taximeters as may be necessary to properly conduct the tests, inspections, examinations and proofs in this ordinance prescribed, which said Inspector and Deputy Inspectors shall at all times be subject to directions from the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, and shall receive such compensation as may be fixed by law."

Fourth—In place of section 316d insert the following:

"316d. It shall be the duty of the Inspector and Deputy Inspectors in section 316c mentioned, to test, inspect, examine, prove and ascertain the accuracy of each and every taximeter affixed to any vehicle offered for hire, and to measure, test and examine any wheel, tire, gear, shaft, or any part of the mechanism of any vehicle which may affect or control the operation of any taximeter, and make all examinations, tests and inspections of taximeters and vehicles. Each taximeter and the vehicle to which the same is attached shall be tested, inspected, examined and proved as hereinbefore provided, at least once in every six months, with some suitable device, the result of which test, inspection, examination and proof shall be recorded in the office of the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses. If upon the completion of such test, inspection, examination and proof, such taximeter and its appurtenances shall be found to be up to the required standard of accuracy, the Inspector of Taximeters or the Deputy Inspector of Taximeters making such test, inspection, examination and proof shall effectually seal the case containing the working parts of such taximeter and the case or cover of the gear which operates the distance, if it is not inclosed in the main part of the taximeter."

Fifth—In section 316a, fifth line, in place of the words "until inspected and tested," insert the words "and shall forthwith inspect and test the same," and in the eighth line after the first word "any" insert the word "defective."

#### MOTIONS, ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS.

Alderman Dowling asked and obtained unanimous consent to introduce the following:

No. 2478.

AN ORDINANCE to amend sections 315 and 316 of chapter 7, title 2, article 3 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. That section 315 of chapter 7, title 2, Article 3 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, be and it hereby is amended and repealed, that the following new section 315 be substituted therefor, and further that section 316 of the same chapter, title and article be amended by adding thereto section 316a in section 316, as follows:

315. Every person driving a licensed hack, or express (other than the person named in the license therefor) shall be licensed as such driver, and every application for such license shall be indorsed in writing by two reputable residents of The City of New York certifying to the competence of the applicant. No owner of a licensed hack or express shall employ an unlicensed driver under a penalty of \$10 for each and every offense.

316a. Any meter, instrument or device by which the charge for hire of a licensed hack is mechanically calculated either for distance travelled or for waiting time or both and upon which such charge shall be indicated by means of figures, shall be deemed a taximeter. Every vehicle intended to seat two persons inside upon which such taximeter is affixed shall be deemed a taxicab; every vehicle intended to seat four persons inside upon which such taximeter is affixed shall be deemed a taxicoach.

316b. Each vehicle upon which a taximeter is affixed shall be licensed and the owner thereof shall pay annually such license fees as are hereinafter provided:

Each special taxicab.....	\$10.00
Each public taxicab.....	8.00
Each special taxicoach.....	15.00
Each public taxicoach.....	12.00

Each driver of a licensed taxicab or taxicoach shall pay an annual license fee of \$3. The owner or driver of any hack upon which a taximeter is affixed and who has duly procured license to use or to drive such vehicle according to the provisions of any ordinance heretofore enacted, shall continue to use or drive said vehicle under said license until its expiration.

316c. There shall be under the direction of the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, an Inspector of Taximeters, and such deputy inspectors as may be found necessary to carry on the work hereinafter described, who shall be appointed and removed at pleasure by the Mayor, and who shall be paid such compensation as shall be fixed by law.

316d. It shall be the duty of such Inspector and deputy inspectors to test, inspect, examine, prove and ascertain the accuracy of each and every taximeter affixed to any vehicle offered for hire, and to measure, test and examine every wheel, tire, gear, shaft, or every part of the mechanism of such vehicle which may affect or control the operation of such taximeter, and to make any and all necessary examinations, tests and inspections of such taximeter and vehicle. A deputy inspector shall mark and number such taximeter and vehicle approved, at least once every six months and as much oftener as the inspector shall deem necessary, with some suitable device, which device shall be recorded in the office of the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses. Any person may provide and keep on his premises a suitable and proper apparatus to be approved and marked by the Inspector of Taximeters for testing and proving the accuracy of taximeters and vehicles furnished for use by him and by which apparatus all taximeters and vehicles may be tested and proved. It shall be the duty of any person using or permitting to be used any taxicab or taxicoach immediately after any inspection or test, to effectually seal up the case containing the working parts of the taximeter and the case or cover of the gear which operates the distance, if it is not inclosed in the main part of the taximeter.

316e. Any person who shall use or permit to be used, or who shall drive for hire any taxicab or taxicoach, the seal of the case or cover of the taximeter or gear of which is not intact, shall upon conviction thereof by any City Magistrate be fined for such offense a sum not exceeding \$10, and in default of paying any fine which is imposed, may be committed to the City Prison not exceeding ten days, each day of imprisonment to be taken as a liquidation of one dollar of the fine.

316f. No license shall be issued to a taxicab or taxicoach until the Inspector, or a Deputy Inspector of taximeters shall certify to the Chief, or Deputy Chief, of the Bureau of Licenses that the taximeter of and such vehicle have been duly inspected and approved.

316g. The Inspector of Taximeters shall keep a register of the name of each person owning and using a vehicle upon which a taximeter is affixed, together with the serial number, size and make of such taximeter, the description, make and necessary dimensions of such vehicle, with the date and complete record of such inspection, and such record shall be open to the inspection of the public at all reasonable times.

Each Deputy Inspector shall issue a certificate of inspection of taxicabs and taxicoaches and shall keep a record of such certificates given on corresponding stubs. The certificates and corresponding stubs shall be numbered consecutively. All registers and books shall be public records and extracts may be certified by the Inspector of Taximeters for use as evidence.

316h. Five thousand two hundred and eighty feet shall be deemed to be one mile. 316i. Any taxicab or taxicoach which seeks patronage on the streets, avenues or highways of The City of New York, or occupies space thereon by reason of a permit or license from The City of New York, shall conform to this ordinance and not exact any fare from a passenger greater than the official schedule of rates hereinafter provided.

316j. The legal maximum rate provided in this ordinance, and any schedule of rates promulgated by the owner of any such vehicle charging less than the legal maximum rate, shall be displayed in a conspicuous place on the inside of such vehicle.

#### LEGAL MAXIMUM RATES.

##### Taxicabs.

For one-half mile or any part thereof, 30 cents.  
For each additional quarter mile or part thereof, 10 cents.  
For waiting time at the rate of \$1 per hour.

##### Taxicoaches.

For one-half mile or any part thereof, 40 cents.  
For each additional quarter mile or part thereof, 10 cents.  
For waiting time at the rate of \$1 per hour.  
One piece of baggage, 20 cents.  
No charge shall be made for trunk bag, dress suit case or child under five years of age.

316k. All rates of fare shall depend on the number of persons which such vehicle is intended to seat inside and not on the number of passengers actually carried, and no owner or driver of any taxicab or taxicoach shall use or permit to be used on such vehicle any taximeter which shall calculate and indicate a rate of fare which shall depend on the number of persons actually carried, under a penalty of \$25 for each offense.

316l. After such taximeter and vehicle have been duly marked, numbered and approved, any person who shall substitute and affix any other taximeter on such vehicle than that marked, numbered and approved for said vehicle, and any person who shall use or permit to be used or drive any vehicle upon which such taximeter has been substituted and affixed, unless such vehicle is immediately withdrawn from service and not offered for hire until such substituted taximeter and such vehicle shall be duly marked, numbered and approved, and any person who shall tamper with, manipulate or operate any taximeter which has been duly marked, numbered and approved, or any part of the mechanism of such vehicle which controls or affects such taximeter, so that the taximeter is defective or incorrect, to the prejudice of any passenger, or who shall use or permit to be used or drive any vehicle the taximeter of or such parts of the mechanism of which have been so tampered with, manipulated or operated, or any person who shall use or permit to be used or drive any taxicab or taxicoach for hire, not inspected, examined, tested, proved, marked and numbered as heretofore provided, shall, upon conviction thereof by any Magistrate, either upon confession of the party or competent testimony, be fined not more than \$50 for each and every offense, and in default of payment of such fine may be committed to prison by such Magistrate until the same shall be paid but such imprisonment shall not exceed ten days.

316m. No person shall use, or permit to be used or drive any taxicab or taxicoach for hire, the taximeter of which shall be falsified or installed in such manner or which shall be in such condition as to be defective and incorrect to the prejudice of a passenger, under a penalty of \$50 for each and every offense.

316n. No taximeter affixed to a taxicab or a taxicoach propelled by steam, electricity, gasoline, compressed air or other motive power, shall be operated from any wheel to which power is applied, under a penalty of \$25 for each and every offense.

316o. Each figure used to indicate the fare on a taximeter shall be of such size as to be legible from the rear seat of such vehicle, and such taximeter shall be placed in a position approved by the Inspector or Deputy Inspector of Taximeters, so that its face can be easily seen by a passenger from the inside of said vehicle, and after sundown such face shall be illuminated by a suitable light.

316p. All persons shall exhibit on demand at all reasonable times any taximeter or vehicle to any of said inspectors, for the purpose of inspection. Any person offending against this section or conviction thereof by any City Magistrate, may be fined for each such offense a sum not exceeding \$10, and in default of paying any fine which is imposed, may be committed to the City Prison, not exceeding ten days, each day of imprisonment to be taken as a liquidation of one dollar of the fine.

316q. If any passenger shall request an inspection of any taxicab or taxicoach, giving in writing a full statement of any trouble made by him, upon investigation of and request the Chief or Deputy Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, or the Inspector of Taximeters may order the owner of the vehicle complained against to withdraw the same from service until inspected and tested, and the same shall be forthwith impounded and tested; if the same, on being so tested, shall be found to be 5 per cent. defective and incorrect to the prejudice of any passenger, the Inspector shall order the owner to forthwith remove the taximeter or change or alter any part of said vehicle. Any person who refuses to comply with or who discards said order or orders shall, upon conviction thereof by any City Magistrate, be fined for each such offense a sum not to exceed \$10, and in default of paying any fine which is imposed, may be committed to the City Prison not exceeding ten days, each day of imprisonment to be taken as a liquidation of one dollar of the fine.

316r. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. Section 316e of this ordinance shall take effect when the grades of the positions of Inspector of Taximeters and Deputy Inspectors of Taximeters shall have been established in accordance with the provisions of section 50 of the Greater New York Charter, and the Municipal Civil Service Commission has provided for a due classification of said positions, in accordance with the prescribed rules and regulations of the said Commission. The remainder of the sections shall take effect ninety days after the date of approval of this ordinance by the Honorable the Mayor.

Whereas, The number of automobile accidents in the City are increasing day by day and the arrests for speeding apparently do not seem to check those who disregard the ordinance from violating it as well to the discomfort and even safety of not only pedestrians but also those careful drivers of horses and motor propelled vehicles who honestly travel within the limit provided by the Rules of the Road; and

Whereas, The power of the Board to pass a proposed amendment to section 475 of the Code relative to penalties for violation of the Rules of the Road, being introductory No. 261, now pending before the Committee on Laws and Legislation, has been questioned; and

Whereas, This Board realizes the seriousness of the present conditions and desires to secure for travellers on our streets and highways safety and comfort; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is requested to advise this Board as to its power to pass the said amendment, introductory No. 261, and the constitutionality of the same at the earliest possible moment.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which was referred on February 2, 1909 (Minutes, page 550), the annexed ordinance in favor of prohibiting the use of excessively bright lights on automobiles in The City of New York, respectfully

#### REPORTS:

That, on December 22, 1908, the Board of Aldermen passed an ordinance relative to the use of headlights and searchlights in automobiles, and the Mayor on January 4, 1909, in approving the same said "your action is undoubtedly a step in the right direction, but perhaps it would be more desirable to prohibit entirely the use of powerful searchlights of acetylene or electric power in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn." Following such suggestion Alderman B. W. B. Brown introduced an ordinance amending the ordinance passed on December 22 last, which limits the use of any acetylene, electric or other headlight to not more than sixteen candle power, which, in the opinion of your Committee, is sufficient for safety and comfort in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, especially in view of the fact that very few powerful acetylene gas lamps are now lighted in these boroughs, as it has been found that they are not needed for safe operation. One of the City Magistrates has stated that under the present ordinance violators thereof could not be held on account of its indefiniteness and your Committee believes that the making of the ordinance more definite and certain by the designation of sixteen-candle power covers its objection. It therefore recommends that the said ordinance as amended to prohibit the use of excessively bright lights in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, in accordance with the suggestions of his Honor the Mayor, be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 458 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relative to the use of headlights and searchlights on automobiles while in use upon the streets, highways and thoroughfares of said City.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 458 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 458. Lights.—Each and every vehicle using the public streets or highways of this City, except vehicles of licensed truckmen, shall show, between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, a light or lights, so placed as to be seen from the front and each side; if dash lantern is carried it shall be placed on the left-hand side; such light or lights to be of sufficient illuminating power to be visible at a distance of 200 feet; said light or lights shall show white in front, but may be colored on the sides, excepting licensed truckmen. Every automobile shall exhibit during the same period two lamps showing white lights visible at a distance of 300 feet in the direction toward which the automobile is proceeding, and shall also exhibit a red light visible in the reverse direction. The lamps shall be so placed as to be free from obstruction to light from other parts of said automobile. No operator of any automobile or other motor vehicle, while operating the same upon the public highway, within the (City) Borough of Brooklyn or Manhattan, shall use any acetylene, electric or other headlight of more than sixteen-candle power. In the other Boroughs a higher candle power may be used when (unless) properly shielded so as not to blind or dazzle other users of the highway, or make it difficult or unsafe for them to ride, drive or walk thereon. In the Borough of The Bronx, excepting south of Tremont avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, east of Jerome avenue and west of the Bronx River, and in the Boroughs of Richmond and Queens, and in the Twenty-sixth, Thirtieth, Thirty-first and Thirty-second Wards of the Borough of Brooklyn, every car or other vehicle between said hours, while moving on, along or standing upon the portion of streets in said Boroughs or parts of Boroughs, shall also carry a light or lights of such illuminating power as to be plainly visible 200 feet, both ahead and behind said car or vehicle.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

No peddler, vender, hawker or huckster, who ply a trade or calling of whatsoever nature on the streets and thoroughfares of The City of New York, shall blow upon or use, or suffer or permit to be blown upon or used, any horn or other instrument, nor make or suffer or permit to be made any improper noise tending to disturb the peace and quiet of a neighborhood, for the purpose of directing attention to his wares or trade or calling, under a penalty of not more than five dollars for each offense.

Sec. 2. The terms of this ordinance shall not be construed to annul the privilege granted to licensed vendors, to stand for the sale of their wares on Ninth avenue, between Thirty-eighth street and Forty-second street, Borough of Manhattan, as provided for in the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on July 1, 1890.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations, consolidated into The City of New York, inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

## REPORTS:

That it held several public hearings on various branches of the general subject, and while it is evident that in a great and busy city there must inevitably be much unavoidable noise, there is also much that is avoidable and should be controlled, if not absolutely abolished, and believing that the proposed ordinance amended by inserting the word "New York" in the seventh line of the second paragraph in section 533 the words "remove, remedy or repair," will go far to remedy the evils complained of, it, therefore, recommends that the said ordinance as amended be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York by adding at the end of chapter 13 of part 1 a new subdivision on "Street Noises."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended by adding at the end of chapter 13 of part 1, the following subdivision:

## 16. Street Noises.

Sec. 532. No person shall utter any cry, make any noise or operate or cause to be operated any musical instrument, graphophone, megaphone, phonograph, bell, gong, horn, calliope, tick-tack device or other machine or instrument, or make any noise whatsoever, for the purpose of attracting the attention of pedestrians or residents, in any street or public place in said city to any show, performance or other form of amusement, or for the purpose of calling attention to wares or merchandise, or signifying a wish to purchase junk or other waste material, or to give notice of the approach of any cart, wagon or other vehicle, in order to sell merchandise therefrom or to advertise any article of merchandise, show or performance; nor shall any person blow any horn, or ring any bell on any vehicle, automobile or motorcycle, except at the intersection of streets, or to warn pedestrians, drivers or automobiles.

Sec. 533. No railroad, street railroad, elevated railroad corporation, or any officer, or receiver thereof shall operate, or cause to be operated, any car, engine or other vehicle upon tracks laid on, through or over any street, highway, or right of way in The City of New York, which engine, car or other vehicle shall have flat or broken wheels, loose trucks, chains or bars, framework or other parts, whereby unnecessary noise shall be caused in said city; nor shall any railroad, street railroad, elevated railroad corporation, or any officer or receiver thereof operate or maintain any rail, switch, frog or crossing or other structure over which cars are run, which shall be broken, loose, sagged or otherwise defective, so as to cause unnecessary noise in said city.

Should any car, engine or other vehicle having such flat or broken wheels, loose trucks, chains or bars, framework or other parts, whereby unnecessary noise shall be caused, or should said rails, switch, frog, crossing or other structure over which cars are run remain in such defective condition for five days after notice by the Board of Health of The City of New York, duly given to said railroad, street railroad, elevated railroad corporation or any officer or receiver thereof, said railroad, street railroad, elevated railroad corporation or officer or receiver thereof, shall be liable to a penalty upon conviction of not to exceed \$500, to be recovered by the Corporation Counsel in a civil action for each offense, instituted in the name of The City of New York.

Sec. 534. No person shall operate over or through any streets of The City of New York any automobile, motorwagon, motorcycle, wagon, truck, cart or buggy, which automobile, motorwagon or motor cycle shall have any engine or machine which shall give forth any loud, unusual or unnecessary noises, whereby the peace of the said city shall be disturbed, nor shall the exhaust of any automobile be "cut out" or made to discharge except through the muffler thereon, when said automobile is operated through the streets in any built-up portion of said city; nor shall any such automobile, motorwagon, motorcycle, wagon, truck, cart, buggy or vehicle be operated over said streets which shall have any loose boards, creaking or unfastened axles or wheels, trucks, chains or other parts, whereby any unnecessary noise shall be caused.

Any violation of this ordinance is hereby made a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of ten dollars.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Hon. PATRICK F. MCGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—My attention having been called by the owner of property on the northerly side of Tremont avenue, to an encroachment of the retaining wall on Tremont avenue, on his property situated on the northeasterly corner of Tremont avenue and Honeywell avenue, on May 10 I addressed a communication to the Corporation Counsel, asking his advice, as follows:

"May 10, 1909.

"Hon. FRANCIS K. PENDLETON, Corporation Counsel:

"Dear Sir—Mr. J. J. White, who is now building on the northeast corner of Tremont and Honeywell avenues, has found that an attempt to drive piles on a portion of Tremont avenue, that the retaining wall on the northerly side of Tremont avenue, between Honeywell and Daly avenues, encroaches on his property at the base, so that it is impossible for him to drive piles, or construct the foundation of his building up to his line.

"I have caused a careful examination to be made, and it appears, that within the lines of Mr. White's property, which extends from Honeywell avenue to a point sixty feet easterly therefrom, the encroachment at the base of the wall (the retaining wall of the street) is from 6 of a foot to a maximum of 21. It would appear from measurements taken, as reported to me, and the best information obtainable at this time, that the wall, which was built on a timber platform, moved bodily after the completion of the work of regulating and grading the street in the manner indicated, and at this place there is apparently a pocket in the rock containing a soft material. It is reported to me by the Engineer of Highways, under whose direction the examination was made of the premises, that it is not possible for Mr. White to build up to the limit of his property under the existing conditions.

"Mr. White has called at this office several times, in order to have an adjustment of the matter made with the City, and it seems to me that under the circumstances of the case, as this wall encroaches upon Mr. White's property, and thereby prevents him from improving the same, that some satisfactory arrangement should be made as he suggests, without litigation.

"I submit the case to you so that you may advise me as to what course I should pursue in the premises, and an early answer is respectfully requested." \* \* \*

On May 13, 1909, in answer thereto, I received from the Corporation Counsel, the following communication:

"New York, May 13, 1909.

"Hon. LOUIS F. HAFFEN, President of Borough of The Bronx:

"Sir—I am in receipt of your communication under date of May 10, in reference to the encroachment of the retaining wall on the northerly side of Tremont avenue, on the property of Mr. J. J. White, who is now erecting a building at the corner of Tremont and Honeywell avenues.

"You inform me that the encroachment is such that the builder cannot drive piles or construct the foundation of his building up to his line, and that a careful examination shows that the encroachment of the retaining wall of the street is from 6 of a foot to a maximum of 21 feet.

"It is the duty of the City to remove the portion of the wall encroaching upon Mr. White's property, and I would advise that you have an examination made so as to ascertain whether this could be done by the City expeditiously. Unless it can be done the City will be without doubt subjected to litigation, and the City can make no claim of right to occupy the property of a private owner for the street retaining wall. It is quite possible that an arrangement could be made without delay, by which the contractor now engaged on the building, would cut down the encroaching wall at a less expense than would be incurred if the work were done directly by the City.

"In this way the matter could be disposed of probably at the least expense and all claim for damages avoided.

"I should hesitate to recommend condemnation proceedings to acquire title to three feet on the front of the property facing on Tremont avenue, as the ultimate expense of such a proceeding would be problematical, and also for the reason that it would not at once give relief to the present builder and he might still be in a position to claim substantial damages for the occupation of his property by the City's retaining wall.

"Respectfully yours,

Acting on said advice, namely:

"It is the duty of the City to remove the portion of the wall encroaching upon Mr. White's property, and I would advise that you have an examination made so as to ascertain whether this could be done by the City expeditiously. Unless it can be done the City will be without doubt subjected to litigation, and the City can make no claim of right to occupy the property of a private owner for the street retaining wall. It is quite possible that an arrangement could be made without delay by which the contractor now engaged on the building would cut down the encroaching wall at a less expense than would be incurred if the work were done directly by the City."

On May 19 I received from the owner of the property, Mr. J. J. White, the following offer:

"New York, May 19, 1909.

"Hon. LOUIS F. HAFFEN, President, Borough of The Bronx:

"Dear Sir—Referring to the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated May 13, 1909, in reference to the encroachment of the retaining wall on the northerly side of Tremont avenue, on my property, where I am now erecting a building at the corner of Tremont avenue and Honeywell avenue, in which said opinion it appears, as suggested by the Corporation Counsel, that:

"It is quite possible that an arrangement could be made without delay by which the contractor now engaged on the building would cut down the encroaching wall at a less expense than would be incurred if the work were done directly by the City."

"I beg to say that, after considering carefully the circumstances surrounding the case, and being unwilling that any more expense should be incurred by the City in this matter than absolutely necessary, and believing, as I do, the work of removing the encroachment above referred to can be performed by me at a very much less price, and in less time than the City can do it, I therefore beg to submit the following offer to you, in order to determine the question without unnecessary delay, that for the sum of \$4,250 I will complete the work of removing the said encroachment.

"This offer is made with the understanding that immediate action will be taken, and that in consideration of the acceptance by the City of this offer, within thirty (30) days, I will release said City of New York from all and every liability on account of said encroaching wall.

"Even at this figure I will lose money, and only make this offer by reason of the expense and loss of time and money I have been already put to in the delay of my operation, which, as you know, involves over \$75,000, and with which I must proceed at once or lose all I have in it.

"Yours truly,

"JOSEPH J. WHITE, Builder."

Which was referred by me to the Engineers of the Borough for examination and report.

On May 24 I received from the Chief Engineer of the Borough the following communication:

"May 24, 1909.

"Hon. LOUIS F. HAFFEN, President:

"Dear Sir—I return communication of Mr. Joseph J. White, builder, with copy of opinion of the Corporation Counsel, relative to an encroachment of a retaining wall on the northerly side of Tremont avenue, in front of the property of Mr. White.

"I have caused a careful examination to be made of the conditions existing at this point and find that the said wall has been forced out from its original position so that it encroaches at its base at some points nearly 2 feet. The conditions at this locality are such that it would be very difficult and expensive to undertake to remove this wall entirely and rebuild it, particularly if the work were done by the City, for the reason that we would not be able to encroach on the private property in connection with this

work, but would have to do the same from the Tremont avenue side. The work would be hampered very materially by the presence of water which would require continual operation of pumps, etc., during its progress. The wall in question was constructed nearly fifteen years ago and it was placed entirely within the lines of Tremont avenue. There is a swamp lying to the north of Tremont avenue which is composed of muck and vegetable matter to a considerable depth, probably ranging from 15 to 25 feet, and underlying this is solid ground or rock. It will probably be impossible to make a substantial foundation for a building along the Tremont avenue front without removing the encroaching portion of this wall, and it will hardly be possible to remove that part without taking down the whole wall, on account of the fact that the work will have to be done in water and it will be difficult to make the sides of the excavation tight so as to prevent the water from coming in from the sides of the excavation, as it is pumped. The Engineer of Highways has been requested to investigate this matter carefully, and he informs me in a report, of which I forward a copy, that after taking all conditions into account, he believes that the proposition of Mr. White that, for the sum of \$4,250 I will complete the work of removing the said encroachment. \* \* \* This offer is made with the understanding that immediate action will be taken and that in consideration of the acceptance by the City of this offer, within thirty (30) days, I will release said City of New York from all and every liability on account of said encroaching wall, is not unreasonable.

"I have looked into the facts myself to some extent and believe that in view of all the circumstances it would be advisable for the City to settle this claim on this basis, or for any less amount which can be agreed upon, but I would suggest that in view of the peculiar circumstances definite action be taken on the matter without delay, as in case there should be a claim for damages the amount will grow rapidly.

"Respectfully,

"JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx."

Subsequently, on May 25, 1909, submitting this offer of Mr. White, and with the report of Chief Engineer Briggs, I wrote to Corporation Counsel, as follows:

"It seems to me, after an examination of all the facts connected with the case, that it would be advisable for the City to settle this claim on the basis of the proposition made in Mr. White's offer, and I desire to have you prepare the necessary agreement to be entered into between Mr. White and The City of New York to perfect this agreement, if you agree with me that the execution of such an agreement and the payment to Mr. White of the sum of \$4,250 and the execution by him of a full release to The City of New York from all and every liability on account of said encroaching wall, would be for the best interests of The City of New York.

"I would further ask to be advised by you, if, on the execution of said agreement, whether or not the amount to be paid cannot be deducted and allowed out of the Judgment fund; if that cannot be done, please advise me as to what fund should bear the expense.

"In view of the fact that the offer of Mr. White is conditioned on its acceptance within thirty (30) days from the date of his offer, to wit, May 19, I would respectfully request that you advise me on the subject without delay."

On June 3, 1909, I was advised by the Corporation Counsel as follows:

"New York, June 3, 1909.

"Hon. LOUIS F. HAFFEN, President, Borough of The Bronx:

"Sir—I am in receipt of your communication, under date of May 25, in reference to the encroachment on the property of Joseph J. White of the retaining wall on the northerly side of Tremont avenue, east of Honeywell avenue, including a copy of the report of Josiah A. Briggs, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

"It appears from the report of the Engineer that the retaining wall now encroaches upon the property of the private owner at that location, at some points to an extent of 2 feet, and that the conditions are such that it would be extremely difficult and expensive to undertake the removal of the wall, particularly if the work were done by the City, for the reason that the City would be compelled to perform the same from the Tremont avenue side.

"It further appears that the difficulty of the work would be further increased through the fact that there is a stream lying to the north of Tremont avenue which is composed of muck and vegetable matter to a depth ranging from fifteen to twenty-five feet. Under the circumstances, an offer has been obtained from Mr. White to perform and complete the work of removing the encroaching wall on behalf of the City for a consideration of \$4,250, which amount is reported to be not unreasonable by the Chief Engineer. Under the circumstances and in view of the fact that it has been asked for, for the performance of the work, no successful bidder would be in a better position to perform the work than The City of New York, as such bidder would also be compelled to remove the encroachment from the Tremont avenue side, it would seem that a contract should be made with Mr. White. There is no way of providing for this work or of authorizing you to sign a contract for it inasmuch as it exceeds the sum of \$1,000, other than that provided by section 419 of the Charter, which is by obtaining the consent of the Board of Aldermen to make the contract without public bidding.

"You ask further to be advised whether or not the amount to be paid could be allowed out of the judgment fund, or if that cannot be done, what fund should bear the expense. Under the circumstances, the amount could not be paid out of the judgment fund and unless you have some general fund to provide for work in the Borough which is not specifically designated or possibly an emergency fund large enough for the purpose, it will be necessary to obtain the amount from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

"Yours truly,

"G. L. STERLING, Acting Corporation Counsel."

Acting under the advice thus given by the Corporation Counsel:

"That there is no way of providing for this work or of authorizing you (me) to sign a contract for it inasmuch as it exceeds the sum of \$1,000, other than that provided by section 419 of the Charter, which is by obtaining the consent of the Board of Aldermen to make the contract without public bidding."

I respectfully ask that the Board of Aldermen pass a resolution authorizing me to contract with Mr. Joseph J. White, in the sum of \$4,250, to remove the encroachment of the retaining wall on his property situated on the northerly side of Tremont avenue at the corner of Honeywell avenue, in accordance with his offer to do so, dated May 19, 1909, on condition that when the work is done to the satisfaction of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, said Joseph J. White shall release The City of New York from all and every liability on account of said encroaching wall, as stated in his said offer.

Resolved, That pursuant to section 419 of the Charter of The City of New York, as amended, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, he and he hereby is authorized and empowered to enter into a contract without public letting with Joseph J. White, in the sum of four thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$4,250) to do the necessary work and furnish the necessary materials to remove and to complete the work of removing the encroachment on his property situated at the northeast corner of Tremont avenue and Honeywell avenue in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, provided that said Joseph J. White shall, when the work of removing and completing the removal of said work is done shall execute a release to The City of New York releasing the said City from all and every liability on account of said encroaching wall.

This contract, made this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 1939, by and between The City of New York, hereinafter called the City, party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the United Electric Service Company, a domestic corporation of the State of New York (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part; witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors in conduits under the streets, avenues and highways within the territory comprised in the Borough of Manhattan, for the purpose of connecting by means of such wires, rail lines, or other signaling apparatus, to be placed upon the premises of the subscribers, with offices of the Company, and thereby maintaining and operating an electrical signal system for the calling of messengers, an electrical burglar alarm system and a fire alarm system, and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—The rights, privileges and authority herein granted shall not be construed in any way to give the Company the right, privilege or authority to engage in a telephone business, or to render telephone service, and this contract is entered into on the mutual and express understanding and agreement by and between the parties hereto, that the Company will not in any way engage in a telephone business, or render telephone service, or claim the right to do so under this contract and the rights, privileges and authority therein and thereby granted and conferred.

During the first five years of this contract an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200), and shall be equal to two (2) per cent of the gross receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$1,200.

During the succeeding five years of this contract an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and shall be equal to three (3) per cent of the gross receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500).

During the remaining five years of this contract an annual sum which shall in no case be less than four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500), and which shall be equal to four (4) per cent of the gross receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500).

The minimum annual sum herein provided for shall be paid to the Comptroller of the City in equal quarterly payments in advance on the first days of January, April, July and October of each year. Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amounts, such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid to the Comptroller on or before December 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

Fifth—The said annual charges or payments, as above specified, shall continue throughout the whole term of the original contract, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payments for similar rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or franchises hereby granted, or any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions as to payments, any statute or any condition herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by said statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract. Nothing herein contained shall apply to any mortgage or more lease, but shall apply to any purchaser upon foreclosure or under or by virtue of any provision of a mortgage or lien.

It is agreed that any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract by the Company to the City shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but that such payments shall be in addition to any and all

taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or by any law of the State of New York.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, either by the act of the Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statute relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, in any person or corporation whatsoever, nor shall the Company, its successors or assigns, in any manner consolidate or pool its stock, business or interests or enter into any agreement for a division of business interest or territory, or to prevent competition or a reduction in rates, or acquire, own or make use of or in any manner exercise control over any of the rights, privileges, franchises or stock, or use, own, control or operate any of the property, works, plants or appliances of any such persons or corporation without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—The Board may by resolution direct the Company to install free of charge messenger call boxes or fire alarm signals, with the necessary apparatus therefor, in any or all of the offices of the City situated in the portion of Manhattan in which the Company shall be operating such apparatus.

Upon written notification of the Board to the Company that such resolutions have been adopted the Company shall install such apparatus free of charge, and shall furnish service at rates not to exceed seventy-five (75) per cent of the rates charged by the Company to any other individual or corporation for similar service.

Eighth—The Company shall construct, maintain and operate its messenger and alarm system, subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City, and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances, now in force or which may be adopted, affecting companies operating electrical conductors in the City.

Ninth—All cables and wires of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). Such subways shall be bored from the Company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City should it exceed to the rights of such company or companies. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors in the Borough of Manhattan, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and conductors in such subways and the City agrees to leave to the Company such wires as may be required for the operation of the signal and alarm systems hereby authorized.

Tenth—The Company shall, within two years from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, have in operation at least two thousand (2,000) messenger call boxes, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Eleventh—The Company shall file with the Board, on the first day of November in each year, a map, plan or diagram upon which shall be plainly marked and designated the streets and public places in which are then laid and also those proposed to be laid, during the succeeding year, the several conduits and ducts necessary for the cables and wires used and to be used by the Company, together with a statement showing the number of ducts in each street and wires in each duct aforesaid.

Twelfth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant.

Thirteenth—During the term of this contract or its renewal, the Board shall have absolute power to regulate all charges or rates of the Company for this service, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair, but the Company shall not charge at any time during the term of this contract, or its renewal, rates for messenger service in excess of the following:

In any direction from a district office or central station:

to city blocks.....	\$0 10
11 to 15 city blocks.....	15
16 to 20 city blocks.....	20
21 to 25 city blocks.....	25
26 to 30 city blocks.....	30

—and for each additional 10 city blocks more than 30 city blocks, 3 cents.

Fourteenth—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts to paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills, unless due from its owner, shall never be charged against property, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service.

Fifteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purposes than those specifically set forth herein, except by consent of the Board, and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes or to illegal places.

Sixteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the system authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Seventeenth—If the said Company, its successors or assigns, shall fail to maintain its structures in good condition throughout the full term of its occupancy of such streets the Board may give written notice to the said Company specifying any default on the part of said Company, and requiring said Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon the failure of the Company to remedy said default within a reasonable time the said Company shall for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains pay to the City a sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or regulated damages, or the said City, in case such structures which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the said Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided.

If, for a period of three consecutive months the messenger, fire alarm or burglar alarm system of the Company shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of six months out of any consecutive twelve months, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings in law or in equity.

Eighteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of accounts and shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year end-

ing September 30 next preceding. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts received from the operation of the systems hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company, together with such other information and in such form and detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Nineteenth—The Company shall submit a report to the Board not later than November 1 of each year, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property;
  2. The amount paid in as by last report;
  3. The total amount of capital stock paid in;
  4. The funded debt by last report;
  5. The total amount of funded debt;
  6. The floating debt as by last report;
  7. The amount of floating debt;
  8. The total amount of funded and floating debt;
  9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt;
  10. The amount of dividends paid during the year and the rate of same;
  11. The amount paid for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation;
  12. The total income during the year, giving the amount from each class of business;
  13. The total expenses for operation, including salaries;
- and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

For failure to comply with the foregoing the Company shall pay a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) per day until such statement is rendered, which may be collected by the Comptroller without notice.

Twentieth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the execution of this contract, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of the terms and conditions of the contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise granted, in default of which payment of the annual charge the Comptroller, acting in behalf of the City, shall cause same with interest from such fund after five days' notice in writing to the Company. Twenty-third—The word "notice" wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice. Every such notice to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the city as shall have been designated by the Company; or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed to the city, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the city. Delivery or mailing of such notice as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-fourth—The Company premises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.
