Gentlemen—At its meeting Friday, February 26, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment passed a resolution asking the different Borough Presidents to have daily engineering reports filed, covering highway maintenance work, so that when the time comes to consider Budget appropriations intelligent and comparable information will be at hand showing materials used and labor accounts, so that unit costs may be compiled for different classes of pavements. As this matter was not considered in the Budget, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment suggested that requests be made for Special Revenue Bonds to the amounts necessary in each Bureau for properly gathering the information.

We have made such a request for the Sewer Bureau, which is now before the Finance Committee, and would now request for the highway work the sum of \$4,500 for the remainder of the year 1909, to provide for the following:

- One Assistant Engineer.
- One Transman or other helper.
- One new runabout automobile.

To get the greatest advantage from the figures we should commence gathering the statistics at once, so should have a special fund to call upon for the expenditures at the earliest possible date, as other appropriations do not warrant the drafts—in fact, are already insufficient, as stated heretofore when request was made to augment the engineering (construction) appropriation.

Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen—The Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals respectfully requests the Board of Aldermen to authorize the issue of Special Revenue Bonds amounting to \$10,000, for the purpose of renovating the ferryboats "Southfield" and "Westfield" and equipping them for use as day camps for consumptives and for the payment of the salaries of the necessary Attendants. The ferryboat "Southfield" has been in use since the 27th of May, but the "Westfield" was abandoned on account of the lack of funds with which to continue it and with which to put it in suitable condition. While some of the expenses of conducting this tuberculosis service have been met by the City, the salaries of some of the Attendants have been paid from private funds collected by Dr. Miller, and many of the articles needed for the comfort of the patients were obtained from persons interested in the welfare of patients of this class. The "Westfield," which lies at Pier 55, in the Gouverneur Hospital District, was in charge of an auxiliary committee, but its use was discontinued some time ago. The Trustees now feel that there is great need for this day camp in that congested district.

On account of the very good results obtained by the Physicians in charge of both day camps, the Trustees hope that the necessary funds may be granted by your Board. It is intended to apply the funds obtained from private sources to the various personal needs of the patients, many of whom have not the necessary clothing, medicines, food, shelter, etc., after their discharge. The giving of such funds will, therefore, not be discouraged or discontinued.

To discontinue the Bellevue Hospital day camp at the present juncture through lack of funds would be most unfortunate also from other points of view. The Board of Education has established a school on board the boat for the children (patients) who are cared for there and has appointed a Teacher in charge of the work. Furthermore, the doctor in charge has arranged for the introduction of certain light forms of employment for the adult patients, which it is hoped may result in the opening of new ways whereby such unfortunate may be able to support themselves. For these and other reasons given above we trust that your Honorable Board may see fit to grant the appropriation requested.

Hon. TIMOTHY P. SULLIVAN, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Mr. Sullivan—In reply to your inquiry as to the use of the \$10,000 required for the ferryboats "Southfield" and "Westfield," which are used as tuberculosis day camps by this Department, I have the honor to state that the cost of installing a heating and lighting system and the building of partitions on the "Southfield" will be about \$3,000. The wages of the Helpers amount to \$90 a month; those of the Nurses, \$140; a total of \$230 per month, or \$2,400 a year. During the past summer the wages of the Nurses were paid by the Auxiliary Committee, a private organization of ladies, interested in the patients, but whose funds are now exhausted.

The structural changes required in the "Westfield" will cost more than those in the "Southfield," as the boat is in worse condition. The roof especially is in very bad repair; in stormy weather the interior cabins are flooded with rain. The boat also needs to be painted throughout. The ladies in charge of the day camp ask also for a kitchen, equipped with cooking apparatus, so that a hot meal can be provided for the patients.

The total expenses for repairs in the two boats, and for supplying the Helpers and Nurses for the year will come to about \$10,000. The request for these changes in the boats was not made until last autumn when the work of the summer was completed, and it was too late to make provision therefor in the Budget for 1909.

Dear Sir—The Gouverneur Auxiliary greets with pleasure the request of the Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen for the wages of the auxiliary in regard to the \$10,000 appropriation now on the Aldermanic calendar regarding the treatment of tuberculous patients.

The auxiliary notes that in the letter from the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, making application for the \$10,000, there is the statement that "the Trustees now feel that there is great need for this day camp in that congested (Gouverneur) district," and indorses strongly this statement. The auxiliary is further gratified to note that the Trustees report "very good results obtained in both day camps."

The auxiliary is especially rejoiced to note these statements because the Trusts in the summer of 1908 felt unable to do anything more for the Gouverneur camp on the Westfield than to furnish a few blankets and medical supplies, and in consequence the expense of putting the Westfield in condition for use, of paying the salaries of all the Attendants, except one Nurse, furnished by the Department of Health, and of feeding the patients and maintaining a supervision over the camp was borne entirely by this auxiliary. Our limitations in money and help made it impossible to do many of the things in the development of the camp, which we recognized as desirable, and which the Trustees felt that they were able to do for the Bellevue day camp in the Southfield, and it is our desire that the Westfield Gouverneur Camp shall, during the coming year be made far more efficient and useful. Last summer we were unable to provide the patients with a hot meal in the middle of the day, and this we feel that they really need and should receive when the camp is reopened. To provide such a meal it will be necessary to put a proper cooking range on board the boat and to increase the supply of dishes, etc.

We feel further that the camp loses half of its usefulness if it is closed one-half of the twenty-four hours, and that, therefore, the experiment, which was entirely successful during the summer of 1908, of permitting some of the tuberculous male patients to sleep on board instead of returning to their usually foul and unventilated rooms should be continued as a definite policy; that the camp should this year be a combined day and night camp, and that the Westfield should, therefore be equipped with the necessary beds, bedding, night Nurse and night Attendant.

One of the misfortunes of the camp in the summer of 1908 was the inability of our Committee to repair the roof so that the upper deck could be used on rainy days. It was a matter of good fortune that such days were few during the summer, but we consider it absolutely necessary that the roof should be made watertight.

An important element in the care of our patients is the supply of bathing facilities, and it is desired that simple shower baths should be installed on one side for the men and on the other for the women.

The letter from the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals does not indicate the recognition by the Board of these various needs, and we would, therefore, urge not only that the request for \$10,000 be granted, but also that at least one-half (\$5,000) be applied to the specific purposes mentioned above.

We feel that while the great need and the great usefulness of the Gouverneur day and night camp have been demonstrated, yet the funds and the personal activities of the auxiliary should not be turned so completely to this work, which benefits only a fraction of the large number of tuberculous cases in Gouverneur district, as to deprive the remainder of the help which the auxiliary was formed to give, and takes pride in giving. In the clear recognition, however, that even when the absolutely necessary repairs are made and installations completed, and the official maintenance of the camp established, there will still be much to help properly demanded by the patients, the auxiliary will gladly co-operate so far as it may in the administration of the camp and the relief of such unexpected needs.

Some time after the commencement of the work here the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics of the Department of Finance sought the co-operation of this Department, and, as a result, there have just been issued by the Department of Finance certain pamphlets along lines similar to those heretofore recommended by your Committee.

It is the desire of the City authorities to secure the publication of such records for all City properties, for the purpose of exhibiting to those interested something of the nature and extent of the City's real estate holdings and plant.

Your Committee believes that its suggestions of 1906 and 1907 should now be carried out.

After consultation with the financial authorities of the City it is believed that an application for an issue of Special Revenue Bonds for this purpose will be favorably received.

The following resolution is, therefore, offered for adoption:

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor.
March 2, 1909.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, disapproved, proposed resolution No. 1495, entitled: "Resolution changing name of part of Seventh avenue to Jefferson parkway."

The reasons for my disapproval are the objections of the business men of Harlem, as presented to me at a public hearing held in this office on the first day of March, 1909, at 2 p. m.

I further find that the name of Jefferson has been used several times in Greater New York, and to rename Seventh avenue above Central Park will probably cause confusion. We already have Jefferson Market at Sixth avenue and Eighth street; also Jefferson Police Court, Jefferson street, east of East Broadway to the East River, Manhattan, and Jefferson Park, also in Manhattan, from One Hundred and Eleventh to One Hundred and Fourteenth street and First avenue.

There is also a Jefferson avenue in Brooklyn, from Ormond place to the Borough line, Queens; also a Jefferson street in Brooklyn, from Broadway to Cypress avenue. There is, furthermore, a Jefferson place in Brooklyn at President, Hicks and Henry streets.

Sec. 66. Each and every company who shall neglect or refuse to comply with the provisions of the foregoing section (1 of this ordinance) shall thereby incur a penalty of \$500 (\$100) for each and every such neglect or refusal, to be recovered by the Corporation Counsel as in the case of other penalties.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

No license for the conduct of a public place of amusement herein described shall be issued until said place shall have been inspected by a representative of the Fire Commissioner, and a certificate of the Fire Commissioner setting forth the results of such inspection with respect to ample protection against fire shall have been filed with the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses.

Sec. 2. The annual license fee for a place of public amusement as herein described shall be two hundred and fifty dollars. Such license shall be operative on the seven days of the week, under the express condition that on the first day of the week, commonly known as Sunday, no device, instrument or other means shall be employed whereby persons may be attracted or induced to enter any such place.

Sec. 3. Any person, firm, partnership or corporation conducting a place of public amusement as herein described who shall fail to take out a license therefor shall be subject to a fine of fifty dollars for each day such place shall be open to the public without being duly licensed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer the sum of \$4,000 from the appropriation contained within the Special School Fund for the year 1908, "Care of School Buildings and Grounds," which item is in excess of its requirements, to the appropriation also contained within the Special School Fund for the year 1908 entitled "General Repairs," Borough of Manhattan, which appropriation is insufficient for the purposes thereof.

Accepting the bid of J. Seelip, amounting to \$16.26, for the sale of discarded pianos at the storehouse, No. 131 Livingston street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Supplies in making no awards for and striking from the list the items indicated in the statement of awards attached to this report.

Approving and ratifying the awards of contracts made by the Committee on Supplies, for furnishing and delivering direct to each school general apparatus and supplies for the departments of chemistry, physics, biology, photography, physiography, botanical and zoological supplies, day and evening high schools, and supplies for training schools for Teachers, for the year ending December 31, 1909; but no payments to be made on account of said contracts until the Committee on Supplies shall have filed the contracts to be entered into by it, for and on behalf of the Board of Education, with the contractors mentioned in the statement of awards hereto annexed; said contracts to be drawn and approved in the usual manner, in compliance with law and the rules of the Board of Education applicable thereto.

Requesting the Municipal Civil Service Commission to approve the emergency appointment of Miss Lillian C. McNamara as Stenographer and Typewriter in the Department of Education, in accordance with subdivision 4 of Rule XII. of said Commission, and approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Supplies in making said appointment, taking effect January 14, 1909, with salary at the rate of \$750 per annum.

Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Supplies in appointing Mr. Randolph W. Graham, of No. 1000 East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, The Bronx, whose name appears upon an eligible list certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission, as Stenographer and Typewriter in the Bureau of Supplies, the appointment to take effect upon the commencement of service and the compensation to be at the rate of \$900 per annum.

Requesting the City Superintendent of Schools to consider the advisability of issuing a circular to the Principals of Schools instructing them to exercise the utmost care in obtaining the correct names of pupils; and discharging the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation from further consideration of the preamble and resolution referred to in the foregoing report.

Amending Sections 60, 61, 62, 63 and 64 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education so as to read as follows:

Nautical School.

Sec. 60. 1. The Nautical School "for the education and training of pupils in the science and practice of navigation," established by authority of the act of the Legislature passed April 24, 1873, and continued by the Charter, shall be conducted, and otherwise ordered, on board such ship or ships as may be now or hereafter loaned by the Government of the United States for the purpose of a Nautical School.

2. The officers in charge of said ship or ships, and conducting said Nautical School, shall be designated as follows: Superintendent, Executive Officer, Chief Engineer, Senior Instructor, Junior Instructor and Surgeon. They shall hold their respective offices during the pleasure of the Board. The Superintendent shall have the charge and control of the school and ship, and shall be accountable for the management of both, and for the safe keeping of the property intrusted to his care.

3. The Executive Officer shall, subject to the direction of the Superintendent, have immediate charge of the crew, and shall be responsible for the cleanliness and good order of the ship; he shall also instruct in the professional branches and take a watch or day's duty as directed.

4. The Chief Engineer shall, subject to the direction of the Superintendent, have immediate charge of all steam and electrical machinery in the ship, and of all water-tight doors and devices for the safety of the ship. He shall also act as instructor in the prescribed studies and perform day's duty in port as directed.

5. The Surgeon shall examine all candidates for admission to the school as to their physical condition, shall have the care of the sick, and shall report to the Superintendent such sanitary measures as he may at any time deem advisable for the health of the pupils and crew. He shall also act as instructor in the prescribed studies and perform a day's duty in port as directed.

6. The instructors shall perform, under the direction of the Superintendent, such duties in their capacity as the efficient conduct of the school may require and take a watch or day's duty as directed.

7. The crew employed for the ship shall, subject to the direction of the Executive Committee on the Nautical School, be under the immediate control of the Superintendent.

Sec. 61. 1. The Executive Committee on the Nautical School shall have power to appoint, subject to the approval of the Board of Education, the officers named in the preceding section and any other persons requisite to conduct properly said Nautical School, whose compensation shall be fixed by said Board. Subject to the approval of said Committee, the Superintendent shall also have power to ship the crew of the vessel in which the Nautical School is conducted.

2. It shall cause to be furnished, subject to the rules of the Board, all suitable supplies, food, fuel, etc., for the use of the pupils of said school and the crew of the ship; and the books, apparatus, stationery and other things necessary or expedient to enable said school to be properly and successfully conducted. The books, maps, stationery, etc., for the pupils, and the fuel, shall be obtained on the order of the Superintendent of the school, subject to approval by the Chairman of the Executive Committee on the Nautical School.

3. It may obtain, by purchase, such tackle, chains, boats, sails or other material as may be needed for the vessel upon which the Nautical School is or may be conducted, and may cause all necessary repairs to be made when the cost of such materials or repairs does not exceed at any one time the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

Sec. 62. 1. Applications for admission to the Nautical School may be made to the Board of Education or to the Superintendent on board the ship at the foot of East Twenty-fourth street.

2. All applicants shall be at least sixteen years of age; shall have the written consent of their parents or guardians to their admission to the school; shall produce written testimonials of good character and health, and shall furnish satisfactory evidence that they have never been convicted of any crime. (See act of Congress, passed in 1874, "to encourage the establishment of public marine schools.")

3. Applicants complying with the provisions of subdivision 2 of this section to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee on the Nautical School, shall be exam-

ined physically by the Surgeon. All applicants who do not give promise of good physical development, or who have such defect of sight, hearing or limbs, or are otherwise so defective physically as to render them unfit for service at sea, shall be rejected.

4. Applicants shall be required to pass such mental examinations as is prescribed by the Executive Committee on the Nautical School. Natural intelligence and animation may be taken into consideration by the examiners in cases where the applicants do not appear to have had the benefit of suitable instruction.

5. If found qualified in all respects the applicant shall receive a permit to report on board the ship. With the permit shall be enclosed the certificate of parent or guardian and the report of the examiners. The foregoing papers shall be presented to and carefully preserved by the Superintendent.

6. After being received on board the ship the applicant shall be placed on probation for a period of two weeks, when, if no reason to the contrary shall appear, he shall be admitted permanently and entered on the register of the school.

7. After admission each pupil shall be furnished with the necessary articles of bedding and with uniforms. Such portions of his clothing as are not suitable for wear on the ship shall be given to him to send home. All articles belonging to the pupils shall be marked with the owner's name. Each pupil shall be required to furnish such articles for his outfit as may be prescribed by the Executive Committee on the Nautical School, and to deposit with the Superintendent the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25), to be expended, under the direction of the Committee, in completing his outfit and furnishing him with such other articles as he may need during his school term. This deposit or part thereof may be remitted by unanimous vote of said Executive Committee.

8. The pupils shall be carefully instructed, under the direction of the Superintendent, in the course of study laid down under section 63 of the By-Laws. If any show a lack of aptitude for sea life or develop any physical disqualification, their parents or guardians shall be requested to withdraw them from the school or they may be dropped.

9. Any pupil may be temporarily dismissed by the Superintendent for misconduct, disobedience to orders or unsatisfactory school record. The Superintendent shall immediately report such dismissal to the Executive Committee on the Nautical School.

10. The course of instruction shall cover a period of two years, during which time every pupil shall be allowed such vacations as said Executive Committee may determine, provided his general conduct and progress have been satisfactory. At the end of two years every pupil who has passed through the course successfully shall receive a certificate of graduation.

11. The City Superintendent shall cause the Nautical School to be inspected annually with reference to the methods of instruction employed and the progress of the pupils in the subjects of the school course.

Sec. 63. The course of instruction in the Nautical School shall be as follows:

English Studies—Grammar, composition, commercial geography, history of the world.

Mathematics and Science—Algebra, geometry, trigonometric functions, physics, physiology and hygiene.

Technical Subjects—Ship's account, seamanship, navigation, the marine engine, electricity and magnetism.

Sec. 64. The Executive Committee on the Nautical School shall report annually, or as often as may be required by the Board, upon the management and success of the Nautical School and the expense of conducting the same.

Disapproving of Assembly bill No. 270, entitled "An act to amend the Greater New York Charter, in relation to the payment of salaries," and authorizing the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation on behalf of the Board of Education, to take such action as it deems proper to secure the defeat of said bill.

Approving of Assembly bill No. 153, entitled "An act relative to taxes charged to pupils of public or private schools by railway companies, and to provide for the issuing of tickets therefor," and of Senate bill No. 178, entitled "An act to regulate street railway fares in all cities," and authorizing the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation on behalf of Board of Education, to take such action as it deems proper to secure the passage of said bills.

Making, in accordance with a recommendation submitted by the Board of Superintendents, Public Schools 33, 34 and 36, Borough of Queens, which are now annexed to Public School 35, Borough of Queens, independent schools, to take effect upon the opening of new Public School 90, Borough of Queens.

Organizing, in accordance with the recommendation of the Board of Superintendents, an elementary school with classes for pupils of both sexes from grades 1A to 6B, inclusive, and a kindergarten in the temporary building located at Church avenue and East Forty-eighth street, Borough of Brooklyn, and that it be known as Public School 135, Borough of Brooklyn.

Approving the action of the Board of Superintendents in arranging to transfer the pupils now attending Public School 129, Borough of Manhattan, to neighboring schools at the close of the present term on February 5, 1909, and discontinuing the use of Public School 129, Borough of Manhattan, after said date.

Making, in accordance with the recommendation of the Board of Superintendents, the class to be organized on the ferryboat "Middletown," anchored at the foot of East Ninety-first street, Manhattan, a part of the organization of Public School 109, Borough of Manhattan.

"That inasmuch as but one of these stages will be required to be operated over the routes specified, and that as the other stage is needed to convey children over another route, I hereby agree to furnish this stage and to operate same from Roman avenue and Hoffman boulevard, Forest Hills, along Hoffman boulevard to Public School 14, Elmhurst, at the same price per school day as above stated and mentioned in my contract.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk thereof, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise to or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business in which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the amount, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bid required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application to the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
