Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York
Held Wednesday, August 16, 1916, at 10.30 o'clock A. M.

Present: Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., Commissioner. The President presided.

Duties: To examine plans for the purpose of detecting and reporting upon violations of the Tenement House Law, the Plumbing and Sanitary Code, the Building Code and Rules and Regulations of the Fire Department so far as they relate to construction and occupancy of buildings.

Requirements: Candidates should have had one year's experience as a draftsman or in other work of a corresponding character involving a knowledge of plan reading.

Certification will also be made from this list to the position of Plan Examiner, Grade B.

Candidates must be at least 21 years of age on the closing date for the receipt of applications.

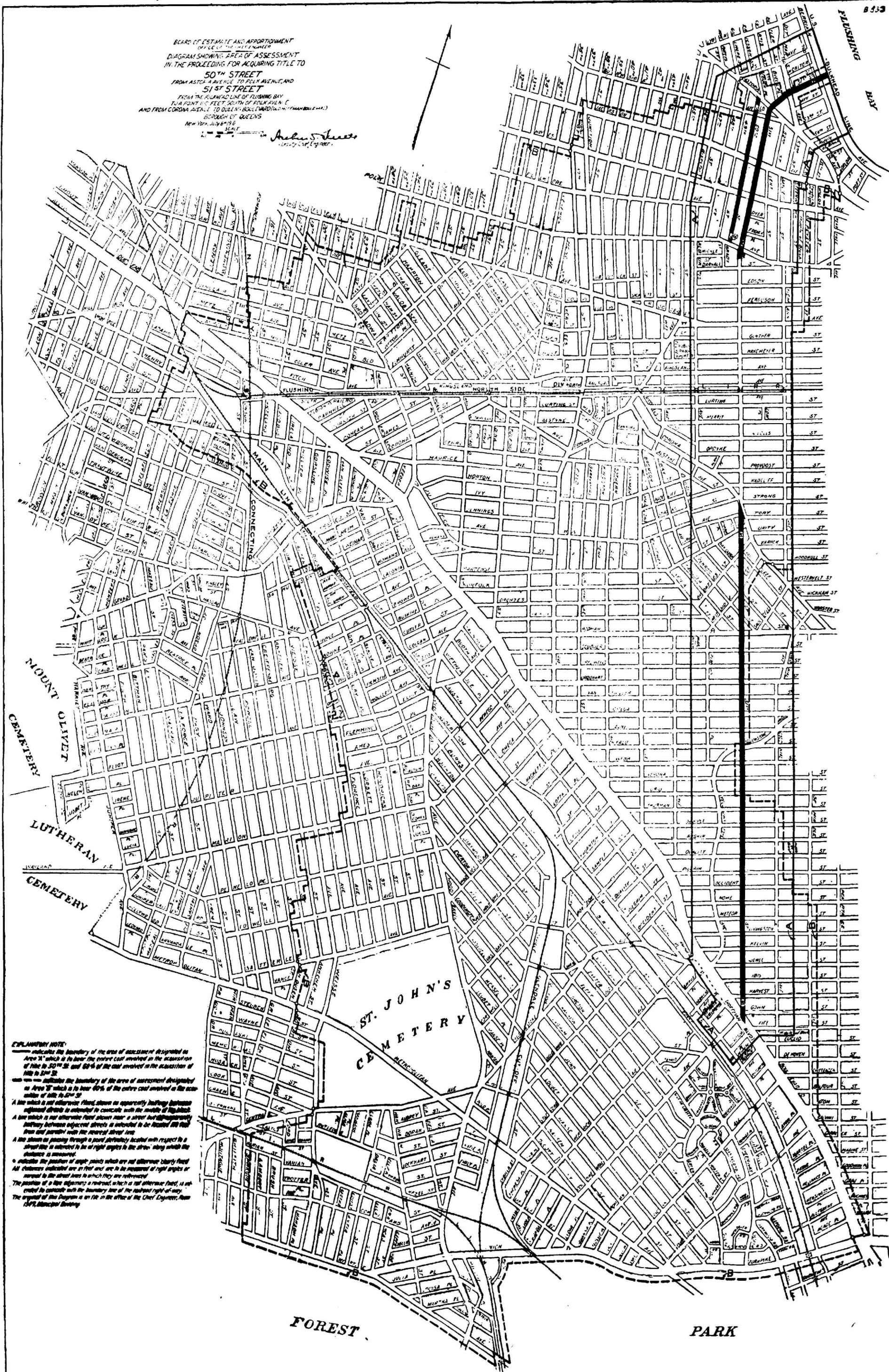

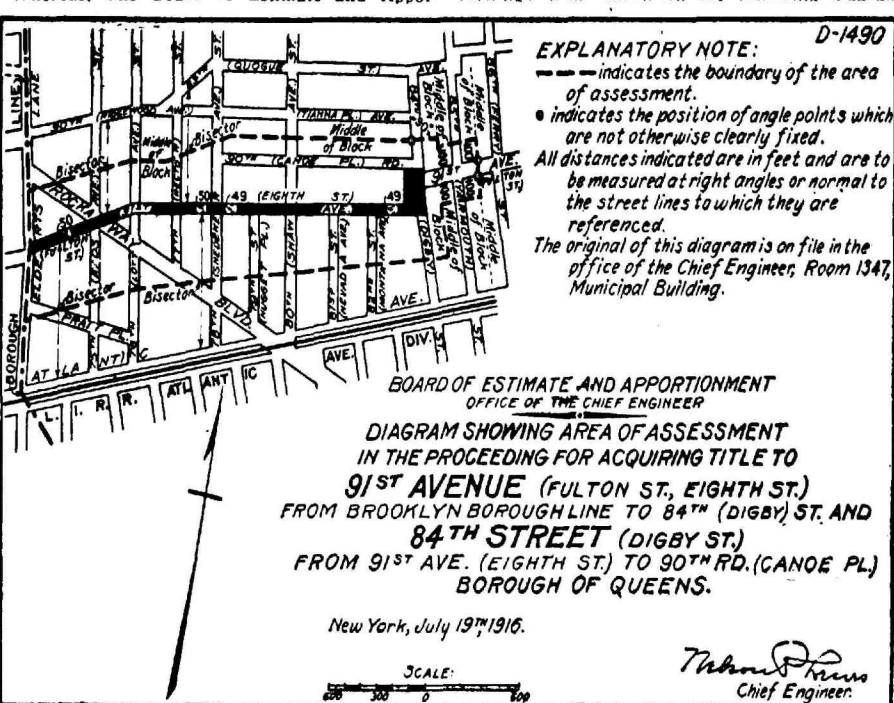
