## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Friday, Jan. 12, 1917, at 3 P. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading “Finance Department,” the following:

Chief Auditor of Accounts.

Chief Accountant.

Collector of City Revenues and Superintendent of Markets.

Chief of the Bureau of Law and Adjustment.

Collector of Assessments and Arrears.

Deputy Collector of Assessments and Arrears.

2 Deputy Receivers of Taxes in each borough.

One William C. Hecht, Jr., addressed the Commission in the matter. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was called on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading “Department of Public Chai’ies,” the title “Confidential Inspector.” There were no appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading “Municipal Court,” the line “Clerk to each Justice” and substituting therefore “Clerk to each Justice except the President-Justice” and by adding thereto the following:

“Secretary to the President-Justice.”

Joseph Rosenthal, an employee of the Municipal Court, addressed the Commission in the matter. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session.

On motion, the matter of the foregoing proposed amendments of the classification in so far as they refer to the Department of Finance and the Department of Public Charities was laid over.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the exempt class, under the heading “Municipal Court,” be and the same hereby is amended by striking therefrom “Clerk to each Justice” and substituting therefor the following:

Clerk to each Justice except the President-Justice.

Private Secretary to the President-Justice.

A report, dated Jan. 11, was presented from the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation relative to Patrick J. Hayes, a candidate for employment as Baker in the Department of Correction under the provisions of clause 11 of Rule XVIII. The Secretary was instructed to mark the candidate “Qualified” for the desired employment.

A report, dated Dec. 4, 1916, was presented from the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation, relative to Harriet M. Gervais, Randall’s Island, N. Y., a candidate for employment as Physician for the Examination of Mental Defectives in the Department of Public Charities under clause 3 of Rule XII. The application of the candidate was rejected, it appearing that she was not licensed to practice medicine in New York State.

A report, dated Jan. 12, was presented from the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation relative to Frederick D. Cooke, 558 Sixteenth st., Brooklyn, a candidate on the eligible list of Stationary Engineer. The Secretary was instructed to summon the candidate to appear before the Commission.

A communication, dated Jan. 5, was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Public Charities, requesting certification of an eligible list from which to appoint one Physician (Female) for the Examination of Mental Defectives at \$1,500 per annum, with maintenance. The Secretary was instructed to inform the department that there was no eligible list for the position and that a person might therefore be nominated for provisional employment under the provisions of clause 3 of Rule XII, pending the promulgation of an eligible list.

The Secretary was instructed to advertise, for Jan. 17, 1917, a public hearing on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class under the heading “Finance Department” the title “Receiver of Taxes.”

The Commission then adjourned, to meet Wednesday, Jan. 17, 1917, at 10:30 a. m.
