



AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance, entitled "An ordinance to provide for the killing of dogs in the City of New York," passed May 27, 1874.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 1 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended by adding thereto, at the end thereof, the following: "And the Commissioners of Police are hereby authorized and directed to cause complaint to be made to the Corporation Attorney against the owner or possessor of every dog permitted to go loose or at large within the corporate limits aforesaid, for recovery of the penalties prescribed in this ordinance, such penalty, when collected, to be accounted for semi-monthly, and paid to the Comptroller of the City of New York, and, upon the requisition of the Mayor, to be applied towards the payment of the expenses of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance."

SEC. 2. Section 2 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended, and shall read as follows:

§ 2. The Mayor of the City of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to take such measures as he may deem most expedient to carry into effect the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance, and for that purpose is hereby further authorized and empowered to appoint two or more persons, each of the age of twenty-one years or upwards, in each of the Assembly Districts in the City of New York, to seize and capture all such dogs found running loose or at large, and to pay such persons so appointed for every such dog so captured and delivered at a place to be provided and designated by the Mayor, the sum of fifty cents. No person shall hinder or molest any person or persons so appointed by the Mayor while engaged in seizing or capturing and delivering any such dog as aforesaid, or any other person engaged in the performance of any duty enjoined by the provisions of this ordinance, under a penalty of not less than twenty-five nor more than one hundred dollars for every offence, to be sued for and recovered in the manner now provided by law or ordinance for the recovery of penalties for violations of the ordinances of the Common Council, on complaint of the person so hindered or molested; the penalty, when recovered, to be accounted for, paid, and appropriated as provided in section 1 of this ordinance. The Commissioners of Police are hereby authorized and required to cause the persons so engaged in the performance of any of the duties prescribed by this ordinance, to be protected from hindrance or molestation. Every dog mentioned in this ordinance, when so captured and delivered as aforesaid, if not claimed by the owner thereof, or any other person, within a period of forty-eight hours thereafter, shall, within six hours after the expiration of the time, be killed and destroyed in such manner as may be determined upon by the Mayor. Any owner or other person who may claim such dog shall, before being placed in possession thereof, pay therefor the sum of three dollars.

Sec. 3. The person authorized to pay for the capture of such dogs shall render under oath, semi-monthly, a statement of all dogs so captured and killed, and the amount paid therefor, to the Mayor of this city, who shall thereupon certify the same to the Comptroller, when a warrant for the amount shall be drawn in favor of the said Mayor for the sum thus expended, which shall be paid, and the other expenses of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance, until otherwise ordered, from the appropriation for City Contingencies.

Sec. 4. The provisions of this ordinance shall apply only to dogs owned or claimed by residents of this city, and any person who shall present any such dog, and claim payment for the capture thereof, which shall not be owned or captured

prescribed in this ordinance to be protected from hindrance or molestation. Every dog mentioned in this ordinance, when so captured and delivered as aforesaid, if not claimed by the owner or any other person, within a period of forty-eight hours thereafter, shall, within six hours after the expiration of that time, be killed and destroyed, in such manner as may be determined upon by the Mayor. Any owner, or other person, who may claim any such dog, shall, before being placed in possession thereof, pay therefor the sum of three dollars.

Sec. 3. Section 3 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended by adding after the word "paid" before the words "until otherwise ordered," the words "and all other expenses of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance."

Sec. 4. Section 4 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. Sections 5, 6, and 7 of the above-entitled ordinance shall hereafter be numbered respectively 4, 5, and 6.

Sec. 6. All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The said ordinance, when so amended, shall read as follows:

AN ORDINANCE to provide for the killing of dogs in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Hereafter it shall not be lawful to permit any dog to go abroad loose, or at large, in any of the streets, lanes, alleys, where not enclosed, highways, parks, or public places within the corporate limits of the City of New York, unless the head of every such dog shall be encased in a wire muzzle sufficiently large to cover the head entirely, but so constructed as to admit of the dog opening its mouth to the fullest extent, and in no case to permit the nose of the dog to protrude; the muzzle to be securely fastened around the throat and behind the ears of every such dog, under a penalty of three dollars for each offence, to be recovered against the owner, possessor, or person who harbored such dog within three days previous to the time of such dog being so found going abroad, loose, or at large, and the Commissioners of Police are hereby authorized and directed to cause complaint to be made to the Corporation Attorney against the owner or possessor of every dog permitted to go loose or at large within the corporate limits, as aforesaid, for the recovery of the penalties prescribed in this ordinance; such penalty, when collected, to be accounted for semi-monthly, and paid to the Comptroller of said city, and upon the requisition of the Mayor, to be applied towards the payment of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 2. The Mayor of the City of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to take such measures as he may deem most efficient to carry into effect the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance; and for that purpose is further authorized and empowered to appoint two or more persons, each of the age of twenty-one years or upwards, in each of the Assembly Districts in the City of New York, to seize and capture all such dogs found running loose or at large, and to pay such persons so appointed for every such dog so captured and delivered at a place to be provided and designated by the Mayor, the sum of fifty cents. Section 3. The person authorized to pay for the capture of such dogs shall render under oath, semi-monthly, a statement of all dogs so captured and killed, and the amount paid therefor, to the Mayor of this city, who shall thereupon certify the same to the Comptroller, when a warrant for the amount shall be drawn in favor of the said Mayor for the sum thus expended, which shall be paid, and the other expenses of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance, until otherwise ordered, from the appropriation for City Contingencies.

Section 4. The provisions of this ordinance shall apply only to dogs owned or claimed by residents of this city, and any person who shall present any such dog, and claim payment for the capture thereof, which shall not be owned or captured

within the corporate limits of this city, shall thereby incur a penalty of ten dollars. This ordinance shall apply only to any such dogs of the age of six months and upwards.

Sec. 5. Chapter XLIV. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The proposal of True W. Rollins for the granite work of a portion of the Museum of Art Building was returned to the Department of Public Parks in accordance with the request of said Department.

The proposal of James Symington for furnishing screened gravel was returned to the Department of Public Parks without the approval of the adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties thereto (Francis H. Smith and S. W. Torrey), in consequence of said parties not appearing to be examined and justify as to the amount of security required by the specification.

The proposal of Michael Cronin, for regulating, grading, etc., Worth street, from Baxter street to Chatham square, was returned to the Department of Public Works without the approval of the sureties thereto, for the reason that an act for the improvement of Worth street, from Broadway to Chatham street, as one work, was passed April 28, 1874, while the award to Mr. Cronin was not made until May 2, 1874, and is for a portion only of the work embraced in and templated by said act.

The proposal of James Clark, for regulating, curbing, gutter and flagging Sixty-first street, from Boulevard to Ninth avenue, was returned to the Department of Public Works without the approval of the sureties thereto, for the reason that a number of the property-owners have made objections to the work being done, that according to the specification it is not of the character for which they applied to the Common Council, and that a portion of the work has already been done by private owners.

The Comptroller attended the proposed opening of bids at the Police Department, on the 14th instant, for maps and printing and supplies for the Bureau of Elections. The opening of the bids was postponed.

A circular (No. 19) dated July 15, 1874, was issued to the several bureaus of the Finance Department, stating that in consequence of the reduction by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the appropriation for salaries, it became necessary to reduce the salaries of all employees 20 per cent.; that all temporary clerks in Bureau for the Collection of Taxes be ordered leave of absence for two months without pay; that the office hours be fixed from 9 A. M. to 5 P. M., daily; and that the usual summer vacation be reduced to one week.

The Comptroller notified the Collector of Assessments that during the months of July and August the messengers in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments will be paid only for such days as their services are required in serving the notices of that Bureau; and if the business is not sufficient to keep them all employed, then each to have an equitable portion of the service to perform.

FINANCE COMMITTEE.

To the Board of Education: The Finance Committee respectfully report, that from the official communication of the Comptroller to this Board, referred to your committee, it appears that at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on the 29th of June last, said Board, by authority of chapter 203 of the Laws of the State, enacted in 1874, revised and redetermined the estimate heretofore made by them of the sums necessary for the purposes of public instruction during the year 1874, and approved the same as follows:

For salaries of teachers, janitors, superintendents, clerks, and employees	\$2,580,000
For supplies, rents, ordinary repairs of buildings, furniture and heating apparatus, and all incidental expenses, including \$5,000 for examination and report on the subject of warming and ventilating the public school buildings	472,500

This revised estimate reduces the aggregate sum appropriated by the said Board in December last, for the original twenty-two wards, one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000), which is deducted from the two amounts named "for purchasing sites and erecting new school buildings," and "for alterations and extraordinary repairs to buildings," etc., as proposed by this Board in the resolution adopted on the 20th of May last.

For the purpose of conforming the reserved fund to this revised estimate, your Committee submit for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the sum of four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000), "set apart and reserved" by resolution adopted by this Board on the 24th of January last, "for purchasing, leasing, and procuring sites, and for erecting new buildings in Wards One to Twenty-two," be and the same is hereby reduced to the sum of two hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars (\$275,000); and that the sum of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) "set apart and reserved," by resolution adopted on the 21st of July last, for "alterations and extraordinary repairs to buildings, heating apparatus, and furniture," etc., for Wards One to Twenty-two, be and the same is hereby reduced to the sum of one hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars (\$175,000), which reduced amounts are in conformity with the revised estimates for the purposes of public instruction for the year 1874, made by the Board of Estimate and

Apportionment at a meeting held by said Board on the 29th of June last.

At meetings of the Board governing this Department, held during the two weeks ending 4th of July, 1874, inclusive, all the Commissioners present, the following action was had:

Organization, Appointments, etc.

June 24.—Resolution offered by Commissioner Budd dismissing John Turner, Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies, from the service of the Department, and laid on the table at the meeting held the 18th of June, 1874, taken from the table, and the ayes and noes being called on its adoption, it was not adopted by the following vote: Ayes — Commissioner Budd; noes — Commissioners Gardner and Westervelt.

Rules and Orders Adopted.

July 2.—All stonemasons employed by this Department, cutting a daily average of twelve square feet of beds and joints, their equivalent, shall be paid at the rate of \$4 per day; and all cutting less than that quantity shall be paid at the rate of thirty-three and one-third cents per square yard; and any cutter cutting less than an average of eight feet per diem, shall not be continued in the employ of the Department.

Applications for Leases, etc.

June 25.—From Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad Company, for lease of portion of Piers 51 and 52, East river, and bulkhead between, for general transportation business of the company. Denied; said premises being required for vessels of the largest draft.

Applications for Permits, etc.

June 22.—From Union Ferry Company, to place gate or door in fence on westerly side of Pier 2, East river, and to erect small house in space between said fence and ferry dock. Granted.

June 25.—From E. W. Jacobs, to insert 6-inch drain pipe in bulkhead, between Piers 8 and 9, North river, to connect with building 59 West street. Granted.

June 25.—From House of Refuge, to drive piles and erect a platform thereon on southerly side of Pier at One Hundred and Nineteenth street, North river, to be used as a landing for a ferry boat. Granted.

June 25.—From Charles H. Longstreet, lessee of part of Pier at One Hundred and Thirtieth street, Harlem river, to have the premises set aside for the exclusive use of the business of his line of small steamboats, running on the Harlem river. Granted.

June 25.—From Washington Ice Company, to erect a platform, 100 feet by 12 feet, on Bulkhead north of Thirty-second street, East river, for landing of ice. Granted.

June 29.—The permission granted Charles H. Longstreet, 22d inst., to use the premises leased by him at One Hundred and Thirtieth street, Harlem river, exclusively for his line of Harlem River Steamboats, annulled and terminated.

July 2.—From Washington Ice Company, to erect on the platforms at their depots, at Bank street, and on pier, at Twenty-second street, North river, a shed or house, ten feet square, for protection of ice. Granted.

Repairs, etc., ordered.

June 25.—Superintendent Turner directed to make necessary repairs to dumping board, at Twenty-first street, North river, the Bureau of Street Cleaning reporting it as insecure.

June 25.—Owners of bulkhead north of Pier 49, East river, notified to make necessary repairs thereto, and to place same in serviceable condition.

June 29.—Superintendent Turner directed to repair Pier 56, East river, at a cost of \$9,400.69, the New York and Brooklyn Ferry Company, representing owners of the southwesterly half,

having agreed to pay one-half the said cost, upon the completion of the work.

July 2.—Action of President in directing Superintendent Turner to make the necessary repairs to dock at Castle Garden, and which were completed 27th May, 1874, approved and confirmed.

Miscellaneous.

June 24.—Counsel to the Corporation directed to take the necessary legal steps for the collection from Jeremiah J. Austin of all unpaid rent due from him as lessee of part of Piers 5 and 6, East river.

June 25.—The Secretary directed to prepare and transmit to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, for payment, a statement of claim, amounting to \$51.85, for loss of, and damage to, property of the Department, on Floating Boring Machine, leased to said Company, from 27th March to 7th April, 1874.

June 25.—Secretary directed to publish notice in the papers designated by law that clean filling may be deposited at the foot of Christopher street, North river, inside the bulkhead wall, upon the payment of ten cents per load, and that the necessary tickets be prepared and issued therefor.

June 25.—Secretary directed to prepare and transmit to the New York Lighter Company, for payment, a statement of claim, amounting to \$20, for damages sustained by Pile-driver No. 8, consequent upon being run into by said Company's lighter "Rio," on June 24, 1874.

June 25.—Comptroller advised in reply to communication informing the Department that Night Watchman Cooper was in the employ of the Knickerbocker Ice Company during the daytime, that said Cooper performed his duties faithfully, being always at his post; that he is only employed by the Ice Company about two hours each day; and that there exists no reason for his being dismissed the service of this Department.
