Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 3, 1887:

There were 8,449 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police.

There were 871 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police.

There were 355 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 84 permits.

There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 5 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 4 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 50 permits.

I herewith forward reports from Chief Inspectors Tracy, Edson and Bullard of the work performed by themselves and their respective corps.

The certificates of 830 births, 55 still-births, 227 marriages and 693 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, September 3, 1887.

This shows an increase of 129 births and 52 marriages, and a decrease of 4 still-births, and 5 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 148 births, and 25 marriages, and a decrease of 4 still-births and 29 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 1; diphtheria, 10; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 7; diarrhoeal diseases, 23; inanition, 2; cancer, 3; heart diseases, 10; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; convulsions, 11; direct effect of solar heat, 2; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 8; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 1; drowning, 5; while the deaths from small-pox increased 2; measles, 2; croup, 6; whooping cough, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 8; bronchitis, 11; pneumonia, 11; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 8; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; premature and preterm births, 10. The number of deaths from alcoholism and rheumatism and gout was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 229 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 300 under two years, 340 under five years, and 38 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 32 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 49.06 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 123 were in institutions, 416 in tenement-houses, 139 in houses containing three families or less, 2 in hotels and boarding-houses, 13 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 12 were on the basement floor, 130 on the first, 155 on the second, 142 on the third, 79 on the fourth, 38 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 676 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 17 non-residents; 101 were stated to be single, 145 married, 56 widowed, and the condition of 391 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 693; still-births, 55; bodies in transit, 12; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 80 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 830 births, 227 marriages, 55 still-births, 693 deaths; 12 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 112 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 6 transcripts of the birth record, 8 of marriage, and 72 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending September 3, 1887, was 65.2 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 30.008; the mean humidity was 59, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 859, and the total amount of rain-fall was .01 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 674 deaths and still-births, or 90.11 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 27; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 272; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 89; Greenwood (undenominational), 31; Lutheran (undenominational), 118; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 12; Evergreen (undenominational), 41; Woodlawn (undenominational), 27; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 20; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 5; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 2; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 10; Washington (undenominational), 16.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water used.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt. Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
